GO TO AFRICA
Mr. and Mrs. Galen M. Carr and their 20 months old daughter, Catherine Ann, sailed from New York May 29, on the African Moon for the Methodist Mission post in Africa where Galen will work as missionary engineer for the next 5 years. They were due to dock at Capetown June 6, and from there would go overland 2,000 miles to the compound where they will live, near the town of Umptali, in the British colony of Southern Rhodesia.

Both hold degrees from Texas Tech, Mrs. Carr's in Home Economics and Galen's in civil engineering and have studied in Northwestern University at Evanston, Ill., University of California at Berkeley and in Hartford Seminary at Hartford, Conn.

Jo, daughter of Mr. J. N. Crister of Brownsville, Texas, was for some time area worker for the Girl Scouts. Galen, son of Mr. and Mrs. G. M. Carr of Abernathy, is a veteran of four years service in World War II and has been working as carpenter and engineer in Lubbock.

They first planned to enter mission work in China, but when that field was closed to them by the communist conquest, they shifted to Korea. On the day they were commissioned for that work the communists crossed the 38th parallel and that country, too, was closed to missionary engineers. About a year ago they were assigned to Africa.

Their station is in about 15 degrees S. latitude with an altitude about the same as ours and a climate comparable to California or Florida.

WHEAT HARVEST IS EXPECTED TO START THIS WEEK

Local elevator men expect the first 1952 wheat to come in this week when operations start in what is expected to be a light grain harvest. Hail and dry weather cut the yield in this area. A few weeks ago cut through good wheat crops north, west, north-west and east, so that the average ranged from total destruction to two-thirds loss.

Original acreage this year was small than in previous years, it was reported. The harvest season is expected to be short and the yield comparatively low.

Elevator operators warn farmers to wait until wheat is completely ready to avoid loss through excessive moisture content of the grain.

The last bumper wheat crop made in this area was in 1947. E. B. Lindsey of Plains Grain Co. recalls. Acreage in wheat that year was above average and the yield was good, he said.

First wheat crop reported in was from 13 acres of dry land on the Weldon Cross farm southeast of town. It was harvested Tuesday and delivered to Co-op Grain Co. Per-acre yield was 23 1/2 bushels, and moisture test was 12.75.

RAE RICHERSON FILES DAMAGE CLAIM IN MD.
Baltimore, Md., June 5 (Special) Midshipman R. E. Richerson, son of Mr. and Mrs. James E. Richerson of Shallowater, Rt 1, is asking \$100,000 damages for injuries he says will prevent him from receiving a commission in the U. S. Air Force.

Richerson graduated Friday from the U. S. Naval Academy with a Bachelor of Science degree. He had been scheduled to receive a commission.

In a suit filed here June 4, Richerson contends that he suffered back and leg injuries in a collision last March 20. The collision was between a tractor-trailer truck and a car driven by Midshipman Erwin E. Troske, Jr., of North Dakota. One midshipman was killed and four were injured.

Named as defendants in the suit are Troske and owners of the truck.

Richerson attended Abernathy and Amarillo high schools, enlisted in the Navy in 1941, served as a radioman, second class, in the Pacific Theater of Operations during World War II, and entered the Naval Academy in June, 1948.

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JUST ONE ANSWER TO FLY PROBLEM SAYS HEAD OF HEALTH DEPARTMENT

Austin.—This is a story about flies told by a man who despises them for the disease they spread. "Flies are one of the few species of life which does absolutely no good on this earth," State Health Officer George W. Cox charges. "Other insects are annoying, but they earn their existence by pollinating plants or by feeding on less desirable forms of life. But not flies."

He says the black swarming insects have but one saving grace: their short lives. A fly reaching maturity in the spring won't live to annoy autumn picnickers. One adulthood in the fall might make it through the winter, but by spring he'll be aged and feeble, too old to pester folks out to witness the wonders of the fresh new season.

But during its lifespan, Dr. Cox says, a fly is extremely prolific. If a single pair begins their family in April, and if all their progeny live there will be countless millions by fall.

"That's no pipe dream," the doctor said. "It's based on the most accurate entomological evidence."

In case you have ever wondered how far a fly can fly, Dr. Cox has

the answer to that one, too. He says entomologists have found an energetic one can cover up to 15 miles in one day without the aid of wind currents. How did they find out?

They trapped one, fed him radioactive phosphorus and set him loose. Retrapping, experimenters used a Geiger counter to make the identification. He was 15 miles from the starting point.

There's only one answer to the fly problem in Texas, Dr. Cox believes. He says cleanliness, using chemical science as a tool, will keep them under control.

"And start now," he advises. "This weather is ideal for fly breeding."

He doesn't like flies at all.

Weldon Crow, whose printing and office supply business shares building space with The Review office, recently traded their 80-acre farm southeast of town. This is Weldon's first row crop farming experience with a tractor. As a lad, he farmed with teams. Weldon dashed into the office Thursday, after a tractor-driving session on his farm, with current information on the horse-fly. "I was plowing along out there a while ago," Weldon said, "and a big horse-fly came in for a landing on the tractor cowl. It perched there awhile, made another flying circle and landed again. After riding a while and crawling over the tractor, it flew away."

Our farm experience ended during the team-power days, and we'd often wondered how the old horse-

fly was made out in this age of mechanization.

Roughly, the rate increase requested by the telephone company will be about \$33.72 per year in addition to what we are now paying. The Review is now paying for our telephone and a jump in cost for the "hello" charge.

City Councilmen are considering the request. When asked the end result in the event the Councilmen refuse to grant the rate increase, one of the City Dads gave this information: The telephone company will take the plea to court. They show that the companies win nearly all the court cases on rates.

A City Council refusal to grant the rate request would lead to a costly court fight in which the city probably would be the loser.

The company, as presented by G. D. Shelley, district manager of Lubbock, says their plant investment in Abernathy is \$63,764.98, with current value of \$75,410.61 and a net value of \$69,587.79. Net operating income under the current rate is \$2,345.65, Shelley says. If proposed new rates, the annual operating income would be \$3,669.87, he added.

City Councilmen should at this time check into the local telephone situation to see if the company is keeping pace with facilities available to all who want the services. Reports coming to this office indicate that telephone lines, more especially the single party lines, are difficult to get in some sections of the town. A waiting period is required in some instances to get party-line service, the reports stated.

The City should arrange with the company to have a switch placed at the telephone switchboard so the telephone operator could turn on the fire siren the instant a fire is reported. City Secretary Lawrence Carter says Councilmen have been considering this request to the company.

We have no personal fuss with Mr. Shelley or his company. Abernathy's exchange has good equipment. Tommie Elkins and her staff of operators are giving as good service as could be expected. The plant maintenance man, W. R. Arthur, has done a good job in keeping the telephones in service.

Everything else, service and merchandise, has increased in price so, we suppose telephone service should be no exception. Wonder when, and where, the spiraling prices will stop?

Reports covering progress of the church during the 1948-52 period will be a highlight since the program has grown in 44 years to include 250,000 members in 4,000 churches around the world.

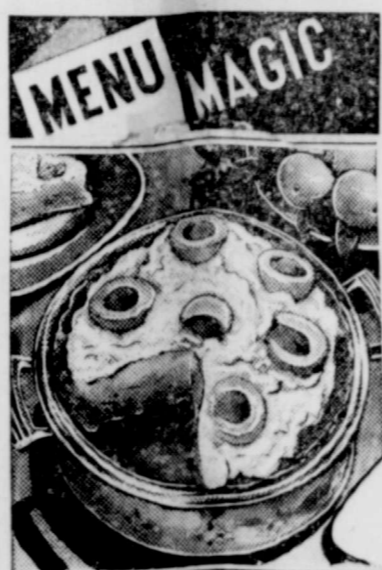

—Divide shredded coconut into three parts. Tint one part at a time, as follows: Place coconut in a glass jar. (Do not fill jar more than 1/2 full.) 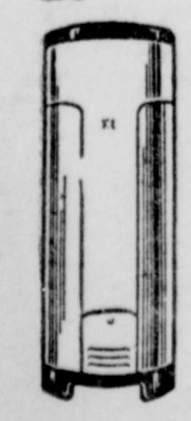

NOTICE TO MEN OF DRAFT AGE

Plainview, Texas.—The secretary of the Floyd-Hale-Swisher-Motley county draft board today warned men of draft age in the four-county area that it is to their advantage to report changes of status which are affected by the draft law.

C. C. McGlasson, the board secretary, said the board especially wanted to warn young married men who have no children to report expected birth of a child.

"If such men don't report the expected birth of a child and they should get an order to report for induction," Mr. McGlasson said, "the board, under the regulations is powerless to defer them."

"If they do report it before they get an order," he continued, "the board then puts them in a deferred class because of dependency."

Mr. McGlasson said notification should be in the form of an ordi-

nary certificate from a licensed physician stating that a child has been conceived.

The secretary also warned men who happen to be in college that they must ask the board for a deferment to continue study if they want to be considered.

"The fact that the college reports a student's class standing, or that the board is furnished results of his taking the draft qualification test is not sufficient for the board to give consideration," Mr. McGlasson said.

"The student must write the board a letter requesting deferment for this purpose," he continued. "If the student does this, then we can properly consider his request under the regulations."

Mr. McGlasson said that men sometimes waive rights by not keeping the draft board informed. He advised men to protect their rights by making the board aware of changes in address and status.



A. J. Rogers of Childress has announced that he will be a candidate for State Senator from the newly-created 30th State Senatorial District.

Rogers now is serving his second term as State Representative from the 121st District, which includes Childress, Hall, Cottle and Motley counties.

The 30th Senatorial District was created by the 52nd Texas Legislature under the redistricting amendment to the State Constitution.

The new Senatorial District comprises of Deaf Smith, Bailey, Floyd, Donley, Hale, Lamb, Collingsworth, Farmer, Swisher, Motley, Briscoe, Castro, Hall, Armstrong and Childress counties.

Rogers is a native West Texan. He received his education in the Childress public schools, where he received his high school diploma. He now makes his home and living on a farm he owns and operates in Childress County. He is married to the former Ann Scott, who is also a native of the South Plains. They have one daughter.

Rogers was raised on his father's farm near Childress, and has been interested and active in agriculture all his life. In high school days he took a prominent part in Future Farmers of America activities, and won the Lone Star, Farmer Degree, the high state FFA honor.

After completing high school in Childress, Rogers attended Texas A & M College, where he received his degree and was an honor student.

He served during World War II as an Air Force navigator. After three years' service he was

honorably discharged and returned to farming before becoming a candidate for the State Legislature.

He was elected in 1948, and was re-elected without opposition two years later.

While serving with the 51st and 52nd Legislatures, Rogers was a leader in the fight for taxes on natural gas exported from the state, and a strong advocate for more and better farm roads.

He also served on several important committees, including the Highways and Road Committee for four years, two years on the Appropriations Committee, the Conservation and Reclamation Committee, the Insurance Committee, and was Vice-Chairman of the Agriculture Committee.

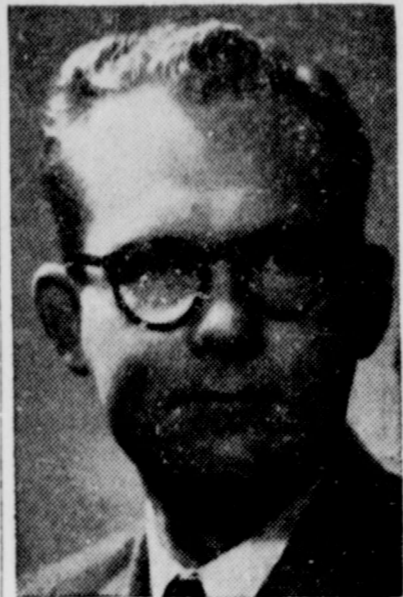
Rogers introduced several major bills in the legislature, among which were a bill to create an experimental station in the Blow Sand district of West Texas to study and control wind and water erosion of sandy soils, and a bill to investigate the Upper Red River for water resources relating to municipal and agricultural uses.

He was co-author of, and introduced, the bill restricting the sale of drip, or casenhead, gasoline.

Rogers has been instrumental in all moves of the Legislature to reduce spending and taxes.

He has been active in local American Legion affairs, Masonic activities and civic undertaking.

Rogers has announced no definite platform as yet, except to say, "It's time to quit talking and time to take action and reduce spending that drains the pocket-books of every Texas citizen".

On hand are 1,700,000 Victory Medals which all WW2 vets are entitled to wear, in addition to the Theatre Medals. Army has distributed 7,500,000 Victory Medals alone. Vets who have not received their medals can get them very easily—and thus help Uncle

Sam out of a pressing storage problem. Simply write The Adjutant General, Department of the Army, Washington 25, D.C., or if in Navy Marine Corps, write Bureau of Naval Personnel, Department of the Navy, Washington 25, D. C. Give name Serial Number, service unit, and designate the theatre in which you served—American area, Pacific or European.
