WAS TEACHER HERE

Miss Dodie Stokes To Join Dr. Tom Dooley's Medico Team In Cambodia Hospital

Dodie Stokes, a teacher in Abernathy school, has accepted a position with Medico and left Tuesday of this week for Fort Worth and will fly from there to New York City. There she will be joined by six other persons and will leave some time between June 22 and July 5, by commercial air lines for Cambodia where she will be stationed at the town of Kratie, with the Kratie Hospital. She goes as a medical technician. Six other persons are leaving with her, one doctor, his wife and son, one technician, one woman doctor and one nurse. The first stop enroute is Paris.

Medico, established by Dr. Tom Dooley who has spent several years in that part of the world, teaching backward and uneducated people how to better take care of themselves and others, is a well established concern with ample backing in the work they are doing.

Dr. Dooley began almost as a one-man team but has grown steadily and today he has an organization of international operation which has gained the respect of many nations and bids fair to be one of the very best ambassa-

dors of America and the Americas. Miss Stokes handed in her resignation Wednesday of last week to Superintendent Noel Johnson who stated that he is holding it until July 5, the date she is to leave New York.

Individuals Urged To Cooperate In All-Out Mosquito Control Program

Abernathy is girding its City officials and medical forces to protect the city and surrounding area against another possible outbreak of viral encephalitis. The recent infestation of the area with mosquitoes has certainly raised the possibility of such a catastrophe. One of the prime weapons against an outbreak is an intensified mosquito control program. The program actually began early this year with the spreading of insecticides in the surrounding lakes in this area, which so far, tests have failed to reveal any larvae growing in any of the ones near by. The mosquitoes are apparently moving in from the surrounding country, and harboring in tall grass and weeds within the city, and breeding in water traps from the recent rains, such as tin cans, old tires, etc.

The city at the present time is spraying, and powdering the insecticides daily with the weather conditions permitting. However, the success of getting rid of these pests is going to depend upon individual responsibility of cleaning, spraying their own premises. The city hall will furnish free of charge the necessary insecticides for its citizens to use on their premises.

The city officials have been urged to pass an ordinance to require the cleaning of vacant lots within the city limits that harbor the potential crippling encephalitis mosquito. Immediate action is suggested to guard against any possible epidemic. We realize that we can't kill them all, but we'll make a special effort to get into places where the greatest risk is to be found.

There were 161 cases of infectious encephalitis in the state last year. The majority of the cases were in this immediate area. This disease carries a very high death rate, and those who survive experience severe brain damage. The American Public Health Association lists these points in the suggestive preventive measures against the encephalitis carrying Sulex tarsalis mosquito:

Legal Notice

ORDINANCE NO. 95
AN ORDINANCE REQUIRING THAT ALL LOTS AND TRACTS OF LAND WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF ABERNATHY BE KEPT CLEAN.

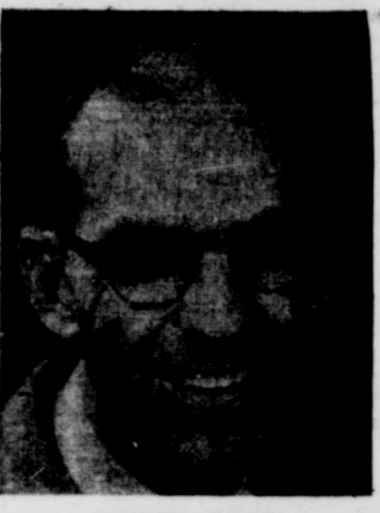
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ABERNATHY, TEXAS:

SECTION 1: Each lot owner within the City Limits of Abernathy is required to keep the lot clean of weeds, grasses and other growth (except trees, etc.) in excess of 4 inches, and all refuse, garbage and other trash.

SECTION 2: After notice from the City of Abernathy to clean the lot or lots, the City may proceed to clean said lot or lots and charge the owner thereof \$5.00 per hour for the time involved, and said charge will constitute a lien against said property.

PASSED, APPROVED AND ADOPTED, this 21st day of June, 1960.

The annual South Plains Soap Box Derby races are to be held Monday night, June 27, at 7 o'clock in Lubbock. This is said to be the earliest race to date in the Derby's history.

Prior to the big race, a final inspection of all racers entered in the event will be inspected at Modern Chevrolet Co. in Lubbock this Saturday afternoon. A preliminary inspection of the racing cars of the local entries was conducted last Thursday evening at Reid Chevrolet.

Forty Abernathy boys and one New Deal lad will enter this year's Derby races in Lubbock Monday night, announced Edwin Crow, who is in charge of local Derby activities.

Abernathy Volunteer Fire Department Reorganized

About 30 local men met in Abernathy city hall Monday night for the purpose of reorganizing the Abernathy Volunteer Fire Department. Of the 30, 24 signed up for active membership in the department.

This action was taken after the city and fire department received letters from the Board of Insurance in Austin in regards to the deficiencies and discrepancies of our local fire fighting equipment, facilities, and number of men on the force.

The Board of Insurance stated if the local department was not reorganized and functioning properly and according to their specifications within sixty days from the date of the letter, Abernathy

would be declared a city without a fire department and the key rate on insurance would jump to \$1.00. This would cost the citizens of Abernathy an additional \$13,000 in insurance premiums next year.

The Board of Insurance specified that Abernathy should have a force of at least 25 men on the fire department, requiring that at least 17 of them be present for the two-hour drills to be held twice each month.

In reorganizing the department Monday night, new officers were elected as well as a new assistant fire chief. Ed Crow was re-elected to serve as fire chief due to his previous record and experience in that capacity.

The newly elected officers of the Abernathy Volunteer Fire Department are: Eddie Eldredge, president; Jim Bob Smith, vice president; C. J. Berutti, secretary-treasurer; Ed Crow, fire chief; and H. C. McMahan, assistant fire chief.

Tri-City Drag Race Association Schedules Races Here This Sunday

Lloyd Jones, president of the Tri-City Drag Race Association announces a series of N.H.R.A. sanctioned races Sunday June 26 at the Abernathy Drag Strip located on the airport section four miles east of Abernathy. Using paved FM 597, and following the

directional signs, the drag strip site, by this route, is six miles from town.

These races are strictly a sporting event as no cash prizes are given, only trophies. A cash prize will be given however to anyone who breaks the local track record, 146 plus miles per hour. The prize will be \$100.00 and is the only money prize given and only when the local track record is broken. The national record is slightly over 172 M.P.H. and was made with an Allison 12 cylinder aviation engine, about 1,000 H. P. in a light steel tubing chassis with a truck transmission and a tug boat clutch. There is no slip in this particular type of clutch.

Drag races are strictly an acceleration race. That is they race against time to attain the maximum speed in the space of one quarter-mile. They make a standing start and work for the highest speed possible by the time they reach the finish line. They are timed both for speed and time with N.H.R.A. approved electronic timing devices. The highest speed at the finish line may not necessarily be the winning car as it is possible for it to have accelerated slower in the first half of the distance and been beaten by a car with a lower top speed at the finish which had less elapsed time from start to finish.

Almost any kind of a car with any kind of body or perhaps no body at all may enter these races if they meet the required safety regulations. These safety regulations contain such devices as Roll Bar, Seat Belts, Crash Helmets, Leather Coats, Safety Goggles.

THE TEXAS PANHANDLE WILL REMEMBER C.R.O.P. WITH WHEAT

Farm families, elevator managers, ministers, bankers and others of the Texas Panhandle are working together for CROP dur-

ing the 1960 wheat harvest. As the wheat comes into the local grain elevators, many producers have a share of it put aside for the Christian Rural Overseas Program. Following the harvest local CROP officers will check these elevat-

ors and arrange for the movement of the grain to those in need overseas. Many refugees from behind the iron or bamboo curtain are kept alive by bread from wheat contributed thru CROP. Children born in refugee camps have no ration cards. Were it not for CROP and similar organizations, these children would have little or no food except that given them by adults from their meager rations. Those wishing to contribute wheat can do so at any grain ele-

vator in their area. Elevator managers not now supplied with transfer blanks and receipts can receive them by contacting H. M. Nichols, Asst. Texas CROP Director, Box 518, Panhandle, Texas or contact J. C. Eiring, Route 2, Plainview, who is the Hale County chairman. It was reported that a donation of \$1.00 will provide 440 pounds of corn meal, dried milk, or wheat.
