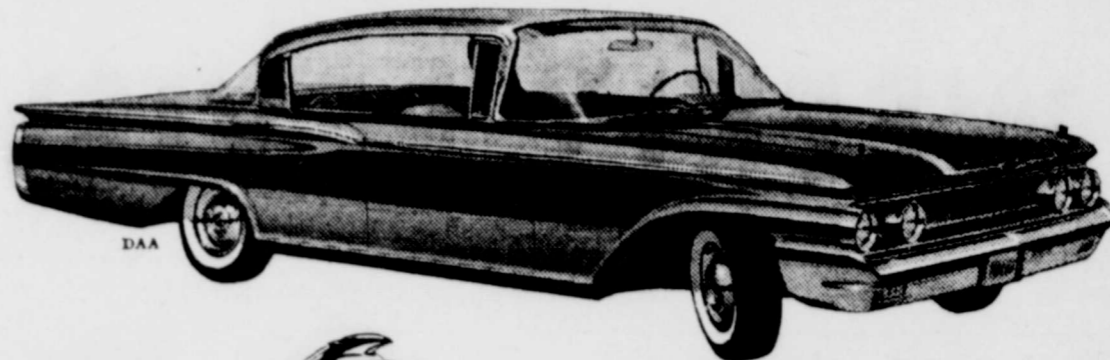

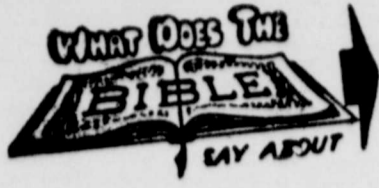

"AUTHORITY"

Nothing is capable of functioning without authority. Governments tumble frequently because the people will not recognize them as authority. They are unable to maintain law and order when the subjects of such a country refuse to recognize their authority. The system of military service would be chaos if service personnel did not recognize their superiors as having authority. The reason many homes contain unruly children is a lack of authority by parents. These mother and dads do not discipline their children into recognizing their authority, and as a result these children are not in subjection to their parents. Not only is this true in these phases of life, but it is also true in religion.

What is one's basis of authority in religion? Some would say, one's authority is his conscience. Others say, it is whatever one feels is right. How can one know what is his basis of authority? The Bible can furnish one completely in matters of righteousness, therefore, it is evident that this should be our only basis of authority.

If you have been following the stipulations found in a creed, manual, or discipline, instead of just following the New Testament, we urge you to give up this practice. Children's Photos To Be Made

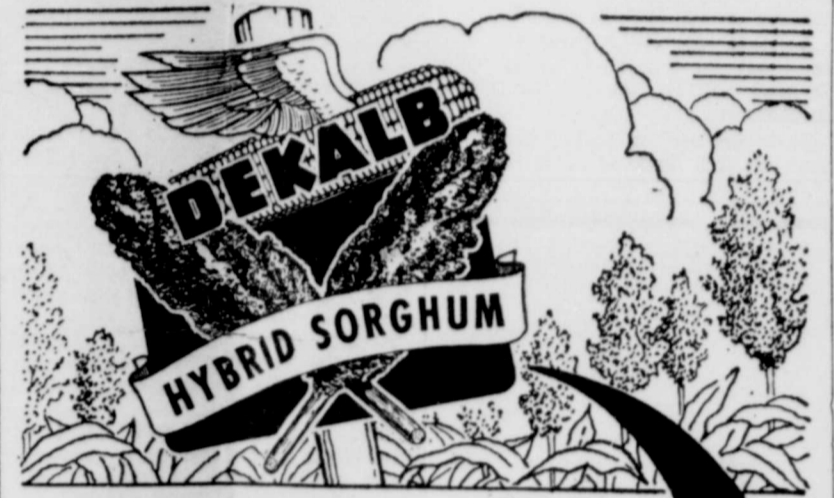

NEWS from the High Plains
Research Foundation

All wells at the High Plains Research Foundation are now connected by underground concrete lines with the addition of 2138 feet of 15-inch line. This line added to the existing 4050 feet will now service all but a small area of the farm. Also 1291 feet of 12-inch seal gasket concrete line has been installed. Another 2800 feet of underground line will complete the system so that no open ditches will be needed for irrigation. Research has shown losses in open ditches because of evaporation, and deep percolation is very high in the High Plains. Underground concrete line eliminates these losses and adds to ease of operation.

Farmers in the High Plains are asking the question, "Should I preplant irrigate?" In order to find the answer to this question, soil moisture blocks have been placed in four locations at the High Plains Research Foundation, James Valliant, Water Engineer, announced.

Three of these locations are on Pullman clay loam on three types of land surface, as follows: (1) sloping land, (2) benched land, and (3) gentle sloping land.

A fourth location is on Amarillo clay loam in the southwest section of the Foundation farm.

These blocks are placed at depths of one, two, three, and four feet. Available soil moisture data will be released at weekly intervals with the hope that it may be helpful to farmers in deciding whether to preplant irrigate.

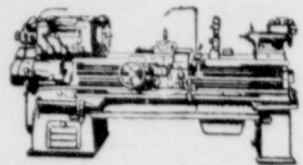
