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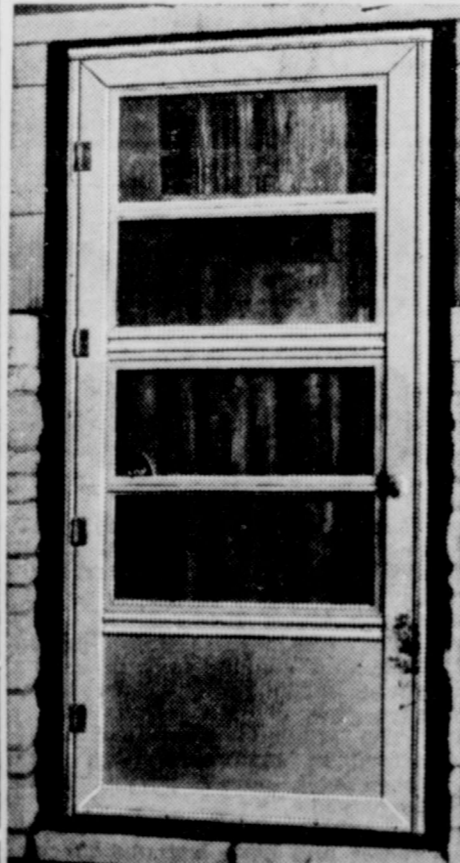

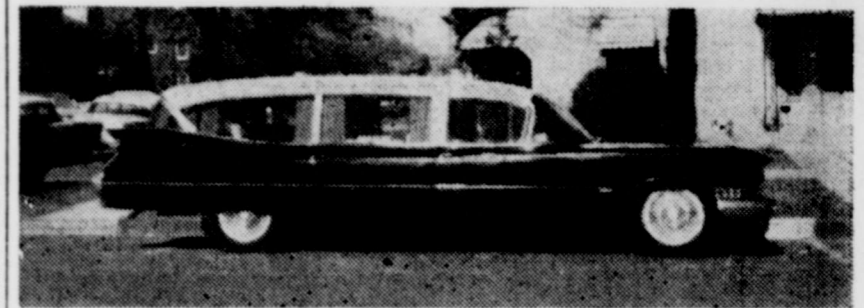

Census District Office Opened

Establishment of a district office for the 1960 Census of Population and Housing at Lubbock County Court House, Lubbock, was announced by Director James W. Stroud of the Census Bureau's regional office at Dallas.

Mr. Earl E. Kerr will be supervisor of the district office. He will direct a force of 24 crew leaders and 376 census takers in the following counties: Andrews, Bailey, Cochran, Dawson, Dickens, Floyd, Gaines, Garza, Hale, Hockley, Howard, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Martin, Mitchell, Terry and Yoakum.

Taking the 1960 Census nationally will require the services of 160,000 enumerators, 10,000 crew leaders, and 400 district supervisors, all temporary workers. The district supervisors, working under

the general direction of the permanent regional field directors, are responsible for all phases of the census in their districts. Duties of the district supervisor include the recruiting of the crew leaders, obtaining space for crew leader training, recruiting and training a small office staff, reviewing the completed questionnaires, and direct supervision of the field canvass which begins on April 1.

Prior to the start of the census, all households will receive in the mail an Advance Census Report Form, a new census-taking device which is designed to speed up the field canvass and provide more accurate statistics. Distribution of this form, which contains the basic population and housing questions, gives the family a chance to assemble information about each member in advance of the census taker's visit.

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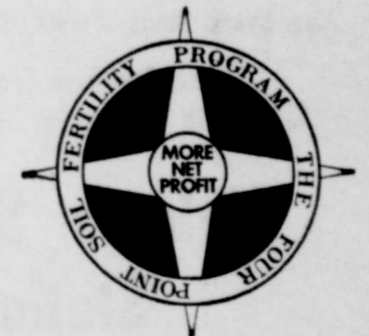

SOIL TESTING GIVES ANSWER TO FERTILITY

(By Ollie Lhner, County Agent)

You can't look at a soil and tell about its ability to supply nutrients for top crop production.

Selection of the proper fertilizer depends upon a knowledge of the nutrient needs of the crop and nutrient-supplying power of the soil on which the crop is to be grown.

Determining the nutrient needs of your crops is comparable in many ways to diagnosing of human ills. The medical doctor observes the patient, obtains all information possible by questions, and then makes certain tests.

Similarly, you as an alert farmer can test your soil to determine its ability to feed your plants a balanced diet. A soil test will save you money by showing you how to put the "right" amount of the "right" plant nutrients in the "right" field.

The fertility level of many soils in this county is too low for optimum crop production. For example, 85 percent are low in nitrogen, 50 percent are low in phosphate, and 80 percent lack organic matter for profitable crop production.

The question that every farmer should ask himself is: Do I know the fertility status of the fields on my farm? If not, "Don't guess — Soil test."

Humble Gets Two Large Blocks Of Wildcat Leases

Two large acreage blocks under oil lease in Hale County have been transferred to Humble Oil and Refining Company, curative title instrument reveal.

It was authoritatively stated that Humble had acquired wildcat blocks, with no immediately announced plan of development. Approximately 10,000 acres are included in the area lying north and east of Abernathy. To the south of that leasing Texaco and some independents concurrently acquired acreage.

There is another block of approximately 4,000 acres in the southeastern portion of Hale County, lying east of Highway 400, and south of the Tucco road, Highway 54. Leases there include portions of tracts in Hale, but extending into Lubbock County.

Humble has shown considerable interest in the past in the Mator Arch, southern Hale County. It drilled three tests on lands belonging to members of the pioneer Lutrick family in the Lakeview community.

One of these, the J. A. Lutrick No. 1, completed in February, 1948, is still producing. It is on section 14, block D8, eight miles west and one north of Petersburg. Humble holds that section under production.

The section south of this, owned by T. E. Lutrick, is among the tracts currently assigned to Humble. On it two wells were plugged in 1950, after initial production in the Cisco that was not deemed sufficient for commercial production.

It was in February, 1947, the interest of majors, independents and speculators were attracted to that general area by the completion of Stanolind's No. 1 Fisher with an initial production of 1,347 barrels daily, and continuously produced commercially since but, of course, at moderate rate.

Many holes were drilled, seeking the Cisco pay, found in reef

formation. No other producer emerged from this spirited activity.

To the southeast small production has been found in the Arick pool. There a well on the A. F. Byrd land was drilled into granite, dry and abandoned, subsequently to be produced shallower. Other production is there.

Undoubtedly the discovery of oil in the Honolulu test near Abernathy sparked the active leasing, but there has been continued interest in this Mator Arch, which has shown spotted production in Southeast Hale County. Across the county westward the Lee Irish No. 1, 10 miles west of Abernathy, was the county's discovery well, completed April 2, 1946, for 241 barrels. It is about the center of the tremendously productive Hale County portion of the Anton-Irish field. The clear Fork there had pay at 5,548. The discovery well total depth was 5,881.

Honolulu's well was abandoned, deemed not of commercial possibilities, under present oil-producing conditions.

Varying bonuses were paid for the leases now going to Humble. The annual rental is \$1 per acre, meaning some \$18,000 annually to land owners, on its and other recent leases, a good crop for which not one drop of water is pumped, no plowing, no seed, just harvest—clear net income.

CO-OP GIN OFFICE BROKEN INTO HERE

The Abernathy Co-Op Gin office was broken into Saturday night, Jan. 16, and two Lubbock juveniles were picked up the following day.

Tax Information

"Treasury records show that one out of every four taxpayers use the simplified income tax Form 1040A," says Howard O. Nichols, Administrative Officer of Internal Revenue Service, Lubbock.

Revenue's midget (size of an average bank check) tax form may be used by individuals with total income of less than \$10,000, consisting of wages reported on Form W-2 and not more than \$200 in dividends, interest, and wages not subject to withholding.

Husband and wife may file a joint 1040A return for '59, of their combined income doesn't exceed the stated limits.

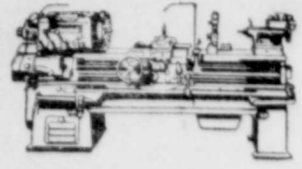
"Taxpayers using Form 1040A automatically claim the standard 10 per cent deduction allowed for such personal expenses as contributions, interest payments, med-

ical expenses, and such. Taxpayers with allowable deductions for these items in excess of 10 per cent of their income for '59 must use the standard form 1040, if they wish to claim them," Mr. Nichols explained.

Taxpayers with income under \$5,000 may figure their own tax, or have Revenue do the chore. Taxpayers with incomes of \$5,000 or more must figure their own tax.

Form 1040A must not be used when taxpayers claim "head of household" or "surviving spouse" status; dividends received credit or retirement income credit, "sick pay" exclusion; deducts for travel, transportation, or "outside salesmen" expense; or estimated tax payment credit; the IRS representative said.

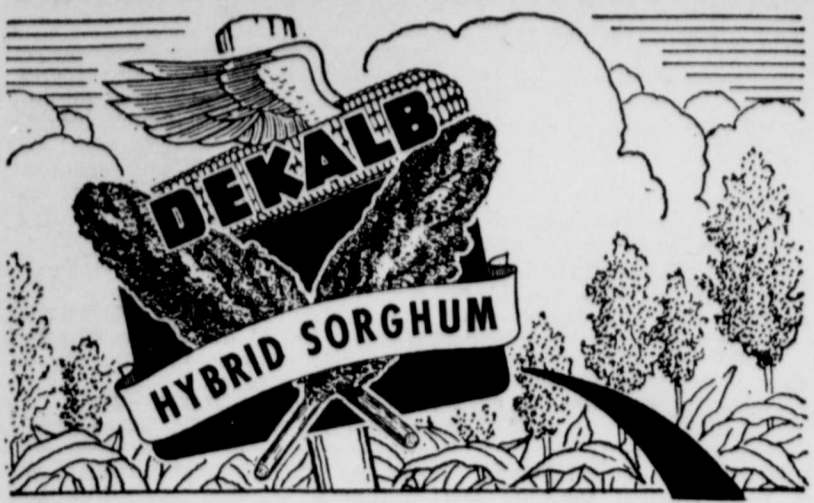
