117 Attend Jaycee Charter Banquet

The Abernathy chapter of Junior Chamber of Commerce held its Charter Banquet last Friday night in Abernathy school cafeteria.

The Jaycees were honored by the presence of 117 people at the occasion, all of whom appeared to enjoy a most delicious meal and the fine program which followed.

Mrs. Lamar McKenzie played piano selections from the time the Jaycees and guests entered the cafeteria from the gym, until all had been served.

The invocation was given by Brother Bill Gibson, pastor of Abernathy Church of Christ.

Norman Igo, President of the Lubbock Jaycees, served as master of ceremonies for the occasion.

Mayor Ed Graham, first speaker, expressed his appreciation to the Lubbock chapter for their efforts in helping to organize the Abernathy Jaycee club. Graham also extended his congratulations to the local Jaycees on the progress they have made in membership and stated that he felt that the Abernathy Jaycees could and would do much for Abernathy and community.

Visiting State officers were then introduced, and the introduction of Jaycees from neighboring chapters followed.

A rare thing happened at the banquet. There were two State Presidents present: F. E. (Red) Hightower, State Jaycee President of Texas, and Wayne Bowles, New Mexico's State Jaycee President. Other State officers attending were: Wright Carlisle, Ralls, State vice president from Region 3; Bill Wilson, Muleshoe, State vice president; Odell Heathington, Ralls, National Director; Pat Garrett, Lubbock, State director.

Several out-of-town Jaycees attended also, coming to the occasion from Amarillo, Hale Center, Lubbock, Levelland, Ralls, Muleshoe, Lamesa, Brownwood and possibly other neighboring cities.

What To Do In a Tornado

- People in open country can view the approach of a tornado and move at right angles to its path. If there is no time to escape, lie flat in the nearest depression, such as a ditch or ravine.
- In towns or cities, seek shelter inside, preferably in a substantial building. Stay away from windows.
- The southwest corner of the basement of a frame house is safer than in a brick or stone house. If there is no basement, lie down on the first floor under a table or bed (preferably in the southwest corner).
- Urban schools: Stay inside, away from windows; remain near an inside wall on a lower floor. Avoid auditoriums and gymnasiums.
- Rural schools of frame construction: Teachers should remove children to a ravine or ditch if storm shelter is not available.

Time of the Twister

Springtime is tornado time. In the unstable transition from winter cold to summer heat, great masses of cold and warm air collide. When the heavier cold air is forced above the lighter warm air, funnels sometimes form to relieve the topsy-turvy situation. This is the twister.

SOME 500 TORNADOES boil up each year in the United States. When they strike, local civil defense and the Red Cross speed to the rescue.

Spring is the time for a special weather eye to the tornado-spawning southwest. Last year, for instance, every major tornado occurred between February and May. On one day—April 3—four giant twisters killed 30 persons, injured 415 and caused an estimated \$13,760,000 damage. There is no way to prevent a tornado. But early warning, proper precautions and speedy rescue of victims can save lives. In addition, disaster funds administered by the Federal Civil Defense Administration can provide emergency repairs and restoration of vital community facilities when Federal assistance is authorized by the President to augment State and local efforts.

LIONS

The traditional "Easter storm" staged a 3-day production for its 1957 show, beginning Saturday and continuing through Monday. No injuries were reported in this area. Tornado damage was reported in the County Line community ten miles west of Abernathy, and hail and lightning brought damage in town.

The big show started Saturday morning when a tornado was sighted near Brownfield. Radio and TV stations kept South Plains residents informed as the storm area moved northeast. Tom Brown, highway patrolman, said there was indication of a tornado one-half mile west of Abernathy about noon Saturday, but there was no report of it touching the ground.

Abernathians sought protection of buildings and cellars during the storms. Mr. and Mrs. Jess Bryant were hosts to 30 people in their 7 x 12-ft. cellar Sunday night. Eighteen or 19 persons were in the Bryant cellar during Saturday's storm. The Bryants reside in Southwest Abernathy.

Heavy rain and hail hit town Saturday afternoon. Lightning struck a powerline pole in Northwest Abernathy setting fire to a transformer.

Tornado damage in County Line community was in Sunday night's storm that hit a wide area, including Shallowater, Whittharal, Littlefield. This storm continued north to the Olton and Dimmitt areas.

Shingles were ripped off the Otis Pope home northwest of County Line. Many outbuildings in the community were demolished, and power and telephone poles and lines were torn down.

Major damage in town came Monday afternoon when hail, described by some as "chunks of ice" battered the area for several minutes. Expensive stained glass windows in local churches were broken out. Windows were shattered in homes and business buildings, and automobiles were pitted by the big hail stones. There was some car glass loss.

Rain reports over the area ranged from an inch and one-half to more than three inches.

State To Pave South Drive

Meeting in special session at a luncheon Saturday in Graham's banquet room, Abernathy City Council passed a resolution that will bring free of charge over one-half mile of paved streets for Abernathy.

The resolution, published below in full text, was passed to allow the State Highway Department to pave a 60-ft.-wide strip over 3,000 feet on South Drive, beginning at the Southeast city limits and going to Highway 87 at Joe Thompson Implement Co.

The State Highway Department will pay for the paving and property owners are to bear the expense of curb and gutter along that route. Property owners are giving easements for right of way, taking from a maximum of 19 feet to a minimum of about one foot. Joining this paving at the Southwest city limits will be a new paved Farm Highway from County Line, a distance of ten miles.

Paper and red tape work is being done on this project, and actual construction may start later this year, officials indicated. Attending the luncheon were

Mayor Ed Graham, Aldermen Robert Burnett, Dr. John W. Hale, J. L. Irish, Shelton Hardin and Bill Wolf, Galen M. (Pappy) Carr, main and constitutes one of its streets and said Highway is paved 20 feet wide and

WHEREAS, the traffic has increased to such an extent that the narrow pavement creates a hazard and inconvenience to the traveling public and

WHEREAS, it is the desire of the City Council of the City of Abernathy to have the pavement widened to 64 feet between curbs, from the West City Limit to U. S. Highway 87 Length 3363 feet a distance of 3363 feet and as it is understood that the State Highway

Commission will provide the widened pavement if the City will build the curb and gutter.

NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved by the City Council of the City of Abernathy in regular session this 20th day of April, 1957, that the Highway Department is hereby requested to widen and improve Highway F. M. 597 as set out above.

The City of Abernathy will provide all necessary right-of-way clear of obstruction and free of property damage and will provide for the immediate construction of continuous curb and gutter, utility adjustments, storm sewers, etc., all as may be necessary for a complete project with the exception of pavement widening, and will assume responsibility for the construction of driveways and sidewalks should they be deemed necessary now or in the future.

The Texas Highway Department, after the City had fulfilled its responsibilities, will provide for pavement widening and its support within these limits. It is understood that the responsibility of the Texas Highway Department is confined to the

pavement and its support and all other features necessary now or in the future to provide an adequate travel facility shall be the responsibility of the City of Abernathy.

It is further agreed that the City of Abernathy will maintain that portion of the work which is its construction responsibility and will pass such resolutions and ordinances in accordance with standard forms of the Highway Department to indemnify the State during and after construction against any and all liability or damages growing out of such construction, to regulate traffic, to provide for parallel parking and to prevent encroachment on the right-of-way. The City also agrees to pass an ordinance prohibiting the use of the area between the curb and the property line for the servicing of cars or trucks parked on the right-of-way, and will make provision for the rearrangement of the driveways and location of Filling Station Pumps or other obstructions to enable enforcement of this ordinance.

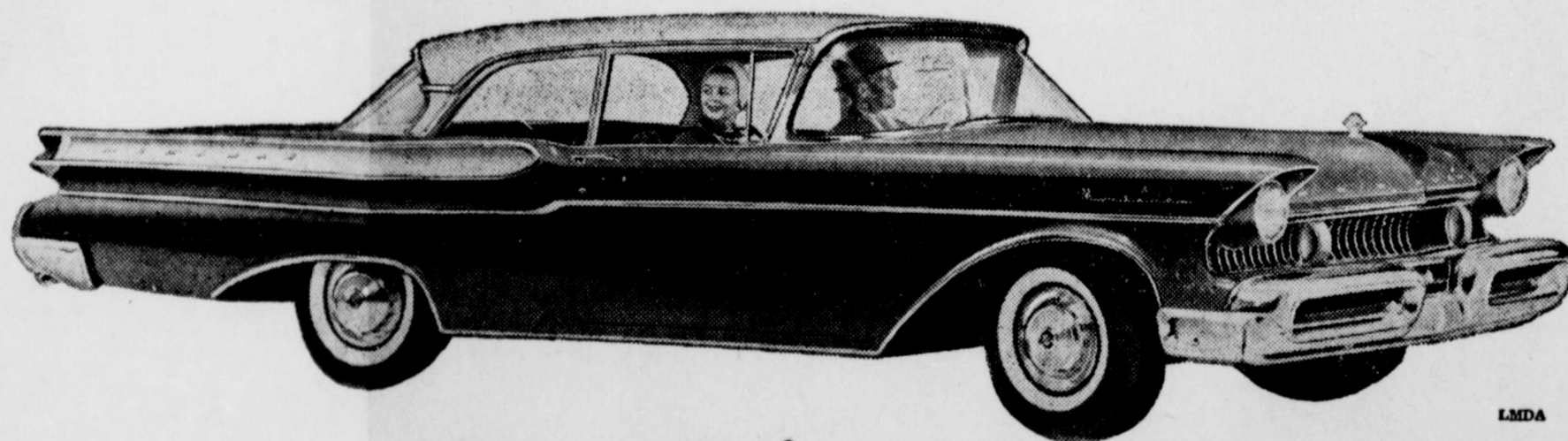

You are commanded to appear by filing a written answer to the plaintiff's petition at or before 10 o'clock A. M. of the first Monday after the expiration of 42 days from the date of issuance of this Citation, the same being Monday the 20th day of May, A. D. 1957, at or before 10 o'clock A. M., before the Honorable District Court of Hale County, at the Court House in Plainview, Texas.

Said plaintiff's petition was filed on the 6th day of April, 1957. The file number of said suit being No. 9041.

The names of the parties in said suit are: Louise Jackson, joined by her husband, C. C. Jackson, as Plaintiffs, and S. L. Wier, as Defendant.

The nature of said suit being substantially as follows, to wit:

That plaintiff Louise Jackson above named, on the 1st day of January, 1957, was, and still is, the owner in fee simple of the following described lands and premises located in Hale County, Texas, more particularly described as all of Lots numbers 36 and 37, in Block number 3, of the Hillcrest Addition to the town of Plainview, Hale County, Texas, as shown by the recorded plat and plan of said addition. On January 1st, 1957, defendant unlawfully entered upon and dispossessed the plaintiffs of such premises and withholds from them the possession thereof, to which possession they were, and are, legally entitled.

WHEREFORE, premises considered, plaintiffs pray the court that defendant be legally cited to and answer this suit, and that upon trial they have judgment for title and possession of said property, for damages and costs of suit.

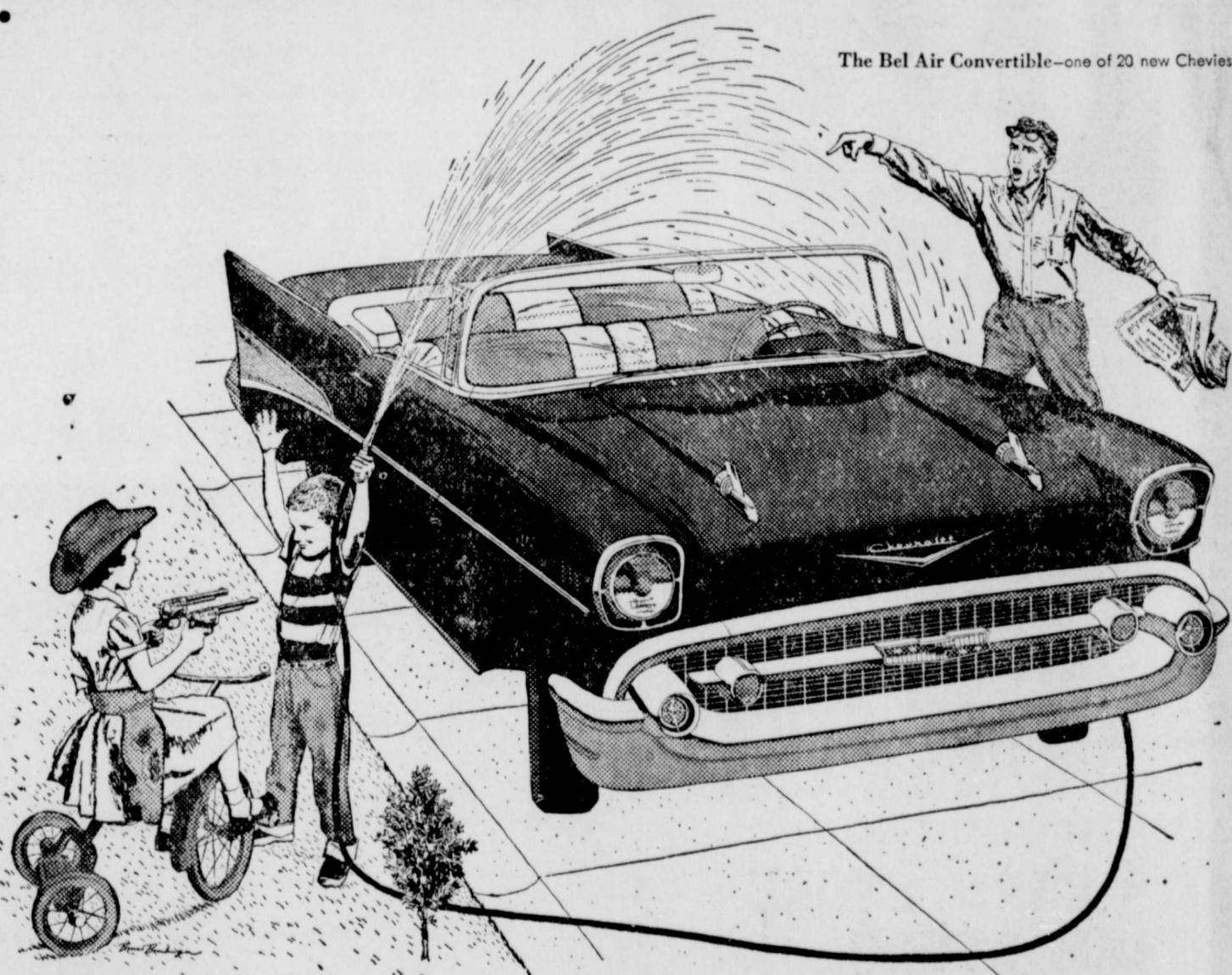

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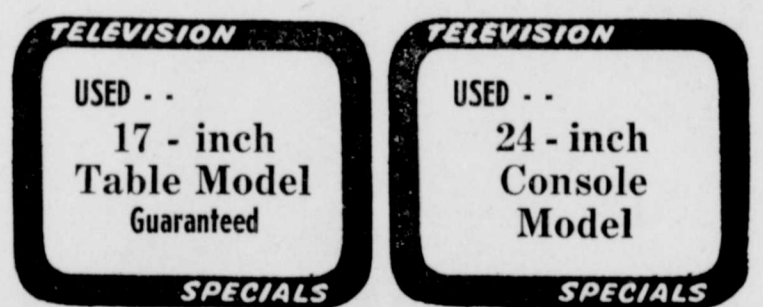
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LIVING AS CHRIST

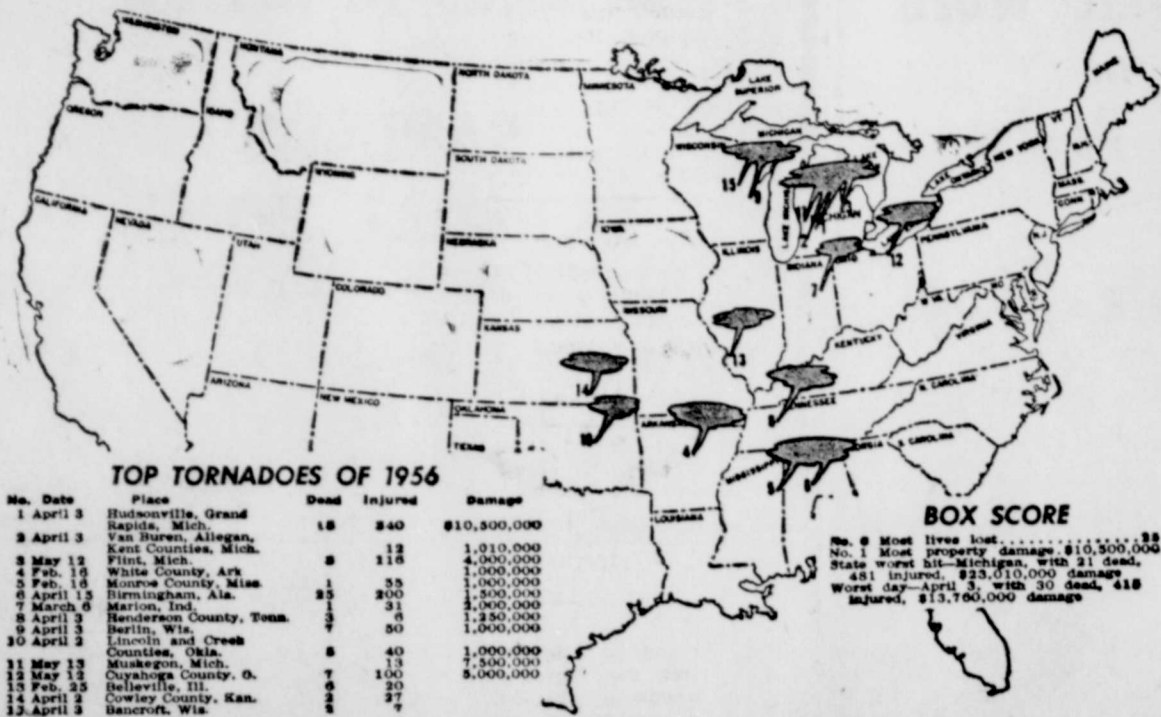

Reports said Jack Blair, teacher in the local school system, went to Paris, Texas, to get married during Easter holidays. And, according to reports given us last Thursday, Jack's uncle, C. S. Blair, formerly of Canton, now of Abernathy, and Mrs. Nora Wilson of this city were married several weeks ago. The Review would like to have a full report on both weddings.

According to a news release handed us by Abernathy Motor Co., Ford and Mercury dealership the two millionth (2,000,000) "Built In Texas By Texans" Ford rolled off the line at the Dallas assembly plant Tuesday.

In the third class mail department, which carries a low rate, the post office department is required to deliver thousands of tons and millions of pieces of mail every day to people who do not want this kind of mail in the first place. This is the mail that fills post office waste baskets every day.

The fellow who pays the rent on post office boxes is forced to take this junk mail. It's a post office department ruling we discovered when we asked Dean Sterling if a request could be registered by patrons that it not be put in their boxes.

Newspapers, including The Review, and magazines in the second class mail division have received some increase in rates, which will make them bear a fairer share of the postal cost. More increases may be needed.

Havens has served as sports writer, covering football, basketball and track events for the AHS Antelope teams. Also, he has covered other school news and general news stories, including the publicity on the recently-organized Junior Chamber of Commerce. Havens, along with other officers, was installed as secretary of the Jaycees Friday night at the Charter Banquet in Abernathy school cafeteria.

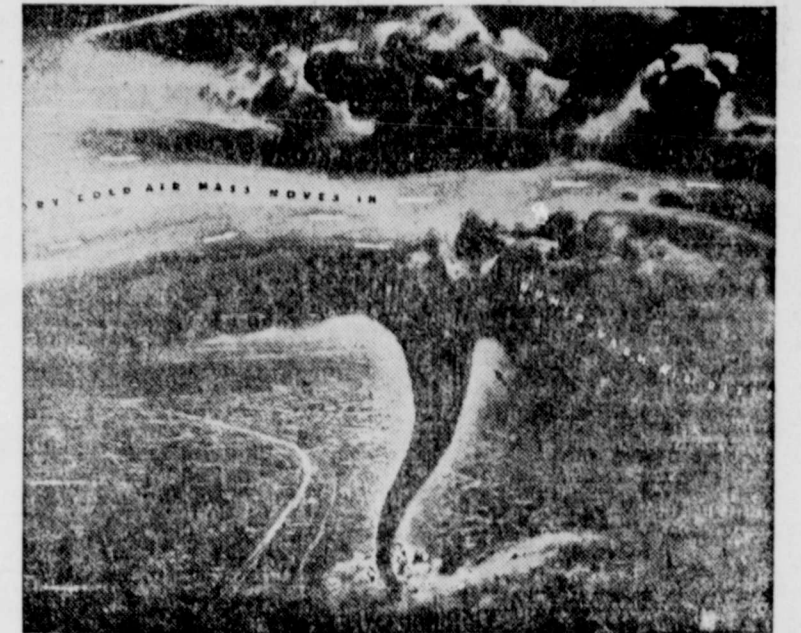

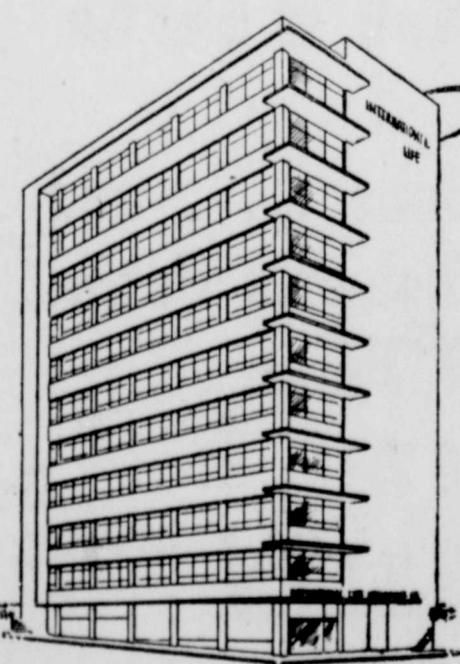
