ABERNATHY SCHOOLS TO BEGIN 1946-'47 TERM SEPTEMBER 2

Abernathy schools will open the 1946-1947 term on Monday, September 2, Supt. W. V. Swinburn announced. Buses will start their runs at about 7 o'clock that morning and registering of students will follow an assembly program which is to begin at 9 o'clock. Buses will start the return trips that day at about 11 a. m. The public is invited to attend the opening program Swinburn stated.

After opening day, buses will start on morning runs at about 7 o'clock, classes will begin at 8:45 a. m. and close at 3:45 p. m.

Lunch Price to Increase

The school will operate eight buses, including two or three new vehicles. The list of drivers has not been completed, the superintendent said.

Operation of the school lunchroom will begin Tuesday or Wednesday after opening day. Detailed announcements concerning price to be charged for meals and the day to begin operation will be made in the assembly program Sept. 2. Due to inflated cost of food, the lunchroom cannot operate on the 20c-per-meal charged last year, Swinburn stated. The lunch-

Must Have Certificates

Men in charge of buildings will be G. H. Meredith and I. J. Pollock.

Enrollment for the new term is expected to range from 650 to 700. The schools will have 28 teachers, 15 in grade school and 12 in high school. The high school has 33 1/2 affiliated credits.

Children reaching the age of six years on, or before, September 1, 1946, may enroll this term. Crowded conditions will not permit enrollment of under-age children.

Parents of children enrolling in school for the first time on Sept. 2 are asked to bring the child's birth certificate.

Beginner students and those entering Abernathy schools for the first time must have certificates to show that they have been successfully vaccinated against smallpox.

Texans to Vote Saturday In Second Primary Election

Hale Soil District Voting Set Saturday

August 24 has been set for the Standard Soil Conservation District election to be voted upon by landowners and their wives in Hale County. Election boxes will be available at the regular voting polls for this election next Saturday.

The regular polling place in Abernathy is at the fire hall. G. G. Gilliland is to be judge and Chris Benn, clerk.

Alfred Ebeling is to be judge in the election at Cotton Center and E. B. Allen was named clerk.

The holding of this election is a result of the public hearing held in Plainview, July 8, when a representative of the State Soil Conservation Board was present to discuss the advantages of a Standard Soil Conservation District at the request of land owners in the county.

The State Board decided, as a result of the meeting, that there was enough interest in the county to merit an election to determine whether or not a majority of farmers were in favor of creating a Standard Soil Conservation District. A two-thirds majority is required to create this District. It is urged by Ollie F. Limer, Assistant County Agricultural Agent, that all land owners and their wives cast their votes in this election.

Advantages of a Standard Soil Conservation District over the Wind Erosion District are:

1. Will put the management of soil conservation work in the county directly in the hands of the landowners, since they personally elect the supervisors who govern the district.

2. Will save the county money, since it will no longer have to pay the wind erosion district supervisors' expenses on meeting days.

3. Will make available to landowners the assistance of the State Soil Conservation Board.

The State Board is preparing to hire additional men to work with conservation districts of the state.

The State Board has ready support of the legislature that will make available \$400,000 worth of machinery to the soil conservation districts of the State.

4. Will make available to the district the help and cooperation of the State Association of Soil Conservation Supervisors.

5. Will control wind and water erosion and improve soil productivity in Texas.

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\$5,000 Bond Is Set For Cotton

PLAINVIEW, Aug. 14. — Leroy (Junior) Cotton, 22-year-old veteran of World War II, of Abernathy was charged in Justice of the Peace W. W. Lewis' court here early Tuesday night with the murder of Jess M. Jenkins, Abernathy cafe employe.

Cotton waived examining trial this morning and his bond set at \$5,000. He made bond at noon Tuesday and was released to await action of the grand jury.

Taken into custody late Tuesday afternoon (August 13) at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Cotton, in Abernathy, the youth made a statement to District Attorney Harold M. LaFont in LaFont's office here and signed at 5 p. m. Tuesday in the presence of the elder Cotton, LaFont and a news reporter.

Asked about his war record after he had placed his signature on the statement, Cotton's voice faltered and tears came into his eyes. He said he came home eight months ago after serving 24 months with an infantry outfit in the European theater. He was hospitalized several months for an injury he received in the battle zone but not in action, he said.

According to Cotton's statement he went into Cliff's cafe at Abernathy about 12:30 Tuesday morning, August 13. He said he was accompanied by a friend and that there were a number of people in the eating place when they arrived.

Cotton said he ate three scrambled eggs and drank a glass of milk and asked Jenkins to charge the bill.

"No, my orders are not to charge anything tonight," Cotton quoted Jenkins in his statement.

"I went around the counter just to aggravate him and he stepped back and drew an ice pick. I grabbed hold of his shoulders and he was facing me and shook him a couple of times," Cotton's statement read.

"He dropped the ice pick. I turned loose as to walk away. The man fell, struck his head against the side of some empty coke cases. The right side of his head just above the ear, was where he struck. I picked the man up in my arms and carried him to the kitchen and called the doctor and worked with him a few minutes. Then I picked him up and carried him to doctor's office four doors north. I laid him down on a divan where the doctor gave him a hypo and felt his pulse.

"Cotton was turned to me and said, 'Cotton, he is dead.'"

The young man said he had had been eating three times a day at the Cliff's cafe for several months and owed a bill there. He is employed with a hay baling crew in the Abernathy vicinity. The Cotton family has lived in Abernathy several years.

Officers said examination of Jenkins' body revealed two wounds in the man's chest. Sheriff Ted Andrews said the wounds could have been made by an ice pick. One of the wounds was in the center of the chest and did not penetrate the cavity. The other was slightly to the right of the middle of the chest and ranged toward the heart. Physicians said Jenkins apparently died almost instantly.

Budget Hearing For Hale Aug. 26

A public hearing on the Hale county budget for the ensuing tax year will be held at the office of County Judge Ernest Tibbets, starting at ten o'clock Aug. 26. The court has officially given public notice of the hearing.

These hearings are generally attended by a small number of citizens. There is no likelihood the county tax rate will be changed this year. The court plans to set the rate following the official public hearing.

Currently the rate 25 cents on the hundred dollar valuation for general fund, 23 cents for permanent improvements, 8 cents for retirement of the county airport bonds, and 12 cents for road and bridge bonds, Judge Tibbets said.
