

Local Methodist Church To Have Youth Revival, August 2 - 7

School buses will run the routes at the regular time Monday, August 31. Classes will meet at 8:45 A. M. that day. Lunch will be available in the school lunch room. School buses will start the return trip that afternoon at 2 o'clock. Classes and bus schedules will be on normal, full-day schedule Tuesday, Sept. 1.

There will be no school the following Monday, Sept. 7, which is Labor Day.

Assembly Meeting of all faculty members is set for 4 p. m. Friday, August 28, it was announced by Superintendent Johnson. Then Saturday, August 29, individual

faculty meetings will be held in preparation for the opening of high school, junior high, and the elementary grades.

Miller's Grocery Is Burglarized

Miller's Grocery, located just across the street north of the Nu-Vue Theatre and owned by Mr. and Mrs. A. H. Miller, was burglarized last Wednesday night after entrance was gained through a window near the rear of the building. According to reports, about \$75.00 worth of cigarettes were taken, along with 12 boxes of 22-long rifle shells, 12 boxes of 22-short ammunition, meat cutters, meat cleavers, knives, and possibly a few other items.

The thieves emptied a 25-pound sack of flour on the floor and used the flour sack to carry away the items. The cigarettes and 22 shells were taken from their cartons, and the empty cartons were left on the floor.

Several other items in the store were disturbed but not taken.

Mr. Miller stated that the break-in must have occurred shortly after closing time. Having closed the store about 7 p. m., it was reasoned that entrance must have been gained between then and the time of the light rain, which occurred between 7:15 and 7:30 p. m., since no tracks could be found.

This was the second time in about six weeks that Miller's Grocery has been burglarized.





"DIVISION?"

At the latest count there were some two-hundred fifty religious bodies in the United States. Most of these claim to follow the teachings of Christ and His apostles. Some, however, reject Him as the Son of God in refusing to believe that He was deity in the flesh. Others believing that He is God's Son propose to be followers of Him, but differ in beliefs on how to become followers of Him, and how to serve Him after becoming His follower.

Can all these different beliefs come out of the same Bible that is inspired of God? (II Tim. 3:16, 17). Can the same Bible teach all of these doctrines, or is it that man is just not capable of understanding the Bible alike? These questions should cause every rational person to carefully consider his idea of religion. To say that God has given us a Bible that we are unable to understand and agree on what it teaches, is to reflect upon the intellect of an omniscient God. The answer, then, is that man has refused to let the Bible speak for itself.

In the article entitled "Christian Unity" in the July 21st issue of L.O.C. Magazine, George E. Leonard Jr. quotes Episcopal Bishop Henry Knox Sherrill as follows: "I can't believe that Christ, when He established the church wanted to establish 250 sects. In the mind of God there must be one church." The article dealt with the problem of the religious division found in our world today. Slowly the religious world is realizing the fact that division in religion is wrong. Why is it wrong? Because the Bible condemns division. In John 17:20 Jesus prayed for unity among His disciples, and those who would follow Him later, that is all other true disciples. Jesus promised to build only one church (MY CHURCH) in Matt. 16:18. In Ephesians 1:22, 23, Paul states "And hath put all things under His feet (Christ's) and gave Him to be head over all things to the church, which is His body, the fullness of Him that filleth all in all." Here the church is said to be His body, and in this same book, Eph. 4:4, Paul says there is "ONE BODY," which means there is but one church. Division is condemned by this same apostle in I Cor. 1:10-13. Here the Corinthian people were trying to identify themselves with some men. Some were saying, "I am of Paul; and I of Apollos; and I of Cephas; and I of Christ." They were trying to follow man instead of Christ.

There are hundreds, yea, even thousands who are following a religious body historically known to have been started by man. They are following the creeds and disciplines of men rather than follow the teachings of the New Testament. If Paul condemned the Corinthian people for following apostles, what would he think if he were here today? If you are in a religious body known to have started by man, and are not wearing the name of Christ in honor of Him, consider seriously what the Bible has to say about division. Let God's word be your creed, your guide in all religious matters, and let Christ be the head of the church of which you are a member.




