Hardin-Simmons Cowboy Band Due Here March 17

The Hardin-Simmons University cowboy band which in one month during the past year travelled 22,000 miles and appeared in five national capitals of the world will present a program at Abernathy School auditorium, Tuesday, March 17, at 1:00 p. m.

Admission prices for the concert will be 10c for students and 25c for adults.

The band, from December 20 to January 20 appeared in Rome, Berlin, Paris, Reykjavik, and Washington. It led the Texas section of the parade down Pennsylvania Avenue at the inauguration of President Eisenhower.

During the Christmas holidays, the band travelling by an air force plane, made an 18,000 mile trip under the sponsorship of the USO camp shows. The band, giving a touch of home to military personnel overseas, gave 18 concerts to soldiers, and Marines in Germany, France, England, Italy, and Iceland.

The band gave shows before the army, air force and navy from Rome and Italy to Iceland and as far east as Berlin. During the trip the band was in all four sectors of Germany, (including the Russians), in France, Italy, and England. They were in Paris, Rome, and Berlin.

Sponsored by the USO camp shows, the band made all of its appearances before American servicemen stationed in Europe. Seeking "to give a touch of home" to the servicemen. The band presented its program in western attire and wore the cowboy uniform on the streets in Europe.

Concerts were given aboard ship (On the Aircraft Carrier, Leyte stationed at Nice, France) in opera houses (in Berlin and Nice), and in Quonset huts (Bordeaux). Food and lodging was in military mess halls and in civilian eating places. Some meals were served aboard the plane. Because of the sunless cold and rainy weather of Europe, the band members reported that the warmest place on the trip ironically was Iceland.

The band, directed by Marion McClure, is composed entirely of students from Hardin-Simmons. In February it participated in the giant rally for Eisenhower in Madison Square Garden.

The Cowboys participated in parades (such as the inauguration) gives shows (such as for the USO camp shows), plays at rodeos and athletic contests, and gives formal concerts.

Wearing a colorful western uniform of chaps, ten gallon hats, cowboy boots, orange shirts and purple neckerchiefs the band is easily identified as Texan.

The band is undoubtedly the most widely travelled intercollegiate band in the nation. It has been to Europe twice during its 29 years of history and it appeared in 40 of the 48 states. It has marched down Fifth Avenue in New York, Michigan Boulevard in Chicago, Market Street in San Francisco, Hollywood Boulevard in Hollywood and in scores of interior cities.

Abernathy Future Farmers of America and 4-H club members will stage their Fourth Annual Project Show Saturday, March 14, in the Farmers Co-op Gin Warehouse on Avenue B at Main Street. Entries will include beef and dairy cattle, sheep, swine, rabbits and poultry.

The FFA division of the show is under direction of Dwight Lindsey and Harold Reese, AHS vocational agriculture teachers.

Jack Douglas, assistant Hale county agent, has charge of 4-H club work in the county. He and County Agent Ollie Linder will be here and at a similar show in Petersburg Saturday.

Abernathy Lions Club is sponsoring the show and has appointed a committee to raise prize money and premiums for the boys.

The following boys have been elected by the FFA Chapter to serve as officers for the 1953 show:

Ribbons will be given in three divisions of the horse show, with judging to be conducted during the parade. Awards will be made for men, women and children riders. The parade will form in front of the school building and start through town at 11 a. m. In addition to riders, it will include the AHS Antelope band and possibly some floats. Those who plan to participate in the parade are asked to report to the starting point by 10:30 a. m.

There is a possibility that Abernathy Riding Club will lead the parade. The Implement Companies of Abernathy are invited to enter tractors and equipment in the parade.

Judging At 1:30 p. m.

Project show entries are to be in place at the warehouse by 10 o'clock Saturday morning. Show judging will be T. L. Leach of the Agriculture Education Department at Texas Technological college. Judging is scheduled to start at 1:30 p. m.

Prize money will be awarded as follows:

Beef cattle: \$10.00 first prize, \$7.50 second prize and \$5.00 third prize will be given in each of the following divisions, heifers, bulls, steers, light weight steers, heavy weight steers; grand champion, \$10.00, reserve champion, \$5.00.

Dairy cattle: \$5, \$4 and \$3 for cows, and same for heifers.

Sheep, fine wool: \$5, \$4, \$3; Crossbred, \$5, \$4, \$3. Grand champion, \$5, reserve champion, \$3.

Swine: gilts, \$5, \$4, \$3; sows with litters, \$5, \$4, \$3; barrows, \$5, \$4, \$3.

Poultry: (Pen of 6) \$3, \$2, \$1. Rabbits: (Pen of 3) \$3, \$2, \$1. Horse show: Ribbons given in first places of three divisions, for horses ridden by men, women and children. All who have horses are urged to enter the parade and compete for prize ribbons. Horses will be judged during the parade.

Several of the animals in the local show will be taken to Lubbock late Saturday afternoon to be entered in the South Plains Junior Fat Stock Show, March 16, 17 and 18.

**COTTON WORRIES
ABOUT 1954**

Representatives of the National Cotton Council in its recent meeting in Dallas were worried over cotton growing in 1954. They reported that cotton exports must be boosted 1,500,000 bales by next Oct. 15, if federal acreage quotas are to be avoided in 1954. Unless a consumptive outlet is found for this much additional cotton, quotas and allotments appear certain.

Under the law, 1954 controls will be based on production in 1947, 1948, 1950, 1951, and 1952. During these years, cotton growing has expanded rapidly in the western part of the belt. There has been a considerable shift in acreage from farm to farm, as well as from one area to another. This shift of cotton westward will work hardships on individual growers when quotas are applied again.

Cotton grown in 1953 will be figured in allotments for 1955, if controls are applied that year. To protect themselves in 1955, growers will be inclined to boost the acreage this year. A similar situation arose in 1949, so Congress eliminated that year in figuring future allotments. Unless Congress does eliminate the 1953 acreage in figuring allotments, some authorities think we might produce as much as 15 million bales this year. USDA's goal is 13 million bales.

To refresh our memory about cotton quotas and allotments, they work like this: Total acreage is determined on basis of five-year average yield per acre. This acreage is allotted to states on a basis of acreage planted for five years prior to control year. States make allotments to counties on the same basis, reserving 10 per cent for making adjustments. Farm allotments are based on production for the last three years.

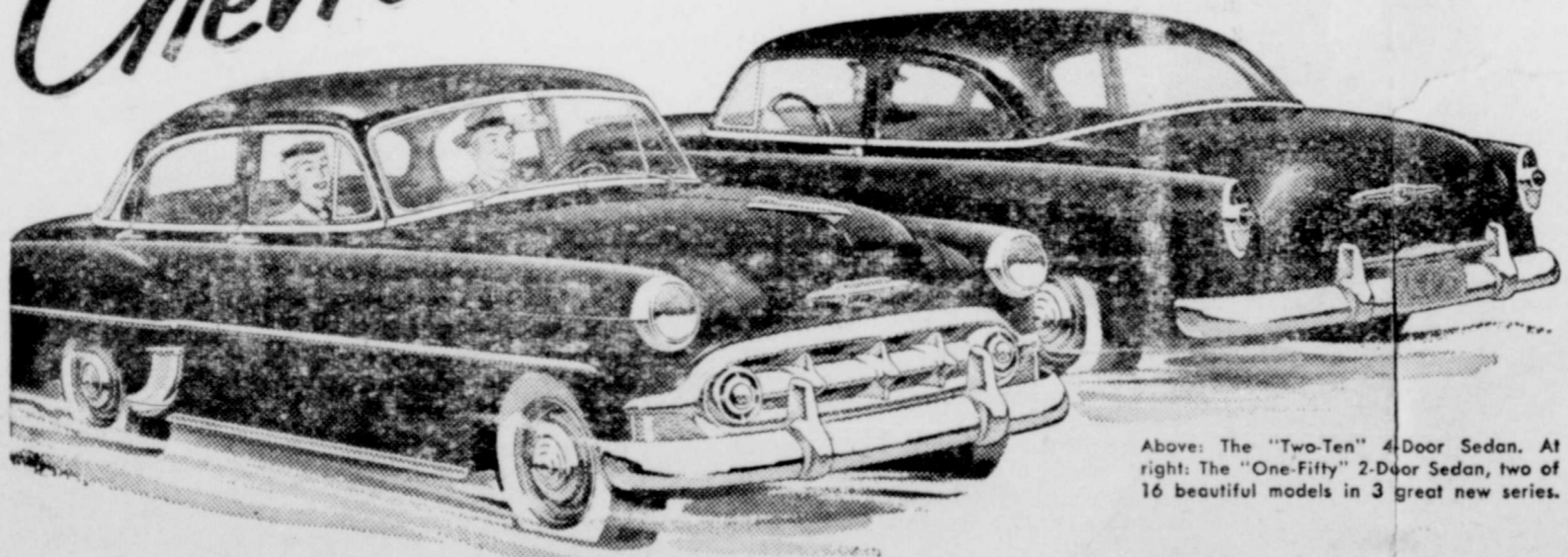
