Edwin James Watson Lane was born in 1836 at Newberry, Virginia. He came to Texas in 1880 and to Callahan County in 1898.

James married Jeanette Lane at Terrell, Texas June 1, 1897. She was born in 1861 at Ritchie County, West Virginia.

J.E.W. Lane served in the 50th Virginia Infantry Regiment, Company J. James enlisted in July, 1861 at County, Pulaski Virginia. He was in Tennessee in February, 1862; was captured at Fort Donelson. After being exchanged, he was assigned to the Department of Western Virginia and fought at Carnifax Ferry. Later the 50th served in J.M. Jones', G.C. Wharton's, and Forsberg's Brigade, Army of Northern Virginia. It participated in numerous conflicts from Chancellorsville to Cold Harbor, moved with Early to the Shenandoah Valley and fought it's last battle at Waynesborough at the battle of Gettysburg. J. was disabled and given leave of absence. Lee surrendered April 9, 1865 while he was still at home. As a matter of fact he did not surrender or return.

From July 1 until 20 July 3, 1863, 190,000 soldiers charged, retreated, rallied and charged again in the Texas.

Aid & Attendance--compared outcomes A Veteran on disability pension may be eligible for more monthly payment if that Veteran is confined to the home (housebound) or in need of care by another person (aid attendance). A housebound Veteran with one dependent would receive slightly over \$1700 more per year while a Veteran on Aid & Attendance with one dependent would receive slightly over \$4600 more per year. A Veteran's widow on Aid & Attendance pension would receive an additional \$3100 over the regular Widow's annual pension.

Remember that pension is subject to reduction if there is any other income. including Social Security. For example, VA presently pays \$460 per month as Widow's pension. If the widow receives \$360 from Social Security, then VA will pay only \$100 per month. Cancer vs. AIDS---A

If the elderly person doesn't need much help, you may find that existing community services can cover your needs. But for complicated cases, ask for a referral to a local geriatric-case manager. An elderly person who needs help with basics like getting dressed and going to the bathroom requires round the clock care. Your best bet is probably going through a home care agency.

Remember what you read in the first item of this column?? A person needing the care described in this home caré item will most likely qualify for the housebound or aid & attendance benefit. Those extra payments can go a long way toward paying for the costs of home care.
