Education Grant Is "Okayed" For Haskell County

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Congressman Omar Burleson announced today a \$98,875.76 Office of Education grant to the State of Texas for 674 children in Haskell County, age 5 to 17, all of whom are in low income families.

The allotment of funds was made available for fiscal year 1971 under the provisions of Part A of Title I, of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act which provides special programs for educationally disadvantaged children.

Hunter said he had no burglary insurance and lost 125 men's suits, 25 sport coats, 25 jackets, 20 sweaters and six pair of coveralls.

The loss was discovered this morning when the business opened Friday morning.

According to Mr. Hunter entry was made by prying open the back door to the building.

Haskell County Sheriff Garth Garrett began investigation immediately upon notification of the burglary.

Since he has served in Vietnam for two years, SFC Warner has a wealth of experiences to relate. After returning to the states, he was assigned to Louisiana State University at Baton Rouge as an instructor.

The office is approximately 5 days behind in classing, according to John E. Williams, In-Charge. Samples classed for the week ending December 4, 1970, totaled 9,156. The total for the season was 55,889.

Grades showed an increase in the amount of light spotted cotton classed with 32's accounting for 40 percent; 42's, 24 percent; 31's, 6 percent; and 41's, 23 percent. Staple lengths showed an increase with 29's making up 27 percent; 30's, 48 percent; 31's, 8 percent; 32's, 7 percent; and 33 and longer, 8 percent.

big yards. After picking up the first two first downs, however, the Indians were forced to punt on 4th. 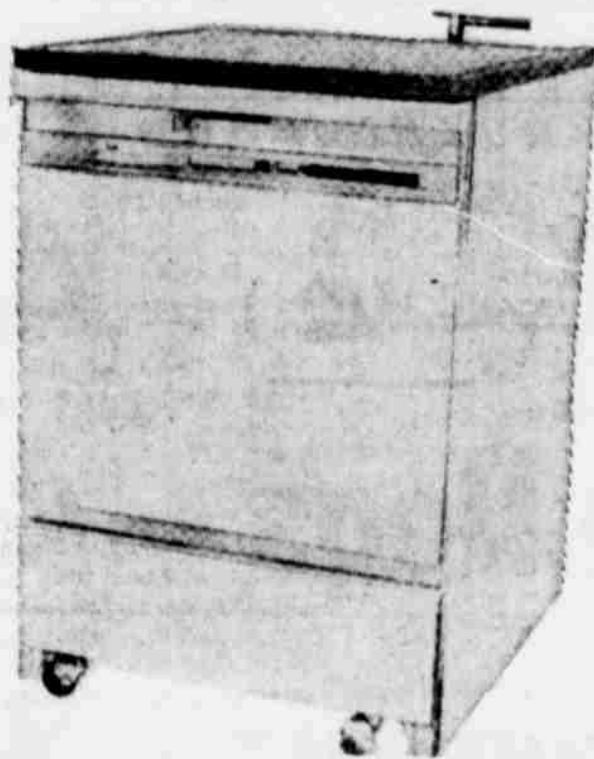

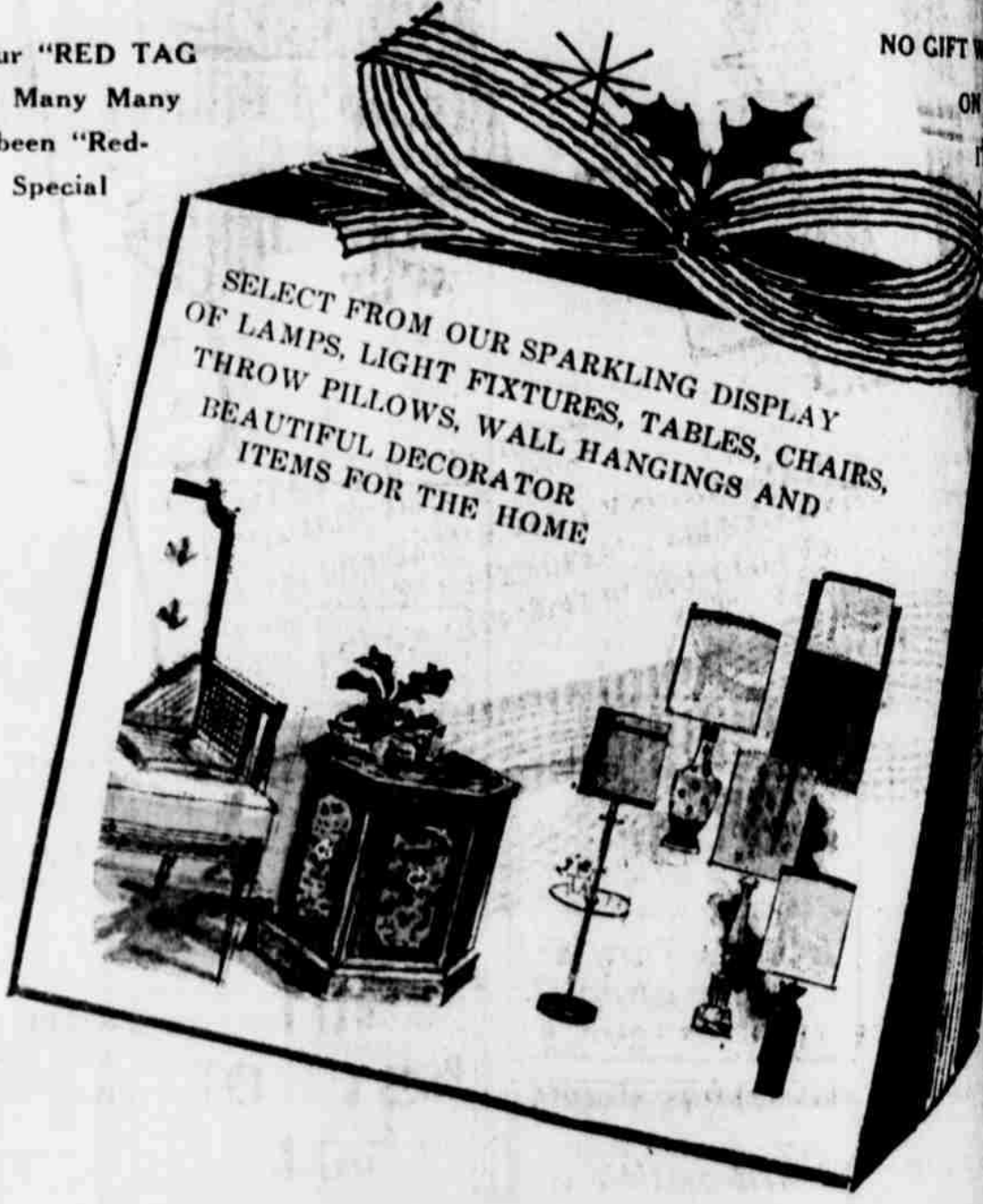

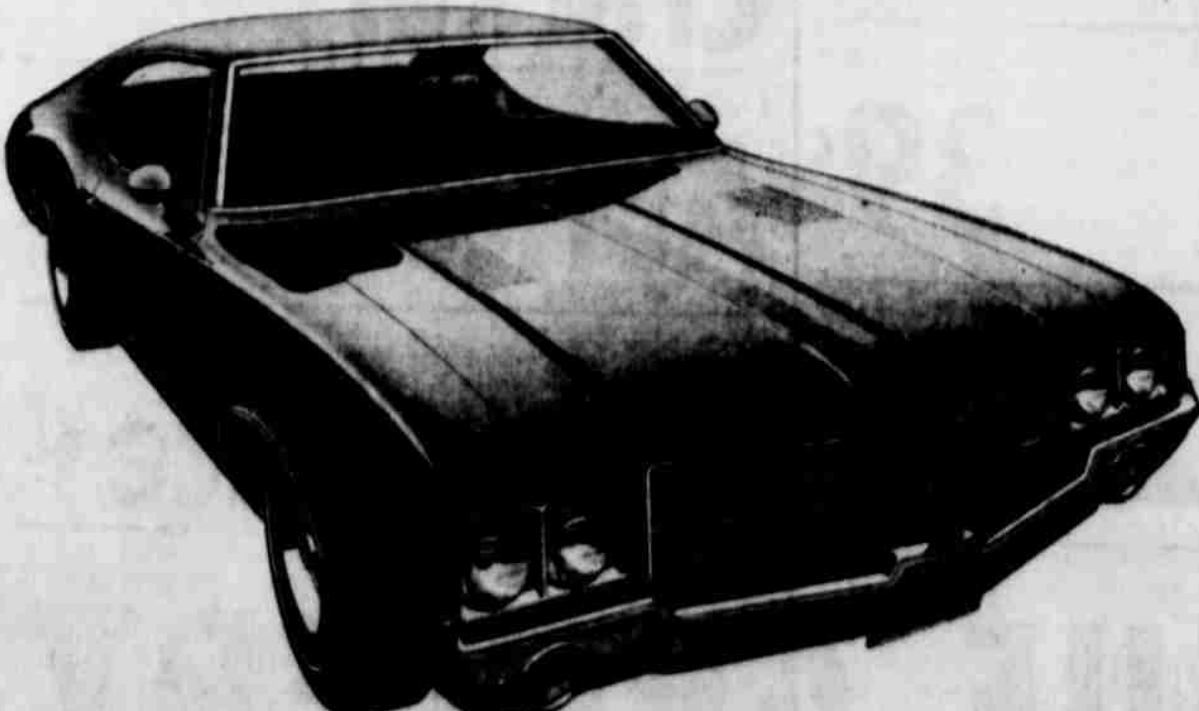

But the public did not take to "The Chimes," probably because it was filled with uncomfortable topical satire. "The Christmas Carol" survived and became increasingly popular, Dr. Nisbet believes, because it is cheerful and "Christmasy", with a social doctrine shapeless enough to be acceptable to all.

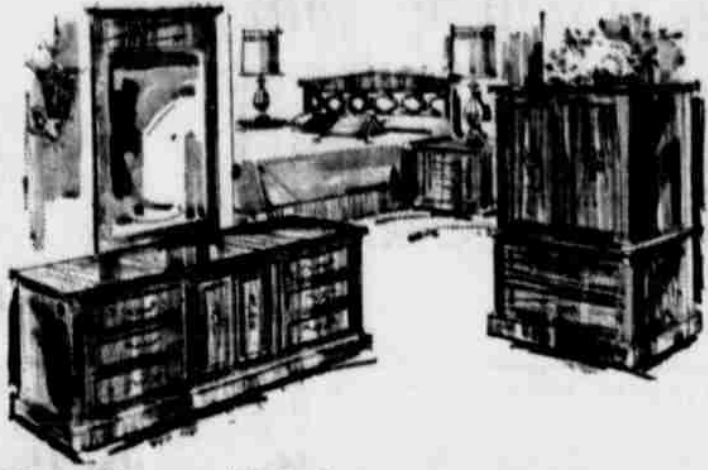

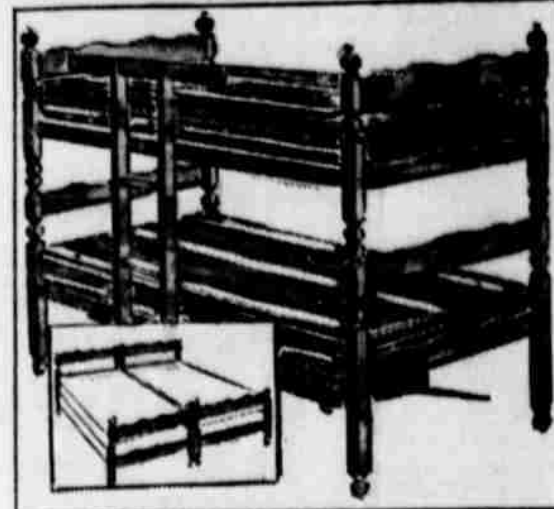

Tri-County Swine Shortcourse Is Slated December 14th and 15th

A Swine Short Course featuring outstanding speakers in the various phases of swine production will be held at Stamford on Dec. 14 and 15.

The program will begin each evening at 7:30 p. m. in the Stamford City Hall, adjacent to County Agricultural Agent, Max Stapleton. It is being sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and is designed especially for swine producers and other interested individuals in Haskell, Jones and Fisher counties. However, everyone in the Rolling Plains Economic Program area is invited to attend.

Featured speakers will be Dr. William B. Thomas of College Station and Dr. Gilbert R. Hollis of Lubbock, both Extension swine specialists; Dr. Bob Jones, a veterinarian from Childress; Paul E. Gross of Big Spring, Howard County agricultural agent; Norman Brints of Vernon, Extension farm management specialist; and three producers, Buddy Walters of Lubbock, Albert Mayberry of Rotan and Charles Graf of Vernon.

Thomas, Jones and Gross will speak at the first evening of the short course. Topics to be discussed will be "Breeding

Versus Commercial Swine Operations, Swine Disease Control and Prevention, and Small Things Make the Difference in a Farrow-to-Finish Operation."

On December 15, Brints will discuss the "Economic Situation" while Hollis will talk about "Rations for Complete Confinement, Partial Confinement and Farm Processing." The three producers will appear as a panel and will discuss "Building and Equipment Ideas."

Presiding at the short course will be Birger Haterius, Jones County farmer and chairman of the County Program Building Committee.

According to Max Stapleton, the short course is being conducted in support of the R-PEP and "3.76 in '76," the statewide Extension Program designed to boost Texas' agricultural income by \$1 billion by 1976.

The two-day short course is designed to provide producers with the latest information on swine production to increase individual profits and thereby reach the goals projected for the county and the Rolling Plains Economic Program area, adds Stapleton.

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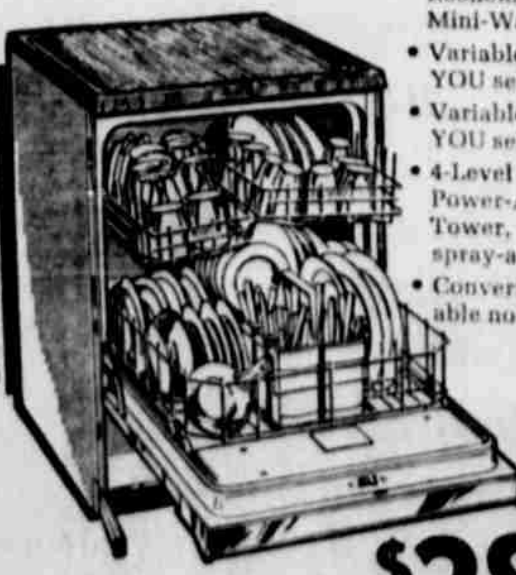
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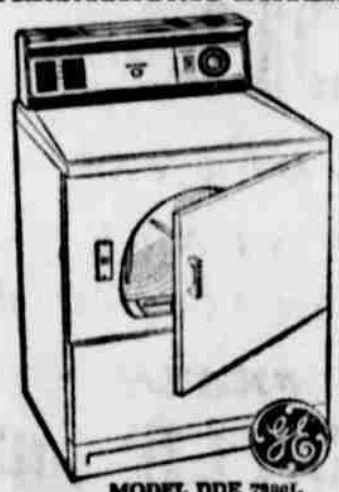

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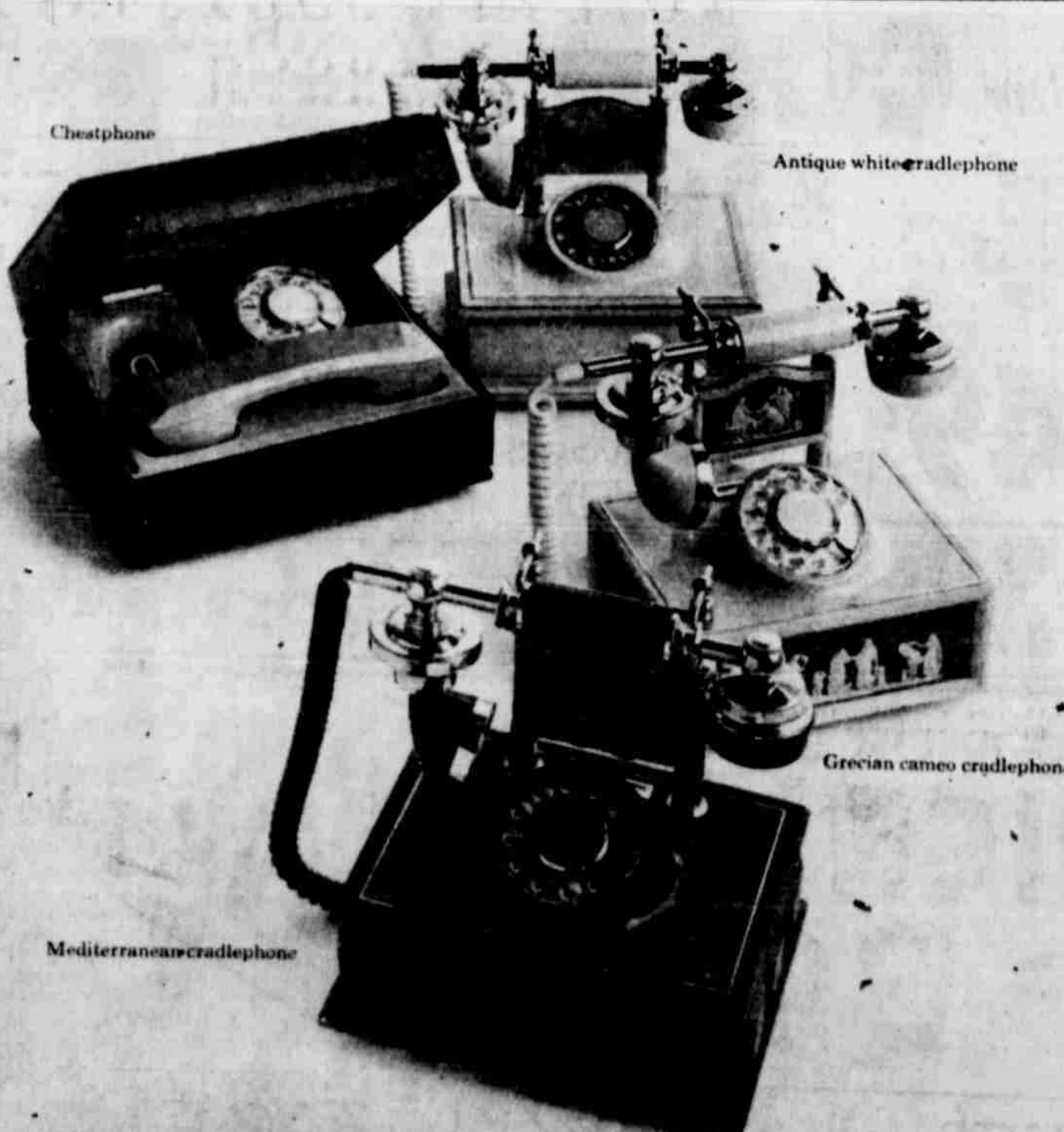
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
