Track And Field Events

The Abernathy Antelope track team racked up 64 1/2 points in a triangular practice meet here on Antelope field last Saturday afternoon. The Floydada Whirlwinds won the meet with 70 points. Hale Center, the third entry, got only 19 1/2 points.

The Whirlwinds won 10 of 14 first places. The Antelopes won the remaining four events while the Owls of Hale Center failed to win a single event.

A. C. Harris won the 440-yard dash with a 53.9 time. Charles Pope won the 880-yard dash with a 2:16 clocking. Jimmy Dye won the pole vault with a 9'6" leap.

The Antelope's mile relay team, probably the most promising spot on this year's team, won that event with a 3:39.2 time.

Abernathy's second mile relay team placed third in the relay, only a few yards behind second place Floydada.

Other Antelopes who placed in the money are Gerald Watson, third in the 120-yard high hurdles; A. C. Harris, second place tie in the 100-yard dash; James Nelson, second in 440-yard dash; Pat Attebury, fourth in the 440-yard dash; Gerald Watson, second in the 190-yard low hurdles; Jerry Oswald, second in the 880-yard dash; A. C. Harris, second in 220-yard dash; James Nelson, third in 220-yard dash; Carroll Powell, second in mile run; Kenneth Turner, third in mile run; Gerald Watson, third in pole vault; Scott Mooneyham, fourth in shot put; Dye and Watson, fourth place tie in high jump; Watson, third in broad jump; Regg Stephens, second in discus; and Richard DuBose, fourth in discus.

FRANK MOORE HEADS GSPA

Mr. Frank Moore, Hale County farmer and agricultural leader of Plainview, was elected President of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association at the annual election of officers in Plainview, Monday, March 17. Mr. Moore succeeds Mr. R. G. Peeler, Deaf Smith County agricultural leader of Hereford, who has headed the IT county research market and legislative organization since its founding three years ago.

In requesting that he not be re-elected, Peeler pointed out the strong leadership available from the various counties served by the association. Peeler remains as Legislative Director for the group. Moore, an active leader in the Grain Sorghum Association's activities since its founding, has served on various committees in the interest of sorghum producers and has been to Washington in connection with the National Association of Commodity Organizations several times in recent months.

The area directors retained Mr. Elbert Harp of Abernathy, as Secretary-Treasurer, and Mr. Sam Gilbreath, Castro County director, of Dimmitt as Vice-President. Bill Nelson, 3320 Patterson, Armarillo, serves the Association as Executive Vice-President.

In other business, Frank Moore reported to the group relative to the progress of the Corn-Sorghum Bill in both the House and Senate agricultural committees. Nelson reviewed his recent trip to the Northern Utilization Research Laboratory at Peoria, Illinois and indicated that arrangements were already underway to expand grain sorghum utilization research by individuals at the laboratory.

Hale Gets More Soil Bank Funds

Hale County Friday received an additional \$850,000 in soil bank funds.

The allocation is in addition to approximately \$388,000 given to the county previously, said John Martin, manager of the Hale County Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation office.

The ASC office Friday mailed out notices to the 300 farmers who had made applications after the first soil bank allotment had been exhausted that the funds were on hand, Martin said. The applicants have a time limit in which to cancel their applications if they wish.

Martin said the Hale County payments will average around \$80 per acre.

1957 National Selective Five Acre DeKalb Hybrid Sorghum Yield Contest. He was unable to attend the banquet. Runner-up winners were L. R. & James Cruce (L. R. of Oton with a yield of 7156.87 pounds per acre. Dwain Smith of Hale Center placed third with a yield of 6959.23 pounds per acre.

The warm weather ahead can cause poultrymen a loss in egg quality and price unless refrigeration equipment is provided in their operations, warns F. Z. Beanblossom, extension poultry marketing specialist. He points out that the cost to operate a unit that would handle a 2,000-bird flock laying 20 to 24 cases per week, including depreciation, would be only one-third cent per dozen.

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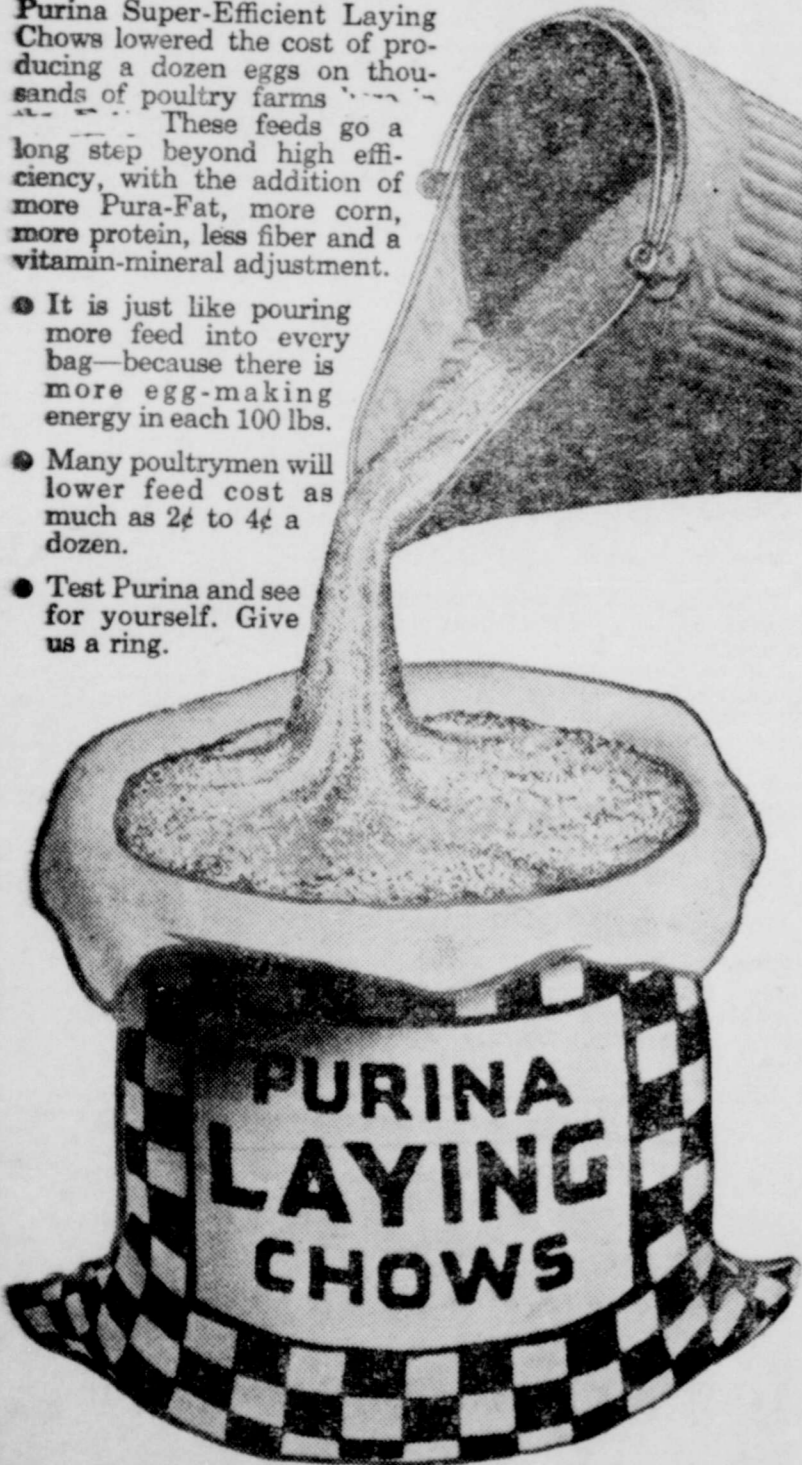
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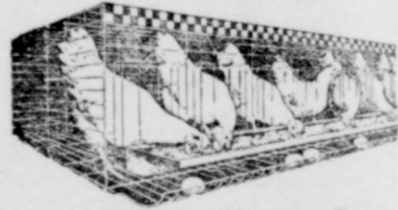
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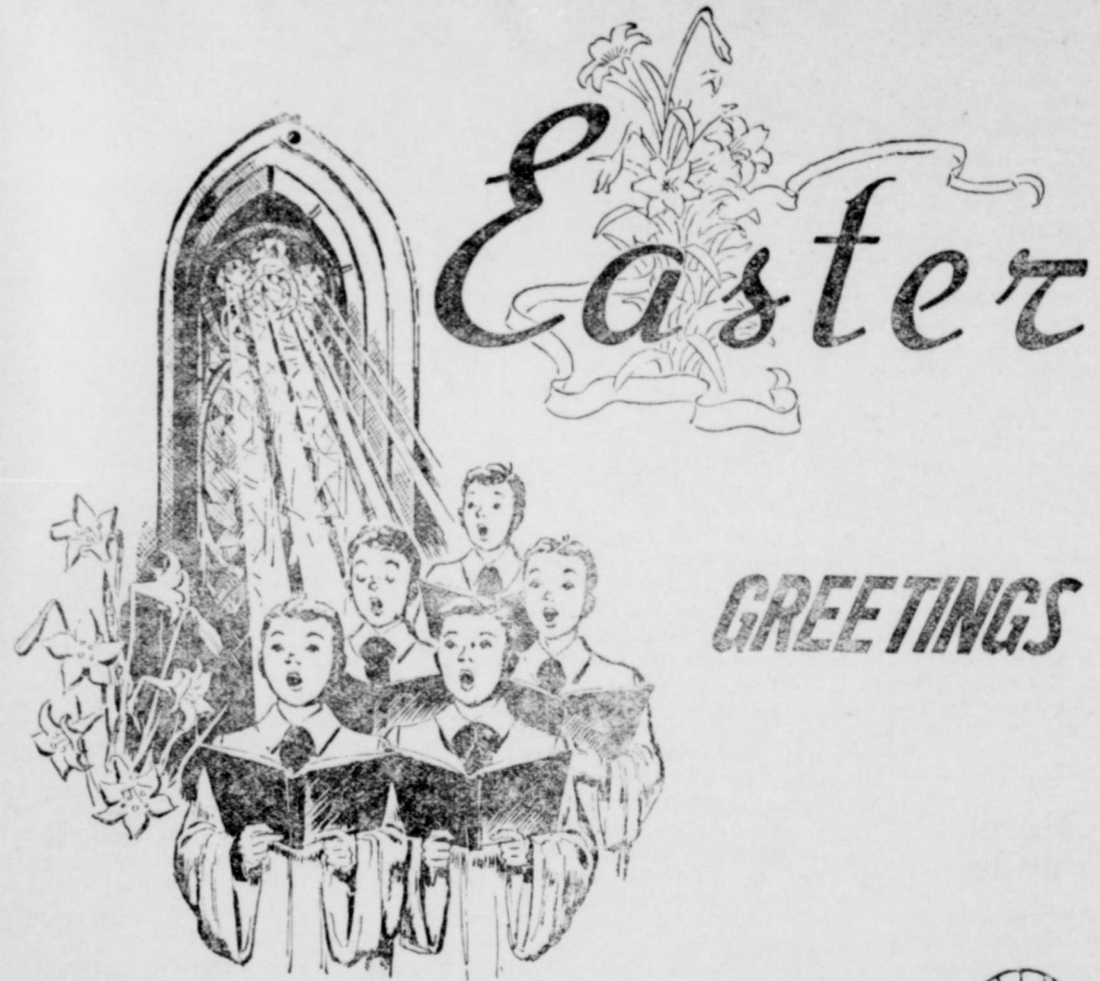

Abernathy last week helped launch a new bottle that may well go round the world eventually. The 10-oz. King-size Coca-Cola bottle, now going on sale here, is a "big brother" to the familiar

6½-oz. bottle, which is known from Boston to Bangkok and back again.

Its fame is such that, during World War II, a German prisoner stepping off the gangplank at an American post spotted a familiar red sign and, turning to an MP, said: "I see you have Coca-Cola here, too." The soft drink is sold in over

70 countries, according to Howard Billingsley, manager of the Plainview Coca-Cola Bottling plant. "Just about everywhere," he added, "except behind the Iron Curtain."

But in at least one instance the Curtain was pierced, Mr. Billingsley pointed out. That was when Gen. Eisenhower sent Marshal Zhukov a case of Coca-Cola after the Soviet military leader enjoyed a bottle during the Potsdam Conference.

Mr. Billingsley said definitely the "big brother" would not replace the regular-size bottle, designed in 1915 at the recommendation of a bottling official who urged: "We need a Coca-Cola bottle which a person will recognize even if he feels it in the dark. It should be so shaped that, even if broken, a person could tell at a glance what it was."

Although about 80 percent of all the Coca-Cola sold is in bottles, the man who invented the drink never intended it to be more than a soda fountain beverage. In 1886 John S. Pemberton, a druggist, prepared a soft drink syrup in his back yard in Atlanta, using a three-legged iron pot heated by a wood fire.

He took a jug of the syrup to Jacob's Pharmacy at the historic Five Points, where soda water was added and the new drink put on sale.

The first year only 25 gallons were sold, bringing in \$50.00. Of this, Pemberton spent \$47.00 on advertising. Most of it consisted of oil cloth signs pinned to drug-store awnings.

When Pemberton died two years later, rights to Coca-Cola were bought by a 27-year old wholesale drug salesman, Asa Candler. "Back in Candler's day the Coca-Cola Company changed offices several times," Mr. Billingsley said. "One time when it moved, a one-horse wagon carried all the firm's equipment and furniture."

Candler was a keen merchandiser. He organized the Coca-Cola poster and calendar, using Lillian Russell's picture on one of them. He was the first to use the slogan, "Delicious and Refreshing," which appeared in 1889. And to get the public acquainted with the new drink, he gave away millions of tickets for free Cokes. "They tell me in Atlanta," Mr. Billingsley said, "that even today someone comes across one of these tickets in an attic. If they send it in, they get a free case of Coca-Cola."

It was 13 years after Pemberton invented Coca-Cola before the drink was bottled. A young Chattanooga lawyer, Ben Thompson, who had come across a locally bottled soft drink in Cuba during the Spanish-American War, hit upon the idea. He and another lawyer, Joseph Whitehead, went to Atlanta and asked if they could bottle Coca-Cola.

Candler, busy with his soda fountain sales, gave them the bottling rights to practically the



BIBLE HISTORY?

By LOYD E. ASH

In order to best understand the Bible, every Bible reader needs to have clearly in his mind the main divisions of Bible History. Otherwise it can be rather confusing. The same is true of American history, or algebra, or English, or about any other subject for study. You must first understand some fundamental rules about the subject before you can fully learn and appreciate it.

Bible History is divided into three main divisions: the Patriarchal Age, the Mosaic Law, and the Christain Age. If you will learn something about these main periods, Bible study can become not only interesting, but also real and alive for you.

Patriarchal Age
The word "patriarchal" comes from "patriarch" which means "father," and refers to the first period of Bible History when God was worshipped by the family instead of a congregation. The father was the priest who offered the animal sacrifices of atonement for their sins. God spoke His will to the fathers of the families.

This period begins at the first of the Bible, Genesis 1, and concludes at the giving of the Law of Moses in Exodus 20. It covers 2500 years of time. Adam was the first man under this age, and Moses was the last. Cain and Abel lived in this period of Bible History and offered sacrifices to God. Noah and his family built an ark according to the commandment of God. Abraham left his homeland and sojourned in a strange land because God told him to. Isaac and Jacob and Jacob's 12 sons kept the commandments and statutes of Jehovah God. Finally, Moses was born in Exodus 1, and was reared in the palace of Pharaoh. When he was 40 years old he forsook Egypt and at 80 he returned to deliver his people from Egyptian oppression and led them to Mount Sinai where the Law of Moses was given. Thus, when you come to Exodus 20 and the giving of the law, you have completed the first period of Bible History. There is one exception: the book of Job, which comes later in the Bible, belongs in this period of Bible History, the Patriarchal Age.

Mosaic Age
This period is named after Moses, the servant of God who received the Ten Commandments, God's Law for this age. Let it be remembered that this Law was

given only to Jews (Israelites) and no Gentile was ever subject to it. It was given to the Jews for a limited period of time until Christ came to set up the New Law, a universal covenant with all men of all nations. We are not under the Mosaic Law, and do not go back to the Law of Moses to find out what to do to be saved in the Christian Age. We can learn valuable lessons from this period of Bible History, one of them being the necessity of obeying God, but we cannot find out God's will for us in the Christian Age by reading the Law of Moses.

Christain Age
Jesus lived and died under the Mosaic system, and being a Jew, He kept all the law. However, when He died He did away with the old system and instituted a new covenant and new law which was intended for all people of all nations.

The Christain Age is named after Christ because God today speaks through His Son (Heb. 1:1-2) instead of through Moses and the prophets of Old. The New Law came into force in Acts 2 on the Day of Pentecost 50 years after Christ's death. At that time the Lord sent the Holy Spirit to guide the apostles in preaching the gospel and writing it down for ages to come. Today, that same gospel is to be preached to all men (Mark 16:15-16).

Here is a suggestion for you: put a sheet of paper at Exodus 20 in your Bible and another at Acts 2. Then whenever you read the Bible remember to think of which period of Bible History you are reading: the patriarchal (Gen. 1 to Exo. 20), the Mosaic (Exodus 20 to Acts 2), or the Christain (Acts 2 to Rev. 22).

entire country. This was one of the most amazing contracts in history—Thomas and Whitehead didn't pay a cent. And the man who had given them a letter of introduction to Candler didn't think enough of the product to ask for even a single share for himself.

Mr. Billingsley pointed out the early bottling equipment was far different from today's. "Bottles were washed by dropping buckshot in them and whirling it in water. They also used those old-fashioned sewing machines, equipped with a brush to scour the bottles."

Coca-Cola was the first soft drink company to use coolers. "The early ones were actually wooden tubs, sawed in half," said Mr. Billingsley. "The first electric coolers came out in 1933."

Mr. Billingsley thinks the secret of Coca-Cola's success is best summed up in the way the trademark in phonetically translated from Chinese. In China, where Coca-Cola is a popular drink, it means: "Man made mouth happy!"

SOCIAL SECURITY INFORMATION

Social security reports on domestic workers for January-March quarter are due in April, John G. Hutton, manager of the Lubbock social security office announced today.

Under the present law, most domestic employees, such as gardeners, cooks, maids, and housekeepers, are covered under social security.

Employers of these and other household workers must report the cash wages paid and remit the social security tax of 4½% of the employee's wages. In cases where the domestic employee has earned less than \$50 cash in the quarter, the employer does not have to make any report.

Mr. Hutton stressed the point that these wage reports are extremely important to the domestic employee, since old-age, survivors, and disability insurance benefits under social security are figured on the basis of the amount of earnings credited to a person's account.

The form used in making the return on household employees required only a few minutes to complete and may be obtained from the office of the District Director of Internal Revenue in Lubbock.

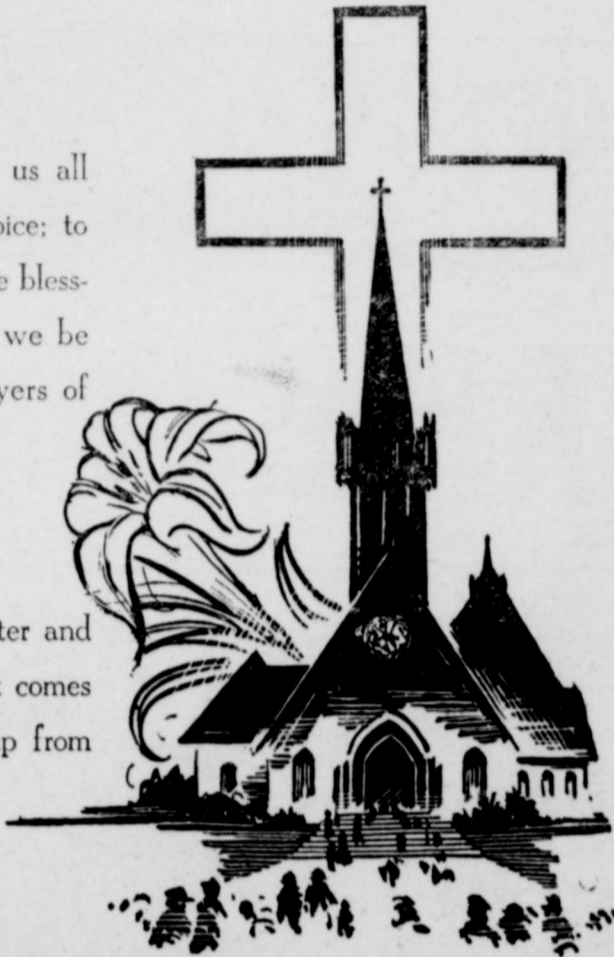

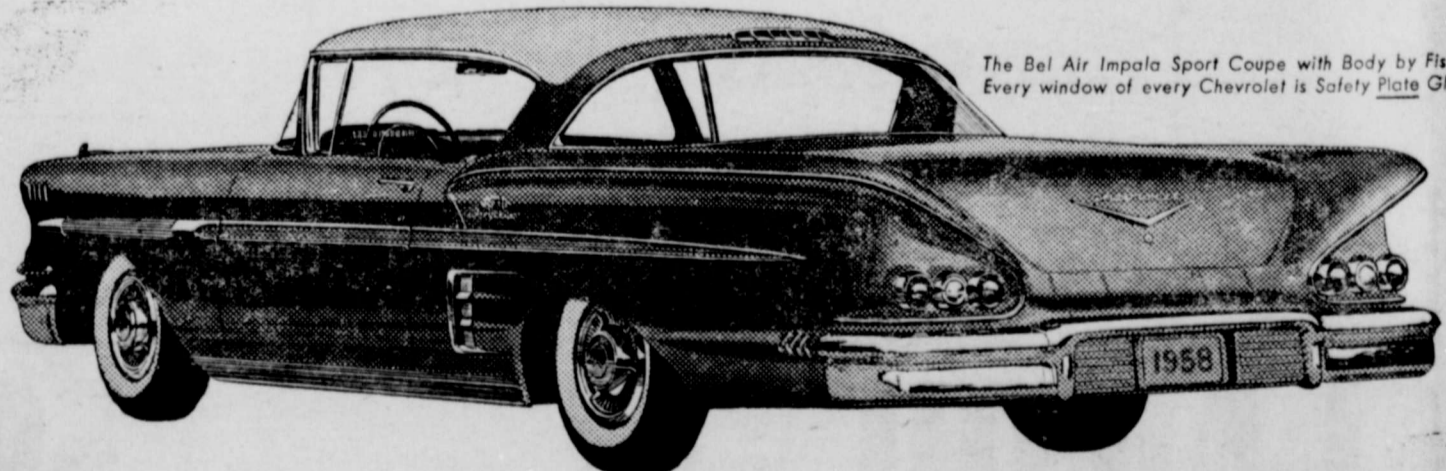
