These crashes resulted in one person killed, two persons injured and an estimated properdamage of \$1,775.00,

The rural accident summary for this county during the first ten months of 1970 shows a total of 74 accidents resulting in four persons killed, 42 persons injured, and an estimated properdamage of \$61,115.00.

Traffic wise, November and December are noted as dangermonths for pedestrians. ous. During November and December of 1969 in Texas, there were 86 pedestrians killed and 885 injured in collisions with motor vehicles, Some of the attributing factors are: early hours of darkness, bad weather, drinking intoxicating beverages, holidays, and lack of drivers' and pedestrians' attention.

The veteran patrol supervisor listed some tips to aid both pedestrians and drivers. Always wear something light colored when walking after dark. If possible, carry some kind of light and walk on the left side of the road facing traffic. If you have a dark colored raincoat or overcoat, put a strip or two of reflectorized material across the back and front when walking on the street or high-

A new high in littering has been reached by the litterbugs. Mount Whitney in California . the highest peak in the nation with the exception of Mount McKinley in Alaska - has joined the ranks of the scenic areas that are being despoiled by a careless public.

According to information, the noble summit of Mount Whitney After Game Fellowship is littered with paper, bottles, cans and the like. Each summer the National Parks Service hauls tons of the stuff from the peak using pack animals to get it down the steep trails. The situation is so serious that the Park Service is considering building a heliport on the summit to expedite trash removel . a lot of people are, to put it bluntly, behaving like slobs. It takes a lot of energy to deposit garbage on top of the nation's second highest peak. If a little of this energy could be turned into brainpower to help keep the country clean and beautiful, we would have a land of unsurpassed beauty.

One does not have to climb to the top of Mount Whitney nor visit the National Parks, to see the work of litterbugs. Just drive out on some of the rural roads and even the main highways in Haskell County, and you will find many of them littered with bottles, beer cans and all sorts of rubbish.
