Weed Control Week In Hale Is April 18-23

The week of April 18 through April 23, 1960, has been proclaimed Hale County Weed Control Week. Highlights of the week will include the Third Annual Weed Control Conference on April 20 at the National Guard Armory in Plainview followed by the Annual Conference of the Texas Weed Control Association in Bushland on April 21.

An informative program is plan-ned for the Hale County Conference including speakers from Kan-sas Experiment Stations, Texas Experiment Stations, and the Hale County Noxious Weed Control District. Subjects to be discussed range from the use of 2, 4-D on the South Plains to Weed Research in Kansas. The Hale County 4-H Club Weed Demonstration Team which has gained statewide recognition through its appearance throughout the Texas Panhandle and South Plains area at various meetings and over television, will perform at both the county and state meetings. Three members of the board of directors for the Hale County District will be elected at the county conference representing Hale County Precincts, 3, 4, and the county at large. Board members presently serving in these capacities include C. E. White representative of Precinct 3 from Cotton Center. E. O. Snelling representative of Precinct 4 from Edmonson, and W. F. Holloway of Petersburg as county at large representative.

The meeting will be terminated by a lunch served through the courtesy of the commercial chemical distributing concerns, who will also display the latest materials and equipment used for weed control and eradication. The public is invited to attend.
