1960 Choice B Cotton Sign Up

Through March 10, 1960, farm operators in Hale County had elected the Choice (B) program for the 1960 upland cotton crop on 237 farms, John B. Martin Office Manager, Hale County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office has an-

This is the fourth report on the Choice (B) signup for the 1960 upland cotton crop. Preliminary reports will continue to be made at approximately 2-week intervals until the March 16 deadline for electing the Choice (B) program. The final report will be made after the signup is complete.

In Hale County, the Choice (B) elections registered thus far have increased cotton allotments for these farms by 67,176 acres. The Hale County Choice (A) allotment, before any increase resulting from Choice (B) elections, totals 169,

Mr. Martin explained that the Choice (B) allotment for a farm is 40 per cent larger than the farm's Choice (A) allotment, but the crop raised on it will be eligible for price support averaging 23.18 cents per pound compared with the Choice (A) average support of 28.97 cents. Notice of both allotments and of the support available under each choice has previously been furnished to all cotton farm operators in the

A similar program was in effect for the 1959 upland cotton crop. If a farm operator does not notify the County ASC Office by March 16 that he wishes to elect the farm's Choice (B) allotment, the Choice (A) allotment will automatically apply on the farm for 1960.
