## WCSA Area School Is Set in Lubbock

The Northwest Texas Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service of the Methodist Church is planning its first Conference-wide School of Missions to be held at Texas Tech at Lubbock July 31 through August 4. The purpose of the school is to bring to the women of the conference in a condensed form information concerning the total program of the Society for the year. Clinics will be held each day under the direction of the corresponding Conference officer in the following lines of work: President, Secretaries of Missionary Education and Service, Christian Social Relations, Missionary Personnel, Literature and Publications, Spiritual Life, Student Work, and Wesleyan Service Guild.

Mrs. T. W. Whigham, Conference Secretary of Missionary Education has been elected Dean of the School. Warehouse receipts presented at the PMA office will be honored immediately, Maderia said.

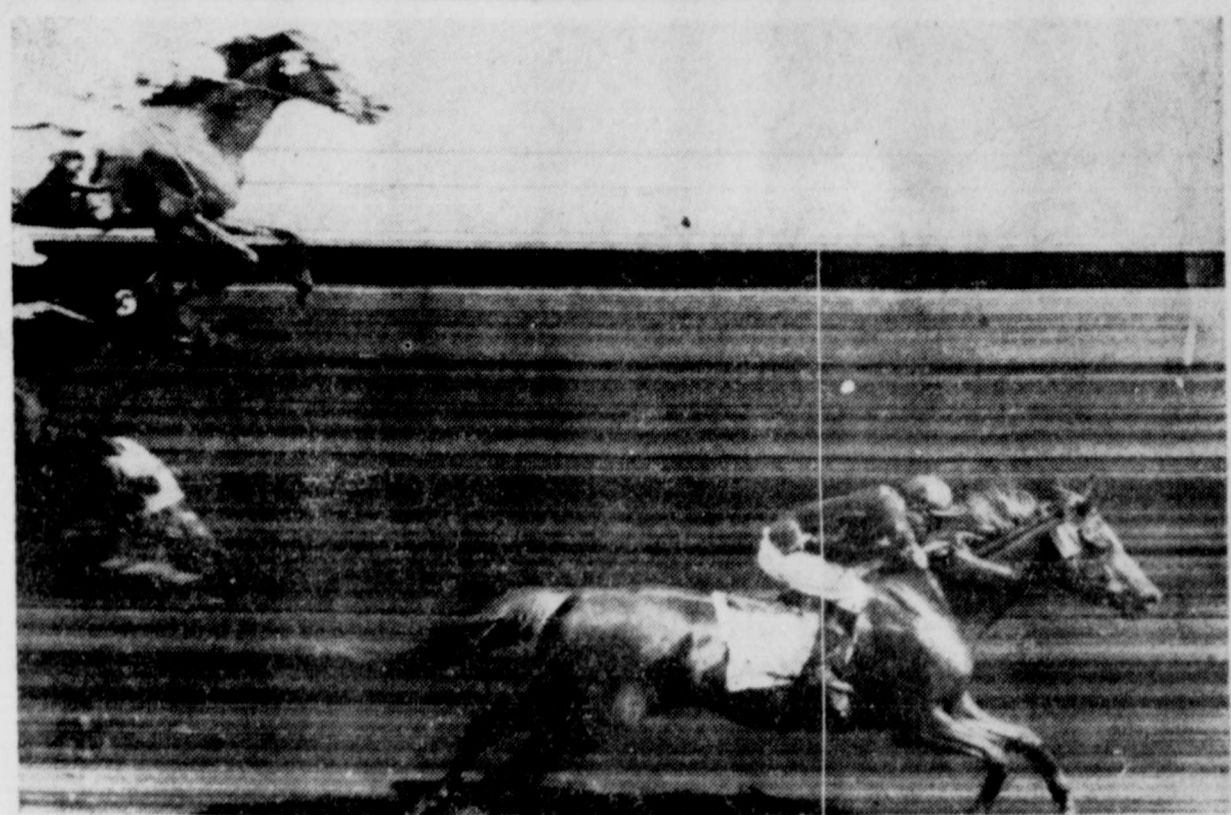

## LUBBOCK COUNTY FARMERS PLAN WATER DISTRICT

With petitions circulating throughout the county, Lubbock farmers are moving to form an underground water conservation district under House Bill 162.

They took the action July 6, at a meeting addressed by W. O. Fortenberry, New Deal ginner and president of the Lubbock and High Plains water associations; L. A. Howard, Lubbock lawyer; A. P. Dugan, Jr., Littlefield lawyer; and Raymond Lee Johnson, Plainview representative of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

Fortenberry told the farmers that the High Plains Water Conservation and Users Association, which steered House Bill 162 through the 51st Legislature, "can't represent you again in Austin if you don't make this law work."

The conservation district law was substituted for legislation seeking state control of water. The present law guarantees private ownership and provides for a conservation program carried out by local, independent water districts.

"This is our own program, we asked for it, and we must make it work or take the consequences," Fortenberry declared.

The above instrument is a Copy of the official action taken by the Commissioners' Court of Hale County, on a claim for \$1,400.00 prepared and presented to the Commissioners' Court for payment, by Mr. Watson. This claim was rejected by the Court, and the Commissioners' Court voted NOT to pay the claim, because the Commissioners' Court considered this claim illegal and unjust.

All the time that Mr. Watson was presenting the above claim and other claims to the Court, he, Mr. Watson, was drawing the same salary as the other County officials.

Mr. Watson became very indignant because the Commissioners' Court would not pay the \$1400.00 claim, and was continuously thereafter hostile to the entire Commissioners' Court, and thereafter failed and refused to cooperate with the Commissioners' Court; in every instance thereafter where the opportunity presented itself, and his ability would permit, he obstructed the acts and workings of the Commissioners' Court.

Mr. Watson said he employed his daughter to work for him, with the full knowledge and consent of the Commissioners' Court. Mr. Watson, is this statement true? The facts are that Mr. Watson hired his daughter, without the knowledge and without the consent of the Commissioners' Court; and when he, Mr. Watson, presented a claim for his daughter's services, and some question was raised as to the legality of this particular claim, he, Mr. Watson again became enraged and abusive.

Mr. Watson made the public statement that "in 1947 he took issue" with the Commissioners' Court, but he did not state the true reason why he did so; the TRUE REASON that he took issue with the Commissioners' Court is and was because the Commissioners' Court REFUSED to pay the \$1400.00 claim above mentioned, and other claims that were also illegal and unjust presented by him for payment.

At the time the \$1400.00 claim was denied payment, the Commissioners' Court had not obtained a ruling from the Attorney General of Texas; soon thereafter a ruling was had from Attorney General of Texas relative to the legality of the claim for \$1400.00, and the Attorney General's Department held emphatically that the \$1400.00 claim was illegal and COULD NOT be paid.
