Our recipe for this week is one you may like to use for Holiday dinner:

**Pumpkin Pie—9 Inch pie**

1-3/4 cups cooked or canned pumpkin  
1/2 tsp. salt  
1-3/4 cups milk  
2 large eggs (1/2 cup) or 4 yolks  
2/3 cup brown sugar (packed)  
2 tsp. sugar  
1-1/4 tsp. cinnamon  
1/2 tsp. ginger  
1/2 tsp. nutmeg  
1/4 tsp. cloves

Heat oven to 425 degrees (hot). Beat ingredients together with a rotary beater. Pour into pastry-lined pie pan. Bake 45 to 55 minutes. Just until a silver knife inserted one inch from edge of crust comes out clean. The center may still look soft but will set later. (Too long baking makes pumpkin pie watery). Serve slightly warm.

For a Shiny Top on Pumpkin Pie, thoroughly blend the filling mixture to completely dissolve the sugar. Mix the ingredients well with a rotary beater; let mixture stand while preparing the pastry.

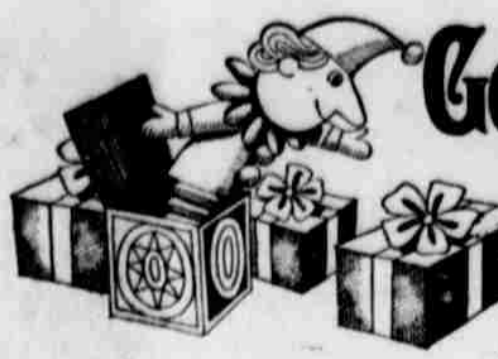

30 YEARS AGO (December 1, 1939) In a special city election Tuesday, marked by light balloting, Haskell voters elected Henry Atkinson, grocer, and Dr. J. G. Vaughtner, dentist, as Aldermen to fill two vacancies on the City Council caused by the recent resignations of Dr. T. W. Williams and John V. Davis. A total of 112 votes were polled in the election, held at the City Hall. Tabulation of the votes was as follows: For Place No. 1: Henry Atkinson, 88 votes. The name of Jim Reeves, which was not printed on the ballot, was written in by 14 voters. For Place No. 2: Dr. J. G. Vaughtner, 54, Virgil Brown 50. The new-elected Aldermen will assume their posts at the next meeting of the City Council. Other members of the committee are J. W. Gholson, Ben Bagwell and Jason W. Smith.

VISIT SOCIAL SECURITY OFFICE FOR SS OR MEDICARE INFORMATION Now that the Social Security Administration has over 800 offices throughout the country, it's more convenient than ever to apply for social security benefits. R. R. Tuley, Jr., district manager for social security in Abilene, added the following suggestions.

It's not difficult to find the address of your nearest Social Security office. Simply look in the telephone directory under the heading "Social Security Administration" or "U. S. Government."

If you are too sick to come into the office, a representative will be sent to your home or even to a hospital.

If you are planning to retire, get in touch with your social security office a month or so ahead of time so that your checks can begin promptly.

Because of poor health, unemployment, or for personal reasons, you may want to retire before you are 65. Retirement benefits are payable as early as age 62, but in a reduced amount to take account of the longer period over which payments will be made.

If you decide to go on working, you should touch base with your social security office during the 3 months before your 65th birthday—even if you do not have any retirement plans. Your Medicare rights could be jeopardized by delay.
