### KEEP SOIL IN SHAPE FOR TOP PRODUCTION

College Station—Good soil management practices and well adapted cropping systems are the basis for a long continued and prosperous agriculture. Those who are likely to become careless depend on the soil for livelihood with this main resource, and this can prove costly, warns Jack Barton, extension soil conservation specialist.

The physical condition of soil is of much importance in crop production, says Barton. Physical properties can be controlled by good use of crop residues, crop rotations, green manure and cover crops and barnyard manure. A deep, moderately porous soil should be maintained, rather than one that is too tight and hard to work or the other extreme, too porous.

Organic matter is of prime importance in keeping soil in good physical condition, points out the specialist. It insures a good population of beneficial soil bacteria, aids in water penetration, increases the water-holding capacity of the soil, improves soil structure and adds nitrogen and humus.

Crop rotations can play an important role in improving soil productivity, and legume or grass should be included in the rotation program, he says. The legume will add nitrogen to the soil and both the legume and grass can be a good source of organic matter and grazing. Naturally, grazing would take some of the organic matter, he adds.

Almost every farm operator follows a plan, though sometimes unconscious of the fact, points out Barton. The choice of a good or poor plan is up to the operator. His choice can mean the difference between a profit or loss.

### Texas Almanac For 1958-1959 Is Off Press

In a swift-changing nation, Texas is setting the pace in economic expansion, according to facts and figures presented in the Texas Almanac for 1958-59, which has just been published by The Dallas Morning News.

Most striking has been the development of manufacturing. In the eight years, 1949-1957, the net annual value of Texas manufactured products increased from \$1,814 million to \$3,991 million. Even discounting for inflation of values this was an increase of about 60 per cent. In the 18 years, 1939-1957, net value of manufactured products increased from \$449 million to \$3,991 million.

The expansion of Texas banking, distribution, transportation and general commerce has been greater in recent years than in any other period in Texas history, as shown by many pages of concrete data.

The Texas population increase, 1950-1957, has been even more rapid than during the census interval, 1949-1950. In the absence of an official census since 1950, the Texas Almanac uses the official estimates of the Bureau of the Census and its own formula based upon scholastic population increase as shown in individual counties, cities and towns.

The state's population increased from 7,711,194 in 1950 to 9,127,000 in 1957, with some counties, cities and towns showing more than 50 per cent increase. Farm population continues to decline in relation to the population of the entire state but in less degree than during the 1940-1950 census interval.

The more than 700 pages of the volume brings up to date information on every aspect of Texas' economic, political and social activity, including latest data and historical reviews of the past.

Included are natural resources of all kinds with especial emphasis on Texas water resources and problems of water conservation.

In the pages of the volume are found recent developments and historical matter on government, education, politics, civic activities and developments and recent legislation.

All articles on counties, cities and towns are completely revised, including maps.

The 1958-1959 Texas Almanac is the most compact, comprehensive edition ever printed.

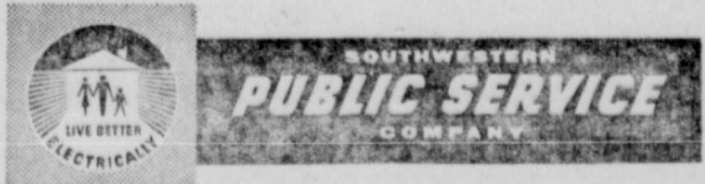

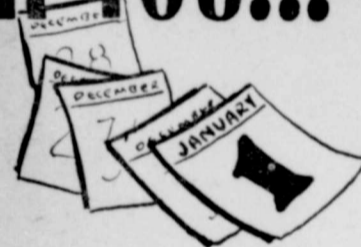

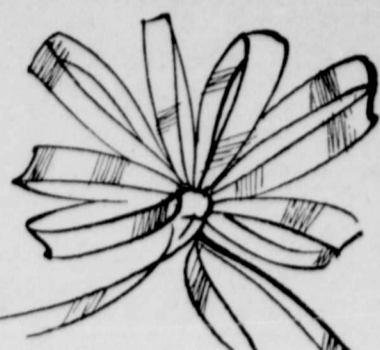

Everyone who is willing to give up the world, believe and obey Christ, and give himself to God for spiritual service, can rest confidently in this great hope.

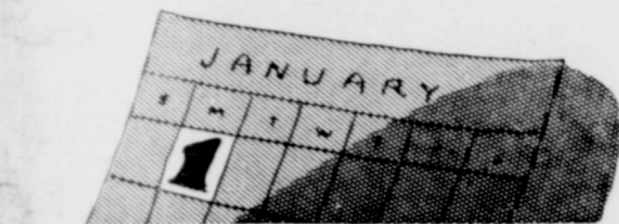

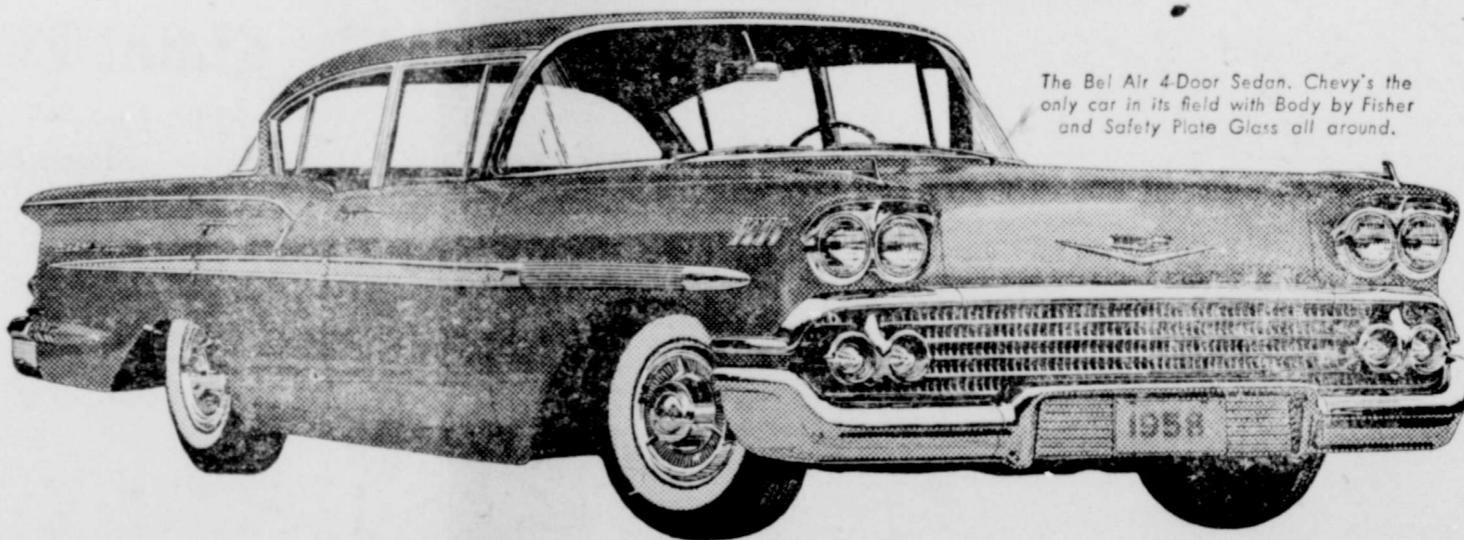

**Hale County Farmers Report  
On Testing of Hybrid Grain**

Many farmers in Hale County grew their first hybrid sorghum in 1957, according to County Agent, Ollie Limer. The results have been different on many of the farms. Those farmers, according to the Agent, who harvested the hybrids before they fell are well pleased and happy with the results. Other farmers who were forced to harvest late and the sorghum blew down were not as well pleased and in many instances hybrid sorghums were the ones that blew down first. However, the Agent feels that most all grain sorghum stood longer than they normally would after a frost or freeze and that hybrid sorghums may suffer a setback to some extent due to the weather conditions. The Agent believes, however, that hybrids will replace standard varieties within a few years and in most every case the hybrids out yielded the open pollinated varieties in 1957.

Most farmers will recall the variety demonstration tests that were conducted by the Extension Agents and the following farmers, Owen Benn of Abernathy; Henry Scarborough of Lakeview; Fred Kanady of Plainview and Bill Jackson of Hale Center. These farmers were not striving for large yields in these variety tests but a comparison of the yields was the important thing. On each of the farms the varieties were planted in rows the same, being planted in rows side by side. You will notice that each variety has responded dif-

ferently on the different farms because they had different land management treatment.

Henry Scarborough reported the following yields: (first figure stands for the variety of hybrid grain sorghum, and the second figure indicates the yield for the variety) — 660 variety, yielded 6,380 pounds per acre; 601, 5,143; 610, 5,110; 650, 3,931; 620, 4,750; 611, 4,717; 590, 4,708; Owen Benn's report: 650, 4,250; 660, 4,235; 620, 4,087; 611, 3,212; 601, 3,187; 610, 3,100; 590, 2,950.

On the Owen Benn farm at one stage Mr. Benn couldn't get the water to it and it began to suffer a little. Fertilizer was applied only on the Henry Scarborough farm. This plot had 80 pounds of nitrogen. The other demonstrations had no fertilizer. The Agent wishes to thank the farmers who cooperated with the demonstrations and they have agreed to conduct a very similar demonstration in 1958 and all of the hybrids, both Texas and De-

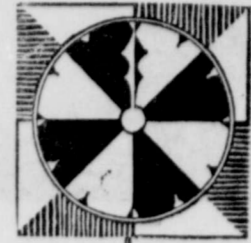
monstration. The Agent believes that the number of acres of hybrids will increase despite the fact that we have had an unfortunate harvest in 1957 in that most all of the sorghum fell down that hadn't been harvested prior to November 29th. However, a big percentage of the crop was salvaged by the use of Hesston Crop Saver Attachments, Hume Reel and many home made type harvest

fingers, however, it was expensive and very slow.

The average in Hale County this year on approximately 300,000 acres is approximately 4,000 pounds to the acre which is the highest in the history of the county. Many farmers reported to the Agent, 5,000 to 6,000 pounds per

acre and more on all the acreage that they farm. Hale County is recognized as the number one county in the United States in the production of sorghum.

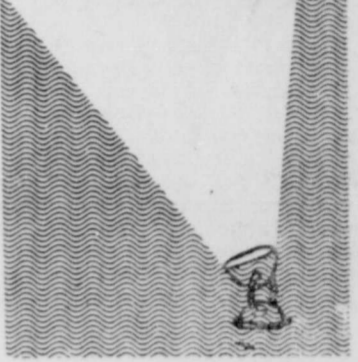

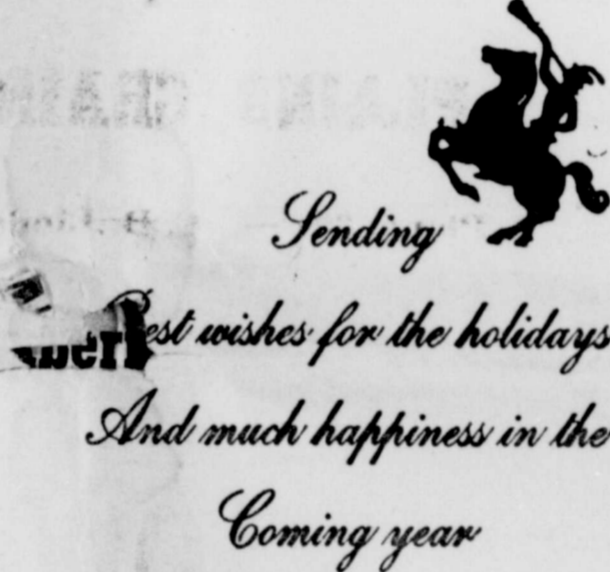

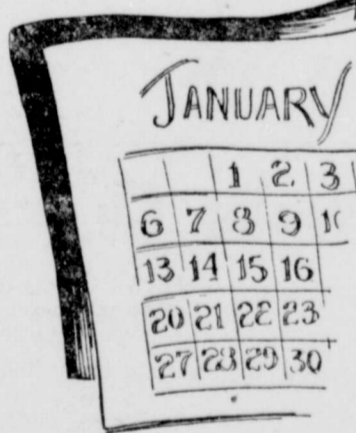

#### SOME CHRISTMAS GIFTS TAXABLE

Although it may come as a surprise to some people, the federal government levies a tax which applies to gifts made by one person to another. However the government has no desire to tax ordinary birthday and Christmas gifts. The law therefore excludes from taxable gifts the first \$3,000 given to each individual in each calendar year.

The law also excludes from taxable gifts, gifts to the church, community chest, and similar charitable organizations, and allows each giver an exemption of \$30,000 before the tax applies.

The tax applies whether the gift is of money or of property. If it is of property, the tax is computed on the fair market value of the property at the date of the gift.

The purpose of many gifts is to remove the property from the taxable estate of the giver at the time of his death. This may or may not be accomplished. The federal law provides that transfers made within three years before date of death shall be deemed to have been made in contemplation of death and shall be taxable in the estate of the one

who dies. It may be advisable to "look a gift horse in the mouth" for the gift may cost the one who receives the gift in income taxes as well as the giver in gift taxes. For income tax purposes the cost basis of property received by gift is the cost of the giver regardless of the fact that the giver may have paid a gift tax on the gift. The other rule is that in case of property received by inheritance, the cost basis is the fair market value at the date of the decedent's death.

An example will show the application of the rules. Suppose a farmer acquired his land in the early days at a cost of \$10,000. This property is now worth \$50,000. The farmer wishes to retire and to escape taxes, so he gives the farm to his daughter. Although he may pay federal gift taxes totaling several thousand dollars, when the daughter decides to sell the farm for its \$50,000 value, she still has to pay income tax on \$40,000 profit (difference between the sales price

and her father's cost of \$10,000.) On the other hand, if the farmer had not given the farm to the daughter, but had left it to her under his will, he would have saved the gift tax. The daughter would have taken the property at a cost basis of \$50,000, so upon the sale she would not have had to pay any income tax.

Of course, there would have been some estate taxes and administrative expenses in the father's estate, but that would have been much less than the taxes which resulted from the gift. However, depending upon individual and particular circumstances, there may be occasions when a gift is advisable. Your lawyer can advise you on this matter.

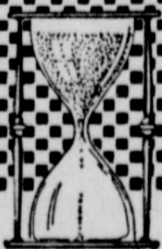

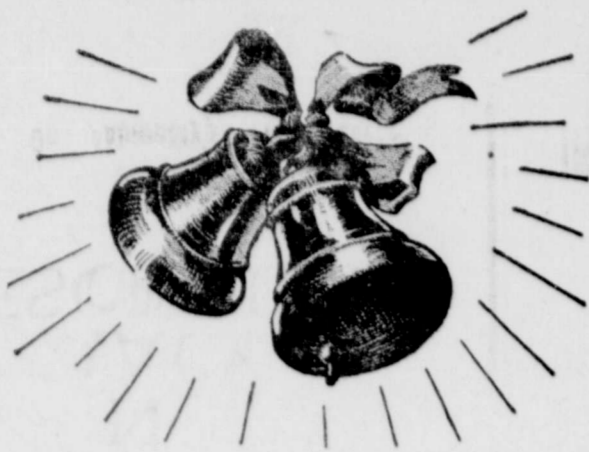
