MEDICARE DEDUCTIBLE MAY SPAN FIFTEEN MONTH USE PERIOD

People with Medicare medical insurance were reminded today that doctor bills for October, November and December may cover their \$50 annual deductible for both 1970 and 1971. if such expenses didn't pass the \$50 level before October 1.

R. R. Tuley, Jr., district manager, explained that the annual deductible is the first \$50 covered medical expenses accumulated in a calendar year.

But there is a "carry-over" rule that helps the beneficiary who might otherwise have to pay the \$50 deductible twice in a short period of time at the end of one year and the begin-

ning of the next year. Medicare medical insurance, the voluntary part of Medicare that helps pay doctor bills and other health services, pays 80 percent of covered expenses af-

ter the first \$50 There can be no Medicare payment until a record is made that you have met your deductible. For this reason, it is a good practice as soon as your bills come to \$50 to attach them to a Medicare claim form and send them to P. O. Box 22147. Group Medical and Surgical Medicare-Part B. SOCIAL SECURITY IS IMPORTANT TO THE UNDER 30 AGE GROUP

If you're in the half of the U. S. population that's under 30, you may think social security is something remote and unimportant to you right now. Not so, according to R. R. Tuley. Jr., social security district manager for the Abilene dist-

"In this generally healthy and youthful group, 21/9 million people receive benefits because they are disabled or are dependent upon disabled workers. Over 3 million widowed mothers and young children get monthly social security checks as survivors of workers." Tuley stated. "Half a million students age 18 to 22 and a quarter million people who became disabled in childhood get monthly benefits as the children of retired, deceased, or disabled workers," he went on. "Disabled children get social security benefits as long as they are not able to work."

"The money in cases like these is important, of course," Tuley added. "But for the young worker who knows that his family will be at least partially provided for should he be injured or die prematurely, there is also peace of mind."





of legislation which he authorized to relieve small hospitals of the requirement of having a registered nurse on duty at all times. The House of Representatives passed the bill on December 22 and the Senate passed it on January 2. The Bill, H.R. 19470 now goes to the President for signature.

The need for such legislation was evidenced by the difficulty many small rural hospitals have encountered in qualifying for Medicare due to this requirement. In his remarks before the House, Congressman Burleson "There must be adequate standards for adequate health care. This we all recognize. There is, however, the practical aspect of what can be immediately provided in certain areas of the Country.

"In many small towns of the more rural sections there is only one hospital. In many instances it is miles removed from a larger town hospital and is necessary to the community. To establish standards and requirements which can not be met at this time and a few years in the immediate future would work an extreme hardship on Medicare patients who have no other place to go.

"Medicare patients should not be required to leave their home community, their familiar surroundings and, particularly, their doctor for care in another area not familiar to them."

Burleson's bill permits discretion on the part of the Secretary of HEW to determine, under certain criteria, whether a registered nurse must be required around the clock at these particular hospitals. The bill is temporary in nature in that it allows the nursing requirement to be waived by the Secretary year after year for the next five years.






