AHS Students To Register August 27-28

Summer Vacation Ends, School Begins Aug. 31



SUPERINTENDENT NOEL JOHNSON
... Second Year Here

Abernathy Public Schools will open the 1959-1960 school year at 8:45 A. M. Monday, August 31, it was announced by Superintendent Noel Johnson.

It is estimated that approximately 1,134 students will be enrolled for the coming term as compared to 1,091 students in the Abernathy schools last year.

Registration of all AHS students will begin Thursday, August 27, and will continue through Friday, August 28.

Principal J. W. Sollis announced the following instructions for students registering in high school August 27-28. It is requested that all students observe the following registration schedule, as it will help registration personnel to give as much individual attention to each student as possible.

Senior students whose surnames begin with the letters A through M will register Thursday, August 27, from 9:00 to 10:30 a. m., and seniors whose surnames begin with N through Z will register from 10:30 to 12:00 noon the same day. Junior students who have surnames beginning with the letters A through M will register that same day from 1:30 until 3 p. m.; and N through Z, from 3:00

9:00 until 10:30; N through Z, names from 10:30 until 12:00 noon. Freshman students whose surnames begin with the letters A through M will register Friday afternoon from 1:30 until 3:00, with N through Z students registering from 3:00 until 4:30.

Students participating in football workouts may register at their convenience during the two-day registration period, Mr. Sollis stated.

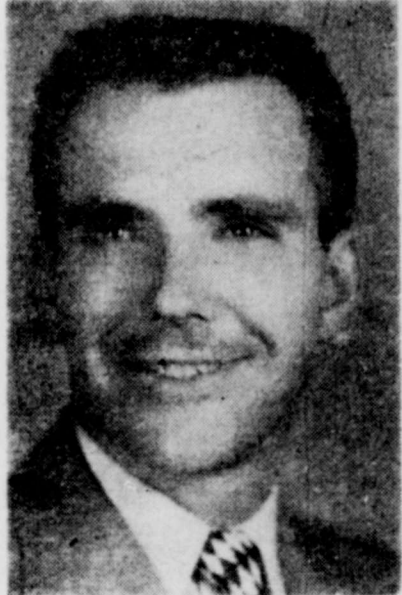
School buses will run the routes at the regular time Monday, August 31. Classes will meet at 8:45 A. M. that day. Lunch will be available in the school lunch room. School buses will start the return trip that afternoon at 2 o'clock. Classes and bus schedules will be on normal, full-day schedule Tuesday, Sept. 1.

There will be no school the following Monday, Sept. 7, which is Labor Day.

A general meeting of all faculty members is set for 4 p. m. Friday, August 28, it was announced by Superintendent Johnson.

Then Saturday, August 29, individual faculty meetings will be held in preparation for the opening of high school, junior high, and the elementary grades.

All Junior High School students and teachers are requested to attend an assembly in the school auditorium at 8:45 a. m. Monday, August 31. Principal Howard Humphrey announced. The students will be assigned to their respective rooms at that time.

Registration for sophomore and freshman students will be Friday, August 28. Sophomores who have surnames beginning with the letters A through M will register Friday morning, August 28, from 9:00 until 10:30 a. m.

Jerry Moorhead, principal of the Elementary school, announced that registration of the grade school children will begin at 8:45 Monday morning, August 31.

Mr. Moorhead also stated that all children entering the first grade at Abernathy Elementary school must have in their possession on the opening day of school their birth certificates, and they also must have had a small

pox vaccination. Either a certificate or the scar must be shown to verify the fact that a small pox vaccination has been received by each child.

City Gin Features All Automatic Equipment

There are four such gin stands in the new City Gin, all of which are completely automatic. Mr. Ellis and Mr. Lee are two of the 19 men who make up the partnership and ownership of City Gin.

One of Abernathy's newest business establishments, which will be in full operation this fall, is the City Gin. The City Gin is located south of Abernathy between the railroad and the highway and is just east of the Antelope Drive-In Theatre.

All modern, complete automatic Continental control equipment is featured at City Gin, having push button control.

The new gin has four 120-saw gin stands with a Continental lint cleaner behind each stand. Also in operation will be a Double Constellation Moss Lint Cleaner. The gin also has two 14-foot bur machines and three six-cylinder incline cleaners.

Work on the installation of the gin equipment is progressing very rapidly, with most of the heavy equipment already installed. The Howe Scales were to be installed at the gin office this week.

A Formal Opening at City Gin is planned for Friday, September 4, announced Charlie Ellis, manager and co-owner of the gin plant.

Rites Held Monday For Mrs. S. R. Merrill, 83

Mrs. S. R. Merrill, 83, a former director of the First State Bank here and widow of a long-time resident of the town, died at 4:25 p. m. Saturday in a Lubbock convalescent home.

Mr. Merrill came to Abernathy in 1899, before the town was formally organized, and had lived here since. She was born in Illinois, but came here from Kirksville, Mo.

Aside from her banking interests she also held farm property in the area.

Mrs. Merrill was a charter member of the Abernathy First Methodist Church, which was founded in 1909. Mrs. Merrill's death leaves only one charter member of the local Methodist church that is still living, Mrs. J. C. Arnett of Dallas.

Services were conducted at 2:30 p. m. Monday in the Methodist church here, and the Rev. George E. Turentine, Lubbock, former pastor of the church, officiated. Burial was in City of Lubbock Cemetery under the direction of Sanders Funeral Home.

Survivors include two daughters, Mrs. Marvin Struve, Abernathy, and Mrs. Leonard Cox, Kidder, Mo.; a sister, Mrs. Lula Hart, Abernathy; six grandchildren; and six great-grandchildren.

The 3,420-pound load brought in by Watts, who farms northwest of Abernathy, brought \$1.60 per hundred.

The first load of milo in Hale County was reported to have been delivered to the Six Point Grain Company, three and a half miles north of Hale Center on US Highway 87, about 4 p. m. Wednesday, August 19. Therefore, since Watts' milo was delivered on Tuesday, August 18, he not only delivered the first load of 1959 milo in Abernathy, but possibly the first in Hale County.

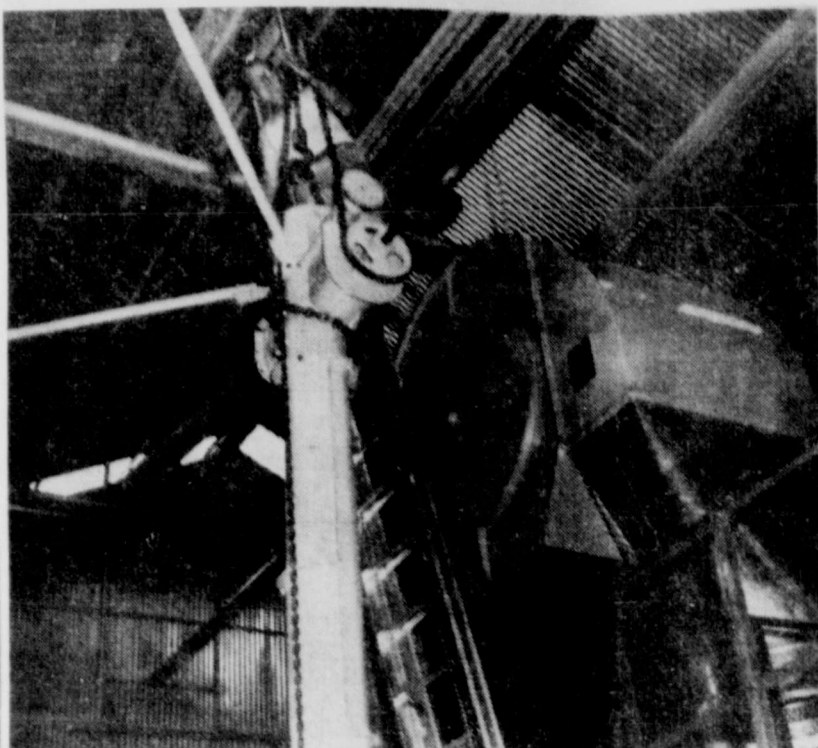

Cheatham, President of Dundee Mills, Inc., Griffin, Georgia, and first vice president of the American Cotton Manufacturers Institute; and Bill Foreman, Public Relations Manager of the National Cotton Council of America, Memphis, Tennessee.

"There will be additional people from the cotton industry on our program and we feel we already have two of the top industry leaders who will be able to give our members a first hand report of conditions as they exist for the cotton producer," Fortenberry said.

"We want to extend a special invitation to all cotton producers and businessmen to attend our meeting. It will begin at 10 a. m. Friday, August 28, at the Municipal Auditorium in Lubbock. A free lunch will be served and our program will conclude about mid afternoon.

Directors of the PCG will meet prior to the annual meeting, at 9 a. m., at the auditorium for a business meeting and the annual election of officers, Fortenberry explained.

"We have had the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., in existence for more than three years now, and we feel this past year was one of our most successful years. At

the annual meeting we will review the progress, and outline our program for 1959-60. I hope all our producer members and others will help us in observing this third annual meeting—a milestone for the cotton industry on the Texas High Plains," Fortenberry concluded.

Attention, Korean War Veterans!

President Eisenhower has signed into law a bill by U. S. Senator Ralph Yarborough which permits some 7,000 Korean War veterans to secure additional education or training under the G. I. Bill of Rights.

Senator Yarborough's measure corrects a technical error in the Korean G. I. Bill to allow qualified veterans a change of program to secure a higher degree in their chosen field.

For example, qualified veterans enrolling in college to become

teachers in many cases set a bachelor's degree as their educational objective. Other veterans planning the same course of study set their objective as a master's degree.

Under the original law, even though the veteran might be qualified for additional educational benefits, if he had mistakenly set his objective under certain circumstances, he was not permitted to go to college to work on his master's degree.

Senator Yarborough's bill, S. 906, gives veterans the opportunity to have a change of program in their original field of training or education to work for higher degrees.

TAX MAN SAM SEZ:
School days are almost here again! Many thousand young Texans will not only learn reading, writing, and arithmetic, but will also learn how to complete an income tax form. Lots of folks are hoping that Internal Revenue Service doesn't find out that they still haven't learned. A letter from Internal Revenue to the school principal will be in the early September mail so the teachers can order the Internal Revenue Service income tax course. Internal Revenue works out all the answers for the teachers. The teachers like it better that way. Last year 75,000 students were enrolled and there will probably be more this year.

REPENTANCE?

Reading Time: 4 Minutes

In Luke 13:3 Jesus said, "I tell you nay, but except ye repent, ye shall all likewise perish." Paul, in his discourse on Mars hill, said, "And in the times of this ignorance God winked at, but commandeth all men everywhere to repent" (Acts 17:30). Peter wrote, "The Lord is not slack concerning his promises as some men count slackness, but is long suffering to us-ward, not willing that any should perish, but that all should come to repentance" (II Pet. 3:9). There can be no doubt in the minds of those believing the Bible that repentance is essential to man's salvation. It is required of God, demanded by Christ, and endorsed by the Holy Spirit through the inspired apostles. Since it is so vital to all who profess Christianity, it is essential that it be understood. There are many misconceptions about repentance because it is misunderstood, and misapplied.

The Bible adequately teaches man what repentance is. The word repentance in the original, "Metanoia," meant "a change of mind," as it appears in one who repents of a purpose he has formed, or of something he has done. "It is the change of mind of those who have begun to abhor their errors and misdeeds, and have determined to enter upon a better course of life." (J. H. Thayer, Greek-Lexicon of the New Testament, p. 465, 466). Jesus told a parable once to teach His audience what repentance is: "A certain man had two sons, and he came to the first and said, 'Son, go work in my vineyard.' The son answered and said, 'I will not.' But afterwards, he repented and went" (Matt. 21:28-29). Here this young man had determined not to work, but after a change of mind, he decided he would work in the vineyard of his father.

for sins is repentance, but Paul says, "Godly sorrow worketh repentance" (II Cor. 7:10). In other words sorrow for one's sins is not enough. It must be a Godly sorrow that will cause one to determine not to engage in the practice of such a sin again. It is that change of a sinner's mind which leads him to turn from his evil ways and live. The change in repentance is so deep and radical as to affect the whole spiritual nature and to involve the entire personality. The intellect must function, the emotions must be aroused, and the will must act. Man must recognize sin as unutterably heinous, the Divine law as perfect and inexorable, and himself as coming short, or falling below the requirements of a holy God. Note that it is not "Sorrow Only" that is repentance, but Godly sorrow which leads one to make a complete change in life. Judas repented (Matt. 27:3), but only in the sense of sorrow, and not in the sense of wanting to make it right in the eyes of God. It is like the thief who repents when he is caught, not because he has stolen, but because he was caught. The repentance that God wants is one which will cause the individual to change his whole life. It will cause him to faithfully follow the commandments of God.

Have you repented of your sins and faithfully obeyed the Lord's commandments? Jesus said, "Thus it is written and thus it behoved Christ to suffer, and to rise from the dead the third day; and that repentance and remission of sins should be preached in His name among all nations, beginning at Jerusalem" (Luke 24:46-48). On Pentecost following this statement, the apostles were in Jerusalem when they were endowed with the Holy Spirit. After Peter's sermon, the Jews were wanting to know

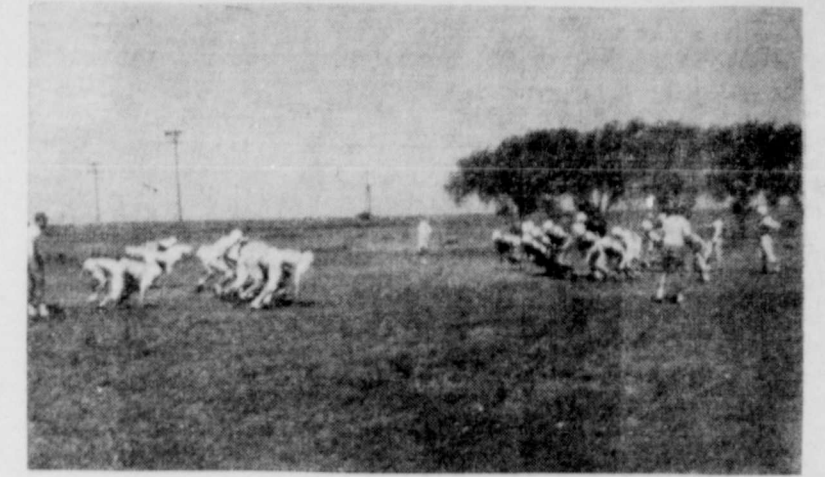
TO MY FRIENDS:

QUESTIONS ANSWERED ON WHEAT ACREAGE ALLOTMENTS

With planting time approaching for winter wheat, Chairman J. Earl Laney of the Hale County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee reminded farmers July 27 that compliance or non-compliance with the 1960 farm wheat allotment will have an important effect on the determination of future wheat allotments for a farm.

The following answers to farmers' questions, M. Laney said, illustrates the effects of various situations:

Q. The base wheat acreage for my farm is 140 acres. My 1960 allotment is 100 acres. If I produce 100 acres of wheat, what is my wheat history for the year?

A. You get credit for your full base of 140 acres.

Q. In the same situation, if I produce 130 acres of wheat, what is my wheat history for the year?

A. You get history credit only for 100 acres—your allotment.

Q. How much wheat would I have to store in order to get credit for my base?

A. You have 30 excess acres. Say your normal wheat yield is 15 bushels to the acre. You must store or deliver to the Secretary of Agriculture the normal production of your excess acres, or 453 bushels.

Q. Isn't that the same amount of my excess calculated under the marketing quota program?

A. Yes, the excess is the same for both purposes.

Q. Let's say that later on I market some of that stored excess

wheat and pay the penalty. What does that do to my wheat history?

A. Your farm would again be considered a non-compliance farm and will be credited only with the allotment as wheat history for 1960.

Q. What if an allotment has already been figured for me using my base acreage as 1960 history?

A. The allotment will stand but your history will be changed for use in future years' allotments.

Q. My allotment is 10 acres and my base acreage is 14 acres, but I produce and market 15 acres of wheat in 1960 under the law that allows any farm 15 acres of wheat without penalty. What is my wheat history for the year?

A. Ten acres, and in such a case there is no storable excess.

Q. My wheat allotment is 20 acres and my base is 30 acres, but I go into the feed program in 1960 and produced 30 acres of wheat for use on my own farm. What is my wheat history for the year?

A. Twenty acres, and there's no storable excess.

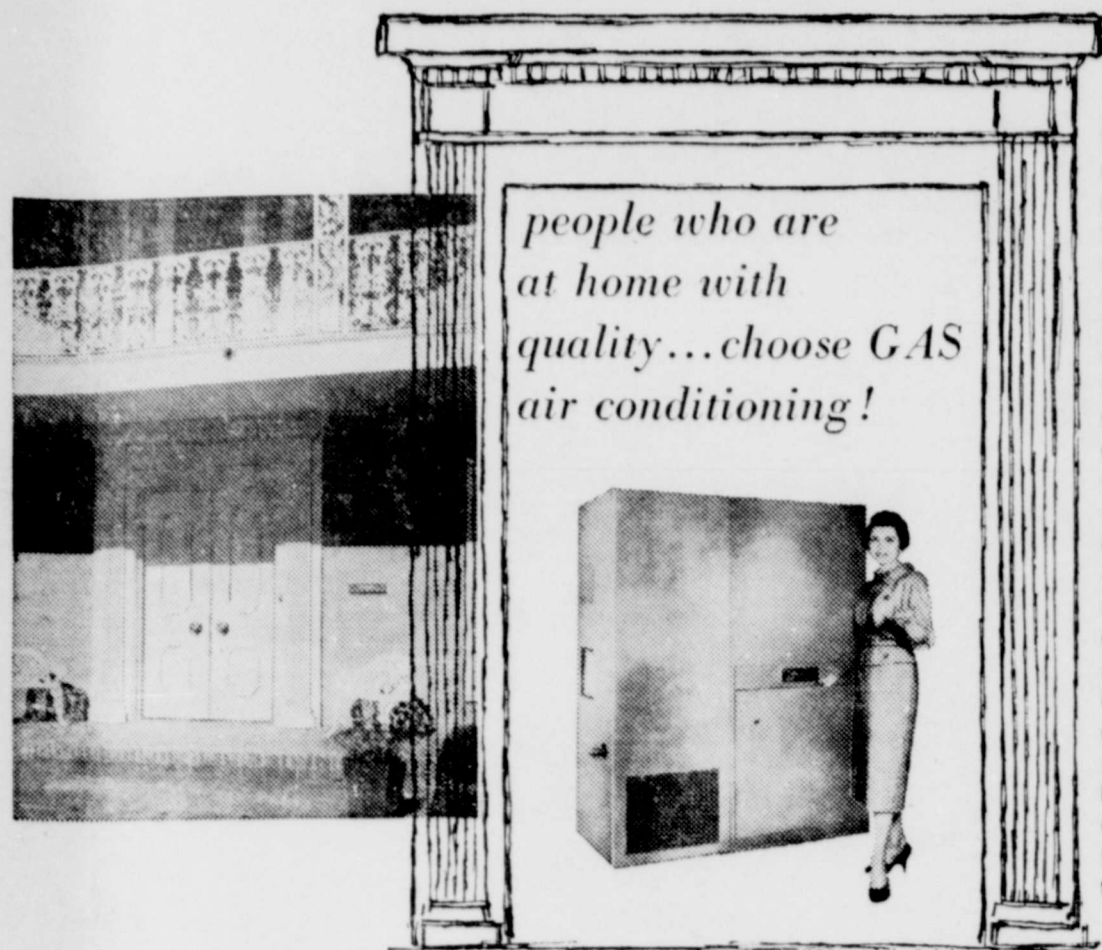

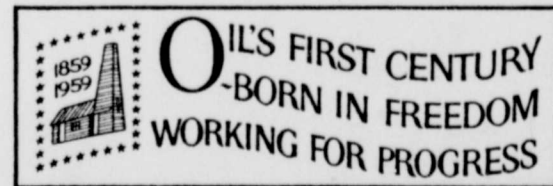

Court Adopts County Budget

The Commissioners Court adopted the 1960 Hale County budget last week.

The schedule of expenditures was approved in short order, there being no one appearing for the announced hearing, said Judge Lee Nowlin.

Estimated income from taxes for 1960 is \$431,919. The property valuation is \$41,000,000. Property is assessed at approximately 30 per cent of its value for county tax purposes.

Last year's property valuation was \$37,000,000 and the assessed income was \$418,100. The tax

levy for 1960 is \$1.13 per \$100 valuation, same as that of last year's.

The new budget calls for payment of \$70,000 on the principal of county indebtedness and \$43,617.50 in interest. Last year payment of the principal was \$85,000 and interest was \$25,817.50.

Outstanding in bonds as of the first of this year was \$939,000. The time warrant debt left at the same time was \$1,154,000. Last year the outstanding bonds amounted to \$1,002,000 and time warrants totaled \$954,000.

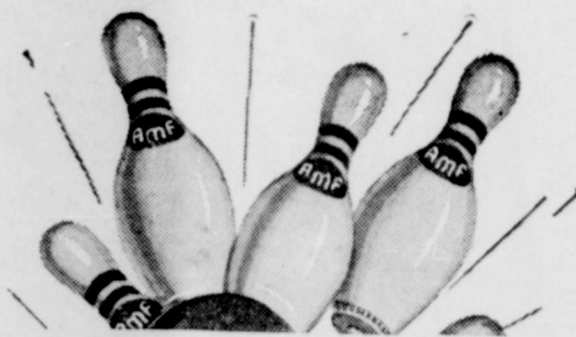

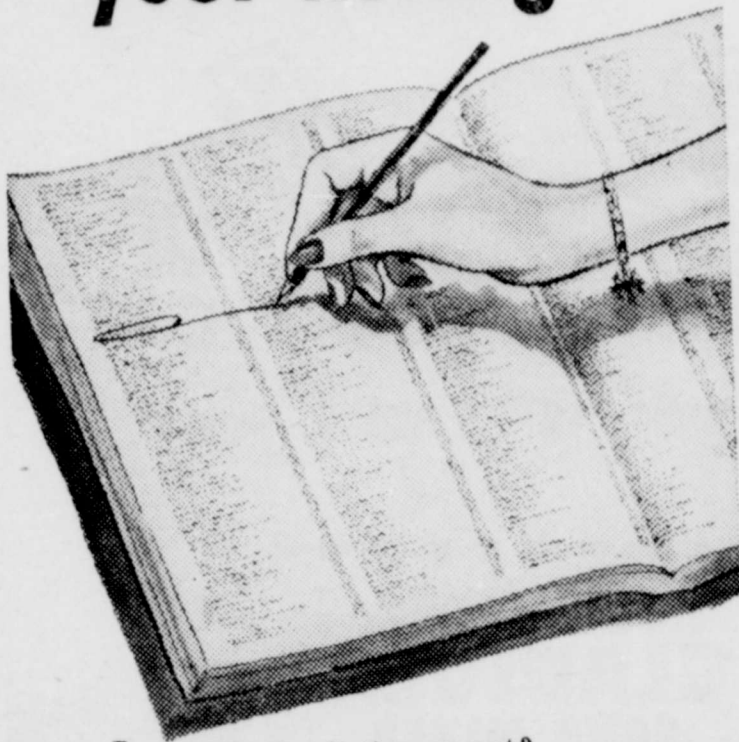
