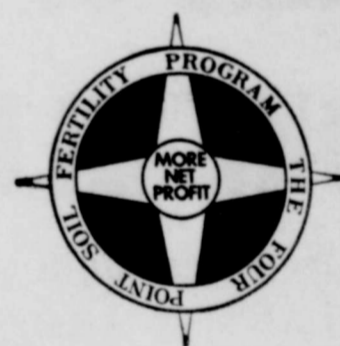

To Organize An Explorer Scout Group
 (By G. F. Rea)
 One may ask what is an Explorer or Explorer Post? For the unfamiliar, an Explorer is a member of an organization which is sponsored by the Boy Scouts of America, the same as the Boy Scouts, Cub Scouts, and Girl Scouts.

The Exploring program has been carefully designed to meet the needs of high school age boys. Using this program, adults can help boys become mature, responsible citizens.

The program is based on methods found effective during a half-century of dealing with American youth and on further information about high school age boys as mentioned in the beginning.

The Explorer program embodies the objective of the Boy Scouts of America in building for character, training for citizenship, and developing physical fitness among boys. Explorers subscribe to the Scout Oath or Promise, the Scout Law, and to this national Explorer Code:

As an Explorer —
 I believe that America's strength lies in her trust in God and in the courage and strength of her people.
 I will, therefore, be faithful in my religious duties and will maintain personal sense of honor in my own life.
 I will treasure my American heritage and will do all I can to preserve and enrich it.
 I will recognize the dignity and worth of my fellow men and will use fair play and good will in dealing with them.
 I will acquire the Exploring attitude that seeks the truth in all things and adventure on the frontiers of our changing world.
 Using the national Explorer Code as an introduction, each post creates its own code to which each member subscribes at an admission ceremony.

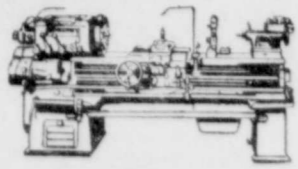

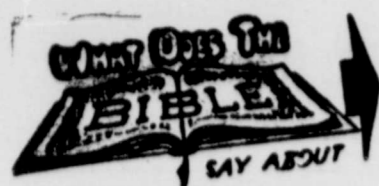

"DIVORCE"

In almost any daily newspaper one can read of divorces being sought while others are being granted. It is estimated that two (2) out of every four (4) marriages of today are ending in divorce. The popular view of prospective couples is, "If this (marriage) doesn't work out we'll just get a divorce and find someone else." The ability to obtain a divorce is becoming easier and easier in our courts. The legal term, "Mental Cruelty," for obtaining a divorce has a multiplicity of meanings. It ranges from the "burning of toast" to "snoring in bed." The startling factor of all, however, is that few seem to be concerned about what the Word of God teaches about divorce.

When asked about the question of divorce on Lord said, "Moses because of the hardness of your hearts suffered you to put away your wives; but from the beginning it was not so. And I say unto you, Whosoever shall put away his wife, EXCEPT IT BE FOR FORNICATION, and SHALL MARRY ANOTHER, committeth ADULTRY, and whoso marrieth her which is put away doth commit adultery" (Matt. 19:8-9). Here Jesus says that divorces under the law of Moses were tolerated by Jehovah because of the hardness of hearts by the Israelites. He further stated, however, that from the beginning (that is at creation of man and woman) God intended that man and woman should be united for life. (NOTE: "From the beginning it was not so" Matt. 19:8). Jehovah has a universal law governing marriage. This law is that one man shall marry one woman and they shall live together as man and wife until the death of one separates them. A divorce granted because of "Mental Cruelty" may be recog-

nized by the law of the state, but it is NOT RECOGNIZED by Jehovah.

As parents, we have the solemn responsibility of teaching this matter to our children. As a proclaimer of God's Word this writer cannot fail to teach and warn all prospective brides and grooms about God's law pertaining to marriage and divorce.

New Ruling On Cotton Acreage

Congress in the last session passed a law requiring a farm to plant 75 per cent of its cotton allotment or acreage must be released if the planting is not regarded as being made under provisions of the Soil Bank Act.

A farmer who releases his cotton allotment can maintain his allotment history provided cotton is planted one out of three years. John Martin, office secretary of the Hale County ASC, said.

Martin urged that farmers planning not to plant all or part of their allotment in 1960 to release that acreage before it is too late to get history credit on the farm.

Martin said a few acres have already been released. The released acreage will be apportioned to other farmers making application

for such acreage. In the past the Hale County ASC Committee has tried to apportion the released acreage to farms of hardship classification.

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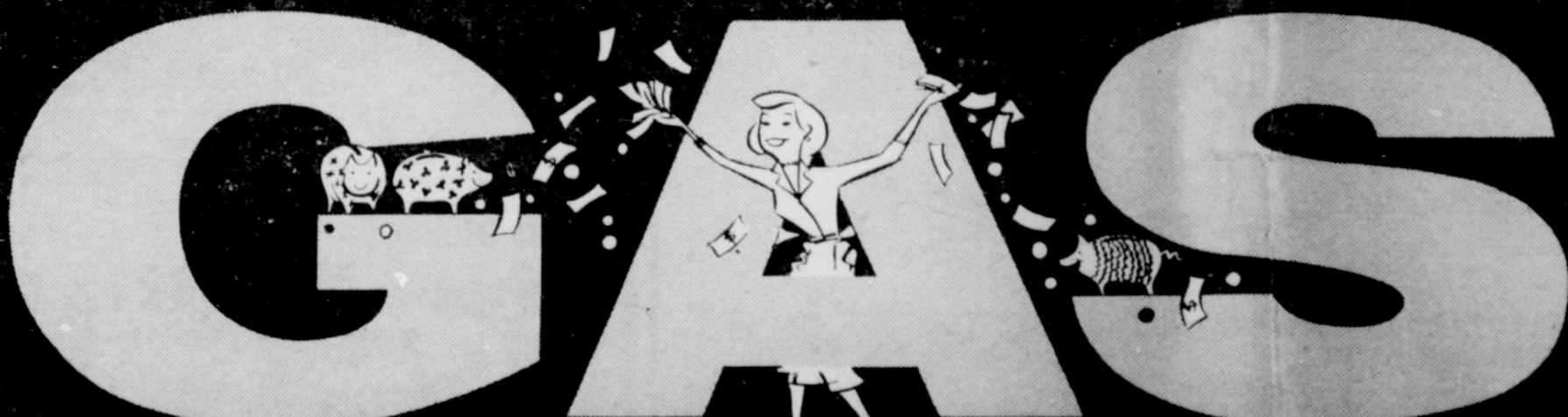

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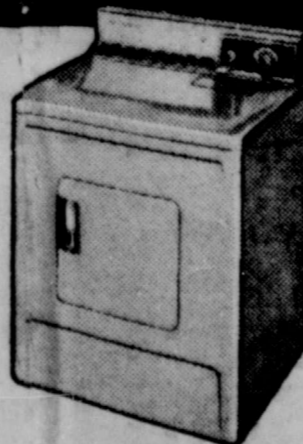
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
