Tickets on Sale to Public

Dick Todd, College and Pro Grid Great, Will Speak at All-Sports Banquet Friday

Abernathy High School's first All Sports Banquet will be this Friday night, May 8, at 8 o'clock in the school lunchroom. The banquet will be for the purpose of honoring all varsity players on athletic teams for the school year of 1958-59.

Everyone is invited to attend the banquet. Admission price is \$1.50, and tickets may be purchased in the school's business office. Tickets may be purchased no later than 5 o'clock Friday morning.

Guest speaker for the banquet will be Dick Todd, former All-American at Texas A & M, player and coach for the Washington Redskins, backfield coach at A & M and SMU, and head coach at Midwestern University.

While a participant in high school football at Crowley, Texas, Todd set a high scoring record that has yet to be equaled or broken. Superintendent Noel Johnson will give the invocation at the banquet. Coach Earl Carter will give the highlights of the football and track season, and Coach Wayne Preston will hit the high spots of the basketball season. Coach J. N. Wilson will give the highlights of the State Championship girls basketball team. Miss Shelley Oswalt will recognize members of the tennis teams.

PO FOUNDATION URGING 25 OF POLIO SHOTS

Dr. Kenneth Gregory, City Health Officer, received notice this week from the Texas State Department of Health in Austin, that there had been a marked increase in paralytic polio in Texas this year. To date, there has been a 50 percent increase in polio cases as compared to last year. This is a 300 percent increase in the overall average number of cases reported in the last five years.

The Polio Foundation, therefore, is urging everyone to have their series of 2 polio shots and are recommending that the 4th booster shot be given.

Dr. Gregory recommends that you consult your family physician for these shots.

Invite Amateurs To Compete At Cotton Carnival

Entries will now be accepted for three age divisions of the amateur talent contest for this year's Hi-Plains Cotton Carnival, according to Reagon Ashby, general carnival chairman. The talent contest will be one of the highlights of the carnival scheduled for the Plainview Cooperative Press Thursday, Friday and Saturday, May 7, 8, and 9.

Again this year all amateur performers will be grouped into three age divisions: through 9 years of age, from 10 through 14 years and from 15 up. Three cash prizes will be awarded in each age group. First prizes are \$25, second prizes are \$15 and third prizes are \$10.

The contest is open to amateur performers residing anywhere on the South Plains and entries should be forwarded to the Plainview Chamber of Commerce. Entries may be solo or group performers and should be forwarded in time to reach the Cotton Carnival talent committee not later than May 8th.

In the first two years of the Hi-Plains Cotton carnival, the talent show has been one of the big attractions with some 1500 persons on hand both years. Again this year the contest will be held on the closing night, Saturday, May 9th.

Any questions regarding the talent contest should be directed to the Chamber of Commerce offices here, according to Ashby.

Voters of Abernathy Independent School District Saturday placed their "OK" on a million-dollar school building project by a 3-to-1 vote margin. They voted to increase school taxes, 189 to 60 against. They voted a million-dollar school building bond issue, 189 to 61 against.

Rev. James I. O'Neill, election judge, said a total of 256 ballots were marked. A few ballots could not be counted by election workers because the voters marked them improperly. The election was held in the city hall club room.

Assisting O'Neill with the election were Mmes. Charles Wilson, Lynn B. Young and Lawrence Carter.

The million-dollar school building project calls for new buildings, additions and improvements for all phases of the system, elementary, junior high and high school, home ec, vocational agriculture, band departments, athletics, lunchroom, transportation (building). Also, the project calls for razing of the oldest building, the two-story elementary school structure, a part of which is more than 40 years old.

The last two issues of The Review carried a complete list of proposed building plans. If the bond election was approved, action of voters in placing their stamp of approval on the million-dollar school building project assures greater progress for the school system and the entire community. 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NOTICE

As of May 9, 1959, the following laws and ordinance as set forth for the Abernathy Golden Anniversary Celebration, will be in effect. Said laws and ordinances to be effective through July 12, 1959.

1. All men between the age of 16 and 99 years who live within and out of the city limits of Abernathy, Texas, shall not appear within the city limits of Abernathy, without a beard or shaving permit. These shaving permits may be furnished from any member of the Abernathy Junior Chamber of Commerce. The shaving permit will be a billfold size plastic card and a pin-type lapel button. This button must be worn on the person and visible while inside the city limits.

2. All violations of the above laws will be subject to a fine and a 1-hour stay in the stockade. The fine of 50c must be paid by two friends of the accused, 25 cents each.

Swine Meeting Draws Crowd in 2-Day Session
(From Last Week)

The two-day hog evaluation demonstration staged here Friday and Saturday was successful in setting before the hog raisers and others the actual points on which a hog is valued as an article of commerce.

Packing plants buy hogs on the basis of return on their money. Hog evaluation is based on his value when killed and cut up ready for human consumption or processing into by-products.

This demonstration was designed to increase the hog raisers' knowledge of how to produce the most value in the finished hog. It is part of a general educational campaign on the part of hog raisers, hog buyers, hog breeders and the extension services of A & M College and others to help the hog breeders and raisers produce a more valuable hog, marketwise.

Quality of meat cuts and not quantity of meat in the cuts was stressed as the objective to work for. Various things were discussed that would affect the quality of the meat and therefore the value.

The demonstration was conducted by County Agent Ollie Limer, Assistant County Agent B. F. Yates, T. B. Tankersley, A. & M. Swine Specialist and Roy Snyder, A. & M. Meat Specialist.

Thanks and appreciation were voiced to Carl Phillips and Ercell Givens for their assistance and support of the demonstration. Prizes were furnished by Ercell Givens and the feeding of the hogs for the time needed for the demonstration was furnished by Carl Phillips.

First prize went to Dale Lacey, second prize to Dudley Winters and third to Herman King, for the hogs that, in the thinking of the two swine men, most nearly met the condition required.

There will be another and larger demonstration such as this one at the Lubbock Fair grounds Aug. 20, 21 and 22 which will be open to all hog raisers and breeders.

A large crowd attended the event here.

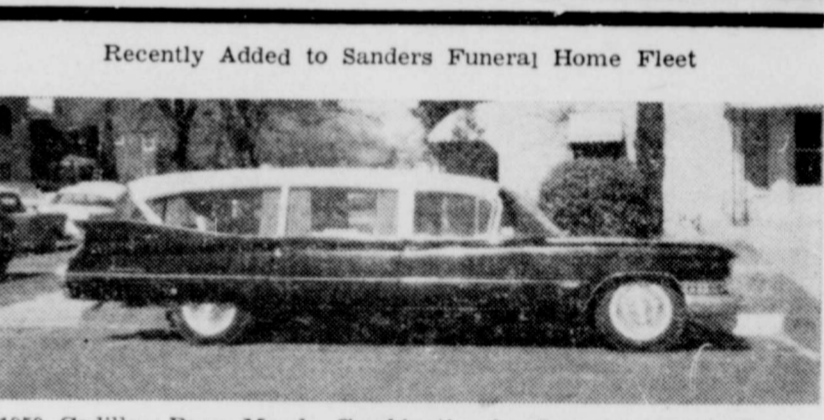

BLIND LEADERS?

Reading Time: 4 Minutes

God has endowed certain individuals to be leaders. This is true in religion as well as other fields. Leadership among God's people is contingent upon true piety and convictions. God's leaders always seek to know the will of the Lord and to reprove, rebuke, and exhort, in accordance to that will.

Will of The People

But the religious leaders of today seem determined to seek the will of the people. This is not something new. Among the Israel of the Old Testament the religious leaders, kings, and priests often sought the will of the people as adverse to the will of God. Aaron built the golden calf in accordance to the will of the people (Exo. 32:22). King Saul spared the king and flocks of the Amalekites upon the same basis (1 Sam. 15:24).

The Old Testament is a chronicle of continuous examples of this rebellious spirit, which the apostle Paul says were written for our admonition (1 Cor. 10:11). They were given to warn us of every age of the disastrous end for all who seek this will of the people and not the will of God. "Lip" piety will not suffice, for we must do the will of the Lord (Matt. 7:21).

Conventional

More and more the religious leaders are seeking the conventional—how to be agreeable rather than spiritual. This does not mean that these leaders are altogether dishonest and insincere, but it simply means they are blind and unstable. These leaders have labored to turn the churches into recreational centers. They cater to every whim in the earthly man, and the "lust of the flesh" is pampered with banqueting, entertainment, carnivals, dances, and in the case of some churches even drinking and gambling!

The "lust of the eyes" is seen in the expensive, luxurious church

buildings, the robed preacher and choir, the embankment of flowers, and the massive pipe-organs. The "pride of life" finds most of its worshippers in personal human achievements and human knowledge. This is more and more exalted above the only revelation of God from heaven—the holy Word of God.

Complacent

These churches seek to be self-preservative rather than adventurous. They cry "Peace, peace!" when there is no peace. They are perfectly complacent. Is it little wonder, then, that its counsel is vague and uninspiring? Is it little wonder that people are convinced there is no real revealed truth but such as is revealed by the innermost self?

Only when the church is sure of itself and swings a heavy hand against all sin and error can Christianity have any influence. Religion is worthwhile only when it is sure, definite, uncompromising and fearless. Such religion only can teach man how to live and how to die, and how to live in eternity.

Contrast this with the pulpits of our time which resound with lectures on almost every conceivable subject except God's will for men, and how to appropriate spiritual power that will fit man for living. Minor platitudes are recited like twittering birds unaware of the approaching hurricane. Sunday services are so hearty, genial, trivial, with cozy comfort to give the attendants a sense of well-being. "Like priest, like people" says the prophet, and thus the blame must be shouldered by the religious leaders of our day.

The Master said: "Let them alone: they be blind leaders of the blind. And if the blind lead the blind, both shall fall into the ditch" (Matt. 15:14).
