Sammy Kaye Davis, born March 24, 1943, to Mr. and Mrs. Lester F. Davis. Mrs. Davis and her children are at home here.



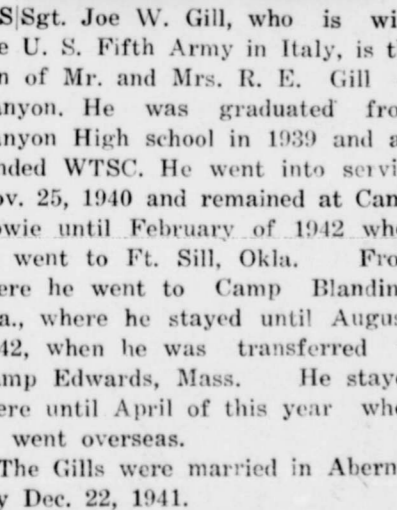
