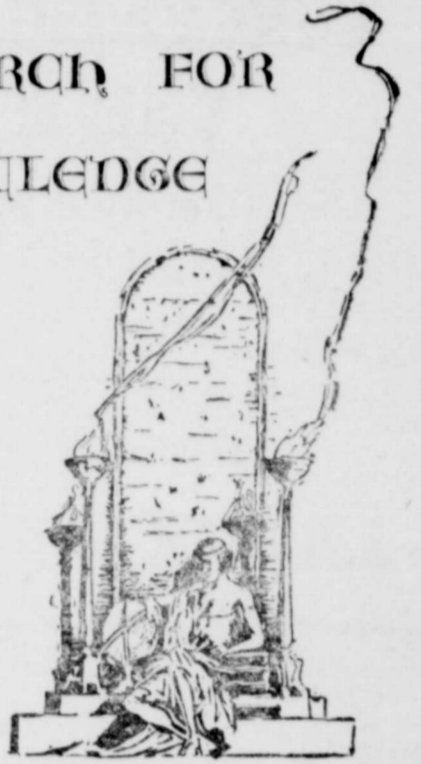

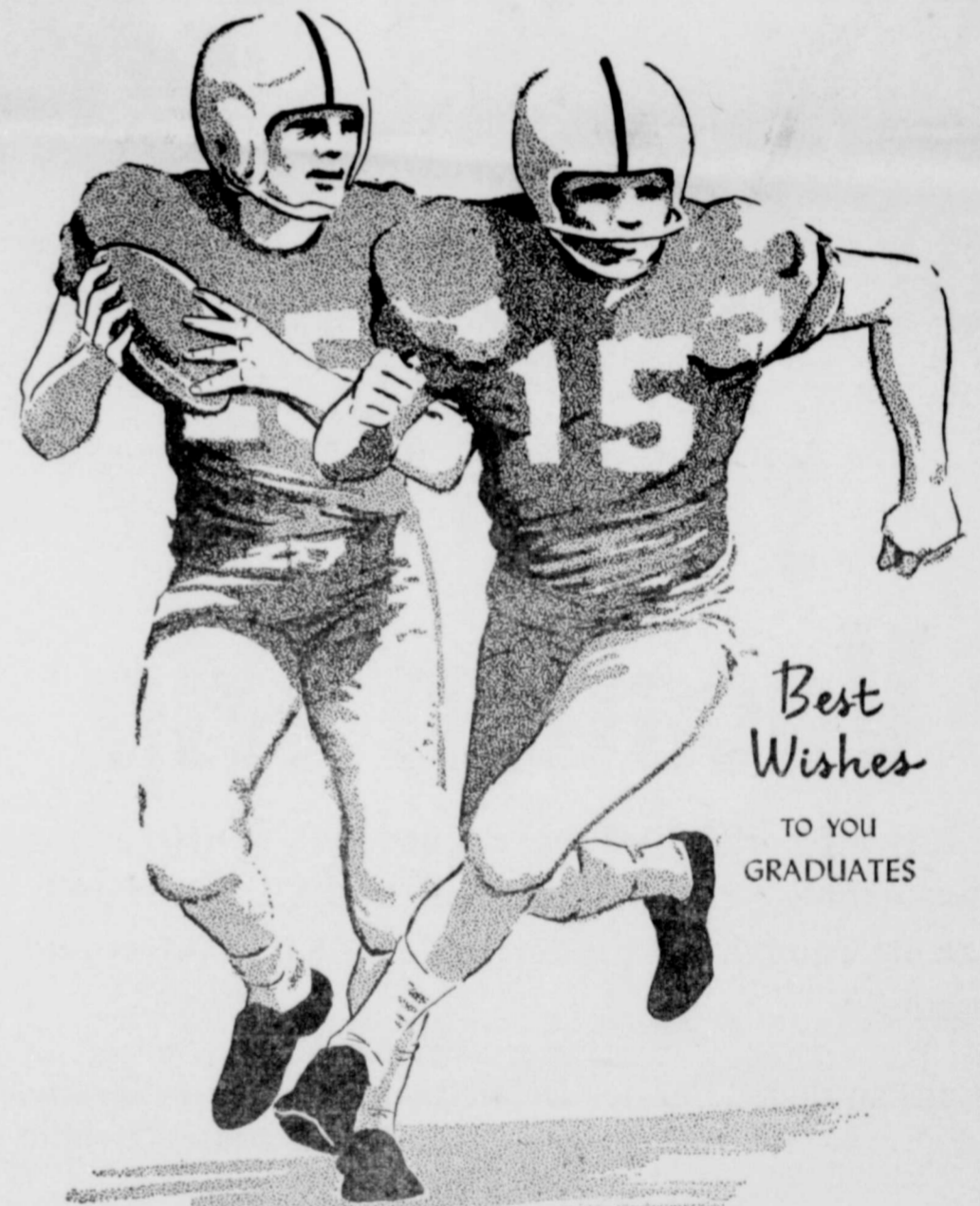

## SANCTIFICATION?

To sanctify means to set apart for some specific purpose, or work. This is clearly illustrated in two verses from Exodus 13: "Sanctify unto me all the first-born . . . that thou shalt set apart unto the Lord all that openeth the matrix" (verses 2 and 12). These two verses refer to the same thing. The first time "sanctified" is stated, and the second time, "set apart." It is evident these two expressions refer to the same thing.

We are told: "But sanctify the Lord in your hearts" (1 Pet. 3:15). This means to set Him apart in our hearts for the special purpose of worshipping Him.

### Saints

One who is sanctified is called a "saint." This term is often abused by people who do not understand what a saint is. Paul addressed the Christians in the city of Corinth in this fashion: "Unto the church of God which is at Corinth, to them that are sanctified in Christ Jesus, called to be saints" (1 Cor. 1:2). Thus, all Christians are saints. Christians are set apart for the purpose of serving God in this world.

We should not say Saint Matthew, St. John, St. Joseph, or St. Mary. They were no more saints than any other Christians then or today. Paul addressed the Christians at Philippi in these words: "To all the saints in Christ Jesus, which are at Philippi" (Phil. 1:1). Notice that there "saints" were not dead saints, but they were called saints while alive! This is different from the practice of some today who have "canonized" certain people long after they have been dead!

Nowhere does the Bible teach Christians to pray to saints. We are to pray to God through Jesus Christ, the only mediator between God and men (1 Tim. 2:5). Jesus told his disciples to pray in His name (John 14:13-14), and Paul exhorts us to "do all in the name of the Lord Jesus" (Col. 3:17). This eliminates praying to God in the name of dead "saints."

### How Sanctified?

How is one sanctified, or made a saint? According to Jesus, the medium is the word of God: "Sanctify them through thy truth; thy word is truth" (John 17:17). He said on another occasion: "Ye

shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free" (John 8:32). Thus, we are sanctified and made free from sin by the word of God, which is the truth. But when does this occur?

One is sanctified by the truth when he obeys the gospel: "Seeing ye have purified your souls in obeying the truth . . . this is the word which by the gospel is preached unto you" (1 Pet. 1:22, 25). Also, "But God be thanked that ye were the servants of sin, but ye have obeyed from the heart that form of doctrine which was delivered you. Being then made free from sin" (Rom. 6:17). Thus, one is purified, made free from sin, or sanctified, when he obeys the truth. But what acts or commands does he obey?

According to the Great Commission: "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved" (Mark 16:16). Also, Acts 2:38 teaches: "Repent and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins." Thus, one must believe the gospel, repent of his sins, and be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ. This constitutes obedience to the word of God, the truth, which is the gospel, and sets him apart to the work of God. It makes him a saint.

### Not Sinless Perfection

Sanctification does not mean sinless perfection. Peter and Barnabas were saints, but they fell into the sin of hypocrisy (Read Gal. 2:11-14). Also, the church at Corinth was filled with strife and carnality (1 Cor. 3:3), but Paul still addressed them as saints of God (1 Cor. 1:2). In other words, sanctification does not mean sinless perfection. A saint who falls into sin must repent and pray for forgiveness of his sins (Acts 8:22). He must be willing to confess his sins (1 John 1:9).

Sanctification is not something in addition to being a Christian. It is not a "second blessing," nor a special gift or work of the Holy Spirit. Obedience to the gospel sanctifies everyone willing to submit, makes them Christians, sets them apart for the Lord's work. Christians are sons of God (Gal. 3:26-27), and thus heirs of eternal life (Rom. 8:17).

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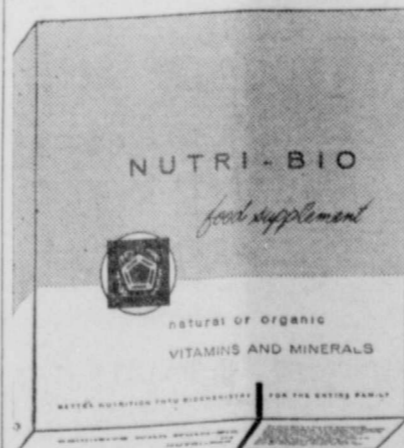
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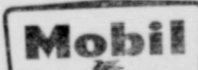

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## PROMPT FILING OF WOOL APPLICATIONS URGED

J. Earl Laney, Chairman of the Hale County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, urges wool growers who marketed shorn wool or unshorn lambs between April 1, 1958 and March 31, 1959 to be prompt in filing applications for payment under the national wool program. The deadline for applications is April 30, and the payment rate will be announced as soon as possible after that date.

Growers can speed up the payment program by prompt filing of applications, the Chairman pointed out. He explained that information contained in the applications is needed by the U. S. Department of Agriculture in computing the average wool price received by growers during the 1958 marketing year. That price must be calculated before the rate of payment to growers can be determined.

Under the wool program, payments are made to growers as an incentive to increase wool production. The payment rate is the percentage necessary to bring the national average price received by growers for wool up to 62 cents a pound. The percentage method of payment encourages a good job of marketing, since the grower who receives the highest price for his wool also receives the largest payment.

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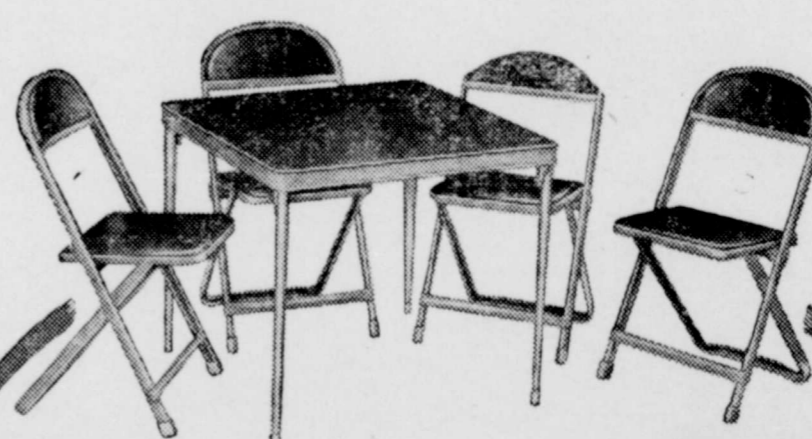
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
