Antelopes Lose Last Game of Season

Edged by Muleshoe, 20 - 18

The Abernathy Antelopes finished out the 1959 conference season with one win against three losses as they played their last game at Muleshoe last Friday night, losing to the Mules by a narrow 20 to 18 margin.

Six Regulars Out — Six Antelopes who normally see considerable action during the games did not suit up against the Mules due to injuries. These included quarterback John Brown, halfbacks Leo Kiker, Mike Ritchey and Donnie Adams, tackle Joe Tom Brown, and end Raymond Smith.

With Antelope quarterback John Brown out with a broken left arm, Keith Beard piloted the Antelopes to within two points of the Mules as he did a fine job calling the game. In fact, all the Antelopes turned in a fine performance during extremely cold weather Friday night.

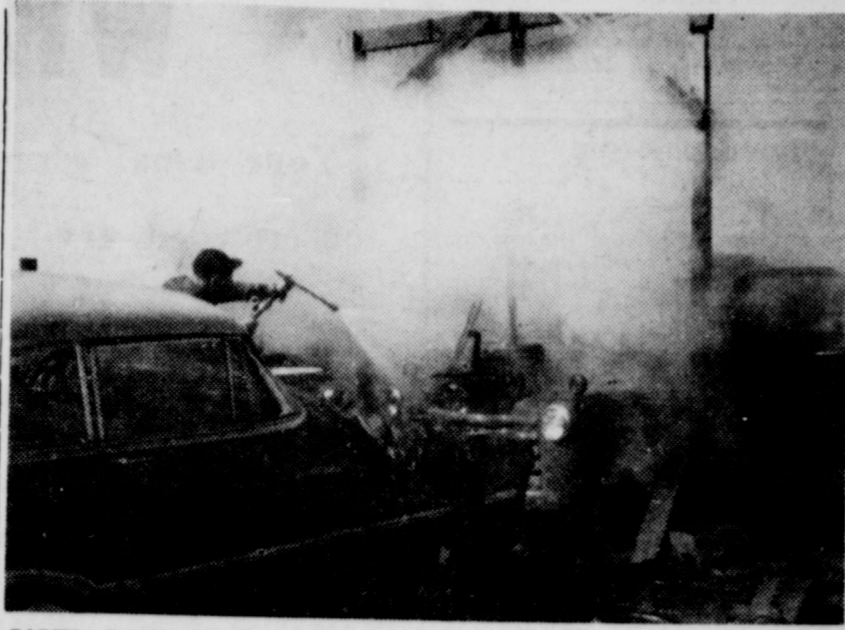
The Antelopes had a bad second quarter but held the Mules scoreless during the second half of the game.

Antelopes Strike First — The Antelopes scored first on a 26-yard pass to quarterback Billy Joe Smith to end Jerry Gist, after Smith had taken a pitch-out from quarterback Beard. An attempt to run the extra points failed.

Muleshoe roared back with quarterback Darrell Oliver setting up the score with a 42-yard pass to Lynda Black. Oliver then plunged over from three yards out. A run for the extra points failed and the score knotted, 6-6.

Muleshoe took a 12 to 6 lead later in the first period on an 11-yard run by halfback Curtis Walker. Again, the run for extra points was stopped short.

In the second period, Oliver again passed to Black for 44 yards to put the Mules in busi-

Abernathy School Faculty Members To Conduct A Curriculum Study Soon

A self-evaluation study of the Abernathy Public Schools has been proposed. Following is an article released by the Abernathy Public Schools concerning the purposes of the study, and the outcome or results of such a study.

The purpose of the following statement is to communicate to the administration and the Board of Education of the public schools of Abernathy, Texas, the details of a self-evaluation study of the total school program at Abernathy.

The overall purpose of the study is to get ready for an accreditation visitation by a committee of the Southern Association of Secondary Schools and Colleges, the major school accreditation agency for southern schools. For a school system to meet the accreditation standards of the Southern Association, and certainly to exceed them, is evidence of a superior system in all details.

The Abernathy School Board approved the preliminary plans for this study October 5, 1959. In turn the Superintendent and Curriculum Director, of Abernathy Public Schools, have asked the Department of Education of Texas Technological College to help plan the self-evaluation study, to make available consultative services as needed, and to assist in communicating in the purpose and the need of the study to the Board of Education and the patrons of Abernathy schools.

The following statement of the purpose, proposed organization and procedures, and the outcomes to be expected from such a study is hereby submitted to the School Board at the regular meeting November 2, 1959.

Purposes of Study — The purposes of the self-evaluation study of the Abernathy Public Schools system are:

(1) To effect improvement in the instructional program in all subjects in each grade; make a (2) To organize and carry out a self-study program that involves all classroom teachers, administrators, and supervisors in a systematic attempt to determine strengths and weaknesses in the instructional areas and in each grade;

(3) To suggest corrective and remedial procedures, believed to be needed in each subject in each grade;

(4) To assist in every way possible in the overall improvement on all aspects of the program in the Abernathy Public Schools; and

(5) To aid in whatever manner believed to be appropriate by the administration of the Abernathy Schools in planning for the visitation of the Southern Association of Secondary Schools and Colleges.

Organization of Self-Study — The proposed plan of organization is:

(1) A steering committee composed of teachers and administrators, made up of representatives of all grades, will be organized to assume the major role of planning, decisioning, and evaluation of the entire study;

(2) Dr. Morris S. Wallace, Head of the Department of Educational Technology at Texas Technological College will be the overall Director and Coordinator of the study;

(3) Members of the faculty, both inside and outside the Department of Education, will be called upon for specialized consultative services as needed;

(4) Study committees consisting of teachers, supervisors, administrators, and board members will be organized in each of the major curriculum areas such as Social Studies, Language Arts, Science, Mathematics, etc., and these groups will serve in the identification of the study.

Negro Boy Is Fatally Burned In Pickup Fire Here Saturday

Tragedy struck in the Negro section of Southeast Abernathy about 1:30 p. m. Saturday, when James Earl Outley, 11-year-old Negro boy, was fatally burned in a fire that damaged a pickup truck. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Lee Outley, whose home is east of where the pickup was parked.

James Earl, who was a sixth grade student in East Ward school, was burned on the head, neck, body and arms. He was taken to Abernathy Medical Clinic, and sent from there to Methodist Hospital, Lubbock, by Dennis-Chambers Funeral Home ambulance. He died at 9:30 a. m. Sunday.

Funeral rites were scheduled for 2 p. m. Wednesday in Bethel Baptist Church here, with burial in Abernathy Cemetery, under direction of Jamison Funeral Home, Lubbock. Rev. Diggs and Rev. Collins were to officiate at the services in the church and at the cemetery.

Survivors include the parents; a sister, Betty Joyce; two brothers, Edward Lee Outley, Jr., and Michael Dwayne, who was born Nov. 10.

James Earl Outley was born August 17, 1948, at Naples, Texas, and was brought to Abernathy in 1950.

South American Feed Miller Studies Grain Sorghum Use In Local Areas

Senor Alvaro Bonilla, managing director of Finca S. A., Bogota, Colombia, was in the Abernathy area last Thursday morning to inspect grain sorghum that was still in the field. Having never seen grain sorghum, before coming to the United States, Senor Bonilla seemed very impressed and convinced of the possibilities of importing grain sorghum into Colombia for feeding purposes.

While in this area last Thursday, Senor Bonilla visited a field of grain sorghum four miles north and one and one-half miles west of Abernathy, grown by Bobby Barton. Bonilla was accompanied by his wife.

Host and hostess for the Bonillas while in the local area were Mr. and Mrs. Elbert Harp. Harp is secretary of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association.

According to Bonilla, who is spending this week in the Texas Panhandle area studying the use of grain sorghum in mixed feed formulas, Colombia does not now permit the import of foreign feedgrains in an effort to protect local feed producers. It is his opinion, however, that in the near future feed manufacturers will be permitted to import feedgrains from the United States and other countries since it is becoming evident that local feed production cannot keep up with the need for livestock and poultry products.

He stressed the fact that we, the people, must learn the traffic laws and must comply with them in order to lower the rate of accidents. The fact was also brought out that those who have completed a driver's education

course have fewer accidents, on a percentage basis, than those who have not taken such a course. In closing, he stated that at the present rate, during the next 30 years we will kill or injure one out of every two Americans with an automobile.

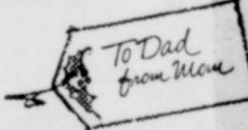

Superintendent Noel Johnson announced that the Abernathy schools will begin the Thanksgiving holiday with the dismissal of school at 2:00 p. m. Wednesday, Nov. 25. Classes will resume at regular time the following Monday, Nov. 30.

School Bus Law Is Publicized

Strict compliance with the law requiring vehicles to stop before passing a halted school bus was urged today by Captain E. L. Posey of the Texas Highway Patrol, Lubbock District.

He said, "An unusually heavy toll of casualties in school bus accidents since schools opened this fall should serve as a challenge to all motorists to save their children from death and injuries, simply by obeying the law."

Captain Posey reported that since September 1, there have been 10 fatalities and 97 injuries resulting from accidents involving school buses across the state. He pointed out that the great majority of the victims were children being transported to and from school.

The school bus law is very simple and specific. It requires vehicles from either direction to come to a complete stop before passing a school bus which is discharging or taking on passengers. After stopping, you may proceed around the bus at a speed not to exceed 10 miles per hour.

The Patrol Captain noted that the law carries penalties up to \$200.00 fine for violation, but added, "The real penalty lies in the possibility of killing or injuring a small child."

"While the Highway Patrol is constantly on the alert for offenders, obviously the real responsibility for keeping our children free from totally unnecessary harm on their way to and from school belongs to the motoring public," he said.

Perhaps it would be well for every driver to think about every school bus he approaches as if it were carrying one of his own children.

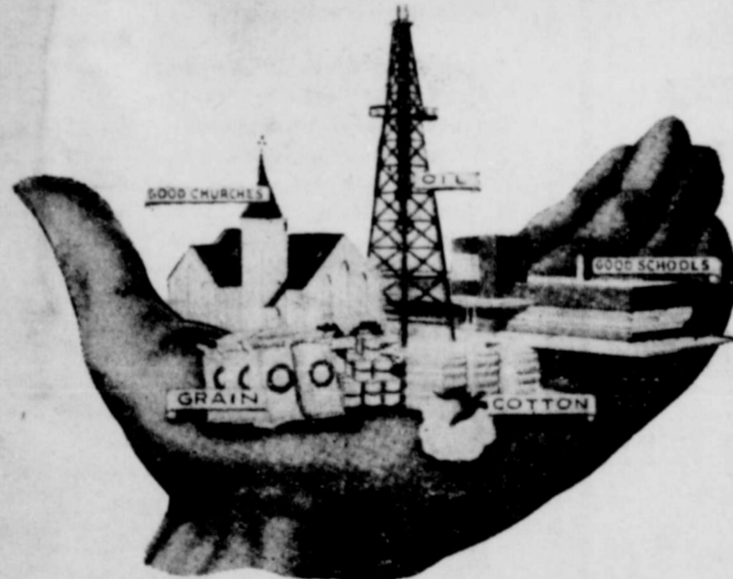

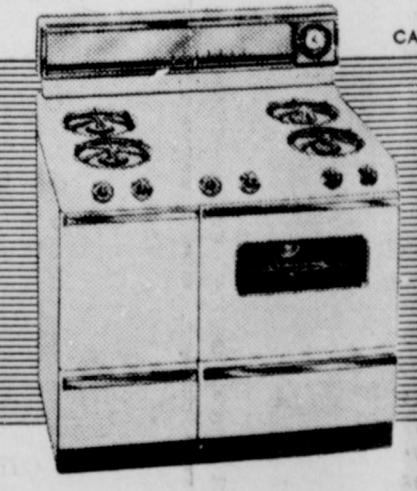

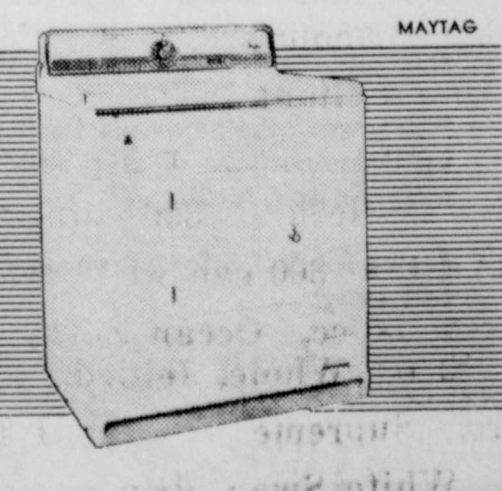

A limit of 50 pounds applies to certain overseas destinations addressed through New York. One hundred inches in length and girth is the maximum except to certain destinations through New York, Hardin added.

All articles should be packed in boxes of wood, or strong double-faced corrugated fiberboard. The boxes should be wrapped in heavy paper and tied with strong cord. Also a cushioning material should be used in the parcel as well as a slip showing contents and name of addressee.

Addressee must be legible and complete and should be printed directly on the wrapper.

Greeting cards for the Armed Forces overseas should be mailed during this same period if they are to have a reasonable expectation of delivery prior to Christmas, he said.

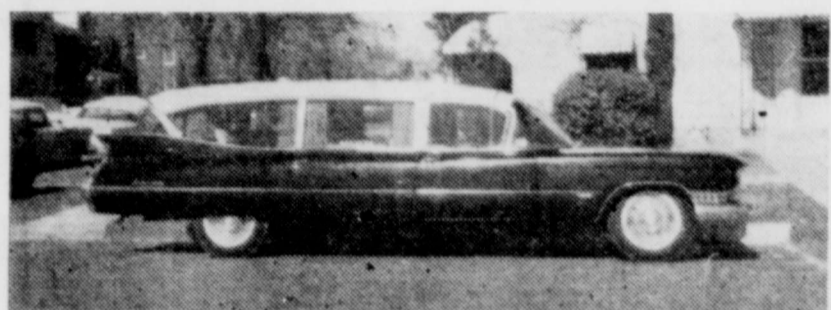
She is Secretary of the Cosmo-

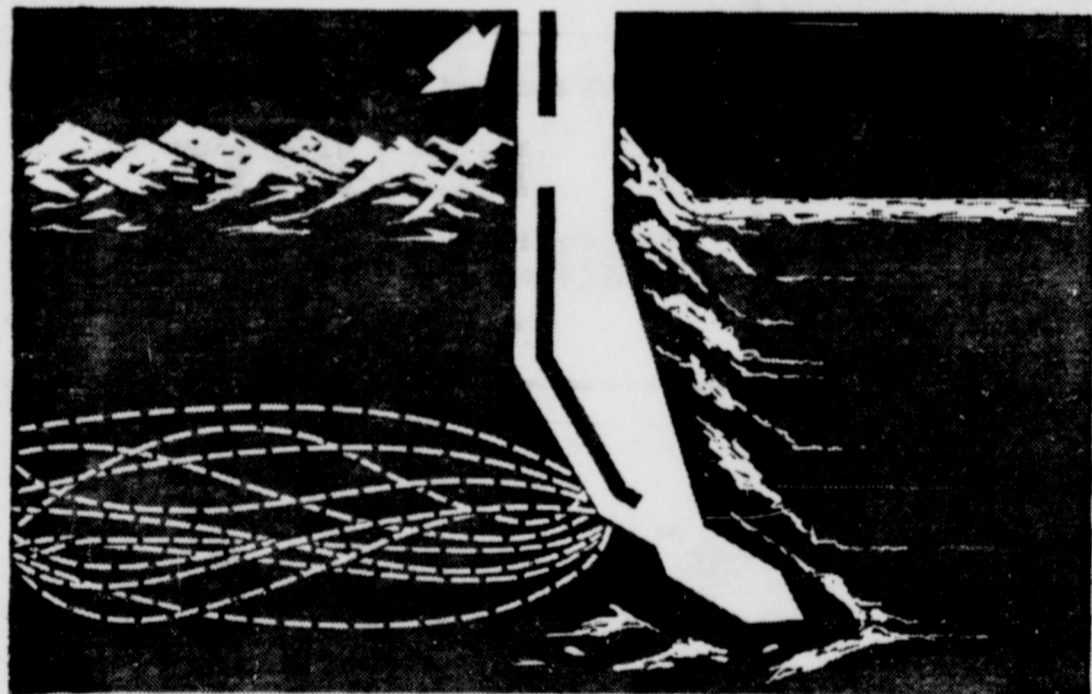

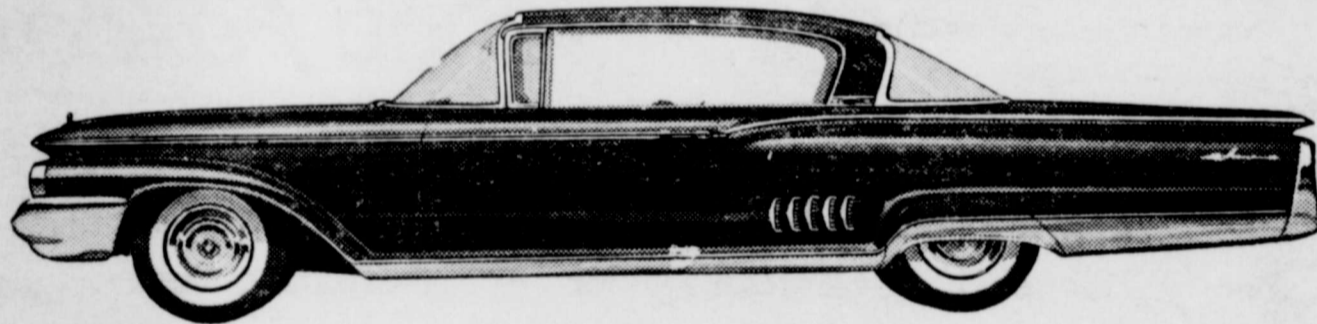

"PARENT-CHILD RELATIONSHIP"

Reading Time: 4 Minutes



Jehovah instructed Adam and Eve to "Be fruitful, and multiply, and replenish the earth..." (Gen. 1:28) After man's fall Eve gave birth to a son, and he was named Cain. From that day until now every child that is born brings about the relationship of parent and child. God has ordained a proper relationship that should exist but unfortunately, such a relationship does not exist in many homes today.

One of man's greatest blessings is to enjoy the thrill of having children. The coming of children, however, brings great responsibilities. Parents sometimes fail to realize just how great their responsibilities are. As a parent, one has the greatest amount of influence that is yielded upon his child.

Solomon said, "Train up a child in the way he should go; and when he is old he will not depart from it." (Prov. 22:6) Moses wrote concerning the duty of parents to children in teaching them the law of God. "And thou shalt teach diligently unto thy children, and shalt talk of them when thou sittest in thine house, and when thou walkest by the way, and when thou liest down, and when thou risest up." (Deut. 6:7) Isaiah said, "The father to the children shall make known thy truth" (Isa. 58:19) These were the instructions which were given to the people who lived under the Law of Moses. Though we are not living under this dispensation we can profit from the examples given.

As it was true in Old Testament times, it is true also in Christianity. The apostle Paul said, "Fathers provoke not your children to wrath; but bring them up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord." (Eph. 6:4) The first responsibility of a parent is to train the child to love and obey God. The new born's soul is pure and sinless, (Matt. 19:14) as it comes from God. It is the responsibility of the parent to teach the child about his God in order that his soul should not be lost. Remember the words of Solomon: "Train up a child..." If we as parents will but fulfill our obligation in this matter, we need not fear but that they will become servants of God. A parent also has the responsibility of teaching the child to respect his parents.

Under the Law of Moses God said, "Honor thy father and thy mother..." Ex. 20:12. Paul repeated this command in Eph. 6:2. He says it is the first command with promise. "That it may be well with thee and thou mayest live long on the earth." If parents fail to carry out this duty, it is little wonder that they will also fail the first responsibility of teaching their children to serve God. The teaching of children requires discipline. A parent who fails to discipline a child fails to recognize the truth of God's Word. "He that spareth his rod hateth his son; but he that loveth him chasteneth him betimes." Though some psychologists may have advocated the theory of not disciplining a child this writer has no fear in saying such a theory is altogether wrong. God's Word states that such is the case. Solomon was inspired of God when he wrote that we are not to "spare the rod." Inspiration overrides the theory of man. If more parents would follow the instruction of Solomon, our rate of juvenile delinquency would drop immeasurably. Three out of every five crimes being committed today are committed by teenagers. Unfortunately parents are forgotten in this matter, but the fact remains that they are largely to blame for the tragic scene. As a judge in juvenile court, Judge Sam Tatum of Nashville, Tennessee, listened to some 14,000 youngsters who came before him. Of this number only two (2) attended a Bible class of any kind regularly with their parents. Only ninety-three (93) attended a Bible class of any kind without their parents. These figures speak for themselves.

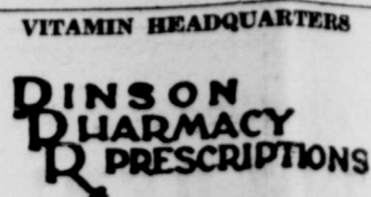
Hundreds of thousands will stand before God and will be condemned to a devil's hell because they failed as parents. If you are not a New Testament Christian parent you are failing your responsibility as a parent. If you are failing to "bring your child up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord" as a Christian you can consider yourself a failure as a parent. Net Income From Fertilizing Is Under Study

College Station, Texas — How much additional net income can farmers expect through proper fertilizer use? Four South Plains counties, Hale, Lamb, Lubbock and Terry, will seek the answer to this question during the coming crop year through a well-planned and expected Soil Fertility Program. The program will be built around four main points, Soil Testing, Water Management, Balanced Fertility and Crop Management, all of which have a direct bearing on net farm income. The effort will be spearheaded in each county, by the County Extension Agents with the assistance of Ben Spears, Extension Agronomist at Texas A&M College, who has been assigned as coordinator of the South Plains area.



Spears pointed out that all agencies, business groups and farm organizations who can make a contribution will cooperate in the soil fertility program, since it is designed to benefit all the people in the area. Practices recommended and used will be derived from research results and practical experience in the South Plains.

"Our objective is a measured increase in net income for the entire area," he said. "A team from the Agricultural Economics Department of Texas A&M College, with help from local people, will make studies by which we can measure the amount of increase in net income for each county."

fication of strengths and weaknesses in the program area under study:

(5) Upon completion of the study, a written report will be made summarizing the entire study pointing up strengths, weaknesses, and corrective and remedial procedures, and this will be transmitted to the Administration and the Board of Education;

(6) The Director and Coordinator of the study will present and analyze this written report to the Board and at the Boards pleasure representative citizens, patrons, and the school faculty.

Outcomes or Results
The study outlined above should result in a factual presentation upon improvement of the Abernathy Public Schools. In addition, it should upgrade the quality of the Abernathy Program, correct

deficiencies, improve strengths, and enable the school system to meet in a very creditable manner all of the standards of the Southern Association of Secondary Schools and Colleges. These outcomes, it appears, are very desirable to the Abernathy Public School system.

In discussing the length of time involved in this study, it is estimated that it would be well for the study to take part of the current school year and part of next

year. Specifically, if this study could be carried out in the winter and spring of this current year and completed in the fall of next year, then the ideal time for Southern Association Visitation would be April of next year. This arrangement would allow ample time for the identification of weaknesses and the application next fall of corrective and remedial procedures.
