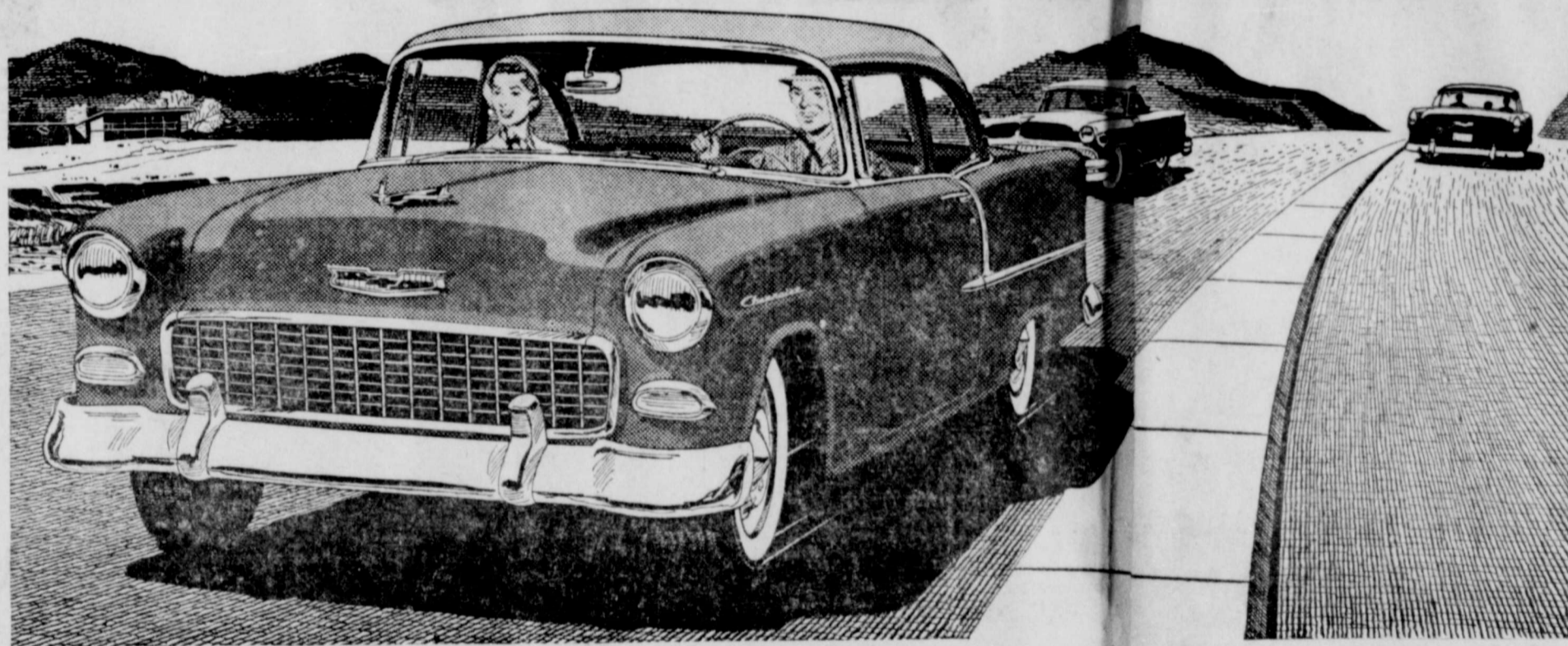

COTTON ALLOTMENT DEADLINE EXTENDED UNTIL JUNE 15

The May 20 deadline for Lubbock County farmers to utilize assigned cotton allotments has been extended until June 15. Homer Harrison, Idalou, chairman of the county agricultural stabilization and conservation committee, announced.

Harrison was advised last week by the state committee in College Station of the deadline extension. Farmers, who have not planted assigned cotton acreage because of

dry conditions, are urged to release their acreage if they feel they cannot plant before the deadline.

Harrison explained that if any farmer releases his acreage, it would be assigned another farm in the same county and the farmer would get credit for it.

He added this might be important in future years, particularly if allotments are based on percentage of crops planted on dry land.

Additional information pertaining to the extended deadline for releasing of cotton allotments is available at the ASC office in the courthouse.
