(Editor's Note: The following news story is from the Snyder newspaper. It concerns the automobile accident which happened north of Snyder, on July 27, in which James McKnight, formerly of Abernathy, was seriously injured. James, who was discharged from the army on July 16, this year, was wounded at St. Lo, France, July 26, 1944. He was moved from the Snyder hospital to the veterans hospital at Amarillo.)

In one of those unusual accidents which happen only once in a blue moon, James McKnight of Plainview, had his left arm severed, completely, four inches below the shoulder, at 2:30 o'clock Saturday morning when another vehicle sideswiped the sport model coupe he was driving. McKnight, oddly enough, had been released from a government hospital only 30 days before the accident. The same arm had been severely wounded in combat action overseas.

McKnight's left arm was stiff and he was resting the limb on the car door when the accident occurred.

A touch of irony entered the accident picture, for McKnight, while in the government hospital, had urged army physicians to take off the injured arm. This they had refused to do. He had been in the army hospital nine months for arm injury treatments.

McKnight was reported Wednesday to be recovering from the "believe it or not" accident on schedule.

Although Billy Jack Hackler, young son of S/Sgt. and Mrs. James T. (Jack) Hackler, of Abernathy and Durant, wasn't present and was unaware of what was taking place, he came through in a recent competition to become a "champ" at this fighter repair and modification center. His photograph was entered by his proud pop in a competition conducted by the Red Cross to determine the prettiest babies of servicemen at this station. Billy Jack romped away with top honors in the male event, it was disclosed after a tabulation was made of votes cast by servicemen serving here.

His pop, a supply sergeant, who has been serving overseas since August, 1943, is pictured above just about to cut the "champ's" cake, which, in addition to prize money amounting to about \$5, made up the winnings. Miss Betty Bardwell, Morristown, N. J., Red Cross program director, looks on. Billy Jack's photograph, bearing the number 20, in which the "champ" appears to be watching the proceedings, is posted to the right of his pop.
