Gas Line Ruptures!!

Callahan County Sheriff's dispatcher Arlinda Williams said she received word at 11:14 a.m. Monday of a L.P. gas leak near F.M. 3217, about 1 mile east of F.M. 604, approximately 3 miles south of Clyde near Clyde Lake.

Williams said a West Texas Utilities crew was in the area when the leak started and notified the Sheriff's Department.

She said according to reports to the dispatch office, Mobil Oil Company had a crew w digging up their 12" underground oil line when they ruptured the 10" high pressure gas line. There were no injuries reported due to the accident and there has been no fire as of yet.

A repair crew was enroute to the scene to patch the leak and was reported to be scheduled to arrive around 7:00 p.m. No evacuations were being performed at this time, but could be

necessary if weather conditions change, Williams said.

Clyde Lake Road (F.M. 3217) has been closed since the accident occurred and spectators were advised to stay out of the area. Callahan County Sheriff's Department, Texas D.P.S., Clyde Fire Department, Clyde Police Department and Texas Department of Transportation were all working together to quarantine the area until the leak could be fixed.

The repair crew arrived on the scene about 7:30 p.m. Monday evening and worked through the night to patch the L.P. gas leak. The roads were opened at 7:15 a.m. on a foggy Tuesday morning.

No evacuations were necessary and no injuries were reported during the incident. County, State, and Local Law Enforcement and Clyde Fire Department personnel stood by for twenty hours to secure the area to eliminate any ignition sources.



Callahan County-Baird and Clyde Fire Departments joined forces to battle a single story residence fire Sunday afternoon, just east of Union Hill Road on the north I-20 service road.

Both departments were notified approximately 5:15 p.m. and units from both towns arrived on the scene at 5:20 to find heavy smoke coming from the east portion of the brick home. A passerby said he saw smoke coming from the rear of the house about 2:30 p.m. as he passed on the interstate, but due to the tree coverage he thought it was a bar-b-que or trash fire in the backyard.

Clyde Fire Chief Rick Gilmore said it appeared the fire had started from an undetermined cause in the northeast corner in a small room and spread to the attic, then to other rooms. Due to the construction of the home, it was almost impossible to extinguish the blaze in the east end. There was evidence that the house had been added on to numerous times. About one third of the west end of the residence was saved, along with some furniture and personal belongings that were hauled out by firemen, friends and neighbors, Gilmore added. The roof on the east half of the house fell in about 30 minutes after firemen arrived on the

scene.

A water supply was another problem encountered at the fire, said Baird Assistant Chief Russell Robbins. Robbins estimated he pumped 10,000 gallons of water brought by Baird and Clyde Tanker trucks. Robbins said it took firemen about 1 1/2 hours "mopping up". One Baird fireman filled close to thirty "breathing air" bottles during the operation. Baird had 14 firemen with four trucks on the scene. Clyde had 10 firemen with four trucks. The north service road was blocked for about three hours with emergency equipment.

About 6:30 p.m., a van from the Salvation Army arrived with

some much needed sandwiches and refreshments. Some firemen were near exhaustion by this time from the intense heat inside the burning structure.

The residence of the home was Patsy Work of Baird, along with her pets, a dog, parakeet, tropical fish and several cats. Work was not home at the time of the fire and lost all her pets to the blaze. Her family owned and operated a dry goods store in Baird for many years. Miss Work stayed with a friend in Abilene Sunday night. A friend said the house was insured and was to be inspected possible sometime Monday for a damage assessment.

Speaking Of Your Health

Q. I get hunger pains in the middle of the day. A friend of mine says this could be an ulcer. Is this true?
A. I gather that your friend is not a doctor since there are other, more exact ways to make such a diagnosis. Occasional hunger pains, even those that are relieved by food, do not necessarily mean that you have a stomach ulcer.
Hunger pains, in most instances, are due to the fact that the stomach is empty. With nothing in the stomach, the muscles have no food "to contract down on." This emptiness is the reason most hunger pains are relieved by eating some food.
Doctors do consider periodic hunger pains as a possible indication of a peptic ulcer of the stomach and duodenum (small intestine).

The fact that eating relieves hunger pains is very significant as a diagnostic sign. When such a history is given to a doctor, x-rays of the stomach and intestine are used to positively determine the presence or absence of an ulcer.
There are also brilliantly designed fiberoptic instruments. These are painlessly inserted into the mouth, then passed through the esophagus and down into the stomach. Now every portion of the inner lining of the stomach can be carefully scrutinized for the presence of an ulcer.
Not all hunger pains are caused by stomach disorder. Gall bladder disease, liver problems and hiatus hernia can produce hunger pains. All these conditions must be eliminated as a cause before arriving at the diagnosis of stomach ulcers.

Dried basil and oregano, crumbled

Prepare crusts: thaw bread dough. On lightly floured surface, divide dough into eight pieces. Cover; let dough rest for 10 minutes.

Spray cookie sheets with nonstick cooking spray; sprinkle with cornmeal. Using your hands, flatten each piece of dough into a six-inch circle; place on prepared sheets.

Preheat oven to 425°F. In a small dish, combine Butter Buds, oil and seasoning blend. Brush mixture on dough rounds. Bake seven minutes. Remove sheets to wire racks to cool.

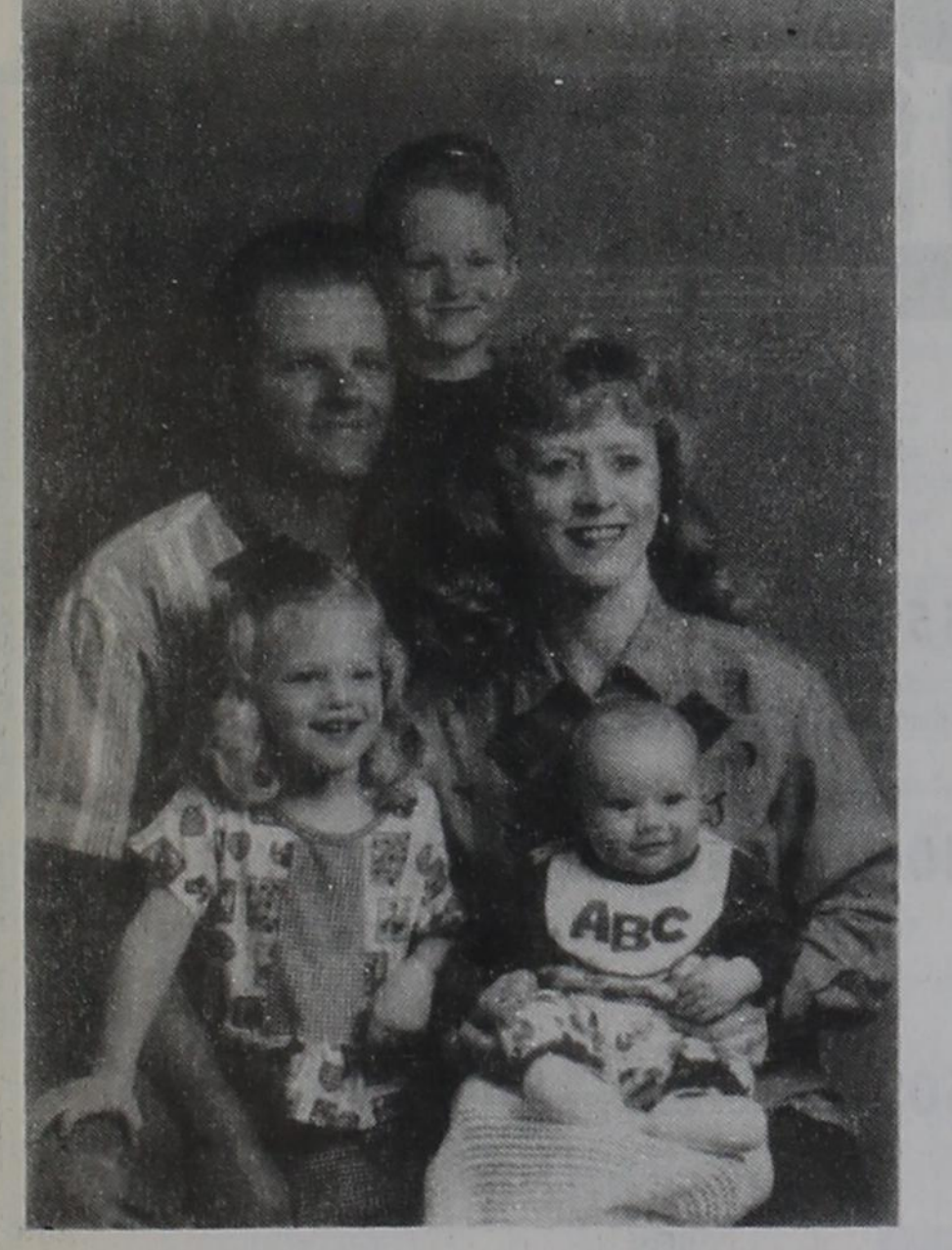

AUSTIN — State inspectors pop in so infrequently at registered in-home day-care facilities that bad situations can slip through the cracks.

Inspectors are required to visit each of the 12,769 registered family homes in Texas only once every three years, according to a report by the Associated Press.

An internal audit of the Texas Department of Protective and Regulatory Services shows infrequent monitoring of registered family homes that care for four or more unrelated children "has a questionable impact on the protection of children" and might as well be cut to save money.

Child-care advocates oppose cutting the monitoring.

Ronnie Earle, Travis County District Attorney, opposes curtailing the unannounced inspections, but said that if the monitoring is cut, there must be an alternative program. "We have to provide for the safety of our children, and that means these homes have to be monitored," he said.

Meanwhile, last week, the Texas Sunset Advisory Commission released a study recommending the Department of Protective Regulatory Services be given power to fine deficient or dangerous day-care facilities, the *Austin American-*

Statesman reported.

"I think it would put some teeth in the laws out there," said Fred Seale, deputy director of programs for the agency. "It becomes more of an issue ... if there's a penalty associated with a non-compliance finding," he told the *American Statesman*.

The agency has authority to revoke licenses or file lawsuits, but the authority to fine would expand enforcement power to deter violations of state law, the sunset commission report said.

Last year, state regulators found about 92,000 violations of child-care standards, but imposed only 122 sanctions and of those revoked only 48 permits to operate.

Sharp Recommends Drought Aid
Texas Comptroller John Sharp last week released a list of ways the state could help drought-stricken farmers across Texas.

"These hard-working folks who put food on our tables deserve the full range of available assistance to see them through these trying times," he said, and made four recommendations:

- That the U.S. Department of Agriculture extend its emergency livestock feed program, which is set to expire Aug. 31, and readmit 24 counties to the program that had been dropped.

- Expand the state agricultural water conservation loan program, which helps water districts, farmers and ranchers pay for water conservation efforts and irrigation systems.

- Redirect loans that go to farmers who diversify their crops and expand their processing.

- Put more money into the small community emergency loan program so towns can deal better with the drought.

Sharp also announced the Texas Department of Transportation will promote a program allowing ranchers to get livestock feed by cutting and baling grass from state highway

rights of way.

No Refund for Eaten Food

Attorneys for the State of Texas last week withdrew their demand for a \$3 million refund for a soybean-based meat substitute purchased — perhaps illegally — by the Texas Department of Criminal Justice.

Why? Most of the granular, just-add-water foodstuff made by the Canadian firm, VitaPro, has already been eaten by Texas prison inmates and guards.

Seeking a refund also could have required switching the location of the trial from prison headquarters in Huntsville to a court in Austin. State attorneys opposed the move because their witnesses and records are in Huntsville.

The state's attorneys continue in their efforts to void a \$33.7 million contract with VitaPro, contending the contract violates Texas' competitive-bidding laws.

VitaPro attorneys argue the contract is valid because the company complied with its terms.

Children Rally Against Dump

More than 500 Mexican children gathered in Austin last week to protest a proposed low-level nuclear waste dump to be built near the small West Texas town of Sierra Blanca.

Sierra Blanca, population about 700, is 16 miles from the Mexican border and about 80 miles southeast of El Paso. The children came from Ciudad Acuna, Coahuila, a town 300 miles from Sierra Blanca that relies on the Rio Grande for its water.

The children came by buses to the state Capitol and joined about 150 Austin-area children to march by the Governor's Mansion in hopes of persuading Gov. George W. Bush to abandon his support for the dump.

Critics of the dump-building proposal say the proposed dump site is in an earthquake-prone area that has many faults in its subterrain.

Many of the grants are designed to provide ways for Texas Hispanics, African-Americans, inner-city youth, single parents and other groups

TPWD has identified as "underserved constituents" to get out and enjoy the great outdoors.

African-Americans, Hispanics and other minorities are projected to make up the majority of the Texas population by the year 2030. Yet, relatively few members of these groups currently hunt, fish or visit state parks.

"This program not only allows at-risk and underserved kids to enjoy such outdoor ac-

tivities as camping, boating, hiking or fishing, but also will help them learn more about conservation, the environment and wildlife habitat," said program coordinator Darlene Lewis.

A cap of \$20,000 per grant was imposed, Lewis explained, to enable the department to offer more organizations a piece of the pie. Grants ranged from \$1,300 to \$20,000.

"To many of our Texas youngsters are growing up in cities, isolated from the outdoors and the important values that visits to the wilderness can instill," said Andrew Sansom, TPWD executive director. "In my five years at Parks and Wildlife, I've never been more excited than I am about this new community outreach program which will continue to pay dividends down the road."

Examples: City of College Station - \$12,813 to introduce 1,000 youth at risk to camping and fishing at state parks. The targeted age group is 16 and under.

City of Monahans - \$5,165 for a fishing tournament for 110 children and 210 adults. Youth ages 5-14 as well as persons with physical and mental disabilities will participate.

Drilling Up Around State, Oil Production Down

Statewide, the Texas Railroad Commission issued a total of 1,049 original drilling permits in April 1996, compared to 895 in April, 1995. The April total included 769 permits to drill new oil and gas tests, 45 to re-enter existing well bores, and 235 for re-completions.

Sofar in 1996 there have been 4,005 drilling permits issued, compared to 3,651 recorded during the same period in 1995.

Total well completions for 1996 year-to-date is 2,789, a one percent increase from the 2,752 recorded during the same period in 1995.

The major part of this exploration is taking place in the Midland area (177 permits in April) and the

San Angelo area (155 permits). West Central Texas had 87 permits in April.

Production is still down, however. Callahan and Eastland County are included in this trend.

The latest monthly oil and gas statistics, for February, 1996, report the following:

Callahan County—32,678 barrels of crude oil 147,665 Mcf (1,000 cubic ft.) of gas.

Eastland County—37,550 barrels of crude oil 537,087 Mcf of gas.

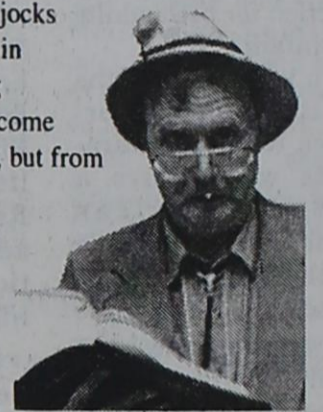

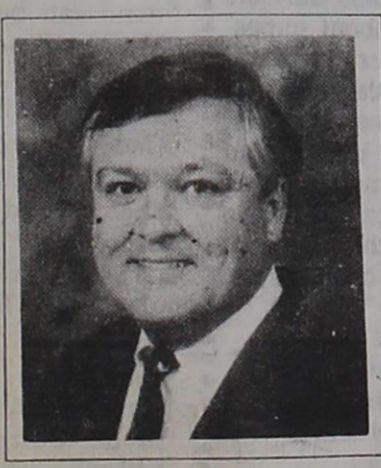

PREVENTING SPORTS INJURIES

No one would think of playing tackle football without wearing shoulder pads and a helmet. Yet, far too many youngsters play contact sports, without wearing protection for their mouths. This results in all too many causes of split lips, broken, chipped and knocked out teeth. For example, fifty two percent of all football injuries occur in unprotected faces and mouths.

The best way to prevent all this mouth damage, is to wear a mouth protector. Bars across football helmets don't do the same job. They don't protect the teeth and jaws from an upward blow on the chin - only from a blow straight against the face. Dental injuries to football players wearing proper mouth protectors have been almost

completely eliminated. Most old-style mouthguards, such as those we see boxers using, are not very easy to wear because they are bulky. Talking is just about impossible. Many players prefer to talk and be comfortable and risk the chance of injury rather than wear one. However, a modern mouth-guard, made to an accurate model of a boy's mouth doesn't interfere with mouth breathing, stays in place when the mouth is opened, allows clear speech and is comfortable.

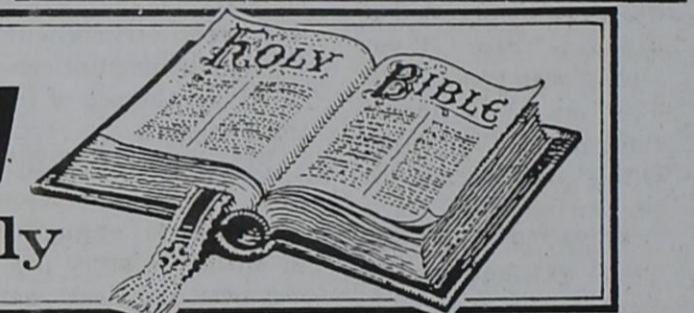

Property Tax Exemptions--

On November 7, 1995, Texas voters approved a constitutional amendment to increase the amount of from property tax for disabled Veterans. The exemptions have now been published and range from \$5,000 for no less than 10% disability to \$12,000 for 70% or more disability. A Veteran of 65 years age or more and with not less than 10% disability qualifies for the \$12,000 exemption also. Provisions are also made for widows and dependent children of deceased Veterans.

The Callahan County Appraisal District (915)854-1165 advises that Veterans who were already receiving the exemption have been upgraded to the new rates. If you have a rating of at least 10%, you might want to contract the Appraisal Office and discuss the exemption.

KUWAIT LIBERATION MEDAL - The Department of Defense has recently approved the Kuwait Liberation Medal offered by the Government of Kuwait. To be eligible, a service member must have

served in the Southwest Asia Theater between August 2, 1990 and August 31, 1993.

To obtain the medal, Veterans should submit a request including full name used during service, Social Security number, dates of service, and their current address along with a copy of their DD 214 to: National Personnel Records Center, ATTN: VSE, 9700 Page Blvd., St. Louis, Mo 63132-5200.

The medal bears the Coat of Arms of the state of Kuwait with the inscription "1991 Liberation Medal" written at the top in Arabic letters. The reverse side is the map of Kuwait on a rayed background. The ribbon is patterned from the flag of Kuwait and consists of red, white and green stripes with a black trapezium centered on the top of the three stripes.

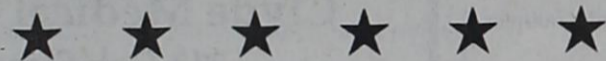

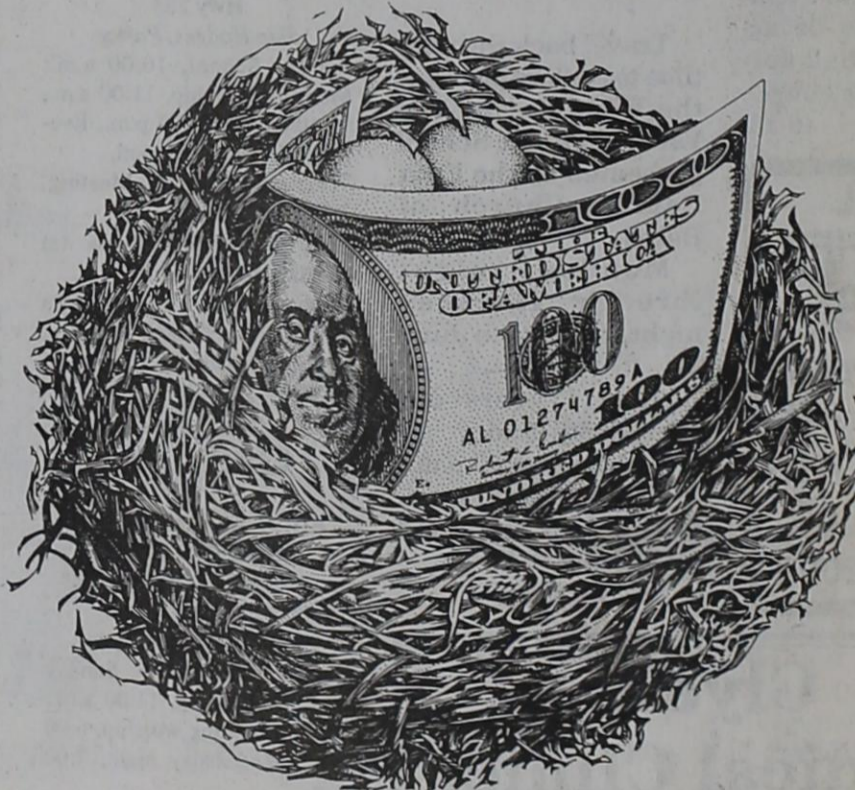
