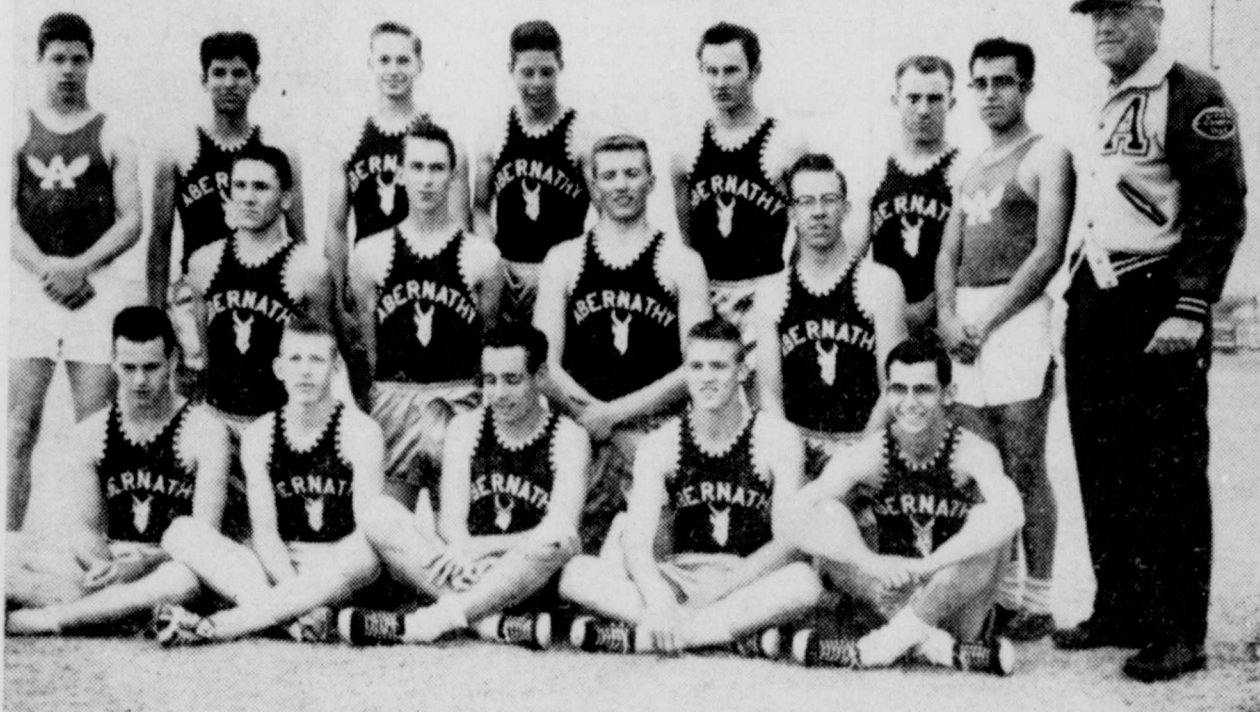

Surprising Antelopes Win District Meet

The Abernathy Antelope track team of Coach Earl Carter put the finishing touch on District 2-AA athletics last Saturday at the Texas Tech track by winning the district track and field title.

In addition to capturing the championship trophy, the Antelopes qualified 10 boys for the regional meet this weekend at the Tech track.

In winning the championship, the Antelopes won first places in the 120-yard high hurdles and the broad jump and tied for first in the 180-yard high hurdles. Gerald Watson, who was high point man in the meet with 12 points, won first in the high hurdles with a clocking of 16.5. Watson was tied for first in the 180 lows by Darrell Oliver of Muleshoe, each with identical 22.1 times.

Charles Pope provided Abernathy with its other first place by leading the Antelopes to the first three places in the broad jump. Pope jumped 20 feet, 10 1/4 inches. Watson and Lane Tannehill, who competed in his first track meet this year, won second and third in the broad jump. Tannehill also won second in the high hurdles.

Jimmy Dye started the Antelopes on their victory trek by winning second in the 100-yard dash with a 10.6 time. Johnnie Adams won third in the century race.

Adams also won fourth place in the 220-yard dash. Olton made a clean sweep of the first three places in the 220.

For the second successive year, Carroll Dean Powell qualified for a regional berth in the mile run, winning second in the district Saturday with a 5:17 timing.

Abernathy's fine 440-yard relay team, composed of Jimmy Dye, Charles Pope, Jimmy Nelson, and Johnnie Adams, ran that event in 45.1, placing second to Olton. The Abernathy mile relay team also

placed second to Olton in that event. Jimmy Dye and Arno Hall of Olton tied for second in the pole vault, both leaping 10 feet. Dye also jumped 5 feet, 6 inches to win third in the high jump. Larry Florence won second in the discus and third in the shot put. Florence heaved the discus 113 feet, 8 1/2 inches and the shot 43 feet, 19 inches.

Jimmy Nelson tied for second in the 440 dash, but he lost by a flip of the coin the chance to run in the regional meet.

The Antelopes finished with 49 total points. Olton had 43 1/2 points, nineteen ahead of third place Lockney.

Only the first and second place winners in each event are qualified to compete in regional.

Abernathy also won the junior high division and placed fourth in the grade school.

The track championship gave Abernathy High all four major district athletic titles this time for the first time in recent history.

Tuco Completes One Million Man Hours of Safe Operation

built twice and the newer tower rebuilt once. Both tower jobs were considered very hazardous as far as safety of personnel was concerned. Yet all three jobs were completed without injury to personnel or damage to equipment.

Many other hazardous operations were also completed in safety during this million man hour period. The fact that there was one fatal one and one near fatal accident during the construction and installation of increased capacity a few years ago to construction crew personnel and none to plant personnel goes to prove that the safety

program instituted by Southwestern Public Service years ago is paying off, especially at Tuco station.

At one time there was a safety session once a month at Tuco but more recently these sessions have been more frequent and now there is a safety session every Monday morning, especially among the maintenance crew members as their work is of necessity more susceptible to accidents. That it has and is paying off is evident in that the Tuco personnel have produced the enviable record of ONE MILLION man hours of work with no lost time accident. If one man were to try to produce this record it would take him approximately five hundred years to do so.

In honor of this achievement by the Tuco personnel a beautiful plaque was presented to Tuco plant manager Phil Sterrett, by Mr. A. R. Watson, Vice-president and General Manager of Southwestern Public Service Co.

The fact that there are many men now among the Tuco personnel who have not been employed for the full million man hour period has not detracted from the value of the achievement nor has the absence of several men who have moved to other positions in other places with the company be-

fore the completion of period, namely, R. T. Price, Chief Dispatcher, Amarillo Pete Renfro, Plant Manager, Riverview Station, Berger; R. E. (Bob) Dyer, Plant Manager, Denver City, and several others who are still with the company but in other locations.

Perhaps these men deserve even a little more credit due to the fact the safety effort has grown as the company has grown and was not so well-coordinated in the earlier days.

Talks in honor of the occasion were made by A. R. Watson, V.P. and General Manager and recently elected a member of the Board of Directors; J. Alton Miller, Production Superintendent; Phil Sterrett, Tuco Plant Manager; J. M. Collins, Plains Division Manager; Travis Aaron, System Safety Superintendent; Cliff Morrow, System Plant Safety Superintendent who also acted as M.C.; Division

Safety Supervisor Charles Stinson was on hand with his camera. There were several visitors also, including Melvin Rape, local manager, and his wife and Tuco's only retiree, Flin Robertson, and his wife and O. F. Rea, and his wife. Both these men were present for all but the last sixteen months of the million man hour period when retirement overtook them on December 31, 1958.

An excellent meal was served by Graham's in their newly enlarged dining room, thanks to their competent waitresses. It had been planned to serve fillet mignon a la-carte but there was not this many in the country that could be obtained just at that time, although every effort was made to obtain them, one concern trying by telephone in Dallas but to no avail. The smaller fillet mignon were served instead on a regular meal and was enjoyed by all.

Constitution and By-Laws of the Municipal Recreation Center

(PROPOSED)

Proposed Constitution and By-Laws of The Abernathy Municipal Recreation Center.

Article I—Name
The name of this Center shall be Abernathy Municipal Recreation Center; and shall hereinafter be referred to as the Center.

Article II—Objects and Policy
Purpose: The purpose of this club is to join the City of Abernathy in creating and maintaining a recreational center, owned by the city, that will furnish the children and adults of Abernathy and the neighboring communities with adequate facilities for a well-rounded recreational program.

The center in its entirety will consist of a nine-hole bent grass golf course, swimming pool, roque ground, clubhouse, diamonds, courts, driving range, picnic areas and other appurtenances. Recreational facilities will have priority over other facilities. It is the ultimate goal of the club to share its facilities with the churches, schools, civic and social organizations, service clubs and any other organizations desiring to promote activities that will create high ideals and wholesome recreation and entertainment. All facilities will be closed during Church hours on both Sunday and Wednesday evening.

Article III—Membership
Section 1. The Center shall be composed of members who have paid their membership fees and annual dues; and have been approved by the Board of Directors.

Section 2. Members.
(a) Any person over 16 years of age otherwise acceptable shall be eligible to membership.

(b) Membership shall entitle the holder, his or her spouse or minor children residing in his or her home to all privileges of the Center, including one vote at any meeting of the Center.

Section 3. Election of Members.
All applications for membership are subject to study and approval by the Board of Directors.

Section 4. Guests.
Guests, living beyond 50 miles, accompanied by a member, will be allowed to participate free of charge. Frequency of visits to be determined by the Board of Directors.

Article IV—Powers of Membership

The membership in good standing of the Center shall have the following powers:

(1) To elect officers and Board of Directors annually.
(2) To approve by-laws and all amendments thereto.
(3) To set the fees for membership and annual dues.
(4) To make any recommendations that they might desire to the Board of Directors.

Article V—Center Meetings

Section 1. Annual Meeting.
The annual meeting of the Center shall be held on some day in February at such time and place as the Board of Directors shall designate, unless designated by the Center itself at a previous

meeting.

Section 2. Special Meetings.
Special meetings of the Center may be called by the President or by the Board of Directors, and shall be called on the written request of any fifteen members in good standing, stating the object thereof.

Section 3. Notice of Meetings.
One week's notice of the time and the place of the annual meeting and at least one week's notice of any special meeting shall be mailed by the Secretary, or under his direction, to all members. The notice of a special meeting shall state the objects thereof, and no other business shall be transacted thereat.

Section 4. Voting Privileges.
At any meeting of the Center each member in good standing shall be entitled to one vote.

Section 5. Proxies.
Voting by proxy shall not be permitted.

Article VI—Board of Directors

Section 1. Election.

There shall be a Board of Directors consisting of the four officers of the Center and four others elected by the Center; and one selected by the City Council of the City of Abernathy, Texas. The officers shall serve on the board for one year. The other four directors shall serve for two years. (In the first election of directors, two will serve for one year and two will serve for two years; thereby necessitating an election of two directors each year and two being carried over.)

Section 2. Powers and Duties.

Subject only to the provisions of this Constitution and By-Laws and to such action as may be taken from time to time by the Center itself at an annual or a special meeting and to such action as may be taken by the City of Abernathy, the Board of Directors shall have entire control and management of the affairs, property and policy of the Abernathy Municipal Recreation Center. The Board may delegate any of its powers or duties to an executive committee of three or more of its own number, except that no executive committee shall have power to elect any candidate to membership or expel any member. The Board shall appoint other committees, of its number or otherwise, with such duties as the Board may prescribe, subject only to the limitations herein contained. The Board may make and alter any rules not inconsistent herewith.

In particular, and without limiting the general powers set out above, the Board of Directors may exercise the following powers:

(1) To make regulations controlling operations of the Abernathy Municipal Recreation Center, its property and facilities and affairs.
(2) To employ the Center and other necessary employees, and to fix their duties and compensation.
(3) To fix all fees and other charges (other than membership fee and dues) for enjoyment of the Center or any of its activities or facilities.

(4) To control all income, funds, expenditures and purchases for the Center.

(5) To prescribe rules and regulations to govern conduct and manner of operation of the facilities of the Center and all sports and games conducted on the Center grounds.

Section 3. Meetings.
The Board of Directors shall meet monthly, and also at the call of the President or of any three members. At least three days notice of the time and place of a meeting shall be given to each member of the Board.

Section 4. Quorum.
Four members present in person shall constitute a quorum of the Board of Directors at any meeting.

Section 5. Proxies.
Voting by proxy shall not be permitted.

Article VII—Officers

Section 1. Election.
The officers of the Center shall be a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary, and a Treasurer. No person may hold more than one office. Any vacancy in any office occurring between annual meetings of the Center shall be filled by the Board of Directors.

Section 2. Powers and Duties.

(a) President. The President shall preside at all meetings of the Center and of the Board of Directors, and in general shall perform the duties incident to his office.

(b) Vice-President. During the absence or inability to act of the President, the Vice-President shall perform the duties of that office.

(c) Secretary. The Secretary shall keep the records of all meetings of the Center and of the Board of Directors. He shall give and serve all notices of meetings. He shall be responsible for and have charge of all correspondence, files, records and papers of the Center. He shall present at each annual meeting of the Center a full report on all matters relating to the affairs of the Center, including a summary of all action taken during the year by the Board of Directors. In general, he (or she as the case may be) shall perform the duties incident to his office.

(d) Treasurer. He shall keep full and accurate accounts of all moneys received and shall deposit the same in the name and to the credit of the City of Abernathy, Municipal Recreation Center Operating Fund, in such depositories as may be designated by the City of Abernathy. He shall disburse all moneys under the direction of the Board of Directors. He shall have authority to receive and give receipts for all moneys due and payable from any source whatever; and to endorse on behalf of the Center all checks, drafts, notes, warrants and orders, and to give full discharge for same. He shall present at each annual meeting of the Center a written report of the money affairs of the enterprise and he shall make a like report whenever requested by the Board of Directors. His annual report to the Center shall be audited as may be directed by the Board of Directors. In general, he

(or she as the case may be) shall perform the duties incident to his office.

Article VIII—Terms of Office and Membership
The term of all officers shall begin March 1st and end on the last day in February.

Article IX—Fiscal Year
The fiscal year shall begin on March 1st and end on the last day in February.

Article X—Obligations and Discipline

The acceptance of membership in the Center shall bind each member to uphold all the provisions of the Constitution and By-Laws, and other rules of the Center, and accept and enforce all rules and decisions of the Board of Directors, acting within its jurisdiction, and of the City of Abernathy.

Members shall be subject to suspension or expulsion for unbecoming conduct detrimental to the good name of the Center and/or the proper functioning or administration of the Center or for failure to pay their dues. Neither gambling nor alcoholic beverages will be permitted. Any charges preferred must be in writing. Any member failing in his obligation as above set forth may be suspended or expelled by a two-thirds vote of the Center or by a two-thirds vote of all members of the Board of Directors; provided such member shall have been given due notice in writing of the charges preferred against him and an opportunity to be heard in his own defense.

Any member thus suspended or expelled by a vote of the Board of Directors may appeal from his decision to the members of any annual or special meeting of the Center.

Article XI—Roberts Rules of Order

Roberts Rules of Order shall control the order and conduct of all meetings of the members and of the Board of Directors in so far as not inconsistent herewith.

Article XII

Amendments to this Constitution and By-Laws may be made at any meeting of the Center, by a two-thirds vote of all votes cast.
