The gin has completed its 27th year of operation with a total for the season of 8689 bales ginned and 3,570 tons of seed marketed.

During the past 10 years, this cooperative has ginned a total of 91,827 bales and has returned some \$986,730.44 in savings to its farmer - owners. The Association's gin plants have been steadily improved until they are among the best in the area.



"ITS OWN POWER"

The writer of the Hebrew letter states, "For the word of God is quick, and powerful, and sharper than any two edged sword, piercing even to the dividing of soul and spirit, and of the joints and marrow, and is a discerner of the thoughts and intents of the heart" (Hebrew 4:12). The Bible claims its own inspiration, and authority (II Tim. 3:16, 17), and is able to save men's souls. James wrote, "Wherefore lay apart all filthiness and superfluity of naughtiness, and receive with meekness the engrafted WORD, WHICH IS ABLE TO SAVE YOUR SOUL" (Jas. 1:21). Men of yesteryears heard God's Word, believed it to the point of obedience and became children of God. Man can still obey this same message.

As evidence that the Bible is powerful enough to make Christians, and ONLY Christians, the following is offered as conclusive proof: A great indigenous restoration movement has taken place in South India. It began in the States of Kerala and Madras and is spreading over much of the nation. 5. "Instrumental music" is not used in the worship services."
