1960 Choice B Cotton Sign Up

Through March 10, 1960, farm operators in Hale County had elected the Choice (B) program for the 1960 upland cotton crop on 237 farms, John B. Martin, County Office Manager, Hale County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office has announced.

This is the fourth report on the Choice (B) sign up for the 1960 upland cotton crop. Preliminary reports will continue to be made at approximately 2-week intervals until the March 16 deadline for electing the Choice (B) program. The final report will be made after the sign up is complete.

In Hale County, the Choice (B) elections registered thus far have increased cotton allotments for these farms by 67,176 acres. The Hale County Choice (A) allotment, before any increase resulting from Choice (B) elections, totals 169,197 acres.

Mr. Martin explained that the Choice (B) allotment for a farm is 40 per cent larger than the farm's Choice (A) allotment, but the crop raised on it will be eligible for price support averaging 23.18 cents per pound compared with the Choice (A) average support of 28.97 cents. Notice of both allotments and of the support available under each choice has previously been furnished to all cotton farm operators in the county.

A similar program was in effect for the 1959 upland cotton crop. If a farm operator does not notify the County ASC Office by March 16 that he wishes to elect the farm's Choice (B) allotment, the Choice (A) allotment will automatically apply on the farm for 1960.

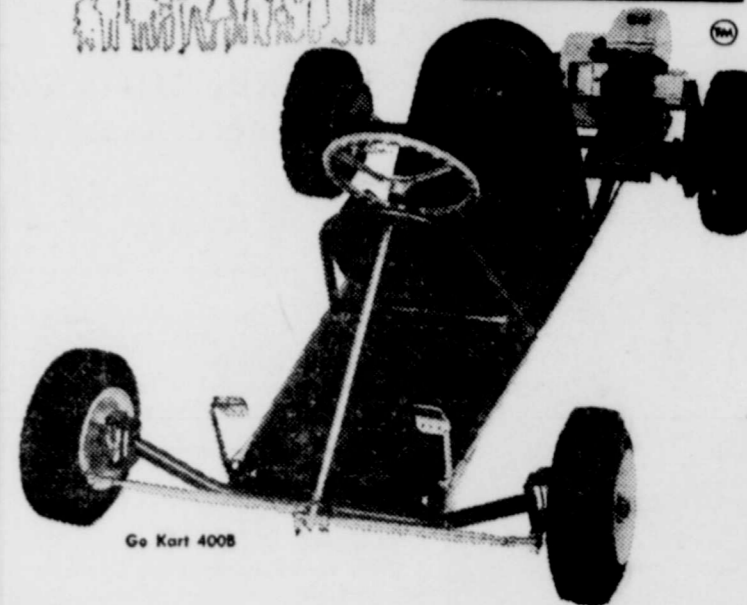

Sales Price For CCC Cotton Set

Minimum sales prices for Commodity Credit Corporation stocks of upland cotton have been determined for the 1960-61 marketing year, according to E. J. Pope, Jr., Chairman, Hale County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

The new sales prices are intended to emphasize farmers' marketings. The announcement at this time will provide farm operators with information on CCC's sales prices before the March 16 deadline for electing Choice (B) allot-

ments and price support for the 1960 crop.

For 1959 and prior crops of upland cotton in CCC inventory, the new minimum sales price will be the higher of (1) the market price as determined by CCC, or (2) 115 per cent of the 1960 Choice (B) loan rate. (This compares with the current 110 per cent of the loan rate.)

For 1960-crop cotton, the minimum sales price is as follows: When the cotton is sold by local sales agencies, the minimum sales price will be 110 per cent of the Choice (B) loan rate; when the cotton is sold by the New Orleans CSS Commodity office, the mini-

imum sales price will be the higher of (1) the market price as determined by CCC, or (2) 110 per cent of the Choice (B) loan rate.

Mr. Pope pointed out that carrying charges will be added to the sales price, beginning with 10 points in October 1960, and increasing 2½ points per month for each month thereafter to a maximum of 190 points in July 1961. The current monthly increase for carrying charges is 15 points per month for each month after October 1959.

Local Farmer With Grain Sorghum Team In S. A.

(Continued From Page 1)

As guest of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association last fall, Dr. Bonilla is president of the Colombian Feed Association, and director of Finca, S. A., an animal feed compounding plant.

After visiting with West Texas grain producers, livestock men and grain dealers last November, Dr. Bonilla has returned home to establish a "Texas-type" feed lot with Cebu cattle. Their main ration now is sugar cane stalk pulp, ground corn cobs and cotton seed meal. He indicated that the animals are making over two pounds a day gain on this feed but that he would feed grain in the ration if it were available.

Colombia at the present time prohibits the import of U. S. grain sorghum and other feed grains. Dr. Bonilla and other feed leaders are attempting to get the restrictions removed and are requesting that they be allowed to import grain sorghum to strengthen Colombian livestock and poultry economy.

U. S. Ambassador Dempster McIntosh of the American Embassy in Bogota welcomed the feed grain group and congratulated Elbert Harp and the Grain Sorghum Producers Association attempt to establish new markets for their product. He and his agricultural attache, Dr. Henry Hopp, offered full embassy support in initiating feed grain programs in Colombia.

At the Escuela Nacional Agrícola "La Molina," the National Agricutural College of Peru, another friend of grain sorghum was discovered by the group. Dr. Antonio Bacigalupo, a former student at Texas A. & M. College is conducting feed lot cattle and "pig Parlor" hog research. His present ration to native cattle consists of various levels of cotton seed meal with chopped cotton stalks, corn cobs and trace additives. In his opinion Peruvian cattle will not receive grain in their rations as long as local grains are as high priced as they now are and outside cheaper grains are taxed out of their reach. The sorghum association leaders found a 20% import tax on grain sorghum—virtually prohibiting its movement into Peruvian market. A 4% tax is placed on imported corn.

After further study of livestock, poultry and feed situations in Venezuela and Guatemala, the grain specialists will return home and make recommendations to the U. S. Department of Agriculture and grain producer groups as to potentials for expanding U. S. feed grain exports in South America and suggest programs that may result in larger grain sorghum and feed grain markets.

Enclosed is a brief press release we have prepared and some pictures. We have had a very interesting trip and hope that we are doing some good. Our findings are encouraging but vary from country to country.

In Colombia, Mr. Bonilla, who visited in our area last Fall, has set up a feed manufacturing association which is starting a drive along with the poultry association and cattle association to get the government to allow them to import grain. This is all a result of his visit to our area last Nov. 9. They have great hopes of getting such an approval for grain sorghum but are not going to ask for permission to import corn now. Our visit really seemed to get the wheels rolling in Colombia. It has been an interesting trip and we have been very busy. The agriculture attaches have a full schedule set up when we arrive in a country.

Our group believes this trip will be of great value to us in establishing feed grain markets around the world.
