



Col. Albert L. Holcomb Named Deputy Director

Wheat Referendum, Producer Board Election Slated Tuesday, May 11th

Col. Albert L. Holcomb, who won the Silver Star for a helicopter rescue mission in Southeast Asia, has been named deputy director of Supply for Headquarters Air Force Communications Service, Richard-Gebaur AFB, Mo.

Before coming to the global command headquarters, Col. Holcomb of Waco Texas, had been commander of the 37th Aerospace Rescue and Recovery Squadron, DaNang Air Base, Republic of Vietnam. He won the Silver Star for rescuing a downed Marine A-4 Skyhawk pilot with his HH-53 Super Jolly Green Giant helicopter despite intense enemy ground fire.

As deputy director of Supply for this global communications command, Col. Holcomb will play an important role in the command's mission of engineering, installing and maintaining communications-electronics facilities for the Air Force. The command also is responsible for the operation of long-haul intercontinental and on-base communications, air traffic control and navigational aid facilities and services for the Air Force and selected government and civilian agencies.

A 1943 graduate of Haskell (Texas) High School, Colonel Holcomb, a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Holcomb, Haskell, Texas, graduated from pilot training in 1944 as a flight officer. He flew C-46 and C-47 aircraft in the China-Burma-India Theater of operations and in 1948 participated in the Berlin Airlift.

Colonel Holcomb entered the supply field in 1959 when he became the base supply officer at Sculthorpe, England.

Two hundred and fifteen Haskell citizens took advantage of the Mobile X-Ray service here last Thursday, March 18th.

The Christmas Seal Mobile Chest X-Ray Unit of the North Texas TB-Respiratory Disease Unit was stationed at the Courthouse Square between the hours of 12:00 noon and 6:00 p. m.

The visit was open to the public, 15 years of age and over, in search for tuberculosis, emphysema, lung tumor, enlarged heart and other chest diseases. A Wheat Referendum and Producer Board Election will be held on May 11 in 34 counties, including Haskell County, whereby producers of wheat in the designated area vote on a proposition of self assessment not to exceed five mills per bushel for research, market development, disease and insect control and more efficient production and marketing practices for wheat.

The referendum and election will be held in each county by personal balloting. Polls will be open from 8:00 a. m. until 5:00 p. m. on the date of the election. The polling places for all counties will be at the County Courthouse.

Leo Witkowski, of Hereford, TWPA farmer-elected president, said that at the same time of the assessment referendum, an election will be held to elect a 9-member producer board to administer the program and direct the use of funds generated.

Any producer may have his name placed on the ballot for election to the producer board by having his request signed by ten other producers and submitting it to the association thirty (30) days prior to the election.

"I'll Make It To 100," Iron Pearsey Tells His Friends On 96th Birthday

"I'll make it to 100," Iron Pearsey said as friends honored him Wednesday afternoon, March 17th, at the City Floral on his 96th birthday.

The "Come and go" event was attended by 86 persons and the traditional birthday cake and punch was served.

The calendar, of course, revealed that Mr. Pearsey has reached his 96th milestone, but looks not a day over 65.

Born in Star City, Arkansas, he came to Haskell with a brother following the death of his mother, when he was only 10 years of age.

The memory of this man spans many years and covers many events. He even remembers the old Bloody Bucket, which was the name given Haskell's only saloon and was often referred to as the "Road to Ruin" saloon.

The years spent in this area were not without Pearsey's activities. He reportedly rode for several ranches, one of them being the Henry Post Ranch.

Mr. Pearsey married the former Rachel Miller in Haskell, and they reared a family of four children.

Mr. Pearsey is widely known, and many a person who attended the Haskell Public Schools have pleasant and sentimental memories of him. He was employed by the schools for 23 years.

Q— I receive VA compensation for a service-connected disability. Am I also eligible for medication from the VA?
A— Yes, a veteran is eligible for medication from the Veterans Administration if it is required for a service-connected disability.
Q— I have recently been awarded Dependency and Indemnity Compensation as the widow of a veteran killed on active duty. I am also a veteran and have my certificate of eligibility for a VA home loan. May I now obtain two VA home loans—one on my husband's service and one on mine?
A— No. An unmarried widow of a man who died while on active duty or who died from a service-connected disability is eligible for a home loan based on her husband's entitlement, but only if she is not eligible on the basis of her own active service and one on mine?
Q— I have a National Service

Life Insurance Endowment Policy which will mature in six months. Must I take the face value of the policy, or can I convert to another type of insurance?
A— You may exchange it for a policy of lesser cash value if you are in good health. You would receive the difference between the endowment amount and the cash value of the new policy. This must be done, however, before the policy matures.
Q— I want to enter college next summer. Should I advise the VA now, or enroll and advise the registrar of my veteran status at that time?
A— You should inform the VA as soon as possible of your plans to enroll.

Boaters Are Warned Of Spring Dangers

"Spring time in Texas can be a time of great enjoyment for boaters, but it can also bring some special dangers," according to the General Manager of the Texas Safety Association.

Lloyd F. Palmer says the "most significant danger to Texas boaters is the unpredictable nature of spring weather."

Palmer pointed out that sudden storms, along with sudden changes in wind direction and speeds, are the order of the season. The safety executive said that both create serious and potentially dangerous situations for the boater.

"The best advice is to not venture out in a boat if rough weather has been forecast," said Palmer. But he explained that it is not always possible to have advance warning.

"Many is the time a boatsman will set out with sunny skies and calm winds, only to find out two or three hours later that the weather has taken an unexpected turn for the worse. In cases like this," the statewide safety organization leader said, "the only protection a boater has is knowledge of boating safety and the skill to put it to use. At the first sign of rough weather the experienced boater will head for shelter."

HINTS ON DRYING

Do not dry items cleaned at home in anything but water. Articles which have been cleaned or spot treated with drycleaning fluids become fire hazards when put directly into a dryer. Articles containing foam rubber also create a fire hazard in a heated dryer.

When excessive lint accumulates on the dryer lint screen, drying them is lengthened. Clean the screen regularly to help shorten drying time.
