In 1937, DeKalb inaugurated the National Selective Five Acre DeKalb Corn Growing Contest. The purpose of this contest was to show the yield advantage hybrid corn had over open pollinated corn. Since that time, corn production has grown to be almost 100 percent hybrid.

The National Selected Five Acre DeKalb Hybrid Sorghum Yield Contest was inaugurated with the same thought in mind: to show that hybrid sorghum has a substantial yield advantage over standard varieties. Again, the contest will be open to any farmer or farm boy who has at least 5 acres of DeKalb Hybrid Sorghum. The farmer producing the highest yield will be made the National Champion Sorghum Grower. A state champion will be proclaimed in each state for both dryland and irrigated divisions. Awards for the top three yields in each county for both dryland and irrigated will also be given.

The contest will be conducted in the following states: Arkansas, Colorado, Kansas, Missouri, Western Iowa, Nebraska, New Mexico, Oklahoma, South Dakota, and Texas.

Mr. E. O. Ramsey is home after being confined to hospital for several weeks.

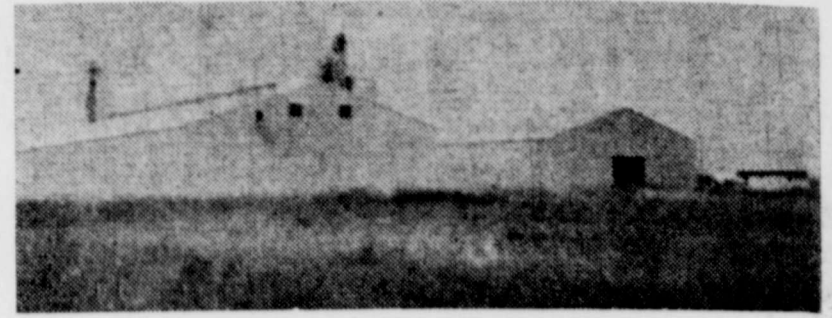
Mr. F. C. Bishop is much better after having surgery last week. He expects to be home sometime this week.

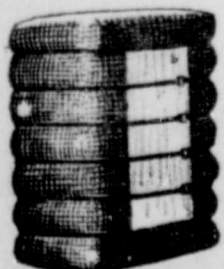

SANCTIFICATION?

Sanctification is a term that has often been misunderstood. Some have thought the term means a miraculous operation by the Holy Spirit upon the heart of a person already having his past sins forgiven. Is this the meaning? Just what did Peter mean when he said, "But sanctify the Lord God in your hearts: and be ready always to give an answer to every man that asketh you a reason of the hope that is in you with the meekness and fear" (1 Pet. 3:15). The word sanctify from the original "hagiazō" means to "set apart for divine service." The problem at hand, therefore, is to try to find a scriptural answer on how one is "sanctified."

Jesus said, "Sanctify them through thy truth: thy word is truth" (John 17:17). Here the Master asked the Father to sanctify the apostles through the "Word of Truth." The next question, of course, is how is one sanctified by the word? Peter answers this question in 1 Pet. 1:22, 23, "Seeing you have purified your souls in obeying the truth through the Spirit, unto unfeigned love of the brethren..." Here Peter states that Christians had purified their souls in obeying the truth, i. e., they had been sanctified. One can read in Cor. 1:2, "Unto the church of God which at Corinth, to them that are SANCTIFIED in Christ Jesus, called to be saints..." Here Paul states that the Christians at Corinth had been "sanctified." The question is, how were they sanctified? In Acts 18:8 Luke states, "And many of the Corinthians hearing believed, and were baptized." Here the answer is supplied as to how these brethren at Corinth were "sanctified."

Some have thought that when one is "sanctified" he is freed from the desire to sin, and is made perfect never sinning again. Their claim is that they are baptized by the Holy Spirit which enables them to live without ever committing sin. This cannot be true, however, since Peter sinned and was rebuked by the Apostle Paul. "But when Peter was come to Antioch, I withstood him to the

face, because he was to be blamed" (Gal. 2:11-14). Peter, in addition to the other eleven apostles, were all baptized by the Holy Spirit (overwhelmed by the Holy Spirit) on the first Pentecost following Christ's resurrection (Acts 2). We see, therefore, that Peter's baptism by the Holy Spirit did not prevent him from committing sin. John further stated that "If we say we have no sin we deceive ourselves and the truth is not in us" (1 John 1:8). Man is unable to live daily without ever committing sin. We must conclude, therefore, that "sanctification" does not prevent one from sinning.

What then does sanctification mean? It is not something in addition to being a Christian. It is not a "second blessing," nor a special gift or work of the Holy Spirit. It is simply man, through his obedience to the gospel, being set apart from the world. His sins are forgiven by the blood of Jesus Christ. When one becomes a Christian he becomes sanctified, or a "saint." To them that are sanctified in Christ Jesus, called to be saints... are the words of the Apostle Paul through the inspiration of the Holy Spirit (1 Cor. 1:2). The brethren at Corinth were Christians and they were saints. They had been "sanctified" in that they had been "set apart" from the world by the grace of God in the forgiveness of their sins. "But God be thanked, that ye were the servants of sin, but ye have obeyed from the heart that form of doctrine which was delivered you. Being made free from sin." These also are words of the Apostle Paul (Rom. 6:17). There can be no doubt then, that "sanctification" and "Christianity" are synonymous terms.

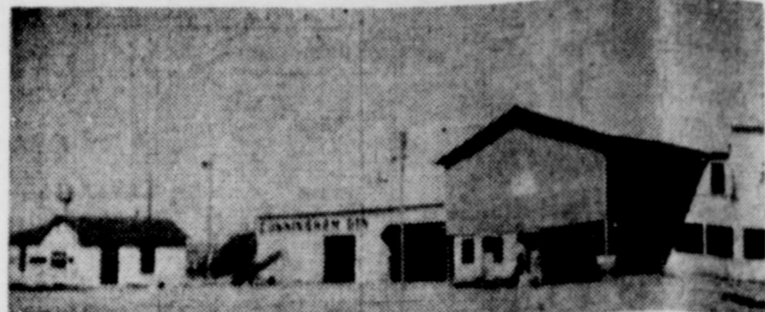

Shower Planned Thursday For Mrs. Tom Lesley

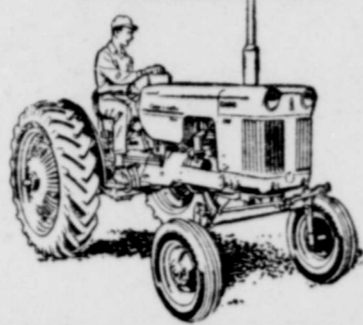
The County Line Community Women's Club is to have an all-day quilting and a miscellaneous shower, starting at 9 a. m. Thurs-

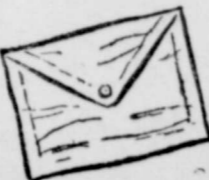


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Kids' Day Open House Planned At Reese AFB

CORRECTION

However, local customers will be able to dial direct to persons in the Hollandville and County Line exchanges by dialing the listed number.

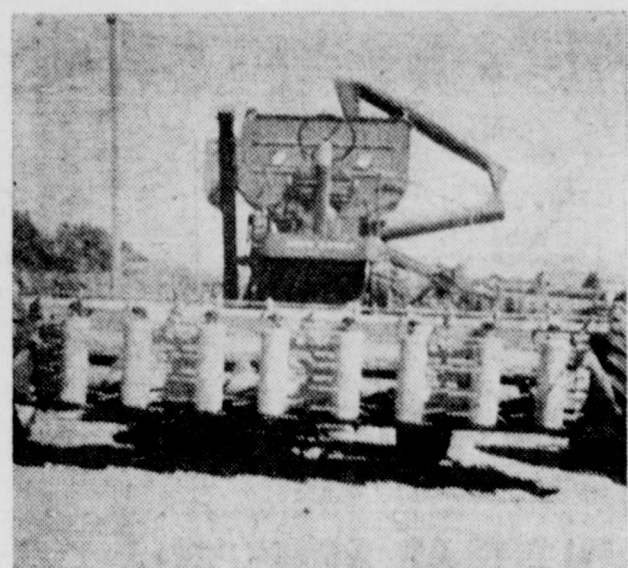

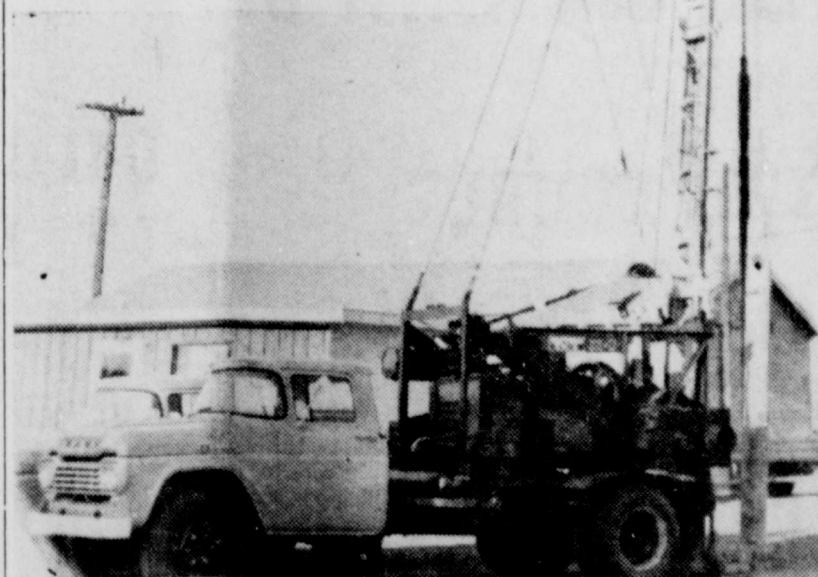

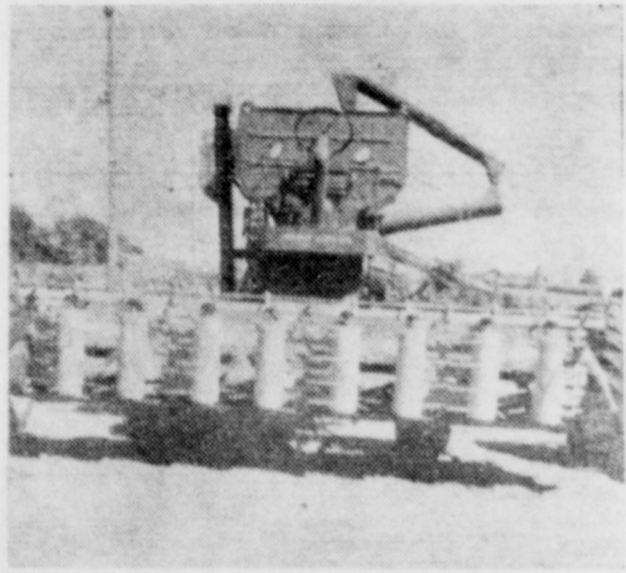

Warning Issued On Defoliating Cotton Too Soon

A warning note against defoliating cotton too early is sounded. Citing the recommendations of the state experiment station, Jason Gordon, for 15 years on the Extension Service staff, and now farm supply firm member, says that it is recommended that defoliants not be used until cotton is 60 per cent open.

The reason is that if the leaves of the plant are killed the fiber will not mature fully. Fifteen days, in general, are needed in this area, said Gordon, to harden the fiber of the cotton and com-

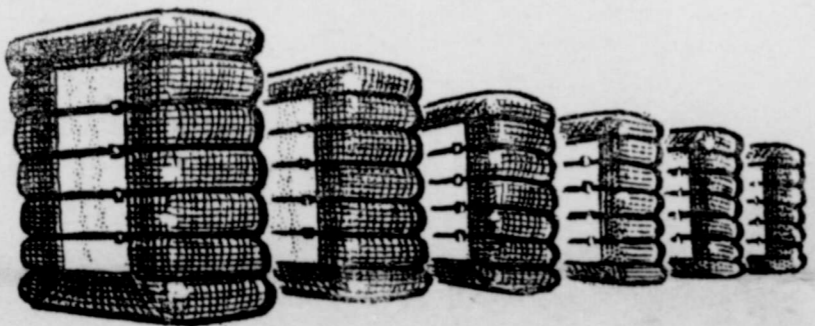

Antelopes, then a six yard gain by Brown on a keeper around right end and put the ball on the Owls' 36. An attempted pass to Aubrey Smith was short, then Joy plunged through the line for six yards and a first down. On the next play Ritchey carried for 14 yards to put the ball on the 16.

With two minutes remaining in the first half, Keith Beard took over for Brown. Beard handed off to Dan Thompson who threw a pass intended for Joy which fell incomplete. The Antelopes lost 12 yards on the next two plays and Hale Center took over on their own 30.

A no gain, and an incomplete pass made it third and 10 on the 30 for the Owls. A third down pass up the middle was broken up by alert Jack Ingram, then Ronald Barrick brought Dollar down for a minus four yards on the fourth down as the half ended. Halftime score: Abernathy 18, Hale Center 6.

The second half opened with Hale Center kicking off to the 23 where Brown grabbed the ball and packed it 13 yards to the 36. E. J. Smith made 3, then H. Thompson took the pigskin and had gone up the middle for 15 yards before the hard-running full-back was brought down. A Smith gained 8, and H. Thompson added another 9 for another first down.

A five yard penalty made it first and 15 for the Antelopes on the Owls' 31, then H. Thompson romped for 16 yards to the 25. Ritchey danced to the 5 yard line on the next play, then took charge again to carry the pigskin over the goal line, putting Abernathy farther ahead, 24-0. The conversion pass intended for Gist fell incomplete.

Dollar took the kick on the 36 and carried it 10 yards before being upset by Roy Smitherman. A Perry Ritchey to Leutham pass play gave the Owl's 16 yards and a first down. They added six yards, lost five on a penalty, then Jack Ingram and Smitherman smeared Ritchey for a six yard loss. An attempted pass on the next play backfired as Donnie Adams intercepted on the 29

and carried it back to the 54. Joy made eight yards over right tackle, then H. Thompson was stopped about a foot and a half shy of a first down. Losses of two and six yards on the next two plays gave the Owls the ball on Abernathy's 35.

The Owls switched to a single wing formation with Perry Ritchey operating from the tailback slot. Ritchey, and Ritchey-Loutham combinations, moved the ball to Abernathy's 8 yard line where Ritchey fumbled when hit hard by several Antelope tacklers. Aubrey Smith pounced on the ball to end the Owl's first serious scoring threat.

H. Thompson carried the ball for 10 yards, then added two more as the third stanza ended. On the first play of the fourth quarter Brown handed off to Leo Kiker who threw a pass to Joy which was just off his finger tips. Brown punted and the ball rolled dead on the 50.

An incomplete pass, a no gain due to Humphrey and Joe Tom Brown, with H. Thompson up-

ending tailback Ritchey after a six yard gain, forced the Owls to again boot the ball. Harold Thompson momentarily fumbled the ball on his own 20 yard line, but gathered it in, tried to go up the right side of the field but seeing too many Owls in his path he reversed his field and raced 80 yards down the left side for Abernathy's final TD. On the run, Thompson was being headed off by Hale Center's Ritchey, but guard Roy Smitherman solved the situation when he took Ritchey out on the Owl's 40 yard line with a beautiful jarring block.

A second try for the extra point, after a penalty was called against Hale Center, saw Johnny Adams plunge over to make the score 32-0. A pass intended for A. Smith on the first try was incomplete.

Abernathy kicked to Hale Center then held them on downs. The Owls booted out to Abernathy's 44 where the ball rolled dead. Beard handed off to Kiker who made it a first on the next carry, then Joy took a pitch out from Beard and attempted to pass. Seeing no one in the clear he turned the play into a left end sweep and picked up eight yards.

Johnny Adams carried the ball 11 yards and another first down. Another pass from Kiker to Joy fell incomplete then Beard fell on his own fumble for a 3 yard loss. J. Adams made one yard then Hale Center intercepted Beard's pass on their own 27 yard line.

From here the Owls cranked up and moved the ball 73 yards on eight running plays and two completed passes to make their one and only TD. The drive ended with 1 min. and 46 seconds left in the game, when Dollar hit end Arthur Kiatt on the goal line from the 23 yard line. Dollar swept around right, end for the two points conversion. Thus ended the scoring in the game with Abernathy out front 32-8.

Brown took the kickoff on the 25 and moved the ball to the 33. A penalty on the next play moved the ball to the 28, then end Raymond Smith made a diving catch to latch onto Beard's pass to Abernathy's 48. Beard skirted right end for six more yards as the game ended.

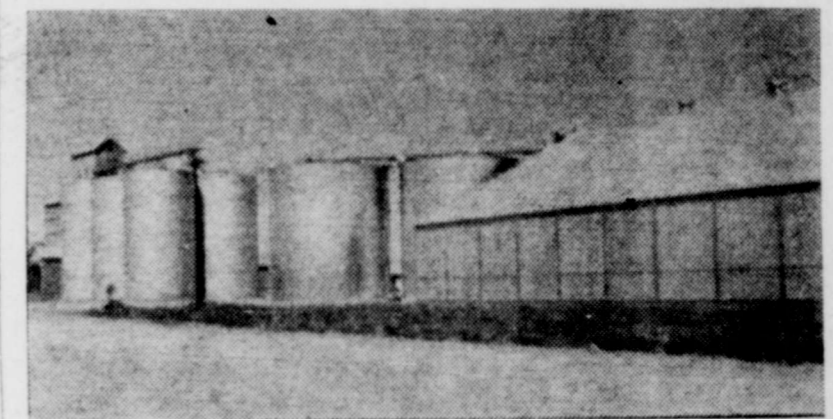

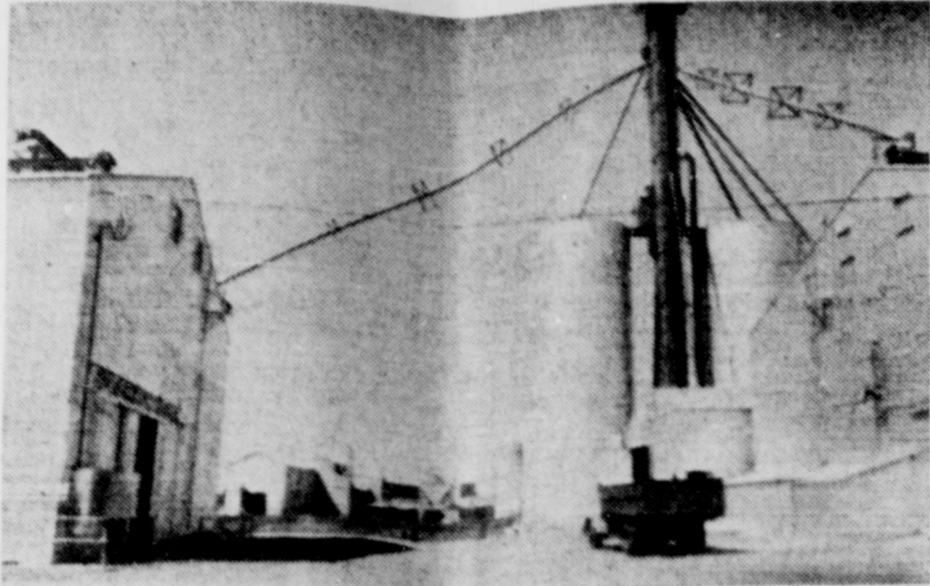

The 20-mile-per-hour speed limit also is in effect around the local schools and on all streets on which "slow" signs have been painted on the pavement.

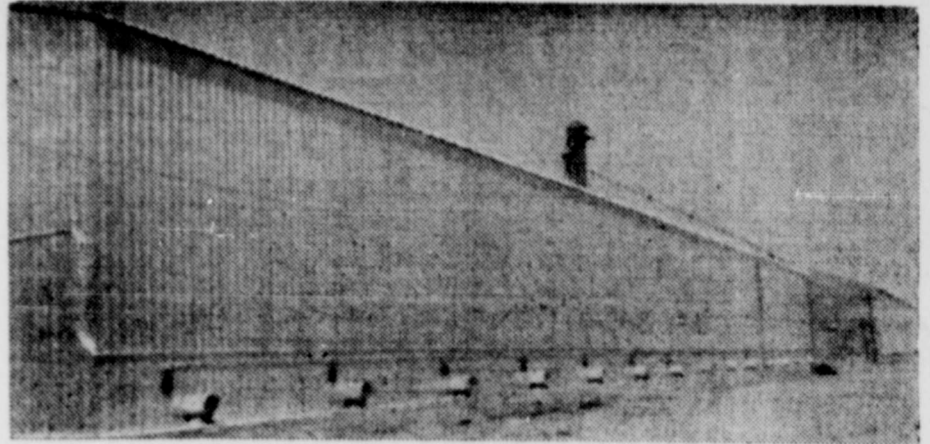
