**PHI DELTA CONSTRUCTS  
BOY SCOUT ALTAR**

An all-collegiate work crew of 102 members and pledges of the Phi Delta Theta fraternity at Texas Tech has recently completed the building of an altar at Camp Post, Texas.

The altar is to serve as a devotional area for area boy scouts. This was the annual "Community Service Day" task of the local members of the fraternity's family of 123 college chapters. This is an annual project of the international fraternity now in its fourth year.

Members of Phi Delta Theta volunteered all the work on the building of the chapel which will provide scouts with their first devotional area.

The site for the chapel is across a deep ravine from the main camp, which is reached by foot bridge. It is a secluded area which has as a backdrop the rugged edge of the caprock rising approximately 75 feet.

The altar consists of a partial screen at the back, with an altar and lectern in front. A partially roofed area might be included later for shelter during private conferences or meditation at the altar. A weather proof and vandal-proof storage area for hymnals, candles, books, etc., could be furnished at the altar or behind the screened backdrop.

Seating consists of planks bolted onto the telephone pole uprights, which are implanted into the ground.

The whole aspect is conducive to reverence. Limestone rock, rustic wood, brick, stone, redwood, and concrete were used in the project.

This is Texas Epsilon's fourth year of Community Service work. The last three years have been spent landscaping the Lubbock Children's Home.

President of the chapter is Bill Dear, junior from Lubbock. Chapter advisor is John Harding an instructor on the Tech faculty.

**POLIO FOUNDATION URGES  
SERIES OF POLIO SHOTS**

Dr. Kenneth Gregory, City Health Officer, received notice this week from the Texas State Department of Health in Austin, that there has been a marked increase in paralytic polio in Texas this year. To date, there has been a 50 percent increase in polio cases as compared to last year. This is a 300 percent increase in the over-all average number of cases reported in the last five years.

The Polio Foundation, therefore, is urging everyone to have their series of 3 polio shots and are recommending that the 4th booster shot be given.

Dr. Gregory recommends that you consult your family physician for these shots.

## Don Jones, Review Staffman, Is Awarded Journalism Scholarship

Don Jones, Abernathy Weekly Review staffman, has been awarded a journalism scholarship by the West Texas Press Association. The announcement was made Tuesday by W. H. Graham, Jr., Friona, chairman of the West Texas Press Association Scholarship Committee. Graham, a former president of West Texas Press Association, is publisher of newspapers at Friona, Bovina, and Farwell.

The \$400.00, four year scholarship is donated each year to a graduating senior in West Texas by the West Texas Press Association. In order to qualify for the scholarship, a student must be in the upper 25 percent of his graduating class and submit a letter to the Scholarship Committee from

the publisher of the local paper, the superintendent of schools in his community, the principal of the high school, and the yearbook sponsor stating why each think the applicant would benefit from a career in journalism.

The members of the West Texas Press Scholarship Committee this year were W. H. (Sonny) Graham, Jr., chairman, of Friona and Farwell; Ed Sprowls, Anson; and Troy Martin, Olton.

A son of Mr. and Mrs. Ward Jones, Don was graduated from Abernathy High School May 21. He had attended Abernathy schools since he was in the sixth grade. His family moved here from Memphis in 1952.

With Review Since 1956  
Don's good fortune in receiving

the West Texas Press Association Scholarship came as a result of his natural ability in the field of journalism, and through the cooperation of several local people who believed that he deserved this honor. Letters, stating facts about Don, were written by his school superintendent, Noel Johnson; his high school principal, J. W. Solis; Mrs. Sue Park, Antelope Yearbook sponsor; and his employer, A collection of Don's news stories and personal columns which have appeared in The Abernathy Weekly Review were included in the portfolio sent to the West Texas Press Association Scholarship Committee.

Don began work on The Abernathy Weekly Review November 3, 1956, in his sophomore year in Abernathy High School, as a "printer's devil." Due to his ability, hard work and dependability, Don's advancement was rapid... so rapid that by the summer of 1957, he was able to put out The Review while the management took a vacation. Readers

complimented his paper that week. In addition to writing news stories, covering sports events and writing a personal column, "Chit Chats From AHS," Don mastered all of the mechanical operations of producing The Abernathy Weekly Review. Don worked before and after school hours and Saturdays for The Review, logging many 40-hour weeks during the school terms. Despite the long hours of work, he held a high grade average in school. The Review management is indebted to Don for his faithful work during a very difficult period of producing the newspaper.

Don plans to study journalism at Texas Technological College, and he will be employed in the Tech Press printing plant beginning in September. Congratulations, Don, it couldn't have happened to a finer person. —BFD

### NO TRESPASS LAW IN EFFECT

Now in effect in Hale County, and several other Plains counties, is a NO TRESPASS LAW, passed by the Texas Legislature to protect wild life in an established game reserve covering a wide area of the state.

Anyone who trespasses on private property to kill quail or other such birds is subject to a \$300.00 fine. Discharging firearms from a public road, a law in effect for many years, also will serve to protect the birds.

When a sufficient stock of quail and other such birds is built up, an open hunting season will be declared and announced.

### THIS SEASON IS FAVORABLE FOR INCREASE IN BINDWEED

The Hale County Noxious Weed Control District has purchased recently some of the best spraying equipment available to aid Hale County land owners toward the control and eradication of noxious weeds. This equipment and its operator is offered to the Hale County farmer free of charge as a part of the weed district's war on field bindweed, according to Archie G. Martin, supervisor.

This spring has brought many acres of field bindweed into being on land that heretofore has been free of noxious weeds. Temperature and moisture conditions have combined into an ideal situation in many places for bindweed seed germination to start new weed infestations. If the seedlings of this noxious perennial weed are not destroyed by tillage practices or other means within six weeks after they emerge they can only be destroyed by the use of chemicals and intensive cultivation practices over a period of several years, said Martin.

Farmers are urged to prevent this weed spread first by planting only clean weed-free seed and preventing harvest machinery that is not weed seed free from operating on their property, and, secondly,

Due to many years of research by both our agricultural department agencies and the chemical industries, weed control chemicals have been developed that obtain much better results and at the same time are more economical and easier to use. For instance, the average cost of eradicating one acre of field bindweed with chemicals today is about \$125.00 as compared with a cost of about \$250.00 per acre in 1955.

To obtain the goal of a bindweed free country every individual must participate and cooperate by becoming weed conscious and then taking positive action toward weed control. "Join in the war on weeds today!" Martin urges land owners.

### Grain Sorghum Support Price Set At \$1.48 for Hale County in 1959-60

The 1959 County Price Support Rate established for grain sorghum grading No. 2 or better is \$1.48 per hundredweight. J. Earl Laney, chairman of the Hale County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee announced.

For grain sorghum stored in an approved commercial warehouse the loan rate is \$1.48 less the service fee charge of one cent per hundredweight and the warehouse charges will be deducted according to the table deductions that range from 5 to 17 cents per 100 weight.

There are listed below applicable discounts for 1959 crop grain

sorghums:  
U. S. No. 3 and containing not in excess of 12 percent moisture, 5 cents per cwt. U. S. No. 4 and containing not in excess of 12 percent moisture, 10c per cwt. Mixed grain sorghums, 3 cents per cwt.

If grain sorghums are stored on the farm, the support price is \$1.48 less the service fee charge of 2 cents per cwt., net to the producer, \$1.46.

Support will be carried out through loan and purchase agreements which will be available from harvest time through January 31, 1960. Loans will mature on March 31, 1960.

# Richard Havens Is Named Editor

Richard Havens this week assumes duties as editor of the Abernathy Weekly Review. He follows Buford F. Davenport, who has been serving as both publisher and editor.

Havens joined The Review staff in August of 1956, coming here from Tahoka, where he was employed by the First National Bank.

He worked at the bank before and after he was graduated from Tahoka High School. Havens returned home last month following two years of active duty in the Army. He spent 18 months of that time at an Army post in Orleans, France. He and his wife, Vicki, and their son, Mark, reside at 1403 Avenue M. Davenport has served as report-

er, editor and owner-publisher of The Review since 1952, when he first went to work as a reporter for Vic Lamb, who was then the newspaper's editor. J. C. Hurst, owner of The Review and Hale Center American at that time, moved Lamb to the Hale Center paper in 1935, and made Davenport editor of The Review. Hurst sold the Abernathy paper to Dav-

enport in 1946, and at the same time sold the Hale Center paper to Tom Rambo, M. L. and Mrs. Hurst now reside in San Francisco, and Lamb owns and edits the Ruidoso, N. M. News.

(This is by no means a "swan song" for BFD, but I'd like to thank everyone for the fine cooperation given The Review through the years. We want you

to continue this cooperation with Havens, your new editor. As stated previously, I am not financially able to retire, and have no desire to retire. In turning the responsibilities of editor over to Havens, I am being relieved of the "work under pressure" that normally goes with that job. 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





### PROGRESS MADE ON DEVELOPING SHORT WHEAT

College Station—Short wheats being developed for production under high fertility and irrigation in early parts by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Dr. I. M. Atkins, agronomist in charge of small grain research, says the new wheats, resulting from crosses of dwarf wheat from Spain with hard red winter wheat varieties, grow to 35-35 inches tall, rather than the 35-45, or even 45 inches, attained by presently available varieties.

In tests conducted by Dr. Kenneth B. Porter at the Southwestern Great Plains Field Station near Amarillo the top strain of new wheat produced 75 bushels per acre with 54 bushels by two widely planted varieties, Concho and Wichita. At the Deaton Station the new strains yielded less than 3 percent while producing high yields. Commercial varieties yielded up to 80 percent under the same growing conditions at Deaton.

Prediction of short wheats will mean many advantages to farmers. Dr. Atkins points out. High levels of fertility might be used to produce more grain per acre without lodging. The more efficient use of fertilizer, increasing their yields without an excess production of straw.

Quality tests also are promising. Dr. Porter says. However, we will do much more testing for quality winter-hardiness, disease resistance, adaption to combine harvesting and other characteristics so the wheat will prove itself before releasing seed to farmers.

We are seeking short wheat which will fit Texas farming and at the end of the same time produce better grain for bread under high fertility and irrigation than currently planted varieties. Some of the characteristics sought also include shatter resistance, higher test weight per bushel and stronger gluten content to enable bread to stand up better during mixing, he adds.

### FERTILIZER USE DISCUSSED BY SPECIALIST

College Station—How can an individual farmer determine the right amount of fertilizer to use to obtain the most profit? This will depend on the soil type, climatic conditions expected, past management and the amount of capital the farmer has to invest, says William F. Bennett, extension soil chemist.

Besides the yield increases, other factors which determine the rate of fertilizer to use are the cost of fertilizer, price expected for the crop and the amount of capital available, he noted.

The most profitable rate of fertilizer to use will depend on the price expected for the crop. If prices appear to be good, more fertilizer can be used profitably. If prices are uncertain and apt to be low, fertilizer use would not be as profitable and less should be applied.

The costs of producing the crop also influence the most profitable rate of fertilizer to use, Bennett said. Certain fixed costs are associated with the growing of a crop. The land has to be plowed, seeded, prepared, seed purchased, insects and diseases controlled and the crop harvested. These costs are fairly constant and can be estimated.

Fertilizer rates are not the most profitable just because maximum yields are reached, he said. From the standpoint of fertilizer use, it is desirable to stop fertilizing before maximum yields are obtained. For example, if 90 pounds of Nitrogen will increase the yield of corn to 109 bushels per acre compared with 87 bushels where no Nitrogen was used, but 120 pounds of Nitrogen will yield 112 bushels per acre, the 3 bushel yield increase would not offset the cost of the additional 30 pounds of Nitrogen.

If capital is limited, it would be advisable to fertilize at a rate short of maximum net profit. If capital is available, it is more profitable to fertilize at a rate which will give maximum net profit. Even though operating capital is limited, returns from fertilizer use would justify borrowing the funds needed, he concluded.

With summer just around the corner, poultrymen are reminded that management practices will require some changing to cope with the heat. Ventilation will be needed and plans should be made now to take care of cooling the poultry houses during the hottest days of summer. Hens, like other farm livestock must have a plentiful supply of cool, clean water available at all times. Productive drops when hens don't get the water they need.

COMMUNION EVERY SUNDAY?

Reading Time: 4 Minutes

More and more people today are becoming concerned about whether they should partake of the Lord's Supper every Sunday. They find in the New Testament about the original church doing this and wonder why many are not following the practice today.

The Lord's Supper, or Communion as it is often called, is an act of worship for Christians. The early church was faithful in its practice. "And they continued steadfastly in the apostles' doctrine and fellowship, and in breaking of bread, and in prayers" (Acts 2:42). This "breaking of bread" refers to the Communion. Paul stated in 1 Cor. 10:16, "The bread which we break, is it not the communion of the body of Christ?"

The church today, if it is to be pleasing to God, must be patterned after the original church. It should not be lacking in observing the right worship. The Lord gave the model for the church through His apostles, and we should conform to that model today.

Weekly Habit

That the churches in apostolic times met on the first day of every week to partake the Lord's Supper is well attested by both inspired and uninspired writers. In Acts 20:7, Luke records: "And upon the first day of the week, when the disciples came together to break bread, Paul preached unto them, ready to depart on the morrow." The purpose of the meeting is clearly defined—it was to break bread, or partake the Lord's Supper. Paul evidently knew they would meet for he stayed seven days in the city (verse 6). The time of their meeting is clearly stated—the first day of the week. The way Luke records this meeting shows it was a habit of the church—"when the disciples came together to break bread."

Because of the uniformity of the work and worship of the early church, Paul could depend on this occasion. Every congregation followed the same pattern. Paul stated that he taught the same thing in every church (1 Cor. 4:17). Warnings were constantly given that there should be no other pattern of doctrine followed (2 John

9-11; Gal. 1:8-9).

Corinth

We learn more of this apostolic practice from the example of the Corinthians. The church in Corinth observed the Lord's Supper as did the other congregations, but in time they made this spiritual occasion into a common meal and a big feast. For this reason, Paul rebuked them: "When ye come together therefore into one place, this is not to eat the Lord's Supper. For in eating everyone taketh before others his own supper; and one is hungry, and another is drunken. What? have ye not houses to eat and drink in? What shall I say to you? Shall I praise you in this? I praise you not!" (1 Cor. 11:20-22).

He continues, reminding them of the original institution of the Supper, and warns them of their condemnation for eating the Supper in a loose and unworthy manner. He closes with this admonition: "Wherefore, my brethren, when ye come together to eat, tarry one for another. And if any man hunger, let him eat at home; that ye come not together unto condemnation. And the rest will I set in order when I come" (1 Cor. 11:33-34).

Every Week

Since they were in the habit of meeting on the first day of the week, Paul also instructs them to give of their financial means on that day. "Upon the first day of the week, let every one of you lay by him in store, as God has prospered him" (1 Cor. 16:2). The Revised Standard Version, Goodspeed's translation, Williams' translation, and others render this verse, "the first day of every week," which is a better rendition in the Greek we have the same construction of language as is found in Acts 14:23 and Titus 1:5, where we read "every." Thus, Paul instructs the Corinthians to give on EVERY first day. But this was the meeting at which they ate the Lord's Supper. Therefore, we conclude that they like the disciples at Troas, met EVERY first day of the week to eat the Lord's Supper.

It was considered a sin for Christians to fail to meet for this weekly observance. (Read Hebrews 10:25-26).

# Landers Family

(By O. F. Rea)

W. L. Landers, an uncle of W. T. Landers, from whom this story was obtained and who now resides in Abernathy, came to Abernathy area from Eastland County in 1887 and bought a section of land from the state on terms that were designed to encourage settlement of the then thinly populated area.

Very little money was required on the initial payment and there were forty years to pay the balance. W. L. Landers brought cattle and horses with him to stock the ranch and began raising both. Soon he bought additional sections from homesteaders and others who were desirous of selling and extended his holding to four sections.

The land could be bought at \$1.00 per acre and he took up the notes of these people and paid the land out. This was before Hale

Center was established and the nearest railroad town was Canyon. Nearly all supplies were hauled from Canyon by freight wagons. The closest railroad on the south was Big Spring. When cattle were sold they would have to drive them to Canyon for shipment to market.

W. L. Landers came out there a bachelor and remained so. He fenced the four sections and bought another section and lived on it and farmed, raising millet, sorghum cane, and kaffir for feeding stock. Farming was done on the old time way, plow a furrow, drop seed in it then cover by plowing a furrow beside it. The plants consisted of a tin wash pan with holes in it through which the seed would fall when carried by hand over the row. Cultivation was unnecessary as there were no weeds. (Can you imagine that?) Just plant, let it grow and harvest.

A brother, B. F. Landers, came out in 1897 and bought two sections adjoining W. L. He ranched also. What farming was done was on the section already being farmed. B. F. wanted more land so did not stay here long, going to New Mexico in 1900 and buying a Mexican who owned a ranch. He added to this by buying out homesteaders who wanted to sell until he had 10 sections. Then he found he could lease land from the state for 40 per acre with no taxes to pay, so he leased six sections, or approximately this amount and continued ranching operations.

W. T. Landers came here in October, 1901, with his parents, arriving the first day of the month. They came thru from Eastland County also, by wagon. Had two wagons and were eight days on the trip. There were five in the family. At first, they worked on the ranch for the uncles who were well established by now. Went to school at Strip in 1901. Later went to Star school which was located on what was later Jno. Adams Lutrick section. Along about 1906 or 1907, farming began to replace the ranching to some extent. Wheat began to be planted and in places suitable lots of alfalfa was grown. Maize began to be grown, quite generally. Mail came to Hale Center stage stand about this time as the railroad was now down as far as Plainview. Most trading was done at Petersburg.

Uncle Joe Landers bought a J. I. Case Threshing outfit in 1907. This consisted of a 28-inch Case separator and a 15-horse power steam tractor. The separator was of course belt driven as was the custom then. Tractor speed was about two to two and one-half miles per hour. Fuel and water were hauled by wagon. Fuel was most anything that would burn readily.

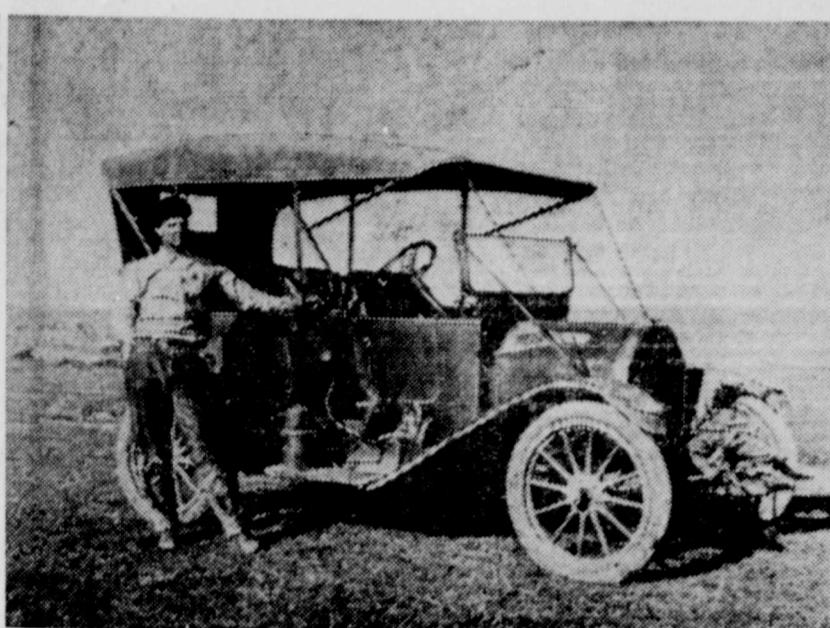
W. T. Landers learned to run the engine, served as engineer on threshing runs all over the west part of Hale County. Wheat fields were pretty scattered, but there was millet, cane and maize, also kaffir to be threshed. Running Water Draw was good enough to run them, at least in places and one of these places was west of Plainview in the vicinity of Running Water.

Here alfalfa was grown rather extensively at it was sub-irrigated, along the draw. The draw had its drawbacks though. At times it was impossible to cross just any place with a load and this threshing outfit had at times to travel several miles to find a place hard enough to cross. At two miles per hour this took considerable time and water.

After reaching Plainview the railroad stopped construction for about three years and all freight and supplies were hauled by freight wagons drawn mostly by horses and mules, and in one instance by oxen. One man trailed several wagons behind a steam tractor from Plainview to Lubbock but did not see fit to make but the one trip. The Landers were just about on the line from Plainview to Lubbock and about one day haul from Plainview.

They fenced a piece of ground so freighters could turn their horses out at night to graze and feed. They sold feed they had raised and bought feed to sell to the freighters. As many as 65 horses would be in the pasture at night. The freighters had their own banks and cooking equipment which they carried on a two wheel cart affair. This was built usually on the front axle of a wagon because the wheels were smaller. The bed would spread wide over the wheels for more room. A small stove would be fastened down securely with stove pipe sticking out. There would be two bunks and room for the chuck box. This rig would be coupled to the rear-most wagon. Most outfits used two wagons, and some three, coupled together and the teams all in front. Some four, six, eight, ten, and twelve horse outfits. One man had two twelve-horse outfits, three wagons each. Arrangements of teams were varied as the men's ideas. Four and six horse arrangements were usually two and two or two and two and two. An eight horse outfit would perhaps be two, four and two. Occasionally a six horse arrangement would be three and three. A twelve arrangement might be two, four, four and two or four three.

Freight hauling was big business as Lubbock was building as were towns farther south and southwest and most all lumber was hauled out of Plainview as were most other supplies. This was a one way business though, as most rigs were empty on the trip back to Plainview. Few wagons had beds on them. Lots of lumber was hauled, and this would be arranged across the bottom and up the sides to form a bed for the other goods. Coupling poles

W. T. Landers folks moved to the place now owned by one of the Brewer boys and farmed there for several years, W. T. helping on the farm and working for other farmers and ranchers. He bought a threshing outfit, J. I. Case of course with gasoline tractor and did threshing for others.

In 1917 he rented the farm now owned by Lawrence Amerson and farmed it until 1923. He also married Callie Belcher March 25, 1917. They were married in the Belcher home by a young preacher named E. Y. Dickerson, who was brought in that day by the late I. C. Houston. The wedding took place at 3:00 P. M. and Mr. Houston drove the preacher to Becton afterward.

To go back a little to the time when the railroad came to Abernathy and the first passenger train came through. This was a great occasion and full advantage was taken by many to ride the first train into Abernathy. Callie Belcher and others went to Hale Center, boarded the train for the ride into Abernathy. Trains being scarce on the Plains, this was a real occasion for some young folks as well as older ones.

In 1923 W. T. Landers gave up farming and moved to Clovis where he went to work for the Santa Fe railroad and continued until July 31, 1931. He had served the last four years as wrecker engineer, picking up wrecks all over the plains during the time. Came 1931 and the depression and men laid off everywhere, W. T. Landers returned to the farm he had left in 1923. Later moved to his own farm, now farmed by Wayne Patton.

Wilford Buffe farms the south half of the same section. Somewhere along he acquired a farm up near Dimmitt where he has a tenant farming now. Also he had the good fortune to be one of the heirs of the uncles mentioned earlier who had remained bachelors and acquired considerable land both here and in New Mexico.

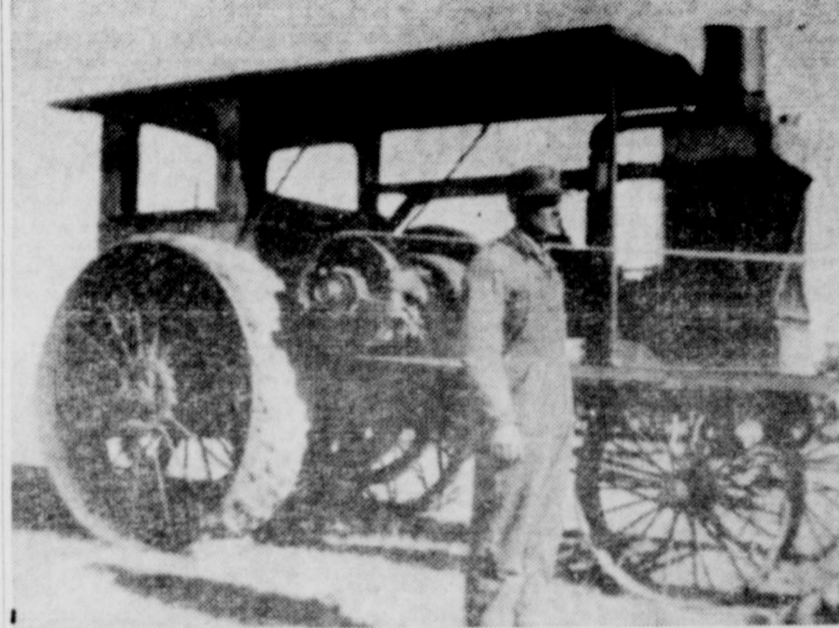

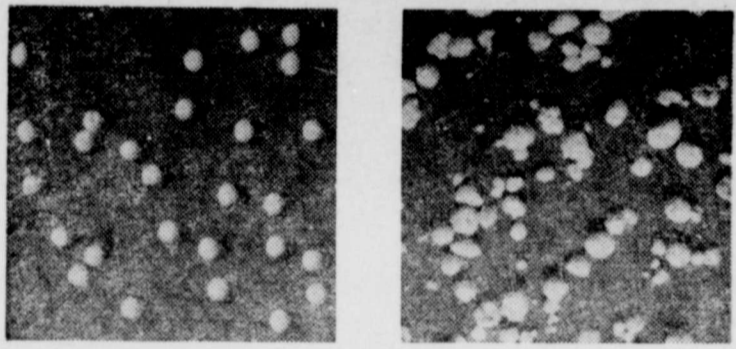

Lubbock Public Schools; Valeria Jordan, first grade teacher; Kendrick Joy, a teacher in Junior High; and Albert Trammell, also a Junior High teacher.

School Policies Changed  
J. W. Solis, High School Principal, met with the School Board and gave a report relative to the Senior Trip to Chicago. The trip, made by 28 Abernathy seniors and eight sponsors, was reported as being a success.

The Abernathy School Board is considering discontinuation of the Senior Trip after 1961. Such action will be in keeping with the policies of other schools of Class AA size, and is due to the expense involved.

The School Board voted to discontinue the annual Junior High School end-of-school picnic due to the undertaking becoming so huge and so involved.

The first three grades in Elementary School will be allowed a one-half day picnic outing on Antelope Field near the close of the school year. The fourth and fifth graders will be allowed a one-half day skating party near the end of school.

It was explained that due to the large number of children involved, it was thought that to the best interest of the children, the new policy was needed.

In other actions regarding school policy, the School Board voted to require final semester examinations in high school and junior high. In effect, this will do away with the exemption plan that was in effect this year. Only seniors in high school, having a 90 or better grade average for the previous seven semesters in high school, will be exempt from the final semester examinations.

An exception of this policy will be granted the seniors of the 1959-60 school year. Those who average 90 or above for the first five 6-week periods will be granted exemptions from the final examinations.
