SOIL TESTING GIVES ANSWER TO FERTILITY

(By Ollie Liner, County Agent)

You can't look at a soil and tell about its ability to supply nutrients for top crop production.

Selection of the proper fertilizer depends upon a knowledge of the nutrient needs of the crop and nutrient-supplying power of the soil on which the crop is to be

Determining the nutrient needs of your crops is comparable in many ways to diagnosing of human ills. The medical doctor observes the patient, obtains all information possible by questions, and then makes certain tests.

Similarly, you as an alert farmer can test your soil to determine its ability to feed your plants a balanced diet. A soil test will save you money by showing you how to put the "right" amount of the "right" plant nutrients in the "right" field.

The fertility level of many s in this county is too low for opti-mum crop production. For ex-ample, 85 percent are low in nitrogen, 50 percent are low in phosphate, and 80 percent lack organic matter for profitable crop production.

The question that every farmer should ask himself is: Do I know the fertility status of the fields on my farm? If not, "Don't guess - Soil test."

"Treasury records show that one out of every four taxpayers use the simplified income tax Form 1040A." says Howard O. Nichols, Administrative Officer of Internal Revenue Service, Lubbock.

Revenue's midget (size of an average bank check) tax form be used by individuals with total income of less than \$10,000, consisting of wages reported on Form W-2 and not more than \$200 in dividends, interest, and wages not subject to withholding.

Husband and wife may file a joint 1040A return for '59, of their combined income doesn't exceed the stated limits.

"Taxpayers using Form 1040A automatically claim the standard 10 per cent deduction allowed for such personal expenses as contributions, interest payments, med-

ical expenses, and such. Taxpayers with allowable deductions for these items in excess of 10 per cent of their income for '59 must use the standard form 1040, if they wish to claim them," Mr. Nichols explained.

Taxpayers with income under \$5,000 may figure their own tax, or have Revenue do the chore. Taxpayers with incomes of \$5,000 or more must figure their own

Form 1040A must not be used when taxpayers claim "head of household" or "surviving spouse" status; dividends received credit or retirement income credit, "sick pay" exclusion; deducts for travel, transportation, or "outside salesexpense; or estimated tax payment credit, the IRS repre-




