COTTON CLASSING SCHOOL IS SCHEDULED AUG. 14-25

The Extension Service, represented by local County Agents, with the cooperation of the Cotton Branch of the Production and Marketing Administration, announces the dates for the 2nd annual Farmers' Cotton Classing School. The school will be held from August 14 through August 25 at the Government Classing Office, 1701 Avenue H, Lubbock, Texas, under the direction of Mr. L. O. Buchanan.

The school is being conducted for farmers who raise cotton to better acquaint themselves with the classification of cotton as well as the marketing of their product. Learn why there may be a variance in the classification of cotton even though the cotton comes off the same trailer. There are many other questions relative to cotton classing and the marketing of cotton that will be answered for you.

Any cotton farmer may attend the school free of charge. All farmers are urged to attend. Classes will be held daily from 9:00 a. m. to 3:00 p. m. Mondays through Fridays. You may attend one, two, five, or the entire ten days. A certificate of attendance will be given to all farmers who attend five or more days.

BAILEY COUNTY FARMERS HOLD WATER MEETING

MULESHOE, Aug. 2 (Special)—Bailey County farmers, meeting last week in Muleshoe, added their support to proposals already made by six counties for creation of underground water conservation districts.

In a business session, the Bailey County Water Conservation Association elected Henry Schuster as president, and unanimously approved a petition requesting designation by the State Board of Water Engineers of an underground water reservoir. Eighteen persons signed the petition.

Bailey county is among 21 Panhandle-South Plains counties given notice of a public hearing in Plainview Aug. 29 at which the State Board will "designate any or all" of the counties as an underground water reservoir or subdivision thereof.

The Board recently returned filing fees for petitions submitted by Lamb, Hale and Hockley counties, announcing that it has jurisdiction on its own motion under provisions of the law to set a hearing. The board felt that one hearing would expedite the designation required by laws.

Counties named in the hearing notice were Armstrong, Bailey, Briscoe, Castro, Cochran, Crosby, Deaf Smith, Dickens, Floyd, Garza, Hale, Hockley, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Oldham, Parmer, Potter, Swisher and Terry.

WHEAT ALLOTMENT SET FOR COUNTY

The Hale County wheat allotment for the 1951 crop has been set at 180,560 acres, E. A. Maderia, Production Marketing secretary, said today.

That figure is approximately 15,000 acres under the allotment for this year's crop which was 195,501 acres.

The county PMA committee will start work Tuesday morning on setting up wheat acreage reserves for new growers. After that is done the committee will determine a factor for the county.

Maderia estimated that the factor will be around 83 or 84 percent of the 1946 through 1949 four-year average.

HERE ARE SYMPTOMS OF POLIO listed by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. They may—or may not—mean polio. Call your doctor and then, if help is needed, contact your local chapter of the National Foundation. When polio is around, these precautions are recommended: Keep children with their own friends and away from people they have not been with right along. Don't become exhausted through work or hard play. Don't stay in cold water too long or sit around in wet clothes. Avoid becoming chilled. Always wash hands before eating.

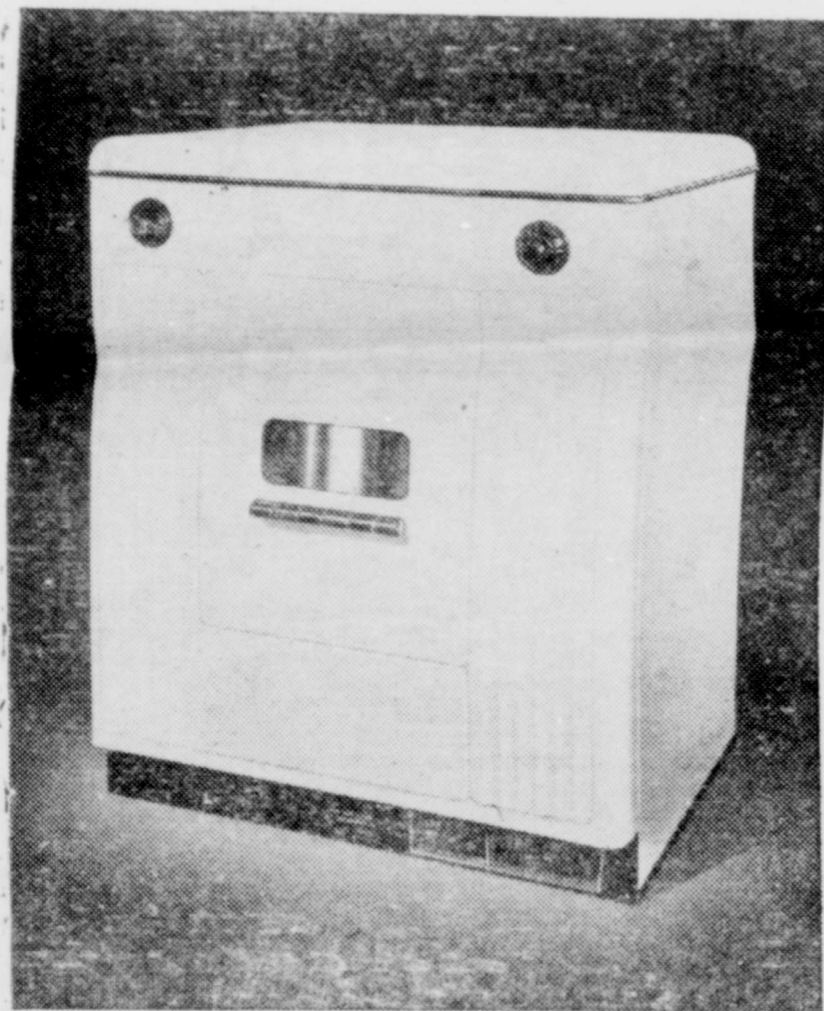

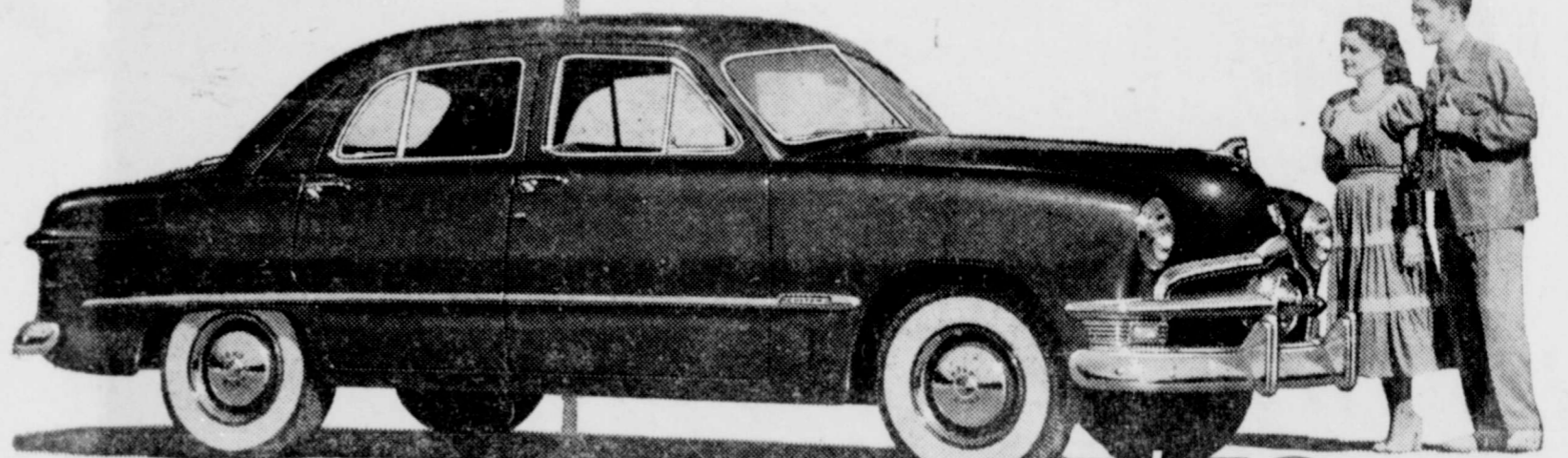

THE LAW AND YOU

By Rob't. (Bob) Kirk

Lamb County, Texas

DO YOU KNOW that legally
you could become your own uncle?

By being adopted by your own
grandparents, you could become in
a legal sense your own uncle.

The statute declares that an
adopted child "shall thereafter be
deemed and held to be, for every
purpose, the child of its parent
or parents by adoption as fully as
though born of them in lawful
wedlock."

DO YOU KNOW the rights and
obligations of the parties to an
adoption?

The natural parents of the child
adopted lose all rights and duties
towards said child. They may not
thereafter ever lay any claim to
their child. However, the child
may still inherit property from its
natural parents.

The adopting parents stand
charged with all the duties and
obligations toward the child, that
they owe to their natural child or
children. The foster parents have
full custody and control over the
child, and said child inherits from
the foster parents just as fully as
a child born to said parents.

The files and records in adoption
proceedings are not such records
as are open for public inspection.
These papers may be seen only by
the interested parties or their at-
torneys, or by the authority of an
order from the District Judge.

DO YOU KNOW what the
grounds for divorce are in Texas?
You may not secure a divorce in

Texas, unless they are alleged
and proved the reasons set forth
by the statute entitling you to a
divorce. Even though both par-
ties might desire a divorce, still
one of the parties must be able
to prove the other guilty of such
grounds for divorce as are set out
in the statute. The statutes fur-
ther state that if there is collusion
between the parties that the court
shall not grant the divorce.

The grounds for divorce as set
out by statute are as follows:

1. Excesses, cruel treatment, or
outrages by one of the parties of
such a nature as to render their
living together insupportable.
2. Abandonment for a period of
three years.
3. Adultery.
4. Living apart for ten years.
5. Conviction of a felony, but
suit may not be filed until one
year after conviction.
6. Permanent and incurable in-
sanity, but not until five years af-
ter the adjudication of insanity.

DO YOU KNOW what the "as-
sumed name" statute is, and what
its requirement are?

This statute refers to businesses
conducted under a trade name.
All persons using a trade name for
their business transactions are re-
quired to file in the County Clerk's
office of the counties in which
they do business a certificate set-
ting forth their "assumed name",
the real name or names of the per-
son or persons conducting said
business, together with his or their
post office address. Whenever
there is any change in the owner-
ship of such a business a certifi-
cate setting out the change must
be filed with the County Clerk.
Any one operating a business in
violation of this law may be fined
not less than Twenty-Five Dol-
lars and not more than One Hun-
dred Dollars. Each day that such
violation occurs constitutes a sepa-
rate offense.
