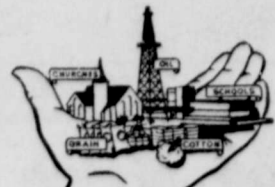

**NOTICE OF ELECTION FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS STATE OF ABERNATHY COUNTIES OF HALE AND LUBBOCK**

**TO ALL RESIDENT QUALIFIED VOTERS OF THE CITY OF ABERNATHY, TEXAS, WHO OWN TAXABLE PROPERTY IN SAID CITY, AND WHO HAVE DULY RENDERED THE SAME FOR TAXATION:**

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held in the City of Abernathy, Texas, on the 31st day of May, 1960, in accordance to a resolution and order duly entered by the City Council on the 4th day of May, 1960, which is as follows:

**RESOLUTION AND ORDER FOR CITY BOND ELECTION THE STATE OF TEXAS CITY OF ABERNATHY COUNTIES OF HALE AND LUBBOCK**

ON THIS, the 4th day of May, 1960, the City Council of the City of Abernathy, Texas, convened in special session, at the regular meeting place thereof in the City Hall, there being present and in attendance the following members, to-wit:

MAYOR, E. O. Graham, ALDERMEN: W. F. Wolf, R. K. McAlister, David R. Pinson, and Lon Carmickle, and the following absent: J. W. Hale, constituting a quorum; and among other proceedings had, were the following:

Mayor Graham introduced a resolution and order. Alderman McAlister moved its adoption. The motion was seconded by Alderman Wolf. The motion, carrying with it the adoption of the resolution and order, prevailed by the following vote:

AYES: Aldermen Wolf, Pinson, McAlister, and Carmickle. NOES: None.

**THE RESOLUTION AND ORDER IS AS FOLLOWS:**

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Abernathy, Texas, deems it advisable to issue the bonds of said City for the purpose hereinafter mentioned; therefore

**BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ABERNATHY, TEXAS:**

**SECTION 1:** That an election be held on the 31st day of May, 1960, which date is not less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this resolution and order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the qualified electors of said City who own taxable property therein and who have duly rendered the same for taxation:

**PROPOSITION NUMBER 1:** "SHALL the City Council of the City of Abernathy, Texas, be authorized to issue SIXTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$60,000) general obligation bonds of said City for the purpose of constructing a public building, to-wit: a Municipal Annex in and for said City; said bonds to mature serially over a period of years not to exceed twenty-five (25) years from their date, and to bear interest at a rate not to exceed FIVE PER CENTUM (5%) per annum, payable annually or semi-annually; and to provide for the payment of principal and of interest on said bonds by levying a tax sufficient to pay the annual interest and to create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem said bonds as they become due?"

**PROPOSITION NUMBER 2:** "SHALL the City Council of the City of Abernathy, Texas, be authorized to issue NINETY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$90,000) general obligation bonds of said City for the purpose of constructing street improvements in and for said City; said bonds to mature serially over a period of years not to exceed twenty-five (25) years from their date, and to bear interest at a rate not to exceed FIVE PER CENTUM (5%) per annum, payable annually or semi-annually; and to provide for the payment of principal and of interest on said bonds by levying a tax sufficient to pay the annual interest and to create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem said bonds as they become due?"

**SECTION 2:** That said election shall be held at the City Hall, in the City of Abernathy, Texas, and the entire City shall constitute one election precinct.

**SECTION 3:** That the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of the election, to-wit: James I. O'Neill, Presiding Judge

Mrs. Lynn Young, Judge Mrs. Charles Wilson, Clerk Mrs. George Ragland, Clerk

**SECTION 4:** That said election shall be held under the provisions of and in accordance with the laws governing the issuance of municipal bonds in cities, as provided in the General Laws of the State of Texas, and only resident qualified electors, who own taxable property in the City, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be qualified to vote.

**SECTION 5:** That the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with Chapter 6, V.A.T.C.S. Election Code, as amended, and that printed on such ballots shall appear the following:

**PROPOSITION NUMBER 1:** "FOR THE ISSUANCE OF \$60,000 MUNICIPAL BUILDING AN-

EX BONDS AND THE LEVY OF A TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

**PROPOSITION NUMBER 2:** "FOR THE ISSUANCE OF \$90,000 STREET IMPROVEMENT BONDS AND THE LEVY OF A TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

**SECTION 6:** AS TO EACH of the foregoing two propositions, each voter shall mark out with pen or pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his or her vote on the two propositions respectively.

**SECTION 7:** That a copy of this resolution and order, signed by the Mayor of the City and attested by the City Secretary, shall serve as proper notice of said election.

**SECTION 8:** That notice of said election shall be given by posting and publication of a copy of this resolution and order, at the top of which shall appear the words "NOTICE OF ELECTION FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS." Said notice shall be posted at three public places in said City, one of which shall be at the City Hall, not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date on which said election is to be held, and be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Abernathy, Texas, and published in said City, the first of said publications to be made not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date set for said election.

## Post Office Building

(By James A. Joy, Abernathy City Attorney)

In view of the fact that the voters of the City of Abernathy are being asked to vote on the proposal to grant an option to purchase a part of the present city park, it is felt that an explanation of the procedures and requirements of the U. S. Post Office Department should be given to the people of Abernathy.

First, the Post Office Department is required by regulations to call for sealed bids when a new building is contemplated. The Department may proceed on an "approved site" basis, which means that only that site or sites deemed suitable for the location of a Post Office may be approved in the first instance. The owner or owners of the approved site or sites are required to place an option price upon said site, in line with the valuations of like property in comparable locations.

If the price is too high in the opinion of the Post Office Department, then the site may be rejected in the first stages. If the price or prices are approved, the party owning the site may grant an option to the site or sites to the U. S. Post Office Department. Bids are then submitted on the rental of the building to be constructed in accordance with the plans and specifications of the Post Office Department. The low approved bidder is then awarded the lease contract for a term of ten years, with an option to the Post Office Department for two additional five year terms, and proceed to construct the building.

The City Council of Abernathy feels that if the Post Office is to be located on the City Park beside the present City Hall, that the City should retain ownership if at all possible, by constructing the building. However, under the rules of the Post Office Department, the City is required to put the site up on an option to the Post Office Department, so that in the event any other party under bids the City and secures the lease, that party may acquire the property at the price placed thereon by the City. The City Council is going to use its very best judgment in bidding on the lease contract in an attempt to secure the bid, and having the advantage of already owning the City Park, should be able to under bid anyone who would have to lay out \$30,000 for the site in addition to the cost of constructing the building.

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held in the City of Abernathy, Texas, on the 31st day of May, 1960, in accordance to a resolution and order fully entered by the City Council on the 2nd day of May, 1960 which is as follows:

**RESOLUTION CITY OF ABERNATHY COUNTIES OF HALE AND LUBBOCK**

ON THIS, the 2nd day of May, 1960 the City Council, City of Abernathy, Texas, convened in regular session, at the regular meeting place thereof in the City Hall, there being present and in attendance the following members, to-wit:

MAYOR, E. O. Graham, ALDERMEN: J. W. Hale, Lon Carmickle, David Ray Pinson, R. K. McAlister, W. F. Wolf, and with the following absent: None, constituting a quorum; and among other proceedings had, were the following:

WHEREAS, the Post Office Department of the U. S. Federal Government requires that anyone building must grant an option to acquire said tract of land owned by the City of Abernathy, Texas;

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Abernathy, Texas, deems it advisable and of the best interest of the citizens of the City of Abernathy, Texas, to submit a bid to the U. S. Post Office Department on the construction of said building; therefore,

**BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ABERNATHY, TEXAS:**

## D. W. Crain Jr., School Band Director, Resigns

The resignation of Abernathy's most successful band director, D. W. (Dub) Crain Jr., was publicly announced Sunday at the annual Band Concert at the school auditorium.

A hurt silence fell over the audience as Superintendent Noel Johnson announced Mr. Crain's decision to retire from the band teaching profession to enter private business.

Mr. Crain came to Abernathy in 1952 and during the past eight years has caused Abernathy's Antelope band to be highly recognized and respected throughout the South Plains of Texas and even in Oklahoma.

His first year here, the High School Band won a II-II rating in the Interscholastic League meet, but advanced to six Sweepstakes ratings during the next seven years. They won Sweepstakes in 1953, 1954, 1955, 1957, 1958, 1959 and again this year, in 1959 they received a II-I rating.

During that time here, Mr. Crain's Junior High Band has won three Sweepstakes ratings.

All in all during his eight years here, the local bands, under the direction of Mr. Crain, were entered in 53 parades and contests.

Mr. Crain, who is a veteran of World War II and the Korean Conflict, came to Abernathy from Lovington, New Mexico, where he had been band director for three years. (During that time he was recalled to service for the Korean affair.)

He is a graduate of Abilene High School and Hardin-Simmons University, Abilene. He was a member of the Hardin-Simmons University Cowboy Band.

Mr. Crain, his wife Mary Frances, and their 13-month-old son, Ferrell Ray, plan to move to Amarillo about mid-July where, on August 1, he will assume the position of Sales Representative for the Caldwell Music Co., of Amarillo.

School Superintendent Noel Johnson reported that no applications for the vacancy left by Mr. Crain will be accepted until after the June meeting of the School Board. The Board meets the first Monday night of each month.

## "Were You Counted" In 1960 Census? See The Bank's Ad

With the 1960 Census of Population and Housing virtually completed locally, District Supervisor Earl E. Kerr today announced the beginning of a "Were You Counted" campaign to insure that no resident of the area has been overlooked.

Persons who believe they have been missed by the census takers are urged to notify the census district office by means of "Were You Counted?" forms. Area newspapers are printing these forms in current editions as a public service. Prompt mailing of the "Were You Counted?" forms will speed up the compilation of preliminary population figures for the area.

Preliminary figures presenting the total population of incorporated places of 10,000 or more population, and for counties, will be issued as soon as the district supervisor is convinced that a complete count has been made. Final, detailed population figures will be issued in Washington later this year after the returns have been tabulated on the Census Bureau's electronic computers.

The importance of a complete count was stressed by the district supervisor. He pointed out that the population figures compiled in the current census must stand as official until the next Federal Census.

Federal aid funds are allotted to State and State funds, in turn, are allotted to counties and municipalities on a per capita basis. So a short count means a short allotment. Thus, it is imperative that we have a complete count. The help of every resident of the area is needed to reach this goal," he said.

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### Windbreak Stock Made Available Through SCD

Farm windbreak planting stock is being made available again this year through the cooperation of Hale County Soil Conservation District and local nurseries. Applications can be made at the agriculture building in Plainview for cooperation with the District in obtaining windbreak planting material at a reduced cost.

Requests should be made as early as possible to be able to pick up the trees by planting time. Arizona Cypress is the chief species being used for tree planting, according to Joe C. Tinney, work unit conservation supervisor. Arizona Cypress is usually planted in single rows eight feet apart. Double rows may be used with spacings of 16 feet apart, staggering the trees. Tinney urged extreme care be used in establishing a windbreak. Trees through the first

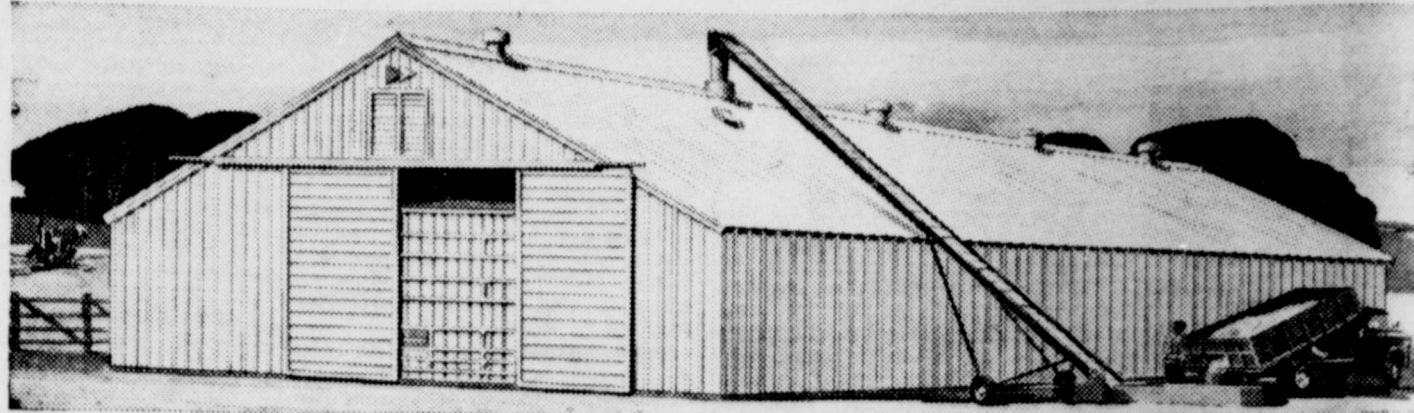

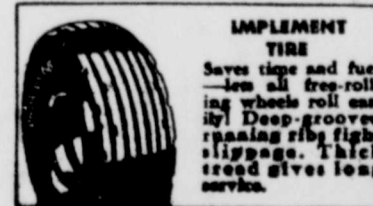

**"ITS PROPER DIVISION"**

Reading Time: 4 Minutes

Much of the confusion and misunderstandings in the religious world today results from an improper division of the Truth that has been revealed unto us by the Holy Spirit. All the Scripture has come from God and is profitable to us but we are under the law of Christ now (I Cor. 9:21). God gave all authority to Christ according to Matthew 28:18. There was a time when God spoke unto the fathers by the prophets, but in the last days he is speaking to us by His Son (Heb. 2:1-2). In the presence of Peter, James, John, Moses, and Elias, a voice came out of a cloud and said, "This is my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased; hear ye him." (Matt. 17:5).

Peter quoted from Deut. 18:15 in Acts 3:22-23 and said, "For Moses truly said unto the fathers, a prophet shall the Lord your God raise up unto you of your brethren, like unto me, him shall ye hear in all things whatsoever he shall say unto you. And it shall come to pass, that every soul, which will not hear that prophet, shall be destroyed from among the people."

Every word that God has spoken has been steadfast regardless of whom He has spoken through and those who set aside His word or disobeyed it suffered the consequences (Heb. 2:1-2). The person who despised the Law that God gave through Moses died without mercy under two or three witnesses, then the question is asked, "Of how much sorer punishment, suppose ye, shall he be thought worthy, who hath trodden under foot the Son of God, and hath counted the blood of the covenant, wherewith he was sanctified, an unholy thing, and hath done despite unto the Spirit of grace?" (Heb. 10:29).

Jesus Christ spoke things which were never spoken by Abraham, Moses, or other great characters of the Old Testament. Since Christ is our spokesman and our authority we are to hear Him rather than to hear what was spoken through others at earlier times. Christ did not contradict a new truth, but he did inaugurate a new

teaching and a new practice. This does not mean that those who lived before Him were lost because they did not know His teachings, and practice it, but it does mean that they never lived under it. It is a misuse and misapplication of the Scriptures to say that one can be saved today living and following exactly the same teaching that Noah, Abraham, Moses, or David practiced. Thousands lived before Christ was born who were never under His law at all, but WE ARE UNDER HIS LAW.

of Texas under which the City of Abernathy operates, the City may not convey the City Park or any part thereof except by vote of the residents of the City; therefore, it is necessary that the proposition be voted upon since there is a possibility, though remote, that the City could be under bid and be forced to sell the proposed site.

The south 100 feet of the City Park has been approved by the real estate department of the Post Office Department as the only site suitable for the location of the new Post Office. However, no approval of the price set by the City Council will be forthcoming until after the election.

By the laws of the State of Texas as it is necessary that the bonds voted upon for the construction of the building be general obligation bonds rather than revenue bonds, although the revenue from the lease of the building will be used to retire the bonds, thereby requiring no additional taxes to build and maintain the new building.

The new municipal annex building will conform in architecture and design to the present City Hall building, thereby keeping the attractiveness of the City Park intact. The City Council feels that the appearance of the Park would actually be improved, in addition to serving the City with a modern well-located accessible Post Office.
