

Football Workouts For Antelopes Began Monday

Football season is here again! The 1959 football season officially opened for the AHS Antelope squad at 9 o'clock Monday morning when 38 of the local lads put on the pads for their first workout of the 1959-60 school year.

With the workout Monday morning, plus a skull session at 4:00 that afternoon and another workout following thereafter, the Antelopes began their two-day workouts which will continue until school starts.

The first workouts Monday were mainly for conditioning, it was stated by one of the coaches. Curtis W. Davenport, new head football coach will have only six returning lettermen from the 1958 team, which was coached by Royal James and Earl Carter, assistant.

The 1958 Antelope team advanced to the regional playoffs before losing to the Spur Bulldogs, which will be mentored by James this year. Lack of age and experience pose as the greatest obstacles to the Antelope coaching staff. Coach Davenport, along with his assistants, Waydelle Hill and Wayne Preston, will have only three short weeks to get the team in shape for the first game of the season, which will be played at Floydada on Sept. 5, 8:00 o'clock Friday night, Sept. 4.

Even though the 1959 team will have only six returning lettermen, most of the other boys have had some experience, and it is certain that these boys will be in there with a competitive spirit and determination battling for each of the eleven positions.

There were a total of 43 boys who signed up for football this season, stated Pete Wilson, athletic director at AHS. Thirty-eight of these boys reported for workout Monday morning. It was explained by the coaches that the freshmen boys are not required to participate in the workouts with the varsity squad, but those who desire to do so may.

Coach Davenport, who was assistant coach at Howard Payne College the past two years, previously coached for four years at Kermit High School, with two years of junior high coaching at Monahans prior to moving to Kermit.

The new assistant football coach at AHS this year is Waydelle Hill who moved here from Munday, Texas, where he was head football coach last year. Prior to that he was assistant football coach at Childress High School for two years. Coach Hill will also coach the junior high team here.

Wayne Preston, AHS boys' basketball coach, is also assisting as football coach this year.

There are five boys who will be playing their last year of football this season. They include Harold Thompson and Roy Lee Smitherman, senior boys who lettered last season; Billy Joe Smith, senior, a reserve from last year's team; Aubrey Smith, a junior student who lettered last year, but is in his last year of eligibility this year; and Jack Ingram, a senior student who did not play last year.

Returning Lettermen

There will be six returning lettermen from the 1958 bi-district championship team. The returning lettermen are Roy Lee Smitherman, senior; Harold Thompson, senior; Ronald Barrick, junior; Aubrey Smith, senior; John Brown, junior; and Larry Florence, sophomore.

Expected to be outstanding this season is big, 205-pound center Larry (Wee Willie) Florence who saw lots of action last year at center. Others who are expected to shine for the Antelopes include Quarterback John Brown, who will only be a junior and who was reserve for Abernathy's great quarterback Lane Tannahill last year; Harold Thompson, who is probably one of the most versatile athletes on the Antelope squad, playing both in the line and backfield last year; and Aubrey Smith, who was a power horse for the Antelope backfield the past season.

According to a poll by ball of district coaches, Muleshoe has been picked as the top contender in District 2-AAA, with Olton second, Abernathy and Lockney were tied for third according to the vote, and Morton is in the cellar.

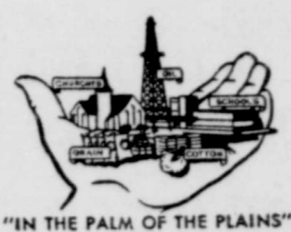

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Baptist Church Recognizes Golden Anniversary Sunday

The New Hope Baptist Church officially moved from the Strip community to Abernathy on August 23, 1959. The history of the local church dates back to August, 1901. The coming Sunday marks the Golden Anniversary of the First Baptist Church in Abernathy. The city of Abernathy preceded the Baptist Church by only one month. The membership of the local church thought it wise to synchronize the anniversary of the church with that of the city.

Three widows of former local Baptist pastors were present for the city's official celebration on July 12 of this year. Mrs. Hembree whose husband was the thirteenth pastor of the church (1919-1921), and Mrs. H. F. Aulich returned for the celebration.

Also present for the celebration were Mrs. C. C. Griffiths, wife of the late C. C. Griffiths (1929-1937). The three former pastors who returned for the celebration are Rev. J. F. Nix, 1939-1947; Rev. Taylor Pendley, 1948-1950; and Dr. C. A. Kennedy, 1951-1955.

It is significant that the North-side Baptist Mission was born fifty years after the mother church. A

Drilling Continues In Local Wildcat

Two drillstem tests at south Hale County's wildcat, Honolulu Oil Corp. No. 1 Martha Schulz, at the west edge of Abernathy, encountered no shows early this week.

The first test, with the tool open 2 hours and 15 minutes and using a 1,500 foot nitrogen blanket, was taken from 10,774-850 feet in the lower Pennsylvania. Recovery was 870 feet of drilling mud and the packer failed. Flow pressure was gauged at 690 pounds and no other pressures were recorded.

The second test was taken from 10,874-959 feet with the tool open two hours and 30 minutes and using a 1,500 foot nitrogen blanket. Recovery was 193 feet of mud. Flowing pressure varied from 770-785 pounds and the 30 minutes shutin pressure was initially 6,985 pounds, and final, 3,040 pounds.

Hole is bottomed at 10,959 feet and the project was reaming out hole to drill ahead.

Previously the operator cored from 10,728 to 10,753 feet. Recovery was 24.5 feet of shale, which was slightly sandy in two small sections.

Before the core was taken, a drillstem test from 10,635 to 10,728

feet, open five hours, recovered 338 feet of 29.5-gravity oil, 90 feet of heavily oil and gas-cut mud and no water.

The section tested was in a sand zone in the Pennsylvania.

Last Wednesday the discovery prospect recovered 2,010 feet of 29.8-gravity oil on a drillstem test from 9,151 to 9,165 feet in an upper Pennsylvania section.

Another Pennsylvania test, from 9,166 to 9,185 feet, open eight hours, surfaced gas in 70 minutes and unloaded approximately 3,200 feet of oil and gas.

Recovery from drippage was 90 feet of slightly oil and gas-cut mud, 1,900 feet of oil, cut with salt water and drilling mud, and 580 feet of salt water.

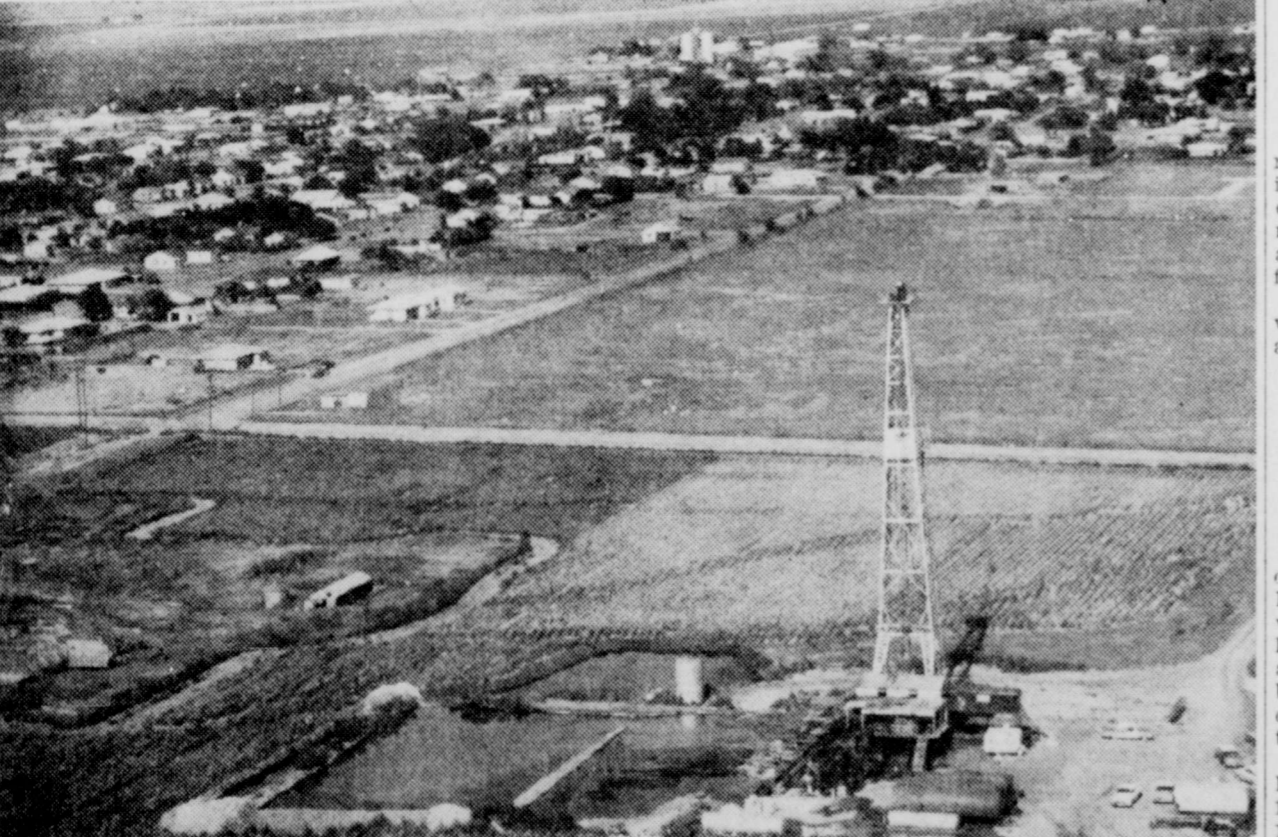
It has been suggested that local people who have movies and slide pictures of the parade show these to the public at a time and date to be set.

Jaycees To Sponsor Third Free Polio Vaccination Drive

The Abernathy Junior Chamber of Commerce will again sponsor a free polio vaccination drive. It has been announced by Dr. Thomas Williams. The free polio vaccinations will be administered by Doctors Williams and Kenneth Gregory between the hours of 1:30 and 4:30 p. m. Thursday, August 27, in the Abernathy City Hall.

It was announced by Dr. Williams that enough vaccine has been received to inoculate at least 1,000 persons. All persons between the ages of two months and 46 years who have not had their shots, or who need to complete the

series of shots, or who need a booster shot, are urged to take advantage of this opportunity. It was explained that polio is not yet on a decreased scale in Texas.

Two such drives have been sponsored this year by the local Jaycees with much success. A total of over 900 local persons have been inoculated against polio due to these two drives.

Transportation to and from the city hall will be furnished by the Abernathy Jaycees to those persons in the city and adjoining area who do not have available transportation for this purpose.

Those who need such transportation may contact Doctors Williams and Gregory, Melvin Raabe, president of the local Jaycees, or any other member of the Abernathy Jaycees.

The First Baptist Church Through The Years

(Continued From Page 1)
The History of The First Baptist Church

The First Baptist Church of Abernathy is fifty years old August 23, 1959. Its history, however, be-

gins eight years earlier, about the beginning of the century. On the third Sunday of August, 1901, several of the pioneer families who had settled in the Homestead Strip some five miles north-east of the present town section,

met and organized a church, The New Hope Baptist Church of Christ. There were eight members at this first meeting. Three others soon joined, making a total of eleven charter members, six men and five women. The original church roll has been lost, but the following were founders: Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Miller, Rev. and Mrs. J. W. Winn, Mr. and Mrs. P. L. Wimberley, Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Turner, Mr. and Mrs. James E. Lutrick and Mr. Stultz. Rev. Quincy Brown was the first pastor. As far as is known, Mrs. Wimberley, now living in Plainview, is the only surviving charter member.

The New Hope Baptist Church of Christ was admitted to the Staked Plains Association in September, 1901 when it met for its eleventh session in Plainview. The Staked Plains Association, according to the minutes, covering a wide territory. "It was bounded on the north by the Fort Worth and Denver Railroad, on the east by the Red Fork Association, on the south by the Texas and Pacific Railroad, and on the west by the providence of God." The newly admitted church reported a membership increase in the first Sunday of each month. Rev. Q. Brown and James E. Lutrick were messengers to the Association. Minutes of the Association for the following year show an increase of membership to twenty-five, with an offering of \$6.25 for missions. Records for the next few years show a slow but steady increase in both membership and offering.

In June of 1906, the new town of Abernathy was officially recognized, and the congregation of the church in the Homestead Strip made a momentous decision.

(The following is quoted from the minutes of The New Hope Baptist Church of Christ.)

"New Hope Baptist Church of Christ met in business session, August 23, 1906. Bro. J. A. Land was elected moderator. Church then went into election of messengers to the Association. Brethren J. T. Lowry, J. M. Turner, and P. L. Wimberley were elected, with A. Landers as alternate. On motion and second, it was decided by unanimous vote to move our place of meeting to Abernathy, and that we change our name to Abernathy Baptist Church. There was no other business. Conference adjourned."

The church moved to Abernathy, and the first meeting, on the last Sunday of August, 1906, was held in a store building owned by W. A. Shelton. The pastor was Rev. J. A. Land, and the first sermon was preached by Rev. B. P. Dixon of Lubbock.

"On Sunday, September 5, 1909, Bro. B. F. Dixon began a meeting with Abernathy Baptist Church, assisted by Bro. J. A. Land. During the week, the following were received for membership: Sister Holloman, Br. and Sister Cooper, Sister Kate Cooper, Sister Clara Cooper, Bro. Clifford Cooper, Sister Durham, and Bro. Dean.

The church having decided to build a meeting house, the following committees were appointed: Soliciting Committee—P. L. Wimberley, John Y. Ligon, Bro. Dean, Miss Kate Cooper, Mr. Holland, and Bro. Horsley; Building Committee—P. L. Wimberley, C. C. Cooper, Mr. Shelton, and Mr. Anderson.

After sermon Sunday night by Bro. J. A. Land, the church by motion and second, decided to go into organization of a Sunday School. Bro. Dean was elected as Superintendent, Miss Kate Cooper, assistant, and Sister Holloman, secretary.

By motion and second, the church by unanimous vote, asked Bro. Dixon to preach for us until permanent arrangements could be made for a pastor."

Quoted from minutes of Abernathy Baptist Church: "The new town on the plains was to see many changes in the next fifty years, and the church which had its beginning with that of the town would experience change while it grew and developed."

Buildings
The building program of the first church organized in Abernathy has seen a remarkable growth in these fifty years of its history. The first building according to a financial statement submitted by W. A. Shelton, cost \$1200.00; of this amount, \$615.45 was subscribed by donations and box supports. The building was erected on the site just north of the present sanctuary. It was completed in August, 1910, and not only the Baptists, but other newly organized congregations as well as the school used the building in its early days.

The second building endeavor

of a brick building to replace the old frame structure. Built in 1929 during the pastorate of Rev. C. C. Griffiths, this building cost approximately \$3000.00. The building committee was composed of E. G. Thompson, G. W. Pool, V. Bennie, Mrs. J. M. Fields, and they, with many of the church members, contributed labor to construct the building. During the process of building, services were held in the old high school auditorium.

By 1948, the congregation had outgrown the possibilities of the 1929 building, and on the property just across the street, a new sanctuary was begun. The cornerstone was laid in 1950 while Rev. Taylor Pendley was the pastor. The building was completed and the first service was held in it on March 11, 1951 by which time Rev. C. A. Kennedy had come to serve as pastor. In 1953, an educational wing was added. In 1953, the church purchased a parsonage on 14th Street, and in 1955, on the site of the old parsonage, a new nursery building was constructed. The latest building project of the church is the Northside Baptist Mission which is nearing completion.

Rev. Joe R. Griffin, our present pastor, came to our church in October, 1955. Under his ministry, the church has built the Nursery, the church for the colored people, and the mission building.

Under the leadership of these twenty and more pastors, our church has grown from its charter membership of eleven in 1901 to 1115 in this anniversary year of 1959.

A number of interim and supply pastors have been a blessing to our church. Our records fail to give us the names of most of them, but one, Rev. George Dale of Lubbock has so endeared himself to our church that he has twice been asked to serve as interim pastor.

Sunday School
The first Sunday School was organized on September 5, 1906. Bro. J. A. Land was the pastor who presided at the meeting, and a Mr. Dean was elected as Super-

intendent, with Miss Kate Cooper (Mrs. A. H. Reed) assistant, and Mrs. Holloman, secretary. In 1916, J. C. Arnett was superintendent. He was followed in 1918 by J. R. Stratton. From 1922 to 1928, A. H. Reed served with L. L. Williams filling the office the following year. Lewis Stambaugh was superintendent of the Sunday School from 1929-1931; L. R. Wilson from 1931-1933; Frank Andrews from 1934-1938; Lewis Stambaugh, 1938-1939; Howard Brown, 1939-1945; Joe Thompson, 1945-1950; W. C. Clement, 1950-1952; Edward Anderson, 1952-1955; Bill Williams, 1955-1957; and Willie Florence, 1957 to the present time. Sunday School enrollment, less than fifty in 1906, is now in 1959, 781.

Training Union
In the first official report of the Training Union, it is noted that 56 were enrolled. There were 4 unions, 1 adult, 1 Intermediate, and 2 Junior. In 1940, the enrollment had increased to 130. The first Training Union Director whose name was listed as Miss Imogene Cotton (Mrs. Cecil Emerson). She was followed in 1942 by Mrs. L. H. Batton. Mrs. Jimmie Bruce served from 1942-1945. From 1945 until the present time, the following have been directors: Mr. J. L. Johnson, W. C. Clement, R. S. Lutrick, W. T. Settle, L. J. Hager, Gene McMaster and Leon Hokett.

Clerk
The first church clerk was P. L. Wimberley, who was elected when the church was organized in 1901. He was followed by J. H. Letsinger who served two years. Mr. Wimberley was then re-elected and remained in office until 1918. J. R. Stratton became clerk in 1918 and served until 1923 when he was succeeded by Lewis Stambaugh who served, except for one year, 1924 when Mrs. Bertha McLaughlin held the office until 1931. From 1931 until the present time, the following have held the office of church clerk: Edwin Hardesty, E. L. Keene, W. H. Brown, Mrs. Jack Hackley, J. L. Ellison, Olin Anderson, James I. O'Neill, W. T. Settle and Harold Reese. W. T. Settle, the clerk at present, is holding the office for the second time.

Treasurers
In the early history of our church, the office of treasurer was held by three members, the pastor, Rev. Q. Brown, the clerk, P. L. Wimberley, and a deacon, J. H. Letsinger. This committee was put in charge of "The Treasury Box" and authorized to use the contributions as directed by the church.

No other record of a treasurer is found until 1925 when W. H. Crow is named. He was followed in 1927 by E. G. Thompson who served until 1933. J. J. Riley was treasurer on year; G. G. Crow, two years; Authur Crow, four years; M. H. Rankin, two years; M. L. Seay, five years; Levi Pettit, three years; and B. F. Skipper from 1952 until the current year. From a financial program of \$86.15 for all causes in 1903, our church budget has increased

to a total of approximately \$85,000 in 1959.

Woman's Missionary Union
The records of our church show The Ladies' Mission Union, forerunner of the Woman's Missionary Union, to have been organized in 1911 by Mrs. Luther Crow. It was authorized October 9, 1911 to arrange to have a stove put in the church house. In 1915, Mrs. J. R. (Aunt Ida) Herral was the president. By 1918, with a church membership of 140, there were thirty members in the organization led by Mrs. R. M. Hardesty. In 1925 Mrs. Herral again served as president, with Mrs. J. B. McCroly following her in 1926. In 1928, Mrs. J. M. Fields became president. In that year, the coming building program challenged the church, and the thirty-seven women went to work. By quilting, selling chickens, serving dinners, and pulling bolls, the women gave \$120.00 on the parsonage, and over \$200.00 to the church building fund. Mrs. C. C. Griffiths followed Mrs. Fields and carried on the effort to raise funds during these depression years. In 1932, Mrs. W. H. Crow took up the work. From 1933, the following women have served as president of the W. M. U.: Mrs. J. V. Crow, Mrs. Oscar Arterburn, Mrs. Frank Andrews, Mrs. W. W. Hardesty, Mrs.

C. B. Reeder, Mrs. A. E. Reid, Mrs. Evelyn Hays, Mrs. J. M. Fields, Mrs. Frank Lovelace, Mrs. J. C. Veach, Mrs. Lee Roy Smith, Mrs. Ralph Davis, Mrs. W. C. Clement, Mrs. Roy Matthews, Mrs. Joe Griffin, and Mrs. B. F. Skipper.

Brotherhood
The Brotherhood was organized in 1951 during the pastorate of Rev. C. A. Kennedy. W. H. Ray was the first president, Buck Cecil, and the present leader, L. G. Hall. The regular meeting of the Brotherhood is the first Tuesday evening of each month, but a Saturday morning prayer breakfast, started at the suggestion of Rev. Joe Griffin has had a steady attendance and has become a major interest to the men of the church. Projects of the Brotherhood have included the construction of a modern church building for the colored people of our community and a \$50 per month salary supplement to the pastor of a church in Colorado.

Music
Prior to the year 1931, we find no record of musicians. Mr. A. B. Reid began his work as choir director in 1931 and served faithfully for twenty-one years. In 1952, Dr. Shelby Collier of

He was followed by Kenneth Coffey who served one year.

In February 1957, Mr. Leon Hokett began his work as our first Minister of Music and Education and still serves in this capacity.

Mrs. M. Z. Holand, whose service included more than twenty-one years, is the first pianist on record. Following her were: Mrs. L. J. Hager, Joe Abston, Miss Yvonne Hager, Miss Freda O'Neill and our present pianist, Mrs. W. C. Clement.

Since 1952, Mrs. L. J. Hager has served as organist.

Licensed To Ministry

This church has licensed four ministers of the gospel. Herbert Brown, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Brown, was called to preach during the pastorate of Bro. W. A. Reed. He is the pastor of the East Avenue Baptist Church of Austin, Texas, at the present.

Max Pettit, son of Mr. and Mrs. Levi Pettit, surrendered for foreign service in 1946, just after his graduation from high school. He served as a missionary in China, Philippine Islands, and Formosa, before going to Oakridge, Oregon to work in the mission field in the West where he is at present.

Sig Lutrick was licensed by this church in 1952. He attended Grand Canyon College in Phoenix, Arizona and as a student did mission work with the Indian people. He and his wife are now working with youth in a small mission church in Phoenix.

Jim Reid, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. B. Reid, now a student at Wayland College, was licensed by our church in October, 1958.

Through The Years

As we look backward into the beginning years of our church, we see how the foundation was laid for the church as we know it today. Time has brought changes and progress.

The board of deacons has grown from the one deacon mentioned in the minutes of 1902 to 24 in 1953.

The "Treasury Box" system of church finances in 1903 has be-

come a planned budget, administered by a finance committee.

The offering for Buckner's Orphans' Home which in 1903 was \$10.15 is now a part of the Cooperative Program which supports all phases of Baptist work.

The Old Ministers' Relief, the offering for which in 1903 was \$12.15, is now a plan by which the pastor and church jointly provide for the pastor's retirement.

The New Hope Baptist Church of Christ which asked the State Mission Board for a \$50 per year supplement on the pastor's salary, now contributes to the salaries of pastors in a mission field.

The church which met only once each month, and often missed that meeting due to bad weather, now has a regular program of weekly activities.

The Sunday School which was organized in 1910 with three officers and three classes now has 83 officers and 48 classes.

The church of one building valued at \$1490.00 in 1910 has grown into an organization housed in five buildings with a valuation in excess of \$300,000.00.

It would be speculation to try to imagine what dreams of the future were held by that little band of eleven Baptists who met on that August day of 1901 and organized our church. Their service and devotion has borne fruit in the lives of the many others who, across the more than fifty years, have made their contributions of time, talent, and money to the growth of this church. This golden anniversary of our organization as a church, gives us today, an opportunity to express to those who have gone before our appreciation for their sacrifice and service.

Most of all, we recognize, with grateful hearts, that God has marvelously blessed these people. "Hitherto hath the Lord led us." May we continue to follow His leadership.

TIME TO CLAIM REFUND ON FARM-USED GASOLINE

College Station—Farm operators have until September 30 to claim a refund of the federal gasoline tax on all gasoline used on the farm, according to Tom E. Prater, extension farm management specialist.

The refund applies to the three cents per gallon federal tax on gasoline which was purchased July 1, 1958, through June 30, 1959. Those who filed a claim for refund in 1958 will receive form 2249 through the mail. Others who wish to make a claim should ask the Internal Revenue Service to send them one.

The claim should be sent to the Office of the District Director, Internal Revenue Service, Austin or Dallas, Texas, depending on whether you live in the southern or northern part of Texas. Claims made after September 30 will not be paid and no more than one claim can be filed for the twelve-month period, states the economist.

Farmers who file claims for refund should keep sufficient records to certify the accuracy of the refund claimed. The records should show the purchase dates, the gallons bought and the gallons used on the farm during the twelve-month period. Also, the gasoline used by custom operators

doing custom work for a farmer should be recorded and can be included in the claim for refund. Prater notes.

Excise taxes paid on diesel fuel or special motor fuels for farm purposes can also be recovered. The farmer should ask the dealer to repay the taxes on the fuel bought. The dealer should be furnished a signed statement, showing the name and address of the purchaser, the date of purchase and gallons purchased, adds Prater.

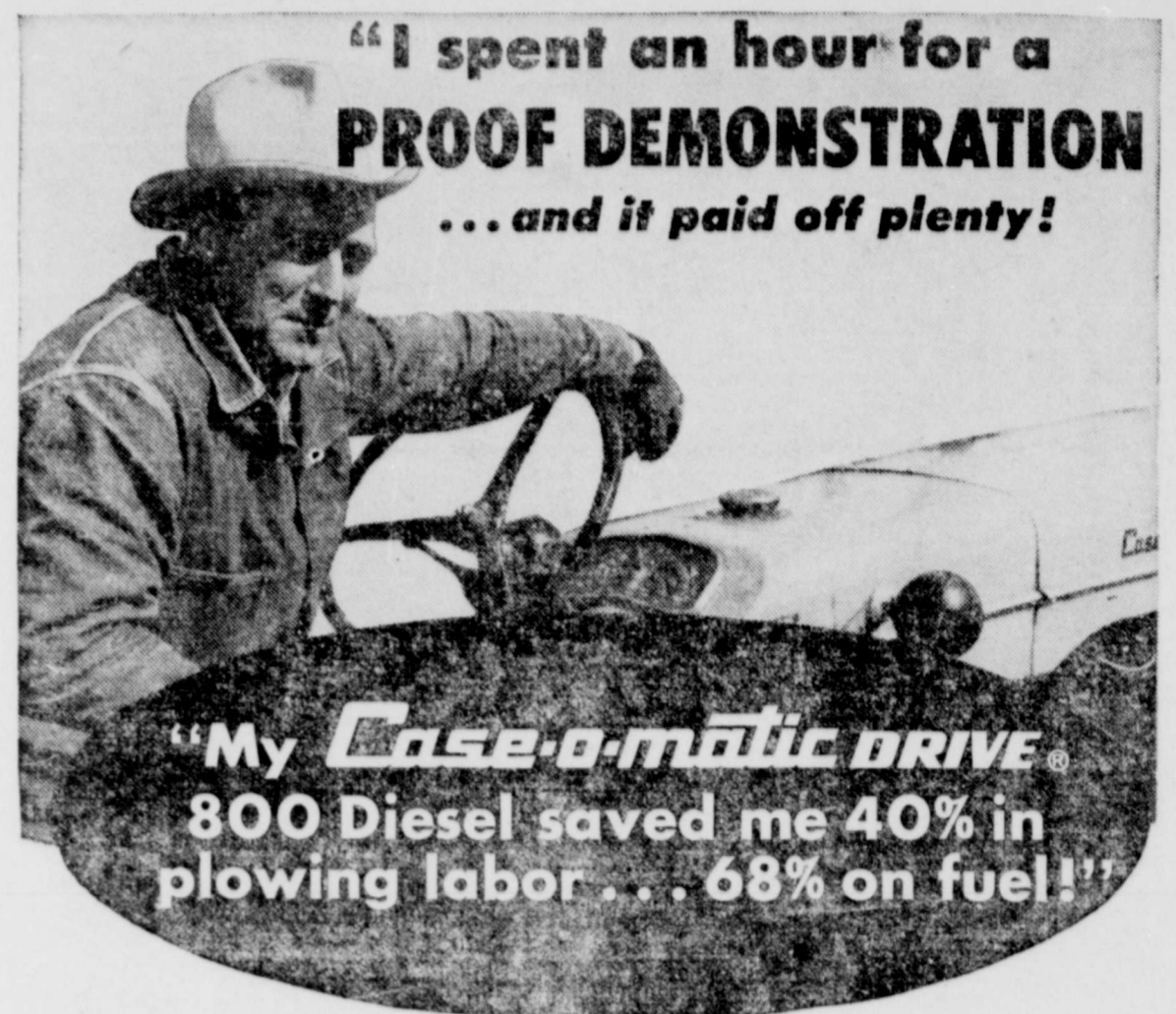

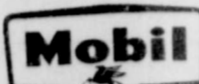

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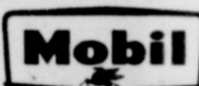

HAPPENINGS AROUND THE SCHOOL CAMPUS

A new football clock and scoreboard was erected Saturday at the south end of the football field. The new scoreboard, a Na-den 1-4 (the same as the previous one), has been erected to replace the one that was blown down and severely damaged by a windstorm last April.

The scoreboard was covered by insurance, with a "life expectancy" of 20 years. Having had the scoreboard three years, the insurance company figured that it had depreciated 3/20th of its original value. Thus, the company paid 17/20ths of the original value toward replacing the scoreboard.

A change has been made to the goal post uprights at the football field due to a change in the 1959 N. C. A. A. Rules for 11-man high school football.

The uprights above the cross bars have been extended to a width of 23 feet, 4 inches (measuring from inside to inside).

The new rule governing this change states: "Each goal shall consist of two uprights extending 20 feet above the ground with a connecting horizontal cross bar, the top of which is 10 feet above the ground. Above the cross bar the uprights shall be 23 feet, 4 inches apart, inside to inside, and not more than 24 feet apart, outside to outside."

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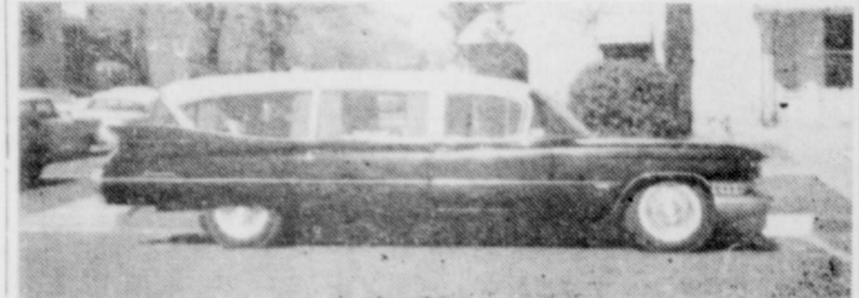

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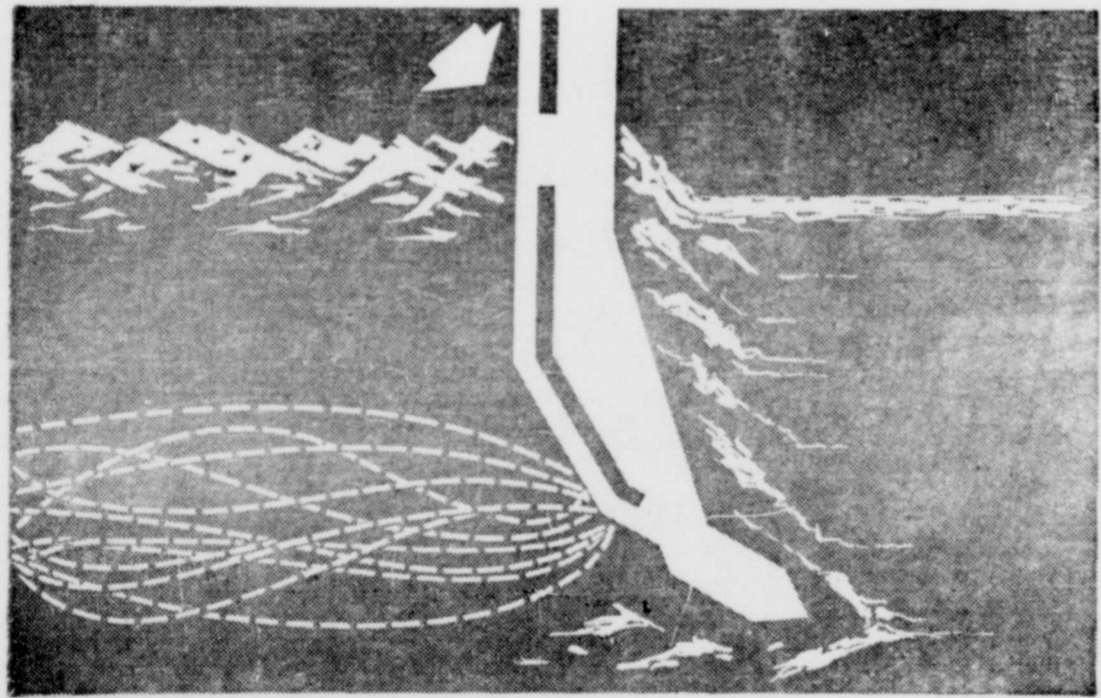

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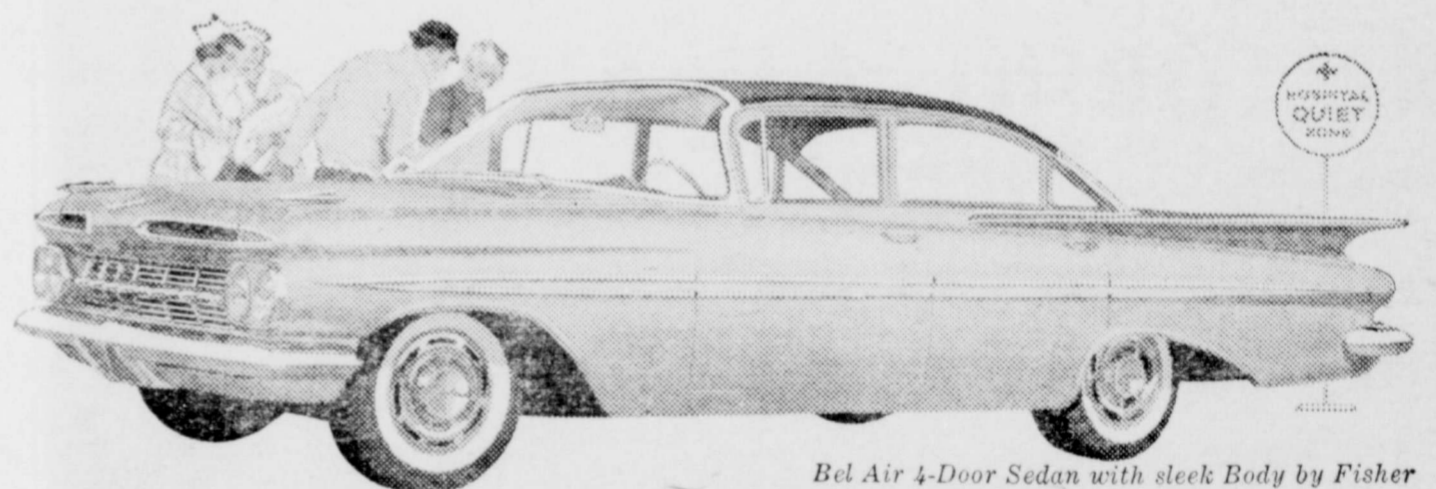

FAITH?

BY ROY DEAN VERNER

Reading Time: 4 Minutes

EDITOR'S NOTE: In last week's issue of The Review, in Roy Dean Verner's column, "What Does the Bible Say about Instrumental Music?" The Review staff members erroneously omitted two words which entirely changed the meaning of one of the sentences.

The following is from The Review published last week: The New Testament is silent on church music. However, singing is music. In fact, this is the kind of music commanded by the Apostles and used in the early church. Playing an instrument is another kind of music and was not commanded or used in the early church. Singing is the kind of music that is plainly commanded.

In almost every religious body "faith" is an essential prerequisite in order to become a member of that body. In many churches, a confession of one's faith in God is a requirement of that church. In many conversations of our Lord, faith was the subject of consideration. Paul discussed faith at considerable length in the Roman letter. The writer of Hebrews, though by many to have been Paul, devotes a portion of that letter to the subject of "Faith." Mar has divided this portion into what is now commonly called Chapter 11. In this division the writer mentions several Old Testament characters who had demonstrated their faith in God.

Faith is essential to salvation. "But without faith it is impossible to please Him: For he that cometh must believe that He is, and that He is a rewarder of them that diligently seek Him" (Hebrews 11:6). Since we must have faith in God, the natural question to ask is, "Where do we get our faith, and how?" "Does it come to us as a direct operation of the Holy Spirit, or not?" Paul answers this question in Romans 10:17: "Faith comes by hearing, and hearing by the word of God." Only through this means, then, can one obtain complete faith in God.

Since faith is such an essential part of Christianity, it is important that all should know what faith is, and how we demonstrate our faith. Hebrews 11:1 gives the definition of faith as follows: "Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the proving of things not seen" (ASV). The word faith, from the original word "pistis" can be distinguished in two senses, as the passive and active. On the one side "fidelity," "trustworthiness," and "faith," "trust" on the other. There is another sense in which the word "faith" means a "doctrine" or "creed" as in Jude 3 and in Ephesians 4:4. It is interesting to note here that in both the above passages, the writer was urging the readers to "content for the faith ONCE DELIVERED," and stating the

fact of there being only "ONE FAITH." One can immediately see the different connotations of the word "faith," as it does not always have the same meaning entirely.

With this in mind, one must realize that the word "faith" can and does mean more than just "believe." Some would have to list to believe that one is saved by "faith only." James states, however, "Ye see then how that by works a man is justified, and not by faith only" (James 2:24). James further states, "Ye see, a man say, 'Thou hast faith, and I have works.' Show me thy faith without thy works, and I will show thee my faith by my works" (James 2:18). It is in harmony with the scriptures to conclude, then that "faith," in order to work, must be a "working faith." Note that in Hebrews 11 each of the patriarchs had faith, and were commended by Jehovah for their faith, but note also that it was a working faith. As Paul states in Galatians 5:6, it is "Faith working through love."

When one hears the word of God, and believes it, faith is produced (Rom. 10:17). When one's faith is strong enough to do the will of God, he repents (Luke 13:3), and upon repentance he confesses his faith in Christ as the Son of God (Matt. 10:32), and demonstrates his faith in doing so. After his confession, he further demonstrates his faith by obeying the Lord in baptism and is "raised to walk in newness of life" (Act. 2:28; Rom. 6:3-6). When these steps have been followed, one is a child of God "by faith in Christ Jesus" (Gal. 3:26-27). He is now a Christian.

Some have said, "John 3:16 is good enough for me. I'm going to believe it, and it only." I read, "For God so loved the world that he gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life." The word "believe" in the original language has the idea of "a conviction, full of joyful trust that Jesus is the messiah—the divinely appointed author of eternal salvation in the kingdom of God, CONJOINED WITH OBEDIENCE TO CHRIST" (J. H. Thayer, Greek English Lexicon of the New Testament, p. 511). Even here the Lord was talking about a faith "which joins with obedience." This is the kind of faith the Lord demands: of all.

If you have had the idea that one is saved by "faith only," and have been following such a practice in trying to serve God, know assuredly that the Bible does not teach such a doctrine. Begin serving God today, with a "faith which works by love."

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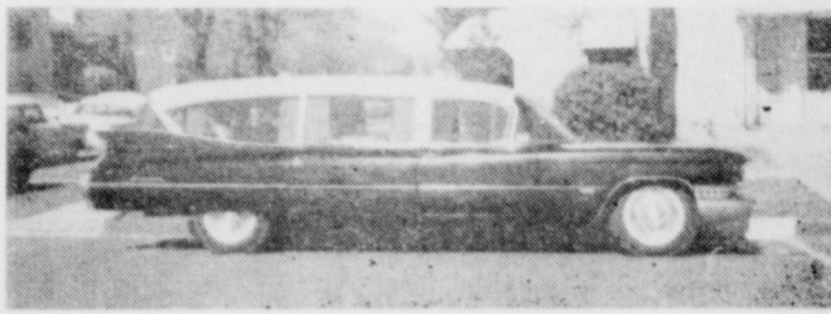
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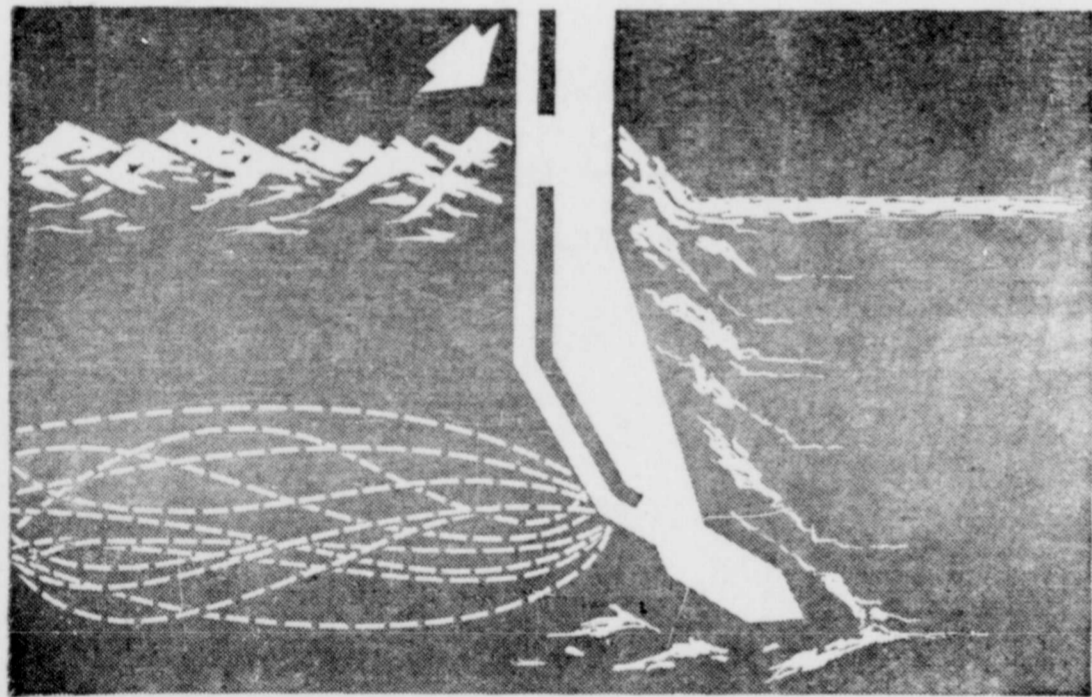

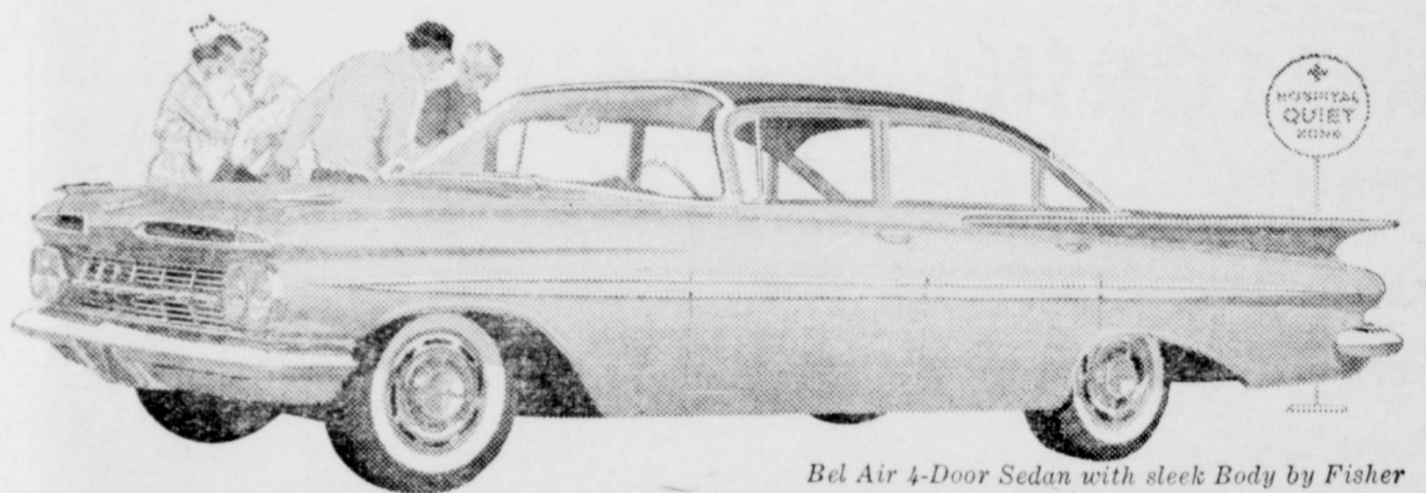

FAITH?

BY ROY DEAN VERNER

Reading Time: 4 Minutes

EDITOR'S NOTE: In last week's issue of the Review, in Roy Dean Verner's column, "What Does the Bible Say about Instrumental Music?" The Review staff, erroneously omitted two words which entirely changed the meaning of one of the sentences. The following is from the Review published last week: "The New Testament is silent on church music. However, singing is music. In fact, this is the kind of music commanded by the Apostles and used in the early church. Playing an instrument is another kind of music and was not commanded or used in the early church. Singing is the kind of music that is plainly commanded."

In almost every religious body "faith" is an essential prerequisite in order to become a member of that body. In many churches, a confession of one's faith in God is a requirement of that church. In many conversations of our Lord, faith was the subject of consideration. Paul discussed faith at considerable length in the Roman letter. The writer of Hebrews, thought by many to have been Paul, devotes a portion of that letter to the subject of "Faith." Mar has divided this portion into what is now commonly called Chapter 11. In this division the writer mentions several Old Testament characters who had demonstrated their faith in God.

Faith is essential to salvation. "But without faith it is impossible to please Him: For he that cometh must believe that He is, and that He is a rewarder of them that diligently seek Him" (Hebrews 11:6). Since we must have faith in God, the natural question to ask is, "Where do we get our faith, and how?" "Does it come to us as a direct operation of the Holy Spirit, or not?" Paul answers this question in Romans 10:17: "Faith cometh by hearing, and hearing by the word of God." Only through this means, then, can one obtain complete faith in God.

Since faith is such an essential part of Christianity, it is important that all should know what faith is, and how we demonstrate our faith. Hebrews 11:1 gives the definition of faith as follows: "Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the proving of things not seen" (ASV). The word faith, from the original word "pistis" can be distinguished in two senses, as the passive and active. On the one side "fidelity," "trustworthiness," and "faith," "trust" on the other. There is another sense in which the word "faith" means a "doctrine" or "creed" as in Jude 3 and in Ephesians 4:4. It is interesting to note here that in both the above passages, the writer was urging the readers to "content for the faith ONCE DELIVERED," and stating the

fact of there being only "ONE FAITH." One can immediately see the different connotations of the word "faith," as it does not always have the same meaning entirely. With this in mind, one must realize that the word "faith" can and does mean more than just "believe." Some would have all to believe that one is saved by "faith only." James states, however, "Ye see then how that by works a man is justified, and not by faith only" (James 2:24). James further states, "Yea, a man say, 'Thou hast faith, and I have works,' 'Show me thy faith without thy works, and I will show thee my faith by my works' (James 2:18). It is in harmony with the scriptures to conclude, then that "faith," in order to save, must be a "working faith." Note that in Hebrews 11 each of the patriarchs had faith, and were commended by Jehovah for their faith, but note also that it was a working faith. As Paul states in Galatians 3:6, it is "Faith working through love."

When one hears the word of God, and believes it, faith is produced (Rom. 10:17). When one's faith is strong enough to do the will of God, he repents (Luke 13:3), and upon repentance he confesses his faith in Christ as the Son of God (Matt. 10:32), and demonstrates his faith in doing so. After his confession, he further demonstrates his faith by obeying the Lord in baptism and is "raised to walk in newness of life" (Act. 2:28; Rom. 6:3-6). When these steps have been followed, one is a child of God "by faith in Christ Jesus" (Gal. 3:26-27). He is now a Christian.

Some have said, "John 3:16 is good enough for me. I'm going to believe it, and it only." If you read, "For God so loved the world that he gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life." The word "believe" in the original language has the idea of "a conviction, full of joyful trust that Jesus is the messiah—the divinely appointed author of eternal salvation in the kingdom of God, CONJOINED WITH OBEDIENCE TO CHRIST" (J. H. Thayer, Greek English Lexicon of the New Testament, p. 511). Even here the Lord was talking about a faith, "which joins with obedience." This is the kind of faith the Lord demands of all.

If you have had the idea that one is saved by "faith only," and have been following such a practice in trying to serve God, know assuredly that the Bible does not teach such a doctrine. Begin serving God today, with a "faith which works by love."

that while the first zone, estimated to be some 24 feet thick, was probably not actually thick enough to warrant offset and development drilling, the second and third zones encountered last week, advancing the possibility of dual zone producing oil well, could make it profitable to drill offset.
The completion, however, is far from being a completed, producing oil well. Scheduled to drill to 11,500 feet or to the underlying granite basement rock, the venture will finish drilling before returning to test the commercial potential of the three zones which have oil shows of possible production.
The Hale County wildcat is 660 feet from south and 1,983 feet from west lines of Section 10, Block CK, GC&SF survey.
