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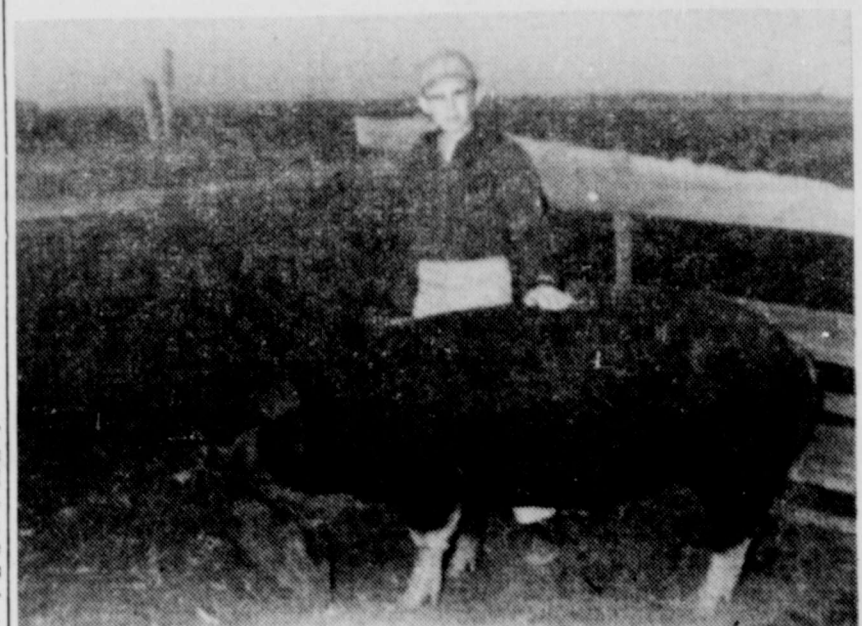
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**WEED CONTROL**  
Members of the Hale County Noxious Weed Control District's board of Directors plan to attend the 21st Annual Kansas Weed Conference in McPherson, Kansas, on February 25th and 26th. That State has been participating in noxious weed control through weed control districts for the past 21 years. Kansas weed and seed laws are ranked among the most effective in the country.  
The Hale County District announces that the program developed in 1958 of furnishing the equipment and operator for chemical treatment of Field Bindweed as a free service and making the chemicals available to the farmer at cost prices will also be available in 1959.  
The signup period with ASC for the second quarter of government cost share practices, including bindweed control, will be March 2nd thru March 20th. Individuals with bindweed are urged to take advantage of early treatment to prevent further spread of the bindweeds and their seed production.  
Our new chemical added to the ASC approved list this year is Polychlorobenzoic Acid. This herbicide shows promise of being a very effective treatment for field bindweed. One of the advantages it offers is the indication that soil treated with this chemical may be returned to crop production in as little as 15 months after application. Experiments conducted in Hale County with Polychlorobenzoic Acid at a forty pound acid equivalent per acre rate of application gave 95 percent eradication with one treatment on field bindweed growing under irrigated conditions.

Research Briefs

Fertilizer tests on cotton at the High Plains Station at Halfway in 1958 indicated that with favorable weather for cotton production applications of fertilizer can be very profitable. In these 1958 trials two fertilizer treatments returned over \$100 per acre above fertilizer cost...

No response was obtained to phosphate alone and there was no consistent response to phosphate along with nitrogen. Although there was little evidence in yields or quality from phosphate in 1958, there was more indication of this in 1957. It is believed that phosphate can assist in producing earlier maturity in a season like 1957.

Based on the results obtained under the two extremes of weather conditions in 1957 and 1958, the following nitrogen fertilizer program can be suggested: If planted before May 1, 100 to 120 pounds N, May 1 to May 10, 70 to 100 pounds N, after June 1, no N. Forty to 80 pounds of phosphate is suggested regardless of planting time.

Experiments showed that similar yield increases were obtained if all nitrogen was applied before planting, all sidedresses, or in split applications. Because of this, it is suggested that the preplant application consists of not more than 40 pounds of nitrogen along with the required phosphate. If the cotton is planted early, additional nitrogen can be sidedressed any time to the first nitrogen.

The farm house, which is located a few miles to the northwest of Abernathy, owned and occupied by the J. J. Vineyard family today, was built by Ed Caldwell and his father W. W. Caldwell. Along about World War I the Caldwell's traded this farm property to V. Stambaugh for a grocery store which was located where the bank is today. On this site, the Caldwell's seemed to do well in business. There were two of the younger Caldwell's, Ed and Martin.

After some years the Stambaugh family sold this valuable farm land and returned to Abernathy. Troy and his brother, Lewis, becoming of age, went into the grain and elevator business, along with their father, V. Stambaugh.

The three of them were associated with Sam Merrill in the coal and grain business for awhile. Then the two younger Stambaugh's, Troy and Lewis, for several years did a thriving grocery business. Stambaugh Bros. Grocery Store was located where Dan Ward's fine implement store is located at the present.

East of the Stambaugh Grocery, the Hardin Meat Market operated for several years. This last mentioned store was owned and maintained by A. W. Hardin and his son Ed, along with Ed's wife, Jesse. That Hardin who is in the post office today, was too small to be of any help.

Shelton Hardin, who is older than the U. S. mail employee, has been with Buck Lindsey in the grain and elevator business almost since the time fire destroyed the Hardin Meat Market. Of course, there was an absence of some years for World War II.

For a number of years, J. R. Gould owned a drug store on the corner where the Darden Theatre is today.

Carter's Cafe was between Gould Store and the Hardin Market. Looking back over the years, long gone, there were three fairly small buildings, located on the site of the present day Ford house and the west part of the Dan Ward machine store. On the corner was the bank, then going east was the J. J. Riley building, and, still east, was Carl Rudick's Shoe Shop. Across the street to the north of the shoe shop was Milt Crow's Grocery and Market. McAlister Grocery.

The grocery store, which bore the name of McAlister Bros. opened for business on Dec. 10, 1924. Personnel of the firm consisted of Perry and his brother Sam; the younger member of the family, Miss Estelle, and her brother Bob, whose wife Irene was, and still is, excellent help. Bobby and his brother Jim, sons of Mr. and Mrs. R. A. (Bob) McAlister were both born here at Abernathy. Miss Estelle McAlister was married some years ago to Mr. Hugh Dryer of Lubbock, where they are business people of that city. Perry and Sam, also Mrs. Sam McAlister, have passed away.

There have been many business houses here over the years, and, too, it has been the misfortune of many firms of different assortments and kinds to close their doors since 1924.

All the buildings between Pinson Pharmacy and Miller Grocery were completed in rapid succession about the year 1924. McMaster Barber Shop, U. S. Post Office, the variety store, Hammond Gift Shop, McAlister's and Bradley's Cafe are real nice places today, whereas once they were only a kind of vacant space, or town in the making.

Across the street to the south is the fine picture show-house, and the International Harvester Co. with its costly farm equipment.

A little over 35 years ago, a well stocked lumber yard stood where Smith Food Store is located now. There was a skating rink, owned and operated by Lamar McKenzie, which was next door to Bruce Furniture. Where the Moody & Pettit Insurance Co. is today, there have been many predecessors. This building is an old land mark.

J. J. Riley, a native of Taswell, Tenn., has a long history of much interest linked with Abernathy. He was here in 1916 and made his home in Abernathy until his death of recent years. Riley never married, he was a dealer in livestock, and later in real estate. He was active in church circles, and he had many friends. Abernathy owes much to the timely efforts of Johnson Riley in securing the Abernathy Water Works. After long months of work during the depression years, Riley obtained a green light for the High tank. This tank has a capacity of 50,000 gallons. It stands 135 feet up. Today there are three additional surface tanks and 5 active wells. Ab-



ernathy's water supply and sewer system is unsurpassed for a town of this size.

Abernathy's right-hand man for maintenance of water works was the late O. Rutledge. It was through the untiring and faithful work of this man, Mr. Rutledge, who helped to bring the town's water and sewer system. Mr. Rutledge was city marshal and officer of the law for something like 20 years. Mose Holland was deputy sheriff here for that long or longer. It was a long and most difficult jump from the old Prairie Town and the Incorporated little city of today.

Abernathy has eight regular employees, and in emergencies pick up a member of the local workmen for a short while. The city hall was completed and was ready for business in March of 1955. It is clean and neat and a credit to the community.

Herman Schulz came to Abernathy in 1910 and was in the real estate business until his death of quite recent years.

Harry Edison came to Abernathy in 1914. He, too, dealt in the real estate, and has passed on, not many years ago. No history of Abernathy could be anything like complete without a mention of these two men, both of whom came from Madison, Wisconsin.

J. P. Nystel came to Abernathy in 1923. Nystel, who is a former mayor, is a church enthusiast and town booster. He was associated with Schulz in the land business for about four years, but he has been in the real estate firm continually for himself since 1927. Archie Nystel, a son of J. P., joined his father the last few years in business. George Ragland, also belongs to the Nystel Realty Company. The Nystel building was completed in 1953, and it shelters offices for the Pioneer Natural Gas Company and ample room for the offices of Dr. John V. Hale. Dr. Hale, who is a young man, is a dentist, and he has been here longer than any other dentist since Abernathy was established in 1906. The Nystel building is located on the ground of the old Schulz office, east of the Hotel Delmar.

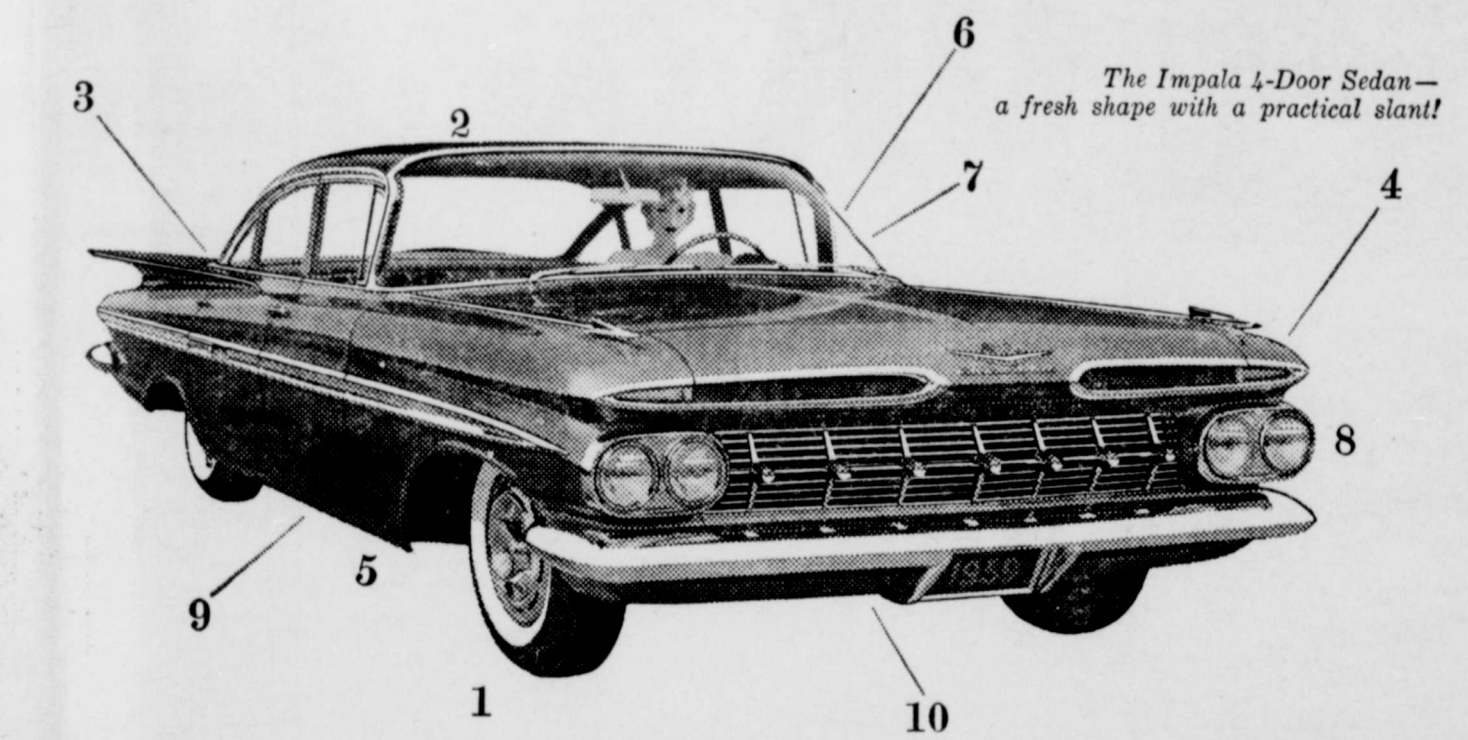

## Linton Builds Attachments to Recover Cotton

The old time way of gathering cotton was to hand pick it. There was little loss, as only that that was ready to pluck from the bolls was picked. If a lock was dropped it was picked up, not lost. This was fine, and is still practiced in many localities where labor is plentiful and more or less cheap. Only a few years ago when cotton was ready to gather in this area it was necessary to go to east or central Texas and import hands. The farmers had to house them and in many cases advance some money to buy groceries. Due to the type of cotton grown here

and also to the different length of season picking has long since ceased to be done here.

Nearly all cotton is pulled boll and all. This is much faster than picking and also more wasteful even though the gins were equipped to handle bolls admirably. If a boll was dropped it was not picked up as with picking but was lost as pulling was much faster and why fuss over one boll.

Back in the twenties sleds began to be used which stripped the stalks clean of everything but a few limbs. These were mostly built at home or in a local blacksmith shop, and drawn by horses. But soon these began to be replaced by a factory built stripper pulled by a tractor and this made gathering cotton much faster and cheaper. However there was a certain amount that would not be gotten by these machines if it were real low on the stalks as some was. Also bolls would snap off and out of the machine and be lost.

Cotton was developed that would stay on the stalk until practically all was ripe and once over the field would gather the crop. Some however prefer to pull by hand for the first time over and sometimes the second then follow with the machine pullers. These machines were gradually perfected until they did a really good job of gathering cotton but there still remained those low bolls and that which was lost by bouncing out of the machines.

This loss was added to by that which was blown out of the bolls and those that were knocked off by the tractor wheels and other ways. This loss varies with the type of cotton planted and many other factors. To some this loss looked big and others while admitting the loss were not so concerned about it. Some were concerned enough to have it picked up by hand mostly on a share basis.

This made getting it gathered rather difficult unless there was considerable cotton on the ground. This loss kept worrying one enterprising Abernathy farmer, Ray Linton, until he decided to do something about it. He had hauled cotton to the gins for years and watched them pick it up out of his truck or trailer with a suction pipe. Everyone familiar with a gin knows how this works. It suddenly occurred to him that this would also work in the field just as good if he could transport said suction pipe across the field where this normally wasted

cotton was lying. Linton proceeded to build a suction apparatus to be carried and powered by the same tractor.

There is nothing complicated about this machine, which can be attached to the tractor and taken off when finished with. He simply rigged a gin suction fan on the front of his tractor, driven by the tractor engine at about 1750 or 1800 RPM with a suction pipe extending from the suction side of the fan to one side and down to just above the ground. This pipe was divided into two slightly smaller pipes which reached down to an appropriately shaped nozzle which rides about three or three and a half inches above the ground.

A broad, thin nozzle if the cotton is scattered all across the middles and a narrower and thicker nozzle if the cotton is practically all in the center. The cotton is picked up here just like at the gins and passes through the fan and out through a divided pipe which carries it to the front of a regular mechanical puller with the puller heads removed.

These spouts or pipes carry the cotton with considerable speed right into the front end of the puller conveyor where the beaters are located and most of the dirt and a lot of trash is sifted out as in ordinary service.

The considerable draft of air from the fan is mostly dissipated through the wire screen sides of the next five or six feet of this conveyor also most of the dirt and light trash picked by the suction. Everything from where the puller heads are taken off and two spouts attached is just as normal in regular pulling operation. The cotton goes back and up the elevator and into a trailer and is as clean as that pulled from the stalk.

Now what good is all this? Well, Ray Linton who had this machine built says he picked up 300 to 400 pounds of cotton per acre last December. Some growers estimated they had half bale per acre left on the ground at one time or another. This could all be picked up with this machine. Linton says he will use the machine next year and follow right behind the puller with it.

He drives the tractor in second gear and the fan is no load for the motor. Now with perhaps 350 pounds to the acre picked up each 15 acres would yield something near two bales of lint cotton. If picked up right behind the puller this cotton would not have gotten stained and dirty and would perhaps not alter the grade at all. With half a bale to the acre on the ground this would really pay off.

Linton says there may be some changes made next year in the rigging but that will depend on the condition at that time. Several others said that they probably will build a similar machine.

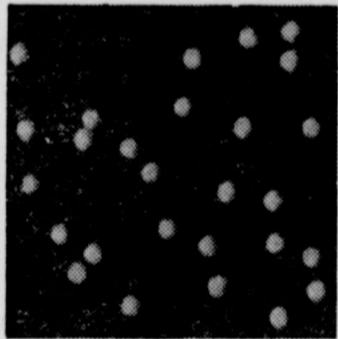

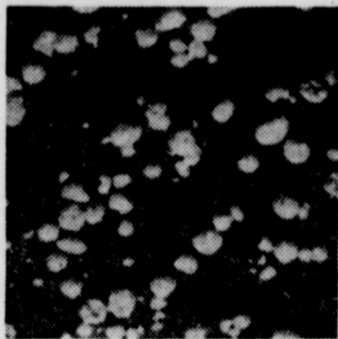

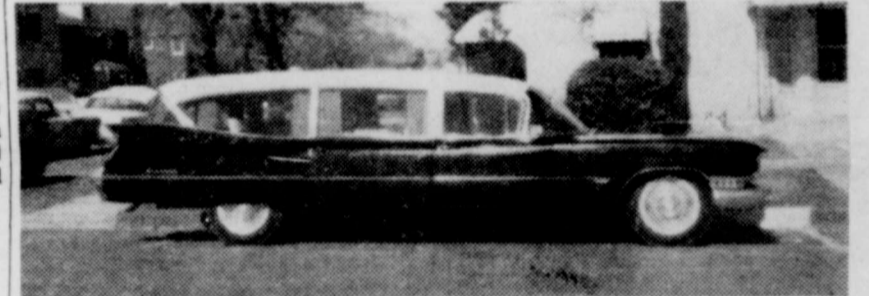
