

Antelopes Upset Spur, 12-0; Meet Tahoka Friday

The Abernathy Antelopes, playing one of their finest ball games of the season, scored once in each of the first and final quarters to upset the Spur Bulldogs 12-0 here last Friday night on a rain-soaked gridiron.

The Antelopes, coached by Curtis Davenport, assisted by Wally Hill and Wayne Preston, definitely outplayed Coach Royal James' Bulldogs defensively and stunned them offensively as they reeled off long runs and connected on important passes which proved valuable to the Antelope cause.

Halfback Aubrey Smith was the big gun for the Antelopes Friday night as he reeled off a total of 130 yards in 19 carries. Quarterback John Brown did an excellent job of calling the plays for

the Antelopes as he sent halfbacks Aubrey Smith and Billy Joe Smith and fullback Harold Thompson crashing through the Bulldog line. Brown connected on four of 12 passes for 84 yards, two of the passes playing an important part in the game's outcome.

Abernathy's defense proved to be stronger than in any other game this season as they held the Bulldogs to only 65 yards rushing, 42 yards passing, nine first downs, and recovered three of the Bulldogs' eight fumbles. The Antelope line outcharged the Bulldogs throughout the game, setting the Spur boys back for a loss on several occasions. The Bulldogs could get no closer to the goal than Abernathy's 28 yard

line during the first half, and their only other serious threat died on Abernathy's 26 early in the final stanza where they fumbled and Stanley Joy recovered for the Antelopes.

Offensively the Antelope linemen opened big holes for the backfield to plow through and held the Bulldogs on pass plays, giving Brown time to spot his receivers.

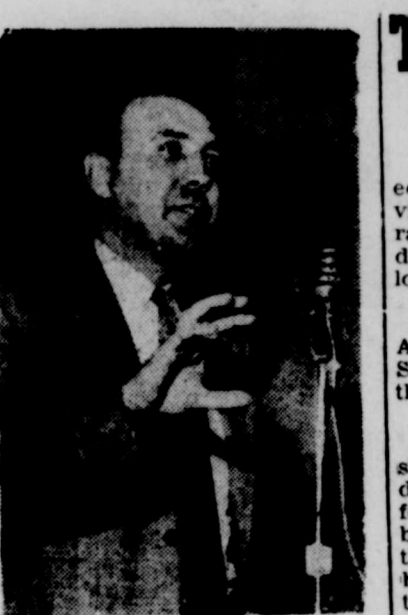

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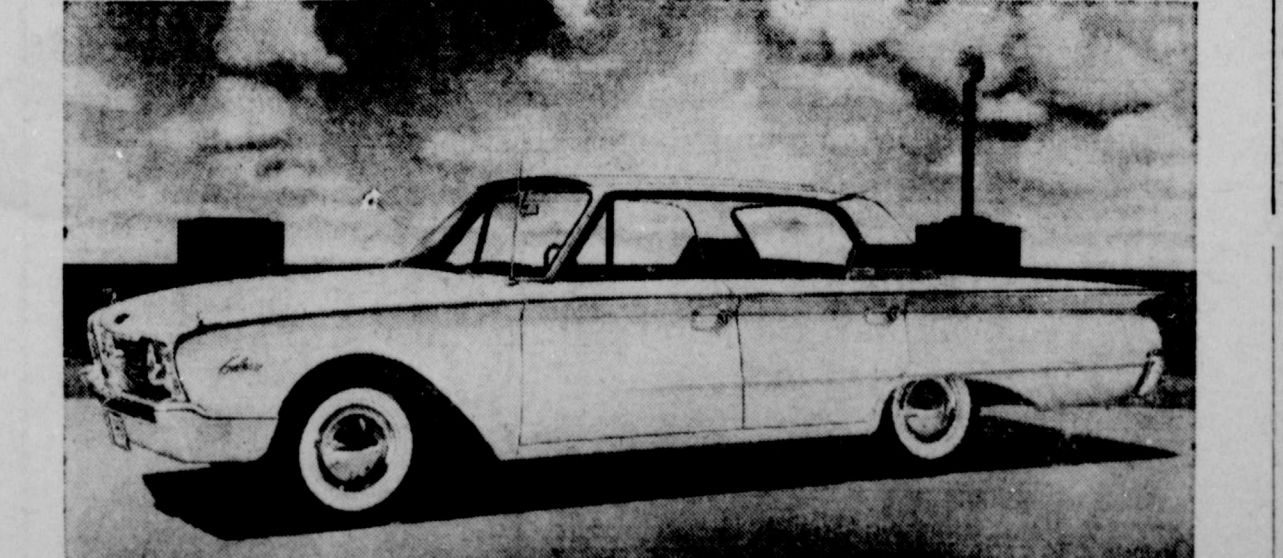

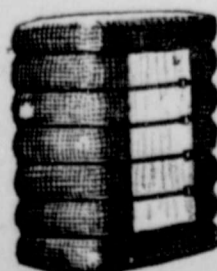

THE KINGDOM OF CHRIST

The Kingdom of God or Christ is a topic worthy of consideration by all men. It has been a topic of discussion on many occasions by religious leaders. Some teach that the Kingdom of God (or Christ) has not been established, and will not be established until Christ's return to the earth. Others teach it was established during the days of John the Baptist, while others teach it was established on the first Pentecost following Christ's resurrection. Which view is right? All three cannot be right, and therefore, demands an investigation. The Bible only can answer this question.

First of all one should note that a Kingdom is foretold in Daniel 7:14, "And there was given him dominion, and glory, and a KINGDOM, that all people, nations, and languages, should serve him: his dominion is an everlasting dominion which shall not pass away, and HIS KINGDOM that shall not be destroyed." Here a vision, or prophecy is made by Daniel stating that an everlasting kingdom is going to be established. Coupled with this is the announcement made by Jesus that some of the people who were listening to Him would not taste of death until they saw the kingdom come with power (Mark 9:1). Therefore, one can conclude that the kingdom predicted by Daniel had not been established yet, at the time Jesus made this statement. John the Baptist preached this message to the Jews: "Repent ye: for the kingdom of heaven is at hand" (Matt. 3:2). John did not preach that the kingdom had been established, but announced that it was at hand (i.e., near). Since it was near, it can be concluded that it had not been established. Jesus, after the death of John the Baptist, promised to build His church, and said to Peter, "And I will give unto thee the keys of the kingdom of heaven. . ." (Matt. 16:19). Here the church and the kingdom are used interchangeably. The words kingdom and church are used to denote the same institution. This statement was made in the future tense, and consequently means that the kingdom had not been established yet. On the first Pentecost following

the resurrection of Christ, one can read where people who had been baptized for the forgiveness of their sins were added to the church, or the kingdom (Acts 2:47). Paul wrote the church at Colosse stating: "Who hath delivered us from the power of darkness, and hath translated us into The Kingdom of His dear Son" (Col. 1:13). Here Paul writes to people who had been in the darkness of sin, but through their obedience to the gospel had been translated into the kingdom of God. John wrote while on the Isle of Patmos, "I John who am your brother, and companion in tribulation and in the KINGDOM and patience of Jesus Christ . . ." (Rev. 1:9). There can be no doubt from the above passages of scripture that the kingdom has been established.

Peter declared that God has made Jesus both Lord and Christ (Acts 2:36). Prior to this statement Peter said God has raised Christ from the dead, and that He is now by the right hand of God exalted, (Acts 2:33). John declares Jesus to be KING OF KINGS, AND LORD OF LORDS (Rev. 19:16). For Jesus to be a king requires that he have a kingdom. One question remains unanswered, and it is this, what shall happen to the kingdom of God at the end of the world? This question is answered in I Cor. 15:24. "Then cometh the end, when he shall have delivered up the Kingdom to God, even the Father; when he shall have put down all rule and all authority and power." The Father shall receive the Kingdom of Christ at the end.

If you are not in the kingdom of God, then you will not be delivered up to the Father at the end of the world. Only those who are Christians are citizens of the Kingdom of God. The only way to become a citizen of the Kingdom is to become a Christian. When one has rendered proper obedience to the gospel, the Lord adds him to the church which is the Kingdom of God.
