Oil News

The Texas company is set up to drill 660 feet from the north and west line of southeast quarter of section 111, Block A. R. M. T., Hockley County, one and one quarter miles west of Anton. The test is to drill 11,200 feet.

The Texas company is also setting surface casing preparatory to spudding in the Texas Company No. 1 Crittenden.

The drilling operation which is just beginning on the Schulz land west of town, which shows up very plainly when you look west on 10th Street, and is to go to 11,500 feet, is to drill into what is known among oil men as the Matador Arch. This is more or less of an arch formation in the underground structure and begins somewhere near Vernon or perhaps in southwestern Oklahoma, and extends across the South Plains and into New Mexico, and has been known to oil men and geologists for some 20 or 25 years. Oil, like gold, is where you find it and this is an effort to find it along this Matador arch.

Construction of new school buildings to begin this fall

It has been reported that construction on Abernathy's new million-dollar school project is expected to get under way late this fall. It will take approximately six months after the million-dollar school bond was approved by the voters of the Abernathy Independent School District before the contract can be let. The bond was approved May 2, by a 3-to-1 vote margin.

The south wall of the old gymnasium that has deteriorated will be torn down and replaced by a new wall.

It was stated that high on the agenda of the Abernathy School Board's meeting on June 1st will be the selecting of the type of materials to be used for the construction of the new buildings and additions.

The bus storage area will be relocated to make way for the new primary school to be built this fall.

Then will begin the approximately four months' process of completing the architectural detailed specifications and detailed drawings for the basic parts of the construction.

The old Elementary School building is to be used during the 1959-60 school year while the new and additional buildings are being constructed.

Any long staple cotton, including pima cotton, found growing on a farm will be classified as penalty cotton.

"For the 1958 crop year, penalty for long staple or pima cotton was 41.6 cents per pound," says Mr. Laney.



It was suggested that the two funds and all other funds connected with the celebration be put under one heading.
A third fund has appeared recently and it was decided to leave the placing of these in one or more accounts in the hands of the chairman of the finance committee, Philip Sterrett. One fund has approximately \$2,000.00 in it, another about \$800.00, and the third fund something over \$1,000.00. The shaving permit sale has raised over \$1,000.00 so far and they are still coming in. Finance chairman Sterrett reported the raising of funds as very satisfactory and that there were donations of \$1,000.00 to \$1,200.00 which will be forthcoming when needed.
Mrs. Frank Lovelace reported the results of the advertising sale in the brochure to be printed and sold prior to and during the celebration. As chairman of this committee she reported the sale of ads so far had brought in \$2,247.50 with a couple days left in which to get in additional ads. A total so far of 117 ads had been sold.
It was decided to print 2,000 brochures, the cost of which would be \$1,200.00 or \$1,500.00. The committee working on this will need about ten days in which to arrange the ads and other matter in the desired order for printing to be turned over to the printer by June 1st. It was also decided to send a free copy of the brochure to each advertiser in the brochure. All other copies will be sold at 50c per copy. Merchants and others may purchase as many as they desire for free distribution to friends and relatives, but the price would still be 50c per copy to the purchaser.

M-F Sets Three Sales Records

Massey-Ferguson has set three new records in sales of farm and light industrial machinery. Don L. Ratliff, Branch Manager at Dallas, received word today from John H. Shiner, Vice-President, Marketing, that Massey-Ferguson world-wide sales for the six month period ended \$225 million, up 12 percent over 1958 — the highest world-wide sales amounted to \$149 million up almost 15 percent over 1958 and the largest of any quarter in M-F history. 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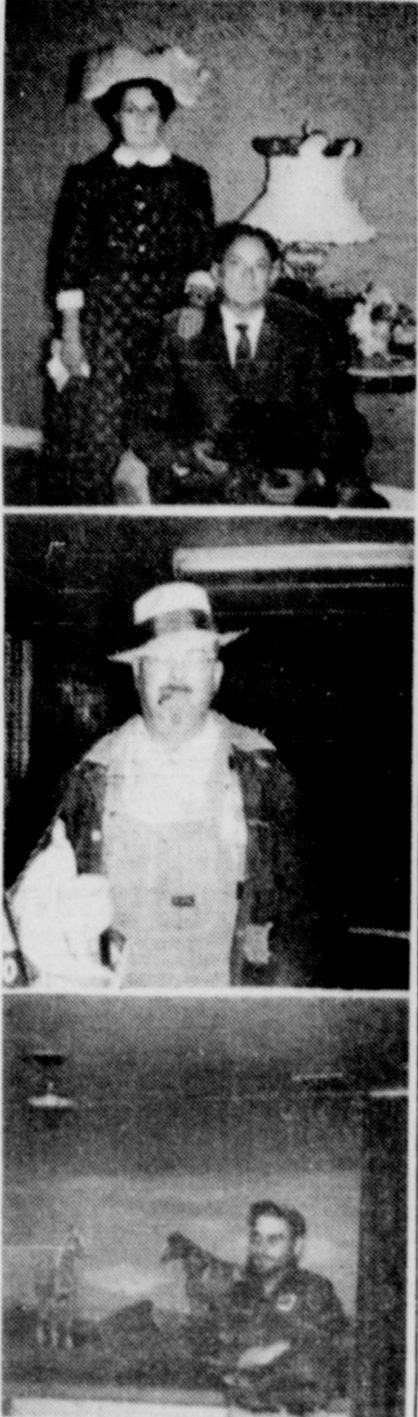

for a long time was torn down, and the Baptists decided they would try to build a permanent building for their meeting place.

They met and decided to try to build on the 5 acres here in County Line that had been donated by the Murrays to be used for Church and School purposes. They got permission from the county judge in Lubbock and drew up their blue prints and started their building in about 1945, and a big dedication service was held to dedicate the new church on March 17, 1946.

Some of the members of the County Line Baptist church who lived around in the vicinity of County Line and were some of the first members at this time and earlier were Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Pool (who were then living where the Tom Lesley farm now stands east of the County Line Coop Gin); Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Brown, Mr. Ernest Brown; Miss Edna Turner; Mrs. R. W. Waddell (who now lives in Fort Worth with her daughter); Miss Josephine Waddell; (Mrs. R. W. Waddell was visiting in Abernathy last week). Other members who helped start the church were Mrs. J. O. Pettit; Mr. and Mrs. A. O. Vaughn (who now resides in James Springs, N. M.) and Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Pool.

The first deacons of the County Line Baptist Church who were ordained during 1946 sometime, were Mr. J. W. Pool and Mr. A. O. Vaughn. Mrs. Leonard Harrall, who now lives in Abernathy, is the only charter member left on the church records. She has never moved her church letter from this church. Noble Rice of County Line is one of the oldest members of the church in this community.

Other preachers who have served as pastors of the County Line Baptist Church were, first, a Rev. Fred Britton who came out and preached in the community church in 1917. He accepted the pastorate on June 24, 1917. Reverend W. C. Wilson was the first pastor in the new building. He came to serve in February, 1946, and served for a year or two as pastor. He is now deceased. The Reverend Alfred Rover was then called in about October, 1948. He served a year or two. He is now serving as pastor of a church somewhere close to Nashville, Tennessee.

In about 1950, the Reverend Raymond Baxter was called to the church to serve as pastor. He served for a year or two and was replaced by the Reverend Larry Fausz, in 1952, and served for two years. He is now serving as pastor in a Baptist Church in Fort Worth. In 1954, the Reverend L. T. Roy was called to serve. He is now a pastor of a Baptist Church in Lubbock.

The church then called the Reverend W. P. Cure out of Lubbock who only served for three or four months. Since the church here did not have a parsonage the pastors would have to drive back and forth each week from their homes to hold the services out here on Sundays, and Wednesdays.

One night in February, 1955, Rev. Cure was driving out here to hold his regular Wednesday night prayer meeting and started across the railroad tracks 2 miles west of Shallowater where the Clovis Highway turns into Highway 401, which goes to County Line, and the train which gets into Shallowater about 8:00 was coming by, and Rev. Cure drove into the path of the on coming train and was killed instantly.

Reverend E. L. (Roy) Minor, who is now the pastor was called to replace Rev. Cure. Reverend Minor has served this church for four years and is beginning his fifth year as Pastor of the County Line Baptist Church.

Since they have a regular pastor now the congregation raised money and had one of the ready built houses moved out here on the south side of the church building for a parsonage for the pastor and his wife. In 1958 the congregation decided that they did not have enough room and they launched a big building program and raised the funds and built a nice addition to the church.

They first built on the church an entrance hall. Later they put down cement walks in front of the building. Then in fall of 1958 they started building this addition on the west side of the back which when completed would have a large assembly room, a pastor's study and eight Sunday school rooms for the different classes, two rest rooms and a large kitchen and serving room.

The different committees went down to Lubbock and selected furnishings for the rooms throughout the church. They selected fold up banquet tables and folding chairs for the assembly room. Tables and chairs and wastebaskets for the Sunday school rooms and an electric range and refrigerator for the kitchen. They also equipped the kitchen with dishes, pans, and a set of stainless steel knives, forks and spoons.

Mrs. Ida Richerson of Lubbock donated a beautiful picture which was hung in the assembly room. She is the mother of Mrs. Marvin Stephens of County Line. Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Stephens donated a nice spinet piano for the main auditorium. Mrs. Jewel Smith of Lubbock, a very talented artist came out and painted a beautiful mural for the background scene in the baptistry which has also been built just recently.

The fresh-hand painting she did for the baptistry is the beautiful colorful Jordan River with the real like looking trees and mountains on the banks and in the background.

Open House was held all day Sunday, May 24, beginning with regular services in the morning and then the women of the church serving a covered dish luncheon at noon to the group. At 1:30, an

(3) the City Secretary is instructed to give notice of the City Council's intention to lease said land by publishing in the Idalou Beacon, a newspaper published in Idalou, Lubbock County, Texas, and in the Abernathy Review, a newspaper published in Abernathy, Hale County, Texas, each newspaper having a general circulation within the county in which located, said notices to be published once a week for three consecutive weeks prior to the public hearing to be held in the City Council's regular meeting place in the City Hall at Abernathy, Texas, at 10 o'clock a. m. on the 20th day of June, 1959, at which time the City Council will receive and consider bids for such oil, gas and other mineral lease. It is the intention of the City Council to award and sell the lease to the highest and best bidder submitting a bid therefor at such public hearing and auction, provided that, in the judgment of said Council, the bids submitted do not represent the fair value of such lease, the Council will reject such bids. No bid will be considered unless submitted at said hearing.

(4) no award or sale will be made unless the successful bidder shall pay the City of Abernathy in cash for the lease within the time prescribed and required by the City Council at the public hearing herein provided for.

CIVIL DEFENSE ORDINANCE

Ordinance No. 81

An ordinance creating a municipal defense and disaster relief committee and providing the powers of that committee; Creating the office of Municipal Defense Coordinator; and providing the duties and responsibilities of that office; Creating an operational organization; Granting necessary powers to cope with emergencies threatening life and property in the city of Abernathy; Authorizing cooperative and mutual aid agreements for relief work between this and other cities and counties; and for related purposes; Prohibiting unauthorized lights and warning and all clear signals and making violations a misdemeanor punishable by fine not exceeding \$200.00.

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As I Remember...

In May, 1896, my father sent me with a wagon and team and an eastern school teacher named Bradford to Sweetwater to move Mr. Bradford's furniture from here to Strip. The first place on the road south of the present site of Abernathy was the Frank Bowles Ranch located on the old road from Lubbock to Hale Center and on the Canyon City (now Canyon, Texas). Following that several miles was the Belle Reed ranch, Judge Crump ranch and the Wolforth Brothers ranch on the canyon this side of Lubbock. This trip was my first visit to Lubbock. Our route was from Lubbock to Grassland, or Seed's ranch, by way of Durham in Borden County, then the R. K. ranch, Snyder, Roscoe and Sweetwater. We only saw one piece of plowed land, about six miles south of Lubbock, until a few miles west of Snyder.

All of the country south of Lubbock was covered with mesquite bushes, but no large trees. We were gone four weeks and had quail or dove at least one meal a day, as the country then was full of small game.

The section on which Abernathy now stands was first owned by John Y. Ligon. He and Bob Mitchell ran a bunch of cattle here for a year or so and Mr. Mitchell was killed by his horse and later the land was sold to Mr. Stanfield.

From 1890 to 1900 the settlers in northwest Lubbock County were Judge W. D. Crump (1890), G. O. Groves (1890), the Hardy family, Claude, B. D. Hughes, John H. Pettit, Joe Sherman, Sam Gholson, Joe Lang, Uncle Nick Beal and W. N. Claxton. All the above moved here in the early 1890's. Later Will Murray, Joe Powell, and others came, all before 1902 and before Abernathy was started. In those days from the Stanfield place (now Abernathy) to Lubbock the Frank Bowles, Belle Reed, Judge Crump and Wolforth Brothers ranches were the only homes the road passed. The Went and Charles Vaughn place was east of the road and E. P. and Joe Earhart places were in the canyon west of the road.

The Grovesville School and the Hardy School were started in the early 1890's and the Caldwell

school sometime later. All these were located to the southwest of present Abernathy.

About 1886 almost all the country between Lubbock and Plainview was burned off, but after that, prairie fires were few until 1896, when many more travelers were passing through the country. One of the first bad fires was started where Abernathy now stands. We saw the smoke and Mr. Dave Neil and I rode hard for it and found Albert Allen of Hale Center fighting it alone. He was travelling north with a bunch of horses and a pack horse. He had met a travelling man in a buggy and soon after saw the fire. The wind was from the west and we went to work on the north side of the fire and fought it alone for about two hours before any help came.

There was no one working on the south side of the fire, but we put out the north side for about four miles then the wind changed to the north and the fire turned and burned a strip about forty miles wide to the caprock on the south. Cattle were burned and sheep belonging to the Bledsoes and Bacon, but don't recall just how many. Also, in about 1898 a whirlwind struck an outside fire at the Glynn place where Mrs. Glynn was heating wash water and the wind came up strong from the southwest. This place was to the southwest of Abernathy several miles, and grass was dead but very dry.

The fire raced through the Stanfield place (Abernathy), the Neils, our place, the J. H. Lutrick place, where it also burned feed and corns as well as grass, and we fought the fire to four miles west of Petersburg. Among the men fighting it were John Reed, Dave Neil, W. H. Ragland, Bill and Ben Landers, Jim Garrison, Earl and Leslie Maupin and myself. We rode to the Maupin place about 1:00 a. m. for a meal which was both supper and breakfast and was that chow good.

Another bad fire started at the Groves place about 1900. We had a strong south wind and the grass was tall. Joe Earhart, Jim Hart, John Hart, Rene Way, Dave Neil and I were soon there. We could not do much good with saddle blankets and packets so we killed a poor cow and split her open and pulled it along the fire edge with four saddle horses. Other men came and followed on foot putting out the remnants of the fire. After about ten miles we had to kill the second cow and finally got the fire out at a road west of Hale Center. The last two bad fires in the area were in 1905 and 1909. These burned us out

and were covered in an article written for the 40th anniversary of Abernathy.

I am very thankful to have lived for sixty-seven years among the finest people and in the finest country in the world. I may have made some mistakes on dates and names and it is impossible to verify this as it covers too many years, so if mistakes are found, please forgive me. There are many more people I would like to mention but have forgotten so many names and dates. We can remember the many hardships that our parents and us as small stockmen had to contend with those first twenty years on the plains. There are many more people qualified to write about Abernathy after it started, but I hope what I have written will be of some interest to readers.

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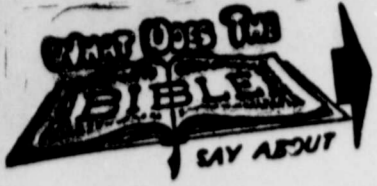

The Family of Murray

Installment Number 11

Around the turn of the 20th century, Mr. James Murray moved to the County Line community, which is about 10 miles west of Abernathy. This Mr. Murray was the father of W. G. Murray who was widely known as a rancher in this part of the state.

The original Murray Estate was located around the County Line store and public school building. Also, the Murrays gave, or donated five acres of land for cemetery and community purposes.

Jammes Murray and wife are buried at Plainview cemetery, but they lived long and active in the County Line vicinity.

Will G. Murray and his wife, Gertrude, came to the County Line community in 1903. People generally regarded them as among the most substantial family a-

round these parts. The Murray ranch-home was located six miles west of the Southwest corner of the town of Abernathy.

At the time wife and I moved to the Murray ranch some 40 and more years ago, where I was hired help, there were 12 sections in the place and about 4-8 sections round about which was under lease. Along about that time the family moved to Lubbock. There were four of the children. They are still living, the three girls live in Lubbock, while the son, Billie, lives at Hale Center.

In their order, according to age, there were: Almada, Virginia, Billie and Ethel, who went by the name of "Muffie."

After the family moved to Lubbock for school reasons, they would come back to the ranch for the summer. This procedure lasted for several years. Each child had their own saddle and horse,



but while a little girl, Muffie had to settle for a burro—which she rode.

Will Murray shipped great numbers of livestock, mostly to Kansas City. One year he shipped 97 car loads of livestock, which was both cattle and sheep. During the summer months, the children helped to drive the livestock to the stock pens. There was once a little boy by the name of Charles Galbraith, who spent the summer with Billie. They were about the same age. The two of them made quite a team, they were the finest pair I ever knew.

The young life is the real life, and there is something about the young child that is in a beautiful class all alone.

I have seen the Wyoming cowboy shoot the mother coyote and fondle the young. The gay rosebud is more lovely than the full-blown rose.

There were many saddle horses and work mules on the place. Some years we broke-out six head of wild mules.

There were two main barns, and numerous corrals, many crowding pens, with ample branding chutes. There was a well-made building for storing threshed grain. There were a series of portable sheep pens and a dipping vat, which was equipped with an upright, coal-burning boiler to heat the dip. There was the main ranch-house which is still standing like an ancient abandoned marker. Also a smaller residence and, too, close by was an orchard of 15 or 20 acres. Blue quails inhabited the orchard.

The lower pasture comprised 5,760 acres, it contained three corrals, with three sheds which were 40 by 70 feet. There were many windmills to maintain. Among the saddle horses, I recall: "Flax, Mack, Midnight, Nigger, Pinto (Almeda's horse) Dunny, Virginia's horse) The Roan, Pat, Billy, San S - Moon, Nubbin, Brownie, and Snip (Billie's horse)

I was never rated high at a horseman, yet there were times when I went high and came down on the hard prairie to my utter embarrassment.

Billie Murray was fast becoming a horseman at the age of five years, when he drove milk cows in from the Powell ranch every evening.

One of the saddest incidents or accidents, that ever occurred to the family was when Billie Murray was so near fatally burned. This fire which burned 80 percent of the skin of his body happened in 1930. Will Murray had moved his ranching interests to the Bell-House Canyon Ranch, where the fire destroyed the two-story house and almost killed the boy. Billie was in a Lubbock hospital for four and one-half months where he received treatment and (final) grafting, then remained at the Lubbock Murray home for another four and one-half months. Billie who appears to be a well-to-do farmer of Hale Center, reminds me so much of his illustrious father, which is indeed an honor.

Will Murray departed this life in December of 1941. His old neighbors and friends were the Barton's Norfleets, Hudgens, Haral Matejowski, Pettis, Press Hill, but his friends could not be enumerated here.

Mrs. Murray passed away of more recent years. In tribute to those departed and those living of the family, I quote from Bryant: "He, who from zone to zone, Guided through the boundless sky, thy certain flight, In the long way that I must tread alone, Will lead my steps aright."
