

Considerable amount of publicity has been channeled through the columns of the Free Press the past month, concerning the sales tax, thus citizens should be well informed of the upcoming election.

You can buy it fresh, pickled or canned. To cook fresh tripe, simmer in water about an hour. Serve creamed in a sauce, fried in deep fat or as an ingredient in pepper pot-a thick soup.

Looking for something different in salad making? Use canned grapefruit juice as the liquid when preparing unflavored gelatin. Add finely shredded cabbage, fresh grapefruit sections cut into bite-size pieces, finely chopped green pepper and minced onion. Serve on lettuce with mayonnaise.

Fried chicken is always a favorite. For corn crisped drumsticks, dip in undiluted evaporated milk, then roll in corn flake crumbs seasoned with salt, pepper and any other seasoning desired. Bake in foillined pan at 350 degrees F for

Most poultry sold whole can be roasted. However, stewing chickens and mature turkeys are more tender if braised or

Roast turkey uncovered for best color and to reduce splitting and shrinkage. Poultry can be roasted with or without stuffing. Unstuffed birds take slightly less time to cook,

To reduce foaming when cooking dry beans, add 1 tablespoon meat drippings or other fat to the cooking water for each cup of beans.

Trim leafy vegetables, like lettuce and cabbage, sparingly. The dark outer leaves are especially rich in nutrients.

City Sales Tax Fair And Equitable

As a growing city, Haskell needs substantially increased revenues for improving and strengthening services, and to finance much needed capital improvements. Present methods of financing and complete dependence on the ad valorem property tax for revenues are insufficient to provide for present needs and future

Additional revenue is needed to hire more policemen; street lighting needs to be increased; street maintenance must be accelerated; vital city departments must be better manned and equipped and capital improvements must be made on a planned basis

Funds obtained from a city sales tax could help solve these needs and bring about numerous improvements.

Hunting, An Old American Custom

Approximately one out of every five or six American males is a hunter. Few other sports offer as much to as many people. In terms of activity and wholesome adventure, hunting exercises the body and stimulates the mind. In financial terms, it with its ramifications of transportation, gear and arms is in the billiondollar-industry class.

The National Rifle Association is proud of its hunting members and proud that they stand for the best in this field of sport, just as its match competitors patriotically represent the United States in International and other competition and its collectormembers keep alive the historical traditions of America.

Like so much else in the United States today, hunting is beset by problems. If those problems are to be solved, and we believe guests of Dr. and Mrs. J. F. they will be, the NRA ranks high among the organizations working to satisfactory solutions. For one thing, the NRA is doing its share to present the hunter in an appropriate and favorable light to the great non-hunting public.

The first point in the NRA Hunter's Code of Ethics, to which more than four million graduates of the NRA Hunter Safety Training Program subscribe, provides that the hunter consider himself "an invited guest of the landowner" and behave so that he "may room and an extra adjusting be welcome in the future."

Those are among the most important words in hunting today, As cities expand, industries spread, and open land shrinks, the problem of finding a place to hunt becomes increasingly difficult. Every urban area is ringed by suburbs and much of the land around and beyond the suburbs is posted with "No Hunting" and "No Trespassing" signs. For the latter, hunters in general have only themselves to blame. Most of the blame, it should be said. attaches to the unduly carefree sportsmen who are neither NRA Members nor NRA-indoctrinated. These are the types who blast at signs, break fences, disregard regulations, and roam at random without permission of landowners. In numbers, they are, fortunas well be the hordes of Genghis Khan or Attila the Hun.

The third point of the NRA Hunter's Code of Ethics provides that the hunter will not only obey all game laws and regulations himself but will insist that his companions "do likewise". While NRA Members, who constitute a relatively small proportion of the 15 to 20 million hunters in the U. S., can hardly police the entire field, they can make their influence felt for the better in

The surest way to prevent the closing off of privately-owned areas where game abounds is to demonstrate to the owners of the areas that their property, safety and personal wishes will be respected. A universal attitude to that effect could make "No Hunting" and "No Trespassing" signs vanish almost overnight, instead of breaking out over the country-side like an epidemic rash.

Much of the solution to the problem is so simple. It lies in things as elementary as remembering that the firearm in your hands is a responsibility, not a toy: in acting like a grownup; in remembering that alcohol and guns do not mix. It can all be summed up in one word: Behave. Like a hunter, Like a man. Like a good American.
