W. W. Conner Dies Following Stroke; Burial In Illinois

W. W. Conner, 54, station agent for the Santa Fe here the past few years, died early Thursday morning in a Lubbock hospital after he was taken Wednesday after suffering a stroke. The stroke came either late Tuesday or early Wednesday morning. Conner, who resided in the northwest room at the depot, was discovered ill by a trainman, about 10 a. m. Wednesday, Boyd Griffith, local farmer, who went to the depot on business, and the trainman called a local physician. Conner then was taken to the hospital.

The trainman sensed that something was wrong when his freight train failed to get a signal at the semaphore at the depot. Conner was unable to move or speak when discovered. No one knows how long he was in that condition before the trainman found him. He lapsed into unconsciousness after reaching the hospital.

Mr. Conner's body was sent to Bushnell, Ill., for burial. He came to the local depot from a station in Illinois. Mr. Conner recently resumed duties as agent after being on sick leave from the local station for several months.

Survivors include a son, William, Jacksonville, Ill.; daughter, Dorothy, of Illinois; a sister, Mrs. Golda Peterson, of Muskogee, Okla.; two brothers, Forrest and Harry Conner, both of Illinois. Mr. Conner was born May 21, 1896, in Gilson, Ill.

Standard Stakes Second Test On G. G. Flinn Farm

Another deep-zone wildcat is scheduled for immediate drilling in Lubbock county. Standard Oil company of Texas reportedly already has driven the stake for its No. 1 Flinn, located in the north-central part of the county, three and one-half miles southwest of Abernathy.

The stake for the slated 10,000-foot tester is 660 feet from north and east lines of section 10, block D, L&SV survey, and 14 miles north of the city of Lubbock.

Location is three-quarters of a mile north of an 8,500-foot dry hole drilled on the same section in 1948 by Stanolind Oil & Gas company.

With a 10,000-foot proposed depth, operators only plan to test into the Pennsylvanian, possibly in search of a reef producing zone. It was Stanotex that took over abandoned leases in Scurry county, which later turned out to be the bulk of the "fruitful" North Snyder (now part of the Kelley-Snyder reef pool). Part of the north Lubbock county block formerly was held by Stanolind; which let it go after drilling the 8,500-foot Flinn failure. The No. 1 Flinn was abandoned in the lower Permian, still above the Pennsylvanian.
