Abernathy and New Deal Will Observe School Week

Abernathy and New Deal schools will join others in Texas in observing Public School Week, March 4-10. Citizens of the State have been urged by Gov. Allan Shivers to visit the schools during this special week.

Supt. Fred Miller of Abernathy and Supt. Toby Waggoner of New Deal have extended invitations to patrons of their respective schools to visit classrooms next week.

Thursday, March 8, has been designated Community School Day in Abernathy. Classes open at 8:45 a. m. and close at 3:45 p. m. Patrons are asked to visit classes, and to have lunch with the students in the cafeteria that day. Lunches for patrons will be 30c. A special assembly program with all students, teachers and the visiting patrons will be held in the auditorium from 1 until 2 p. m., March 8.

New Deal patrons received invitation letters to visit the school and have lunch (30c) in the cafeteria. Patrons were to indicate the day they would be able to visit the school.

FFA And 4-H Club Boys Plan Project Show Here March 10

The Abernathy FFA and 4-H project show sponsored by the Abernathy Lion's club has been set for March 10. This date has been chosen so that the boys who plan to enter the South Plains Junior Fat Stock Show with their fat steers, fat hogs and fat lambs will have some experience in showing and have their animals in show shape. The date of the South Plains Junior Fat Stock Show is March 19-21 at the Lubbock fair grounds, where the boys will enter their animals for sale.

The Abernathy show will be held in the F. B. Lovelace warehouse (formerly Stone's) about a block northeast of the Co-op Grain elevator. This will be better than last year because we can have the show no matter what the weather.

The judge will be T. L. Leach from the Agriculture Education department of Texas Tech. The members of the Abernathy FFA chapter will carry out the show. One member will be selected to be general superintendent of the whole show and one member to be superintendent of each of the livestock divisions.

The Abernathy Lions club will appoint a committee to raise the premium money. The Lions club also was responsible for getting merchants and business people of Abernathy to finance and sponsor 23 beef calves for the boys. These calves along with the other calves will make a total of around 35 fat calves to be shown in the project show, which should make the show very interesting to the whole community.

Prizes and ribbons will be given the first three places in each class. Rules and Regulations for the Show:

1. Entries should be in place by 10 A. M. March 10.
2. Entries must be the property of the exhibitor.
3. An animal can be entered in one class only.
4. Each exhibitor will be limited to two animals per class.
5. Ribbons will be given to first second and third place winners.
6. There will be cash awards to winners (small cash awards will be made to all exhibitors if the money is available.)
7. In case of only one entry in a class, first place ribbon and second place money will be given.
8. Any member may exhibit his project even though it might not be listed below.

There will be classes for the following: beef cattle—fat steers, beef heifers, beef cows and beef bulls.

Dairy cattle: heifers, cows and bulls.

Swine: gilts, sows, sows with litters, fat barrows, boars and feeder pigs.

Sheep: fat lambs and ewes.

Miscellaneous: poultry and rabbits.
