Pension Law In Change July 1

Many important changes will be made by the new pension law which the Veterans Administration is now taking steps to put into effect on July 1. Our Veterans' County Service Officer, G. E. Ragle, recently attended a school of instruction on the provisions of this new law, and he urges all interested persons to contact him at his office in the courthouse at Plainview for information and assistance.

All veterans and widows who are now receiving Pensions through the V. A. (do not confuse Pension with Compensation, which is paid for service-connected disabilities or death) will receive a pamphlet and an election form in the envelope with their check about March 1. These persons may

choose to continue to receive benefits under the present law, or they may elect to come under the new law. The election form should not be completed if the pensioner desires to remain under the present law, and every possibility should be considered before a change is made because such choice is final.

Many children and unmarried widows of deceased veterans who have not been eligible to receive pension benefits under the requirements of the old law will become eligible under the liberalized provisions of the new law. These persons should make applications soon so that payments will begin for the month of July. Since the V. A. nor the County Service Officer has any way of knowing who or where the widows and children are who may now be eligible, the assistance of the general public is requested in seeing

that they seek information and assistance.

Your Veterans' County Service Officer is available to all area veterans and their dependents to advise and assist in any of the many types of problems which arise under the numerous laws now in effect, and you are invited to avail yourself of his services at any time.

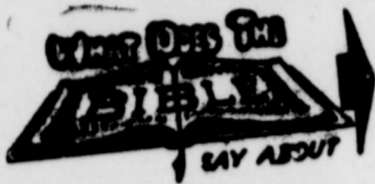

"THE CHURCH OF CHRIST"

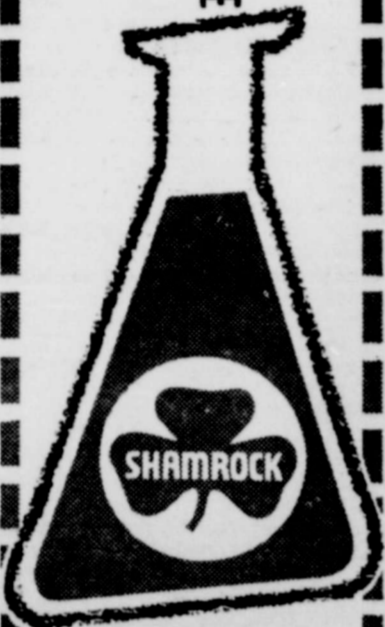

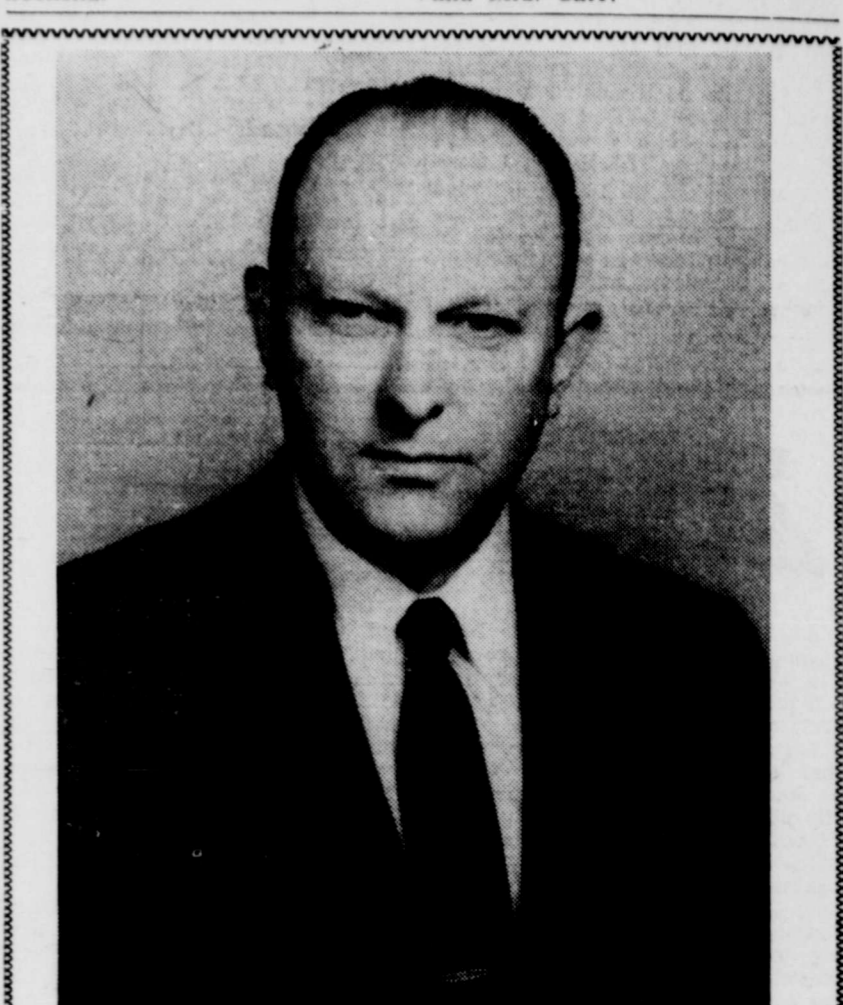

ORDINANCE NO. 96
AN ORDINANCE REQUIRING THE VACCINATION OF ALL HORSES KEPT WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF THE CITY OF ABERNATHY AND PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR FAILURE TO DO SO:

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ABERNATHY, TEXAS:
SECTION 1. Any person or persons who keeps a horse or horses within the City Limits of Abernathy shall have said horse or horses vaccinated against encephalitis at intervals recommended by the City Health Officer. Each owner of a horse or horses within the City Limits, if called upon to do so, shall produce evidence that said horse or horses owned by said person or persons and maintained and kept within the City Limits of the city of Abernathy, has been so vaccinated.
SECTION 2. Any person or persons who violate the terms of this Ordinance is subject to a fine not to exceed Two Hundred and no/100 (\$200.00) Dollars.

miles an hour, slammed into the train without slowing.

The train, according to patrolmen, was traveling about 60 miles an hour.

Mrs. Lightholder's car struck the locomotive and was dragged several feet before becoming disengaged from the train, at which point Mrs. Lightholder was thrown out of the car and against a telephone pole approximately 65 feet from the track.

Bounced Into Ditch

Upon disengaging from the locomotive the automobile bounced and struck the train a second time, crashing into the first passenger car. It then bounced into a ditch, demolished.

Justice of the Peace George H. McCleskey, who conducted an inquest at the scene, said Mrs. Lightholder apparently died instantly when her head struck the

telephone pole.

Engineer of the train was John Ward Ecker, 63, Slaton.

Ecker told highway patrolmen he saw the automobile near the crossing and began blowing his whistle.

Car Didn't Slow

The automobile did not slow down, Ecker said.

It was believed that the radio and air conditioner in Mrs. Lightholder's car were being operated at the time of the accident, and that the windows were rolled up.

Investigators theorized that Mrs. Lightholder had not seen or heard the train.

Mrs. Lightholder was driving west on the farm road, and the train was headed south toward Lubbock, officers said.

Cared For Children

The car Mrs. Lightholder was driving belonged to her daughter and son-in-law, Margaret and Vernon McDougal, who live northeast of New Deal.

Mrs. Lightholder had been car-

ing for her four grandchildren while the McDougals were vacationing in Hawaii. The McDougals were expected to return to New Deal Friday or Saturday.

Ironically, Mrs. Lightholder in March 1952 was the first person to be honored by the Lubbock Citizen's Traffic Council for courteous driving.

Record Is Noted

At that time it was pointed out by officials of the CTC that Mrs. Lightholder had been driving since 1918 and had never been in an accident or received a citation for a moving violation.

The Lightholders have been residents of Lubbock since 1936, moving here from Wichita Falls. Lightholder is a painter and long has been active in trade union circles in Lubbock.

Survivors include three daughters, Mrs. McDougal, who resides near Abernathy and who was vacationing in Hawaii; Mrs. George

Harris, El Paso; and Miss Mark Lightholder, Carlisle; four sisters, Mrs. A. D. Fish, Pampa; Mrs. Bertha Linton, Buena Vista, Colo.; Mrs. Brandy Bratcher, Plainview; and Mrs. Mary Rice, Lovington; five brothers, Albert Sullivan, Chyanne, Wyo.; Tom J. Sullivan and W. E. Sullivan, both of Midland; H. A. Sullivan, La Prior, Tex.; and Bob Sullivan, Ropesville; and six grandchildren.

Mrs. Lightholder's death was the 42nd traffic fatality of the year on the South Plains. On the same date last year, 63 persons had died in area traffic smash-ups.

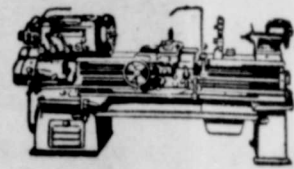
