

Rites Wednesday At Hale Center For Mrs. Struve

Funeral services for Mrs. George Struve, 74, pioneer Hale County resident, were conducted

at 2:30 Wednesday afternoon. The rites were at the Hale Cen-ter First Baptist Church. The Rev. Raymond Dyess, Stratford Meth-odist pastor, and the Rev. Charles Gates, pastor of the Hale Center First Methodist Church, officiated. Mrs. Srtuve died at 1:15 Tues-day morning at the Hi-Plains Hos-pital at Hale Center. She had been ill for five weeks.

Mrs. Struve and her late husband moved to the Plains in 1908 soon after their marriage Aug. 10 of that year at Cypress Mill, Texas. They traded horses for two sections of \$2-an-acre land near Hale Center and farmed and ranched the remainder of their active lives. Mr. Struve died in November of last year.

Mrs. Struve was active in home lemonstration work when the proram was introduced many years ago.

She was Olga L. Fuchs and was born July 5, 1885, at Cypress Mill. Survivors are one daughter, Mrs. Tom C. Smith, Olton; three sons, Walter and Eugene Struve, both of Hale Center, and Frank Struve, Olton; three brothers, Bruno and Rudolph Fuchs, both of Mena, Ark., and Emil Fuchs, Johnson City:

Interment was in the Abernathy cemetery.


Celebration Committee **Holds Meet**


