Before coming to Abernathy to take over as girls basketball coach in 1953, Wilson was mentor for the Avoca girls for four years. During the last two years at Avoca, Coach Wilson's team compiled 60-10 won-lost record and in 1953 his Avoca team qualified for the state tournament in Austin.

Mr. Wilson's second team to go to the state tournament was in 1955 when all-stater Sherley Oswalt, who is now assistant coach for the Abernathy squad, was the top star.

In the semi-final game that year, the Abernathy girls were leading by one point when the game ended, but their opponent, Angleton, sank two free throws to win the game, and eventually the championship.

Wilson's Abernathy teams have lost only 4 of 58 conference games in the five years that he has been coach. In that five years as coach, his teams have failed to win the district championship only once and have compiled a 73-11 record the last two years.

Coach Wilson credits much of the success of this year's team to the assistant coach, Miss Sherley Oswalt. Miss Oswalt played on two of Coach Wilson's teams and in 1955 was an all-state forward for the team that was beaten in the state semi-finals.

Miss Oswalt, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Doyle Oswalt of Abernathy, graduated from AHS in 1955 and is now a senior at ACC in Abilene. She will graduate this summer.







7-STEP PROGRAM AIDS COTTON IMPROVEMENT

College Station-12 years ago a program was initiated by the Texas Agriculture Extension Service that has through the years grown in scope and importance to the cotton industry of the State. was known as the 7-Step Cotton Program and was an effort to oring together on the county and state basis committees represent-

ing every segment of the cotton industry to work for the betterment of their industry.

A backward glance over the annual reports filled by Fred Elliott, extension cotton specialist liott, extension cotton specialist, shows how effective this joint effort has been. During the 12-year period, the average lint yield per harvested acre in Texas has climbed from 134 pounds in 1946 to 291 pounds for 1957. The 1957 figare has been exceeded only once. the records show, and that was an estimated 325 pounds an acre

Last year, Elliott reports that county agents in 193 Texas counties assisted producers with various phases of the 7-Step Program. Involved in the total program were 5.8 million for the 5.9 mil-Hon acres harvested in Texas last rear. Spreading burs on the land for soil improvement and to reduce gin fire hazards was stressed and 10,250 farms in 125 counties were treated. Cotton followed phosphated legumes on approximately 29,000 farms in 153 counties; barnyard manure was used on more than 8,000 farms to increase yields; and defoliants or desicants were used on more than 21,000 farms in 104 counties as an aid to mechanical harvesting.

Too, 1,587 spindle pickers used in 57 counties and 23,132 stripper harvesters in 123 counties to harvest an estimated 1,200,000 bales of cotton at a saving of \$30,000,000 in labor. Mechanical and chemical weed control practices cut the far-mers hoe bill by an estimated \$15,000,000. Elliott says producers in 150 counties used 44,978 rotary equipped tractors; that 87,954 acres in 143 counties were spot oiled for Johnsongrass control and that 13,346 acres in 41 counties were lateral oiled with post emergence chemicals.

Eliott gives full credit to the 7-Step Committees for the achievements and predicts the progress will continue.

FORD OUTSOLD ALL OTHER **MAKES OF AUTOMOBILES IN 1957**

DETROIT, MICH .- Ford outsold all other makes in 1957, according to final and official registration figures released here today by R. L. Polk and Company, the automobile industry's statisticgathering agency.

The figures show that not only did the nation's Ford dealers sell more new Ford cars in 1957, but they also sold more new cars and trucks combined than any other manufacturer.

The figures, which cover sale of both 1957 and the successful 1958 Ford models, show Ford obtained 37,329 unit lead in cars and a lead of 23,670 when cars and trucks are combined.

A total of 1,493,617 Ford cars was registered in 1957 compared to 1,456,288 cars registered by Ford's closest competitor. Combining cars and trucks, the figures show a total of 1,770,918 Fords registered in the year, compared to 1,747,248 for Ford's near-




