Jubilee Pageant To Be Presented July 11th

"The Palm Of The Plains"

The forthcoming Abernathy Golden Anniversary Celebration holds in store for the people of the Abernathy community and guests from surrounding towns, entertainment of many forms. One of the outstanding and possibly the most historical form of entertainment will be the pageant which is to take place about 8:30 p. m. Saturday, July 11, on the Abernathy High School football field.

The story of Abernathy from the year 1904 through 1959, covering 55 years of historical events in the Abernathy community. The pageant is divided into prolog and episodes, with the prolog and each episode being sponsored by a local club. A listing of each follows: Prolog—Texas—Sponsored by the 1953 Study Club. Episode One—Entitled "Covered Wagons Moving," is sponsored by the Community 4-H Club. Episode Two—Entitled "Days of

the Pioneers," sponsored by the Study Club. Episode Three—"A Town Is Born," sponsored by the Home Maker, Hobby Club. Episode Four—"The Town Grows," covering the period of 1910 through 1919; sponsored by the 1954 Women's Club. Episode Five—"Abernathy In The '20's," covering the period 1920 through 1929; sponsored by the Home Demonstration Club. Episode Six—"The Dust Bowl and The Depression," covering the period 1930 through 1939; sponsored by the City Garden Club.

Episode Seven—"The War-Torn '40's," covering 1940 through 1949; sponsored by the Country Garden Club. Episode Eight—"The Palm of The Plains," covering the period 1950 through 1959; sponsored by the Abernathy Music Club. According to Mrs. A. B. Reid, who has spent many hours of research to compile year to year history of Abernathy and then written the script, there are approximately 250 people cast in the pageant. It was also stated that casting is not complete, as changes and additions will be necessary.

A casting committee was selected from members of the various clubs of Abernathy to select the members or participants of the pageant. This committee, made up of Mmes. Frank Lovelace, Thomas Conner, Marvin Struve, Doyle Oswald, Billy Frank, Skipper, J. C. Mills, Ray Pinson, C. S. Shipman, W. A. Covey, Billy Shipman, Doyle Smith, Dwayne Saylor, Bruce Brightbill, Chris Benn, Millard Hancock, Floyd Mooneyham and R. A. McAllister, have been meeting in the home of Mrs. A. B. Reid. Careful consideration and selec-

tions have been made by this committee in an effort to have as many families, especially pioneer families, of the entire community represented in this pageant. The music for the pageant will be furnished by the Abernathy High School Antelope Band, under the direction of Dub Crain, with Clyde Rhodes at the organ. An all-church choir is planned, with members of the choir from all local churches and the Lakeview and County Line churches being asked to participate. Choirs from the following churches have been asked to participate: First

Methodist Church, First Baptist Church, Church of Christ, Northside Baptist Mission, Church of The Nazarene, Assembly of God Church, Bethal Baptist Church, Lakeview Methodist Church, Lakeview Baptist Church, and County Line Baptist Church. The all-church choir will be under the direction of Woodie Coleman. The pageant is to be narrated by Dr. John Hale and Noel Johnson. Several committees have been appointed in order that all phases of the pageant may be worked out thoroughly and smoothly. The committees are as follows: Production—Noel Johnson, Mrs. Roy Figley and Mrs. Andy Reid. Costumes—Mrs. Frank Lovelace and Mrs. Ray Pinson. Music—Woodie Coleman, Dub Crain and Clyde Rhodes. Staging—Rudolph Struve, Jack Saari, Carroll Turpen and Cecil McCurdy. Lighting—Willie Florence and Melvin Rape. The Abernathy Riding Club has voluntarily accepted the responsibility of furnishing or making arrangements for all the stock to be used in the pageant. As you may realize, this pageant will be one of the major highlights of Abernathy's Golden Jubilee Celebration, and it will surely be talked about for years to come. It is definitely an event you will not want to miss.

Luncheon Meeting At the regular noon luncheon Tuesday, June 9, program chairman, David Pinson, gave a brief introductory talk about Abernathy being the export center for a very unique type of industry. He then turned the program over to Arno and Horton Struve.

Arno explained that the new industry is the production of double-leverage float valves for water tanks. His industry is located approximately 1 1/2 miles east of Abernathy.

The double-leverage float valve was developed by W. A. Higginbotham, who at that time lived in Burleson, near Ft. Worth, and he called this valve the Burleson Valve. He later sold the industry to two men in Ft. Worth because of poor health.

The industry was then purchased by the Arno Struves about a year ago and was moved to Abernathy.

Horton, Arno's son, presented a very interesting and descriptive demonstration of the process of molding the valves. Slide pictures were then shown of the actual operations, with details being related by both Arno and Horton. An invitation was extended to anyone wishing to watch the pouring of the metal into the molds, or other operations of the process. The metal is poured twice daily: just before noon, the best time to be there; and just before "quitting time."

Lubbock County Farm Bureau Queen's Contest Slated July 16

The Lubbock County Farm Bureau will hold its annual Farm Bureau Queen's Contest in Lubbock on July 16. This is the first step toward the State Contest, of which the winner and matron escort will be allowed \$500 expenses to the American Farm Federation Convention in Chicago, Illinois, this December.

Following the procedure of the contest, communities will select the community queen, who will then participate in the county contests. The winners of the county contests will then participate in the various district contests. Then, the winners of each district contest will attend the State Farm Bureau Convention where the final winner becomes the Texas Farm Bureau Queen of 1959.

This is an honest-to-goodness Queen's Contest. The girls are to be judged on grace, poise, charm, vivaciousness, and all the other qualities that go to make up winning future homemakers. There are three main points on which they will be judged; namely (1) appearance, (2) poise, (3) personality. Eligibility To be eligible for this contest, each contestant must be a daughter or sister of a Farm Bureau member actively engaged in agricultural production, and membership should be in the county of participation. Each contestant must be single and between the ages of 16 and 22 (16 by September 1, 1959, and not over 22 by September 1, 1959). Daughters of state directors, all employees, county presidents, and secretaries, and previous state winners are not eligible to enter this contest. All district winners and an attendant for each will receive an expense paid trip to the state convention. Also, each district queen will receive a beautiful watch. Contestants must sign up for the Lubbock Farm Bureau Queen Contest not later than July 14.

Residents of nearby Bartonville moved their homes and business houses to Abernathy when the railroad bypassed their community and a post office was established on January 13, 1910.

The people of Abernathy are celebrating the 50th anniversary of the City's establishment July 10-12, 1959.

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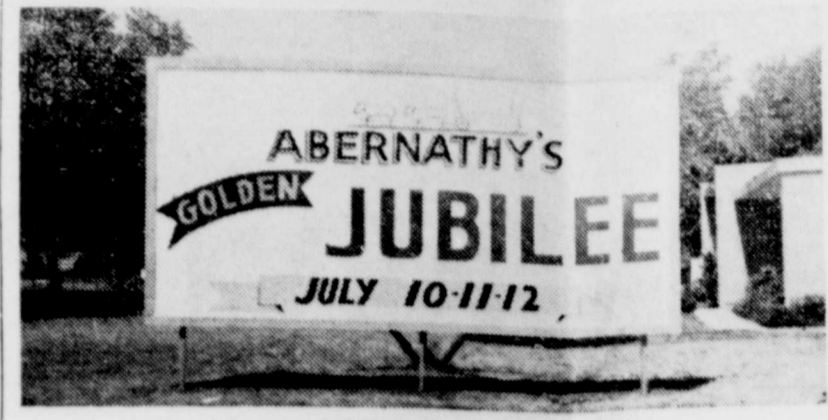
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**Seniors Report Enjoyable

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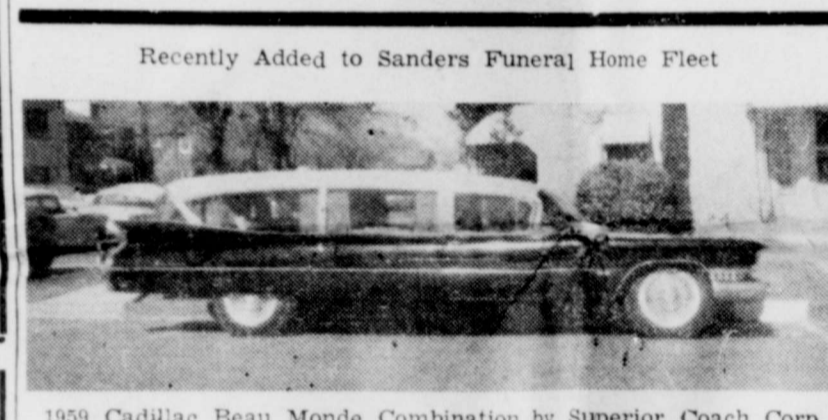

They were guests on the Don McNeil Breakfast Club, viewed the movie "South Sea Adventures," which was in cinerama; took a boat ride on Lake Michigan, visited the Science and Industries Building, and visited the Prudential Building, a building that is 47 stories high.

Six of the Abernathy seniors were heard by home folks on the Don McNeil Breakfast Club, Rich and DuBose got on the program and because he was a math genius, and Billie Houston got to be on the program because she was the steady of the math genius. James Blalock and Don Jones were on the program because they thought they would make good husbands, and Suzan Benn and Scott Mooneyham were on because they had something unusual to say about their home town.

While in Chicago, the group got a glimpse of Skid Row, probably the most interesting sight on the tour. The group ate all meals at the Forum, a cafeteria across the street from the Morrison.

The Abernathy group checked out of the Morrison Hotel at noon Thursday, May 28, and took a day tour of Chicago before leaving for St. Louis to get some fresh air and sunshine.

After arriving in St. Louis Wednesday night about 10:00 o'clock, the Abernathians checked into the Sheraton-Jefferson Hotel and hit the hay to prepare for the busy day ahead.

In St. Louis, they saw the courthouse in which the slave Dred Scott, whom the Supreme Court finally denied freedom because the High Tribunal ruled that slaves were property, was first brought to trial.

While in the city of St. Louis the group also visited a showboat, the Forrest Park, one of the largest parks in the world; and took a ride on the roller coaster.

Also, the ex-seniors passed by the Budweiser Beer Company, "manufacturers of the world's leading beer." While passing by the huge beer company it was pointed out by the guide that St. Louis is one of the beer drinking cities in the world. The average St. Louisan consumes 50.2 gallons of beer per year, so said the guide.

While visiting in Forrest Park, the group took in a monkey show and visited the park's zoo.

The Abernathy group checked out of the hotel in St. Louis at 4 p. m. Thursday evening, went to the depot, had pictures made, and, after waiting for about thirty minutes, boarded the train for Kansas City, the town where all of the crazy little women are.

Unfortunately, the stay at Kansas City was not long enough for anyone to get to meet any crazy little women. After about a two hour lay over, the group again boarded the train for their next stop, Amarillo, Texas.

The group spent Thursday night on the train again, and everyone had their last good game of poker and dominoes before arriving in Amarillo at noon the next day.

At Amarillo, the group boarded a school bus, brought down by the bus foreman and headed back for Abernathy, concluding one of the busiest weeks ever experienced by the former seniors.

NEBUCHADNEZZAR'S DREAM?

In about 606 B. C. Nebuchadnezzar, king of Babylon, had an unusual dream. When he awoke from his sleep, the pagan monarch could not recall the dream (Daniel 2:5). After the Chaldean wise men, magicians, astrologers, and so on, proved unable to help the king, Daniel, a captive Jew and worshipper of the true and living God of heaven and earth, told the heathen ruler what he had dreamed, and gave him its interpretation.

The Dream
Daniel told Nebuchadnezzar that God had chosen to make known to him some things that would come to pass in the latter days (Daniel 2:28-29). The king had seen a great image with a head of gold, breast and arms of silver, belly, and thighs of brass, and feet of iron and clay. Then he saw a stone, cut out without hands, strike the image upon its feet and destroy it. The stone went on to become a great mountain filling the earth.

The Interpretation
Daniel said to Nebuchadnezzar: "Thou art this head of gold" (2:38). He went on to say that afterwards would rise another kingdom inferior to his, then a third kingdom, followed by a fourth. And then: "And in the days of those kings shall the God of heaven set up a kingdom which shall never be destroyed." (Dan. 2:44).

Thus, four kingdoms of men were to arise, and somewhere during this time God would choose to set up His own kingdom on the earth. The Bible reveals the first kingdom as the Babylonian under Nebuchadnezzar (2:38). From history we learn that the kingdom of the Medes and Persians under Cyrus and Darius became the second kingdom in 538 B. C. The third world power was the Greek under Alexander the Great in 331 B. C. (See also Daniel 7:20-21). Then the fourth kingdom was the Roman empire which had its first Caesar in 31 B. C., and came to an end in 476 A. D.

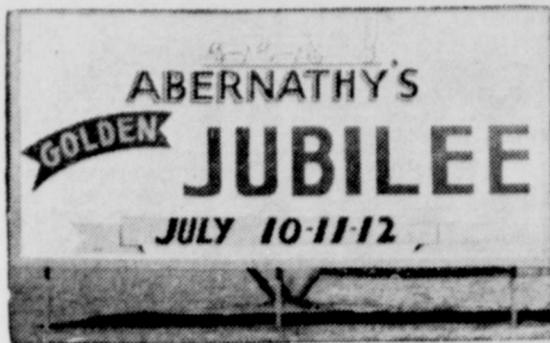
Air and ground forces were launched against aggressor forces involving the newly-redesigned helicopter assault carrier USS Princeton from which attacking troops launched assaults at inland targets, in the latest employment of the Corps' vertical envelopment doctrine. The two-week maneuver was the most extensive air-ground landing exercise to be conducted on the Southern California Coast since 1957.

A statewide study made last year through the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council on farm and ranch accidents showed that the number of accidents starts to increase with the step-up in production activities. Farmers and their families are urged by the Council not to take chances which can lead to crippling accidents or even fatalities. An accident now could cause a delay in farming activities and result in a crop failure and other serious economic losses. It is just good farm management, points out the Council, for every agricultural producer to practice farm safety.

Statistics covering farm accidents rise with the temperature, points out the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council. The reason — farm activities hit a seasonal peak and very often due to the rush required to keep up with a farm job, some farmer or family members become careless. That is when another statistic goes into the record books, warns the Council.

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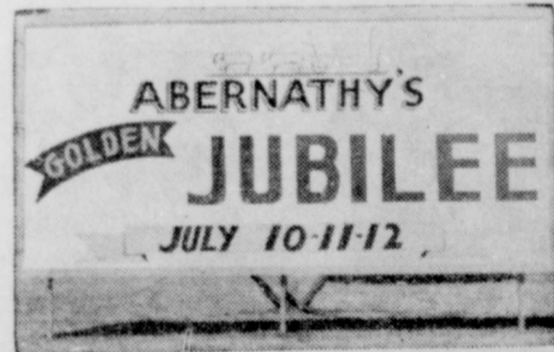

When the route was changed, and the town of Abernathy was founded in July, 1909, many of the buildings were moved from the town of Barton to Abernathy.

Legal Notice

ORDINANCE NO. 85
AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE KEEPING OF DOGS IN THE CITY OF ABERNATHY; PROVIDING FOR A LICENSE AND TAX; PROVIDING FOR THE VACCINATION OF DOGS; PROVIDING FOR A DOG POUND; PROVIDING FOR THE REDEMPTION OF DOGS AND THE DISPOSAL THEREOF IF NOT REDEEMED; AND PROVIDING FOR THE VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ABERNATHY, HALE AND LUBBOCK COUNTIES, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. Providing for Dog Tax and Vaccination; That there is hereby levied and assessed upon each dog, male or female, kept or owned within the City of Abernathy, Texas, an annual tax of \$2.00 on each male dog and \$3.00 on each female dog, which tax is to be due and payable on the first day of January of each year, and it is hereby made the duty of the owner or keeper of any dog, male or female, to pay over to the City Clerk or his duly authorized agent the said tax on or before the first day of January.

SECTION 2. The City Clerk shall collect or have collected under his supervision all dog taxes, and he may employ a special officer to be known and designated as the Animal Warden, whose duty it shall be to carry out the terms and provisions of this Ordinance and the City Clerk shall be authorized to pay unto the Animal Warden a commission on all dogs impounded the amount of \$1.00 per head. The City Clerk shall be responsible to the City of Abernathy for all moneys collected under this Ordinance and shall make monthly reports in writing of all moneys collected under this Ordinance to the City Council and shall deposit with the City Treasurer all moneys collected at least once a month.

SECTION 3. Upon the payment of said tax, the City Clerk, or his duly authorized agent shall furnish the owner or keeper of said dog or dogs with a tag on which is stamped the number of registration with the year for which tax is paid, which tag the owner or keeper shall attach to a collar securely fastened around the neck of such dog, male or female, and no dog shall be allowed to run at large without the proper tag attached to the collar around the neck of said dog. In no event shall the City Clerk, or his duly authorized agent issue a license tag to any owner or keeper of a dog, male or female, unless and until such owner or keeper shall furnish a vaccination certificate issued by a licensed veterinarian stating that such dog or dogs have been vaccinated against rabies by him.

SECTION 4. All dogs within the City of Abernathy, Texas, are hereby required to be vaccinated against rabies by some licensed veterinarian on or before January First, and each year thereafter and it is further provided herein that every veterinarian who vaccinates any such dog, either male or female, within the City of Abernathy, Texas, shall collect his fee for same from the owner of the dog and shall issue a certificate of vaccination to such owner, stating the name of the owner, a brief description of the dog, the date of vaccination and the fee collected by him for same; provided, however, that the fee charged by such veterinarian for such vaccination certificate shall not in any case exceed the sum of Five (\$5.00) Dollars.

SECTION 5. If shall be the duty of the Animal Warden or his authorized agent to capture and impound in a pen to be provided by the City Engineer of said City for that purpose, and called the Animal Shelter and any dog, female or male, found running at large within the City of Abernathy, Texas, without a tag as provided for under the terms of this ordinance and if such dog, male or female, is not redeemed and reclaimed and taken from said shelter within the time required under the provisions of this ordinance then the Animal Warden shall advertise said dog for sale twenty-four hours by posting one notice of said sale at the door of the city hall, which notice shall give the time and place of sale and shall, if not redeemed, sell said dog, male or female at public auction, and if no one shall bid upon the same, the amount of charges due on said dog, the said dog shall be killed by the Animal Warden or his duly authorized agent.

SECTION 6. (a) The owner and keeper of any dog or dogs captured or impounded under the provisions of this ordinance shall be permitted and allowed at any time within forty-eight hours after such dog or dogs shall have been impounded, to redeem, reclaim, and again receive permission of said dog or dogs, upon payment to the City Clerk or his duly authorized agent, the sum of One (\$1.00) Dollar per day or fractional part thereof during which time said dog or dogs may have been impounded for every such dog so impounded which sum so paid to him shall be deposited with the City Treasurer for the use and benefit of the City, as well as all other money received by him under the terms of this Ordinance.

(b) Should the owner or keeper of said dog or dogs, male or female, fail to redeem the same as provided for in paragraph (a) of this section within the forty-eight hours then said dog or dogs shall be advertised and sold or killed in the manner provided for in this ordinance. It shall be the duty of the City Clerk and duly authorized Animal Warden to see that the terms of this Ordinance are strictly enforced, provided, however, that terms of this Ordinance shall not be applicable to dogs following Countrymer, into the City.

SECTION 7. The Animal Warden and any policeman of this City shall have the right to shoot or kill any rabid dog or dogs in the streets; which shall manifest a disposition to bite. It shall be a violation of this ordinance for the owner or keeper of a female dog or dogs, to allow such dog or dogs to roam at large while such dog or dogs, are in heat. The Animal Warden or any duly authorized agent shall have the right to impound any female dog, or dogs, found roaming at large while such dog, or dogs, are in heat.

SECTION 8. That any person who shall willfully take from any dog a collar or tag shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not to exceed One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars.

SECTION 9. Any person violating any provision of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not exceeding Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars.

SECTION 10. This Ordinance shall be in force from and after its publication and the City Secretary is hereby directed to publish same.

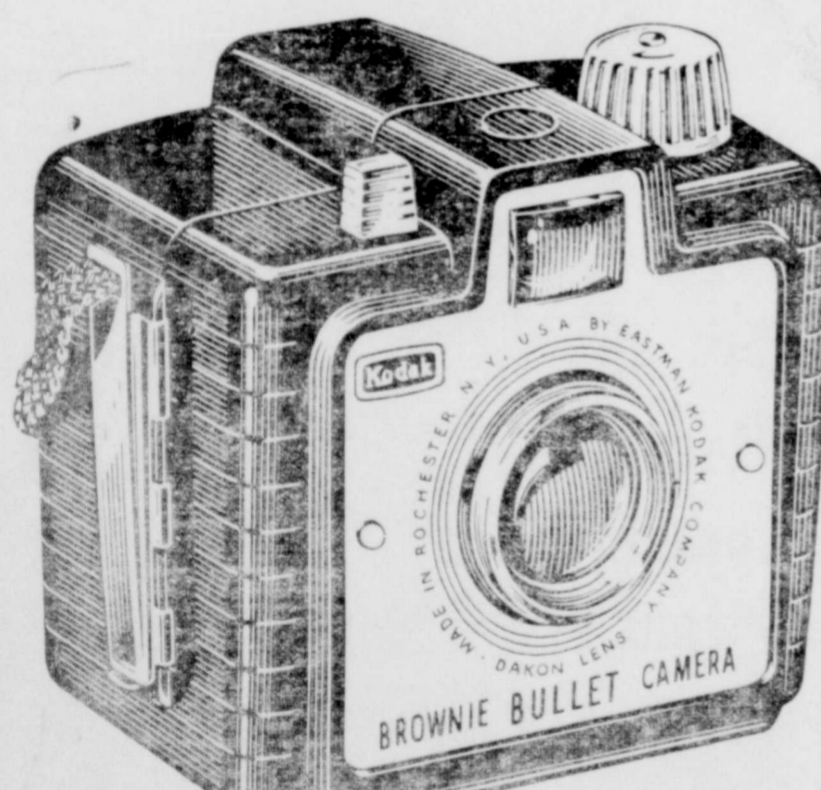

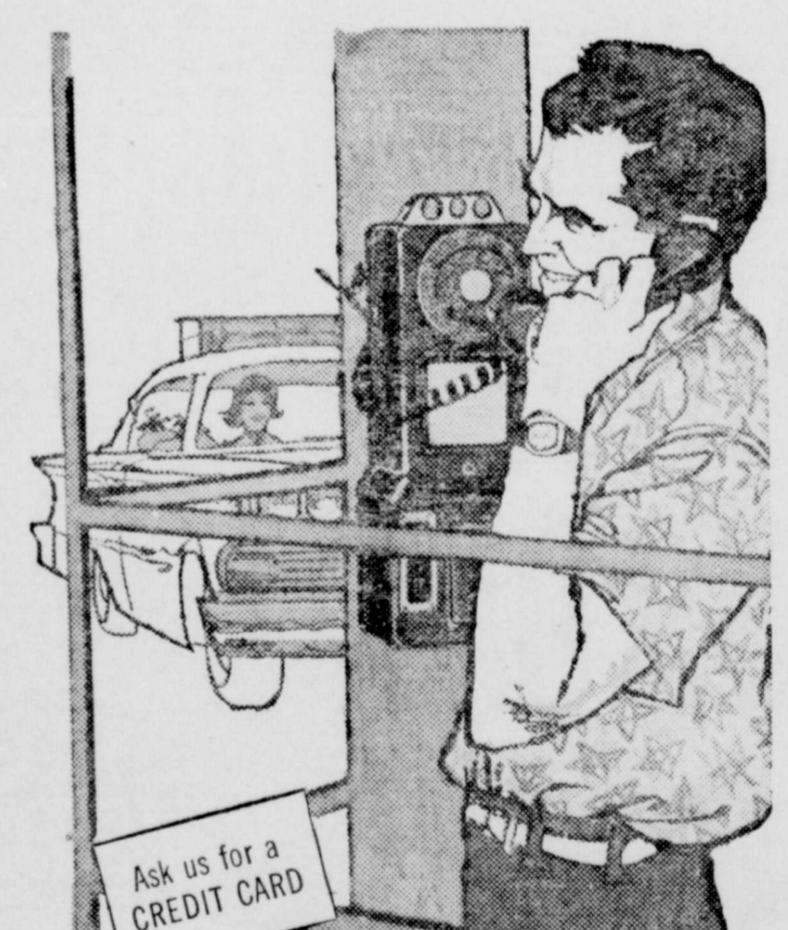

Tornado Warning System

In a joint announcement, Edwin Crow, chief of Abernathy Volunteer Fire Department, and Mayor Edgar Graham identified the various fire siren alarms.

The officials said one long blast of the fire siren on the second and fourth Tuesday nights will be to call firemen to practice sessions.

When there is a fire, the siren will sound a series of long blasts.

When the fire siren is used to sound warning that a tornado is approaching Abernathy there will be two six-second blasts, followed by a 12-second blast. This series of two short blasts followed by a long blast will continue until ample warning is sounded by the siren.

Night warning on tornadoes approaching will be handled by the telephone operator and volunteer firemen. When the night telephone operator is advised of a tornado approaching, she will call a member of the fire department nearest the fire station and he will start the series of siren blasts.

Officials asked that local residents not call the telephone office to find the location of a fire after the siren sounds for that purpose. A policy of the company forbids the operators giving this information to anyone except members of the volunteer fire department.
