## Major Rhodes Goes Back On Duty At Alaska A. F. B.



Elmendorf Air Force Base, Alaska, 9 April 1951—Major Clyde E. Rhodes, Jr., veteran of the China-Burma-India Theater, has recently been recalled to active duty at Elmendorf Air Force Base in Alaska. Major Rhodes, previously employed at the base in a civilian capacity, has been assigned to the 54th Troop Carrier Squadron where his duty will be that of Operations Officer.

His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Clyde E. Rhodes, reside near Abernathy. Charlotte, his wife, and two children make their home in Anchorage, Alaska.

Major Rhodes entered the United States Air Force in May of 1941 and received his commission as 2nd Lt. in June of 1943 at Topeka, Kansas. During World War II he saw active duty in the China Burma India Theater where he received the Distinguished Flying Cross, Air Medal and Oak Leaf Cluster. His last stateside assignment was with Headquarters, Air Force Training Command, Fort Worth, Texas.

## New Deal Wins 7-B Track Title

New Deal's Lions walked off with the District 7-B Track and Field meet at Champion field, Lubbock, Saturday, finishing well ahead of Shallowater and Cooper in both Junior and Senior competition.

C. S. Wales scored 15 points to lead the Lions to an overwhelming victory in the Senior division. The Lions scored 96½ points. Shallowater was second with 27½ and Cooper ran third with two points.

The New Deal victory was nearly as easy in the Junior high competition, with the Lions scoring 41½ points; Shallowater, 19½; and Cooper failing to scratch.

In the Senior high bracket, Shallowater's Jerry Brock scored half his team's points by finishing first in the 100-yard dash and 220-yard dash, in addition to sparking the Shallowater 440-yard relay team to a victory.

But Wales was the big boy for the winners. He won the 120-yard high hurdles, 200-yard low hurdles, and the 880-yard run.

Times were good in comparison with other area meets. Brock's 10.2 time in the 100-yard dash is one of the best records made by a South Plains sprinter this year, and his 23.4 for the 220-yard dash should be good for some points in the regional meet to be held here this week.

Lloyd Jeffcoat, New Deal looked good in winning the 440-yard dash in 55.8 seconds, and he teamed up with Foy Don Covey of New Deal to tie for first place in the broad jump. Each turned in jumps of 20 feet, four inches.

In the Junior high meet, New Deal dominated every division except chinning, where Shallowater took all three places.

Robert Jeffcoat of New Deal was high point man in the Junior meet with 16½ points. He was first in the 50-yard dash, 100-yard dash, broad jump, and anchored New Deal's winning 440-yard relay team to a first-place finish.

**COUNTY GENERAL FUND LIMIT HIKE IS SOUGHT**

Members of the Commissioners Court of Hale county are circulating petitions among taxpayers asking that an election be ordered to authorize a change in maximum levies authorized for special purpose of county government.

The reason is very simple. The county owes \$40,000 in warrants which bear three per cent interest, recently reduced from four, and can be paid only from the general funds of the county.

The costs of county government are increasing, partly due to increased cost of things the county buys, including services and supplies.

There is a statutory limit on the amount of taxes that can be levied for various purposes. The general fund is the sort of catch-all, and many things can be paid for out of the general funds.

Acts of the Texas legislature

recently passed permit a re-allocation of these funds provided the maximum levy does not exceed the limit of the total permitted.

The limit permissible for general purposes has been 25 cents per \$100 valuation until the special act of the legislature permitted a reallocation.

The matter now proposed to be submitted to vote of the people is to charge the maximum that can be allocated for general purposes from 25 cents to 37 cents, by reducing the maximum that can be levied for jury purposes from 15 cents to three cents per hundred dollars' valuation.

Jesse Knight, Jr., has furnished The Review with the following copy of a farm sale bill which appeared in the Anderson, Kentucky News, in 1849:

"All ox teams except Buck and Ben and Tom and Jerry, 2 milch cows, 1 gray mare and colt, 1 pair of oxen and yoke, 1 baby yoke, 2 ox carts, 1 iron plow with moldboard, 800 feet of poplar siding, 1,000 three-foot clap-boards, 1,500

10-foot fence rails, 1 64-gallon soap kettle, 85 sugar troughs, 10 gallons maple sirup, 2 spinning wheels, 30 gallons mutton tallow, 1 large loom made by Jerry Wilson, 300 poles, 100 split hoops, 100 empty barrels, 32-gallon barrel of Johnson-Miller whiskey, 7 years old, 20 gallons apple brandy, one 40-gallon copper still, 4 sides oak-tanned leather, 2 handled hooks, 3 scythes, 3 cradles, half interest in tan yard, one 32 calibre rifle, bullet moulds and powder horn, rifle made by Ben Miller, 59 gallons soft soap, nams, bacon and lard, 40 gallons sorghum, 6 head fox hounds, all soft mouthed except one.

"At the same time will sell my six Negro slaves, 2 men 35 and 50 years old, 2 boys 12 and 18 years old, and 2 mulatto wenchens 40 and 30 years old. Will sell altogether to same party as will not separate them. Terms of sale cash in hand or note to draw 4 per cent interest with Bob McComel as security. My home is 2 miles south of Versailles, Kentucky, off McConnis ferry pike. Plenty of eat and drink."

**AREA ELECTRIC CO-OP OFFICERS RE-ELECTED**

All officers of the South Plains Electric Co-operative were re-elected during the final session of the annual stockholders meeting of the organization Friday at Jamboree hall, Lubbock. Newton explained that this and past profits have enabled the co-operative to get ahead \$92,436 on its payments of the loan from the federal government. **LaFONT-WAGGONER VOTE TOGETHER ON CURRENT PROPOSALS**

AUSTIN — Both Rep. Harold LaFont of Plainview and Rep. Waggoner Carr of Lubbock went on record with their vote this week:

For removal of the \$35,000,000 ceiling on welfare payments;  
 For a natural gas pipeline tax to finance rural road construction and to help the cities in their street construction financing.

The two members voted together for the proposed constitutional amendment, which passed the House 104-32, to remove welfare ceilings. The present constitutional limit is \$35,000,000 of state funds annually for payments of old age assistance, aid to the needy blind and aid to dependent and neglected children.

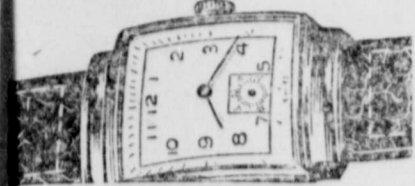
They also stuck together in their votes favoring the bill by Rep. Jim Sewell to tax natural gas going into pipelines at the rate of one cent per thousand cubic feet. The estimated \$28,000,000 revenue from the tax would be allocated as follows: one-fourth to the state's available school fund; one-fourth to the municipalities of the state on the basis of population

for city street work; one-half to the counties for rural road construction.

Both measures now are awaiting Senate committee action.
