### MORE ABOUT ABERNATHY'S CHIEF OF POLICE

As announced in the Review last week the Abernathy city council has seen fit to engage Mr. Willard Opp as chief of police for the city of Abernathy. Since Mr. Opp assumed his duties there have been numerous rumors circulated as to just where Mr. Opp's salary comes from and how he collects it.

Now to remove from peoples minds any and all misconceptions as to where his salary comes from and why, Mayor E. Graham has authorized this statement: Mr. Opp was hired by the city council to serve as chief of police in the city of Abernathy and is paid a regular salary of a certain amount which comes out of the city general fund, the same as any other city employee.

He very definitely does NOT derive any income from the number of arrests he makes nor any percentage or commission on the amount of fines, if any, collected as a result of any arrest he may make. He does, however, on a trial basis, receive a certain amount per mile on the use of his personal car while on duty.

This is, at present on a trial period of 90 days, after which the city council will approve it as is or make any change they see fit relative to the amount paid per mile for the use of his personal car.

Mr. Opp was not hired for any definite length of time any more than any other city employee.

Also, to clear the minds of community people of any mistaken ideas as of our other police officer Mr. L. J. Daniel, he is an employee of both the city and the county, being a deputy sheriff with full authority of such office and is paid partly by the county and partly by the city of Abernathy.

# Antelopes Meet Cats in Bi-District Game at Monterey Gymnasium

For the third time this year, the Abernathy Antelopes and the Dimmitt Bobcats will clash, this time in the all-important Bi-District basketball game in Monterey gymnasium at Lubbock next Tuesday night, Feb. 24, at 8:00 p. m.

Abernathy fans will occupy the score-keeper side of the gym. Pla-cards will direct fans to their re-

spective sides of the gym. Admission prices will be \$1 for adults and 50c for students. There will be no reserved seats, and tickets will not be sold in advance at the local school. The game will not be broadcast on radio. For benefit of local fans who have not been to Monterey High school in Lubbock, there are many ways to

go there.

Most direct ways are:

- 1) Go through Lubbock on Ave. A, turn right (west) at 34th St., drive west on 34th to Indiana Ave., turn left (south) on Indiana, drive south on Indiana until you reach the west side of the Monterey campus;
- 2) Go through Lubbock on Ave.

A to 19th St., turn right (west) and travel 19th to Indiana Ave., then proceed south;

- 3) Coming into Lubbock on North College, turn right on 4th St., through Tech farm, to the Level-land - Brownfield Highway circle, then east on 19th to Indiana Ave., then south on Indiana.

The Antelopes will be seeking revenge for two earlier defeats at the hands of the 1-AA District Champs, The Bobcats downed the Antelopes, 55-38, in the final of the Abernathy Invitational Tournament, last December, and again, 59-46, in Dimmitt tournament in January.

The 'Cats from Dimmitt won the 1-AA District crown with little sweat, posting an 8-0 loop record, while the Antelopes upset favored Morton for the 2-AA title. The Abernathians sport a 7-1 district record, the only defeat coming at the hands of the Morton Indians, 41-38, and a 17-4 season record.

In the 23 games played this season, the Antelopes have scored 1,272 points, an average of 55.3 points per game, while allowing the opposition only 986 points, a 43-point average. In loop competition, the Antelopes have amassed 435 points while allowing opponents only 332, an average of 34 to 41.5 points per game.

Jimmy Dye is the only player on the Antelope team that has managed to score in double figures throughout the season, and Gerald Watson, Antelope Captain, is the only Antelope hitting in double figures in district competition. Dye has scored a total of 246 points in 22 games, 75 in the eight district games, for a season average of 16.5 and a 9.5 district average.

### Abernathy, Friona Bi-District Game In Plainview Gym

School officials report that the Abernathy-Friona girls bi-district basketball game will be played in the Plainview gym on Tuesday, March 8.

The Abernathy girls are champions of District 2-AA with an 8-0 district record, and the Friona girls, champions of District 1-AA, are 7-1 in loop action. The State Champion Abernathy girls have a 28-3 season record and a 19-game winning streak going.

The Abernathy girls will host the Hale Center Owlets, champions of District 4-A, this Thursday night in a practice exhibition in the Abernathy gym.

### Abernathy Teams Close Out Season

The Abernathy basketball teams closed out regular season play last Friday night at Olton with two victories over the host teams. The district champion Antelopes defeated the Mustangs, 54-42, and the Abernathy girls, also district champions, handed the Olton girls their eighth straight district loss, 66-27, in a one-sided affair.

The win over the Mustangs left the Antelopes with a 7-1 district record. The Abernathy girls have an 8-0 loop record, due to a game that was forfeited to the local girls by the Morton girls.

The Olton Mustangs have won only one district game this season, and the Olton femmes went winless in loop action.

In the girls game Friday night, the Abernathy girls, with reserves playing most of the game, held quarter leads of 20-7, 40-19, and 52-24.

Margie Guinn of Abernathy dumped in 26 points for scoring honors, backed up by Diann Owen with 10, Barbara Turner with 7, and Linda Shipman with 4. Pat Lae France led the Olton girls with 10 points to her credit.

Although never trailing in the ball game, the Antelopes never held a lead larger than 16 points, that coming late in the game. The Antelopes stretched a 16-7 first quarter lead to 28-21 at intermission. The locals held a 43-28 lead at the end of three quarters.

Scriber of Olton gained scoring honors for the game by hitting the nets for 15 points. Jimmy Dye scored 10 points for the Antelopes, followed closely by Lane Tannehill and Horton Struve with 8 and 7 points, respectively.

Before entering playoffs, both Abernathy teams will host the 4-A District champions Thursday night, Feb. 19, in a practice game in the Abernathy gym.

The Abernathy boys will encounter the Silverton Owls, who won the 4-A District with a 9-0 record, and the Abernathy sextet will play hostess to the Hale Center Owlets, also 9-0 in 4-A loop competition.

Research Briefs

One hundred and twenty pounds of nitrogen applied to grain sorghum produced a yield of 6,056 pounds per acre while the non-fertilized plots showed a yield of 3,623 pounds. The net return after paying fertilizer cost was \$36.05 per acre from the application of 120 pounds of nitrogen over the non-fertilized plots. One hundred and sixty pounds of nitrogen produced a net profit of \$30.71 per acre. Dr. T. C. Longnecker, Head of the High Plains Station, reported these results on the 1958 grain sorghum research this week.

The tests were made on 4-row plots 100 feet long with each fertilizer application repeated four times in different parts of the field. Fertilizer treatments were made with nitrogen and phosphorus alone and in combinations. Nitrogen was applied at rates of 40, 80, 120, and 160 pounds per acre and phosphorus at three rates of 40, 80, and 120 pounds. Phosphorus at 40 and 80 pounds showed higher amounts of nitrogen showed more increase in yield but not

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necessity is the mother of inven-  
tion. Now this is in a sense cor-  
rect, but not always. Sometimes  
an invention is stumbled onto  
while working on an entirely dif-  
ferent and unrelated project. But  
most inventions are the result of  
an idea that is original or an im-  
provement on another idea.  
Lots of people have ideas but  
cannot make them work out if  
they are mechanical ideas or need  
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workable. Abernathy has a man  
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very good combination.

Some years ago a farmer near  
here had several post holes to  
dig and did not wish to put the  
physical effort to dig them by  
hand in the accepted way. As an  
alternative he goes to our man  
with imagination and ability, John  
Duty, and tells him he wants a  
post hole digger that would run  
with a tractor. Now, John had  
never seen a power hole digger  
but this did not bother him in the  
least. He told the farmer to get  
his gear box and he would build  
one.

The gear box was gotten and  
the power hole digger was con-  
structed. That was several years  
ago and that original hole digger  
is still in use and does a better  
job than lots of later models. He  
built several of these and they  
are still in use. Can be attached  
to the rear of a tractor and can  
dig holes in a couple of minutes  
or less.

John Duty used to run combines  
gathering row crops, maize and  
other grain and it always bother-  
ed him to see a nice large head  
bounce out and be lost by not  
getting into the conveyor or being  
thrown out after getting in. He  
did nothing but think about it for  
a long time until a man north of  
here tried to build a machine at-  
tachment that would not lose any  
heads.

This was not successful and  
John began to think and came up  
with an idea that would make it  
work by making several changes.  
He built an attachment for a  
combine for an Abernathy farmer  
that worked, then he was swamp-  
ed with orders for a machine at-  
tachment that would pick up fal-  
len stalks and not lose the heads.

This machine attached to a reg-  
ular combine instead of the fa-  
miliar reel would pick up stalks  
that had fallen down because of  
wet weather or other causes and  
carry the heads right through the  
machine without losing them.  
John built these attachments for  
several farmers in 1957, when the  
crop was all but lost because of  
having fallen down.

This attachment could be taken  
off and the regular reel replaced  
if desired but one farmer ran  
one machine with a reel and one  
with this attachment side by side  
in several fields and the attach-  
ment invariably gathered more  
grain even in crops that were  
standing straight.

There was no less of heads by  
being thrown out of the machine  
with the attachment and the dif-  
ference even in a small field  
would pay for the attachment in  
a relatively short time.

John also built a pressurized  
cooling system for irrigation wells  
that is well known here, and was  
the first to build them in this  
area. He turned out hundreds of  
them before selling out his busi-  
ness and moving to Midland. He is  
back here now and we may as  
well look for his fertile mind and  
fine mechanical ability to turn  
up something else just as useful  
and unusual as these machines he  
has built in the past.

## Abernathians On Maneuvers In Germany

WURZBURG, GERMANY (AH-  
TNC)—Two soldiers from Aberna-  
thy, Cpl. Blake D. Skidmore and  
Pvt. Henry F. Healy, participated  
Feb. 27 with the 3rd Infantry  
Division in Exercise Free Play, a  
large-scale Seventh Army field  
training exercise in Germany.

The maneuver, which matched  
the 3rd against the 4th Armored  
Division under simulated combat  
conditions, was designed to deter-  
mine the readiness of units and to  
provide further training in the  
various concepts of modern war-  
fare. The exercise involved 50,000  
men, 7,000 vehicles, 2,550 light  
Army planes, and 60 jet aircraft.

Corporal Skidmore, son of Mr.  
and Mrs. Lawrence B. Skidmore,  
is assigned to Company A of the  
3rd's 30th Infantry.

Healy, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe  
F. Healy, is a gunner in Company  
A of the 3rd's 30th Infantry.

The men entered the Army in  
August, 1957 and received basic

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combat training at Fort Benning,  
Ga. They arrived in Europe in  
March, 1958.

They attended Abernathy High

**PREJUDICE AND CONVICTION**

Someone has said: "The difference between a prejudice and a conviction is that you can explain a conviction without getting mad." This definition holds true in religious affairs as well as anything else. But isn't it true today that many cannot counsel and discuss their religious differences? Surely this shows our great need for less prejudice and more conviction.

The Bible teaches us not to be religious fanatics guided by prejudice. "Be ready always to give an answer to every man that asketh you a reason of the hope that is in you" (1 Pet. 3:15). We should be able to explain, in sensible fashion, our religious beliefs. Are you able to do this?

**Contrast**

There is a great contrast between prejudice and conviction—one is always harmful and the other helpful.

Prejudice breeds ignorance by closing the mind to investigation. Conviction, however, maintains an open-minded air that invites further information. To some Jews of His day, Jesus declared: "If ye continue in my word, then are ye my disciples indeed; and the truth shall make you free" (John 8:31-32). Some of the Jews chose to fall back on old prejudices, and thus remain ignorant of the Son of God.

It is well for us to remember the noble people of Berea, who "received the word with all readiness of mind, and searched the scriptures daily, whether those things were so" (Acts 17:11). They were interested in the truth and didn't allow prejudice to keep them in the dark. How worthy of our emulation today!

Prejudice is harmful to our character. When a man learns new facts that cast doubt on his own beliefs, he must choose to give them a hearing or not. If he discovers he has been wrong, he must decide whether he will change and follow the truth. If he knows he is not completely in the right, and yet his prejudice and pride do not allow him to change, his life becomes inconsistent. He is led to be deceitful. But suppose this man does not have prejudice but sincere convictions. He will not be afraid to

search for the truth and make a change if necessary. He remains honest in character.

Prejudice also tends to destroy lasting friendship. Conviction establishes confidence and seals friendships. It gives the personality a depth and earnestness that others admire. We naturally like the man who, instead of forcing his own opinion, says, "Let us review the facts."

A striking example to contrast prejudice and conviction is seen in Acts 17:32, when Paul had preached the gospel, and concluded by making reference to the resurrection of Christ. "And when they heard of the resurrection of the dead, some mocked; and others said, 'We will hear thee again of this matter.'"

**What Is To Be Done?**

What is to be done in removing prejudice and replacing it with solid convictions?

First, we must be willing to study all facts. The Jews wanted to condemn Christ without a hearing, but Nicodemus pointed out their injustice by asking: "Doth our law judge any man, before it hear him, and know what he doeth?" (John 7:51). It is necessary that we hear all the facts to be sure our conclusions are right.

When Nathaniel was told that Jesus of Nazareth was the Christ, he asked, "Can there any good thing come out of Nazareth?" (John 1:46). We can't help admiring the answer of Philip: "Come and see." Nazareth was a city looked down upon by the average Jew. The old prejudice had it that no good thing could come from this lowly city. Philip simply told Nathaniel to "Come and see." Before we allow ourselves to be completely ruled by our prejudice, we need to "come and see" the facts.

Then, we must remember that the Bible is the true basis of our convictions. The word of God is settled forever (Psa. 119:89). The gospel word is the power of God unto salvation (Rom. 1:16). When we stand before God in judgment, the standard by which we will be measured will be the word of God (John 12:48).

## Tornado Warning System

In a joint announcement, Edwin Crow, chief of Abernathy Volunteer Fire Department, and Mayor Edgar Graham identified the various fire siren alarms.

The officials said one long blast of the fire siren on the second and fourth Tuesday nights will be to call firemen to practice sessions.

When there is a fire, the siren will sound a series of long blasts. When the fire siren is used to sound warning that a tornado is approaching Abernathy there will be two six-second blasts, followed by a 12-second blast. This series of two short blasts followed by a long blast will continue until ample warning is sounded by the siren.

Night warning on tornadoes approaching will be handled by the telephone operator and volunteer firemen. When the night telephone operator is advised of a tornado approaching, she will call a member of the fire department nearest the fire station and he will start the series of siren blasts. Officials asked that local residents not call the telephone office to find the location of a fire after the siren sounds for that purpose. A policy of the company forbids the operators giving this information to anyone except members of the volunteer fire department.

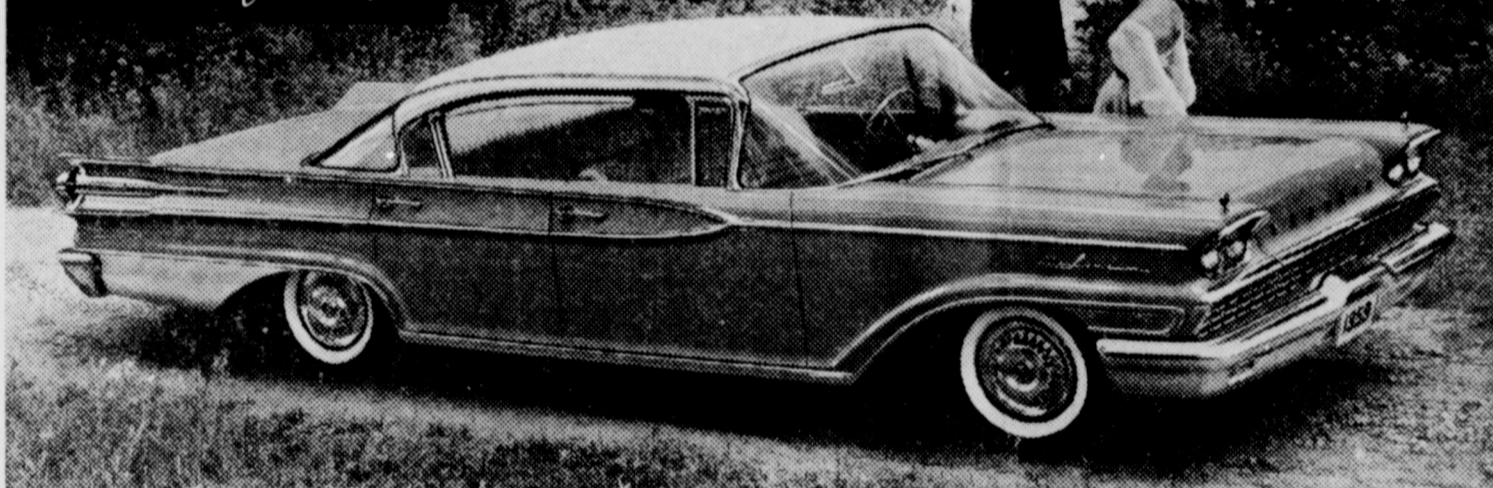

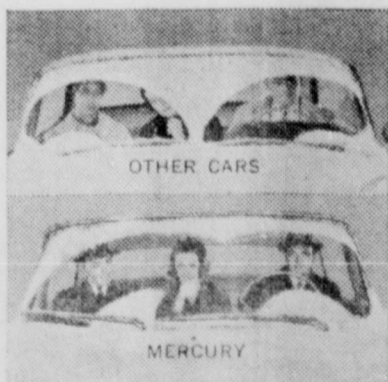

# Constitution and By-Laws of the Municipal Recreation Center

(PROPOSED)

Proposed Constitution and By-Laws of The Abernathy Municipal Recreation Center.

## Article I—Name

The name of this Center shall be Abernathy Municipal Recreation Center; and shall hereinafter be referred to as the Center.

**Article II—Objects and Policy**  
Purpose: The purpose of this club is to join the City of Abernathy in creating and maintaining a recreational center, owned by the city, that will furnish the children and adults of Abernathy and the neighboring communities with adequate facilities for a well-rounded recreational program.

The center in its entirety will consist of a nine-hole bent grass greens golf course, swimming pool, roque ground, clubhouse, diamonds, courts, driving range, picnic area and other appurtenances. Recreational facilities will have priority over other facilities.

It is the ultimate goal of the club to share its facilities with the churches, schools civic and social organizations, service clubs and any other organizations desiring to promote activities that will create high ideals and wholesome recreation and entertainment. All facilities will be closed during Church hours on both Sunday and

Wednesday evening.

## Article III—Membership

Section 1. The Center shall be composed of members who have paid their membership fees of annual dues; and have been approved by the Board of Directors.

Section 2. Members.  
(a) Any person over 16 years of age otherwise acceptable shall be eligible for membership.  
(b) Membership shall entitle the holder, his or her spouse and minor children residing in his or her home to all privileges of the Center, including one vote at any meeting of the Center.

Section 3. Election of Members.  
All applications for membership are subject to study and approval by the Board of Directors.

Section 4. Guests.  
Guests, living beyond 50 miles, accompanied by a member, will be allowed to participate free of charge. Frequency of visits to be determined by the Board of Directors.

## Article IV—Powers of Membership

The membership in good standing of the Center shall have the following powers:

- (1) To elect officers and Board of Directors annually.
- (2) To approve by-laws and all amendments thereto.

(3) To set the fees for membership and annual dues.

(4) To make any recommendations that they might desire to the Board of Directors.

## Article V—Center Meetings

Section 1. Annual Meeting.  
The annual meeting of the Center shall be held on some day in February at such time and place as the Board of Directors shall designate, unless designated by the Center itself at a previous meeting.

Section 2. Special Meetings.  
Special meetings of the Center may be called by the President or by the Board of Directors, and shall be called on the written request of any fifteen members in good standing, stating the object thereof.

Section 3. Notice of Meetings.  
One week's notice of the time and the place of the annual meeting and at least one week's notice of any special meeting shall be mailed by the Secretary, or under his direction, to all members. The notice of a special meeting shall state the objects thereof, and not other business shall be transacted thereat.

Section 4. Voting Privileges.  
At any meeting of the Center each member in good standing shall be entitled to one vote.

Section 5. Proxies.  
Voting by proxy shall not be permitted.

## Article VI—Board of Directors

Section 1. Election.  
There shall be a Board of Directors consisting of the four officers of the Center and four others elected by the Center; and one selected by the City Council of the City of Abernathy, Texas. The officers shall serve on the board for one year. The other four directors shall serve for two years. (In the first election of directors, two will serve for one year and two will serve for two years; thereby necessitating an election of two directors each year and two being carried over.)

Section 2. Powers and Duties.  
Subject only to the provisions of this Constitution and By-Laws and to such action as may be taken from time to time by the Center itself at an annual or a special meeting and to such action as may be taken by the City of Abernathy, the Board of Directors shall have entire control and management of the affairs, property and policy of the Abernathy Municipal Recreation Center. The Board may delegate any of its powers or duties to an executive committee of three or more of its own number, except that no executive committee shall have power to elect any candidate to membership or expel any member. The Board shall appoint other committees, of its number or otherwise, with such duties as the Board may prescribe, subject only to the limitations herein contained. The Board may make and alter any rules not inconsistent herewith.

In particular, and without limit-

ing the general powers set out above, the Board of Directors may exercise the following powers:

(1) To make regulations controlling operations of the Abernathy Municipal Recreation Center, its property and facilities and affairs.

(2) To employ the Center and other necessary employees, and to fix their duties and compensation.

(3) To fix all fees and other charges (other than membership fee and dues) for enjoyment of the Center or any of its activities or facilities.

(4) To control all income, funds, expenditures and purchases for the Center.

(5) To prescribe rules and regulations to govern conduct and manner of operation of the facilities.

Section 3. Meetings.  
The Board of Directors shall meet monthly, and also at the call of the President or of any three members. At least three days notice of the time and place of a meeting shall be given to each member of the Board.

Section 4. Quorum.  
Four members in person shall constitute a quorum of the Board of Directors at any meeting.

Section 5. Proxies.  
Voting by proxy shall not be permitted.

## Article VII—Officers

Section 1. Election.  
The officers of the Center shall be a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary, and a Treasurer. No person may hold more than one office. Any vacancy in any office occurring between annual meetings of the Center shall be filled by the Board of Directors.

Section 2. Powers and Duties.  
(a) President. The President shall preside at all meetings of the Center and of the Board of Directors, and in general shall perform the duties incident to his office.

(b) Vice-President. During the absence or inability to act of the President, the Vice-President shall perform the duties of that office.

(c) Secretary. The Secretary shall keep the records of all meetings of the Center and of the Board of Directors. He shall give and serve all notices of meetings. He shall be responsible for and have charge of all correspondence, files, records and papers of the Center. He shall present at each annual meeting of the Center a full report on all matters relating to the affairs of the Center, including a summary of all action taken during the year by the Board of Directors. In general, he (or she as the case may be) shall perform the duties incident to his office.

(d) Treasurer. He shall keep full and accurate accounts of all moneys received and shall deposit the same in the name and to the credit of the City of Abernathy, Municipal Recreation Center Operating Fund, in such depositories as may be designated by the City of Abernathy. He shall dis-

burse all moneys under the direction of the Board of Directors. He shall have authority to receive and give receipts for all moneys due and payable from any source whatever; and to endorse on behalf of the Center all checks, drafts, notes, warrants and orders, and to give full discharge for same. He shall present at each annual meeting of the Center a written report of the money affairs of the enterprise and he shall make a like report whenever requested by the Board of Directors. His annual report to the Center shall be audited as may be directed by the Board of Directors. In general, he (or she as the case may be) shall perform the duties incident to his office.

## Article VIII—Terms of Office and Membership

The term of all officers shall begin March 1st and end on the last day in February.

**Article IX—Fiscal Year**  
The fiscal year shall begin on March 1st and end on the last day in February.

## Article X—Obligations and Discipline

The acceptance of membership in the Center shall bind each member to uphold all the provisions of the Constitution and By-Laws, and other rules of the Center.

and accept and enforce all duties and decisions of the Board of Directors, acting within its jurisdiction, and of the City of Abernathy.

Member: shall be subject to suspension or expulsion for unbecoming conduct detrimental to the good name of the Center and, or the proper functioning or administration of the Center or for failure to pay their dues. Neither gambling nor alcoholic beverages will be permitted. Any charges preferred must be in writing.

Any member failing in his obligation as above set forth may be suspended or expelled by a two-thirds vote of the Center or by a two-thirds vote of all members of the Board of Directors; provided such member shall have been given due notice in writing of the charges preferred against him and an opportunity to be heard in his own defense.

Any member thus suspended or expelled by a vote of the Board of Directors may appeal from its decision to the members of any annual or special meeting of the Center.

## Article XI—Roberts Rules of Order

Roberts Rules of Order shall control the order and conduct of all meetings of the members and

of the Board of Directors in so far as not inconsistent herewith.

**Article XII**  
Amendments to this Constitution and By-Laws may be made at any meeting of the Center, by a two-thirds vote of all votes cast.

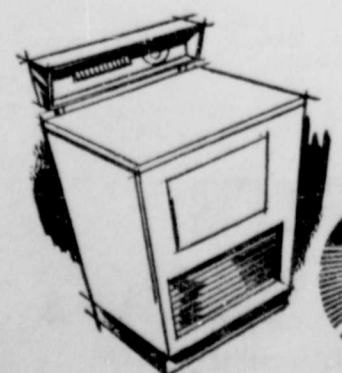

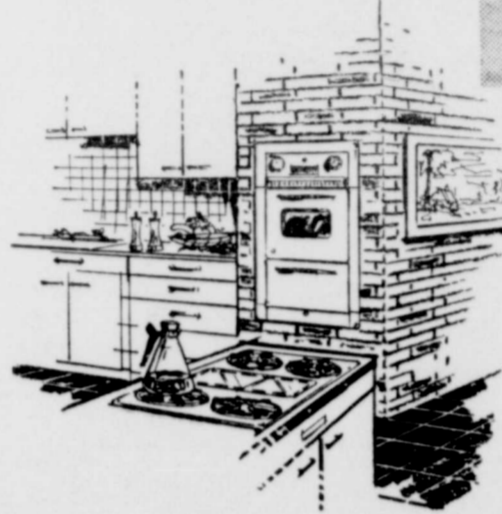

**South Plains Stock Show In Rule Changes**

After twenty-five years of all-male competition, the South Plains Junior Fat Stock Show will open its gates next spring to girls who can qualify under new rules recently adopted by the area-wide exposition.

Announcement of the new rules which will allow girls to enter the event was made by the show's general chairman Ray Johnson following several meetings of the steering committee. The rule change is effective for the spring show, scheduled March 16 through 18 at the Fair Grounds in Lubbock.

New entry rules provide that "all regularly enrolled 4-H, FFA and FHA members who are nine years of age and under twenty-one on Jan. 1, 1959, are eligible to enter stock in any of the divisions of the Junior Fat Stock Show." Such members who show animals must have personally owned, fed and fitted their animals under the supervision of a county agent or a vocational teacher.

Officials of next spring's show are D. W. Sherrill of Lubbock, General Superintendent; L. M. Hargrave and L. H. McElroy, both of Lubbock, Assistant General Superintendents.

In the Fat Steer Division, W. B. Griffin, Tahoka, is superintendent and C. L. Montgomery of Big Spring will be assistant superintendent.

Superintendent of the Fat Barrow Division is Ollie Limer of Plainview, assisted by Bill Gregory, Spur; Lee Roy Colgan, Lamesa and Paul E. Cross, Seminole.

Thomas Neely, Lubbock, is superintendent of the Fat Lamb Division. He will be assisted by Olan Rice, Lubbock; and Bryon Pierce, Gail. Entries in the show will be accepted from the following counties: Curry, Roosevelt, Lea, New Mexico; Farmer, Castro, Swisher, Briscoe, Bailey, Lamb, Hale, Floyd, Motley, Cottle, Cochran, Hockley, Lubbock, Crosby, Dickens, King, Yoakum, Terry, Lynn, Garza, Stonewall, Gaines, Dawson, Borden, and Scurry, Texas.

**WOOL MARKETING YEAR ENDS MARCH 31**

J. Earl Laney, Chairman of the Hale County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, reminds farmers that the marketing year under the 1958 Wool Program will end March 31.

The Wool Program is conducted under the National Wool Act of 1954. Payments under the 1959 program will be made this summer when the payment rates are determined on the basis of national average prices received by producers for shorn wool during the 1958 market year. Any marketing after March 31 will be under the 1959 program.

If any condition concerning the sale is not settled by March 31, the sale will not be considered as completed. Title must have passed to the buyer, the wool must have been delivered to the buyer (either physically or through documents), and the last of the factors (price per pound, weight, yield, etc.) needed to determine the total purchase price must be available.

Applications for payment under the 1958 program must be filed with the county ASC office not later than April 30, 1959.

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**GOOD SOIL SAMPLES MAKE SOIL TESTS BETTER**

College Station—The use of fertilizer on Texas crops and pastures will pay big dividends in the areas where plant food is needed to boost yields. The cheapest, easiest and best method for determining fertilizer needs is to test the soil. But, adds W. F. Bennett, extension soil chemist, the soil test is no better than the soil sample from which the test is made.

In fact points out Bennett, chemical tests based on poorly taken soil samples may actually be misleading. Here are suggestions from the chemist on how to take a good soil sample.

A spade, probe or auger can be used for taking the soil sample. Sampling should be done to a depth of six inches. If a spade is used, dig a V-shaped hole to the six inch depth and take a half inch slice of soil from the smooth side of the hole. Then cut away all but the center one inch of the slice and place it in the container being used for collecting the individual samples from which the composite sample will come.

Take a composite sample from each soil type in the field. For example, take a sample from

the level ridgetop and another from the slope. In getting the individual samples should be taken from over the area. These should be collected in a clean container and thoroughly mixed before the soil for the composite sample is placed in the sample box. In taking the random samples, Bennett says field depressions, old fence lines or unusual areas within the sample area should be avoided. Too, separate samples should be taken from areas that have been cropped differently.

In numbering the sample boxes, make sure the box number corresponds to the number shown on the information sheet and keep a record of the sample numbers and the area from which each was taken. The soil sampling sheet—it's available from the local county agent—should be filled out as completely as possible. The samples along with the information sheets may be mailed directly to the laboratory at College Station or taken to the county agent's office or community leader for transmission to the laboratory. The test results should be back to the sender in three weeks.
