Our grandson, Mark Havens, was two years old July 5, and for those 24 months I have refrained from boring readers of this column with my dotting grandfather role. Here is one exception to the rule, but only because of its political significance. Mark is genuinely afraid of the toothsome caricature of Senator John F. Kennedy appearing on the front cover of the July 4th edition of Newsweek magazine. There are a few but few things or situations that scare Mark, but he audibly complains and hides his eyes when confronted with the Kennedy drawing.

If the Democratic Party expects to elect a president in 1960, delegates to the National Convention, starting July 11 in Los Angeles, had better stay away from Senator Kennedy as a candidate. There are millions of voters who are just as afraid of Senator Kennedy as a presidential candidate as Mark is of his caricature.

Pressure is being placed on the Democratic National Committee in the form of letters now being received urging that Senator Kennedy not be nominated. In the event he is nominated by the Los Angeles Convention, this pressure then will be directed to a vigorous campaign against him.

The Democrats had no chance of beating Eisenhower in 1956 for his second term, but they now have a good chance of defeating the Republican nominee . . . Nixon? Rockefeller? Goldwater? The Democrats have a chance, providing they DO NOT nominate Senator John F. Kennedy.

I hope the Democrats will not be deluded by the West Virginia primary in which Senator Kennedy won over Senator Hubert Humphrey in a state that is only four per cent Catholic. The voters of West Virginia had no choice in their primary, or we might say Senator Kennedy had no opposition within the state against Humphrey in the race against the Republican candidate who will be real opposition to Kennedy, or

Abernathy Has Hectic July 4th

Strong winds unroofed decking from the home economics building under construction at the east end of the high school structure, and two Lubbock women came near "un-roofing" an Abernathy woman to make it a hectic Fourth of July in Abernathy. Added to this was a real gone fireworks stand. High wind tumbled a firework stand 75 feet, with the manager inside the small building.

Lawsuit Planned To Establish Depletion Tax Credit

Having failed to obtain a favorable ruling from the Bureau of Internal Revenue that would establish ground water in the southern High Plains of Texas as a depletable natural resource and allow a deduction on federal income tax returns, the High Plains Water District No. 1 is girding for a lawsuit to establish its contention.

Suit will be filed in the name of some representative land owner. The contention is that underground water in the area is a natural deposit and that it is being depleted; and that owners using it to produce income should be allowed the deduction for depletion. Basis would be calculation under cost rather than percentage depletion methods.

Cost of the litigation will be met by the district, which levies a tax on land included in the district.

Outside and expert legal counsel will be retained.

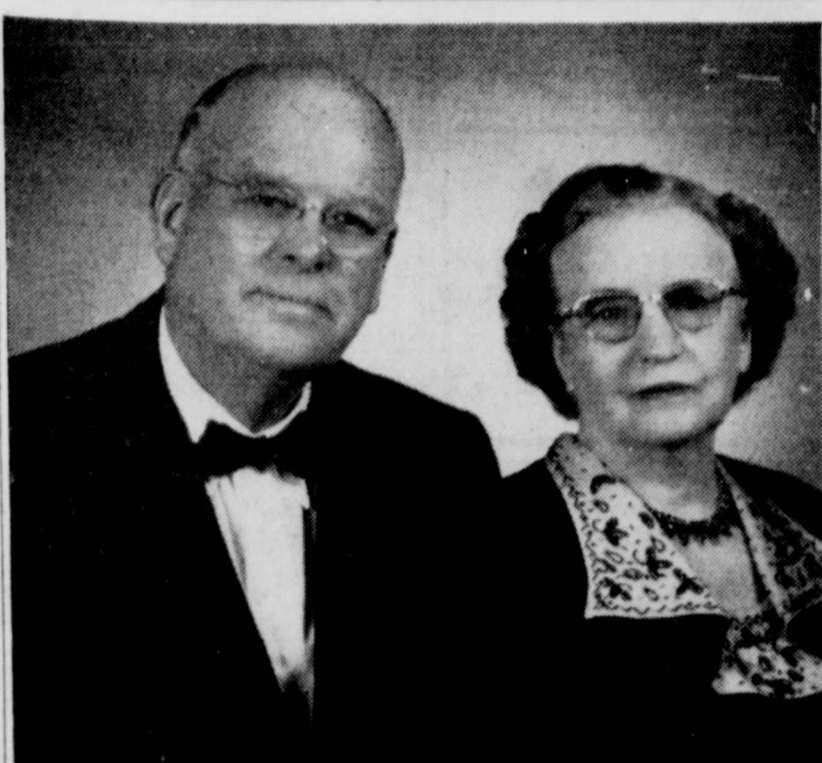
Should the principle be established it would be applicable to all land owners in this area.

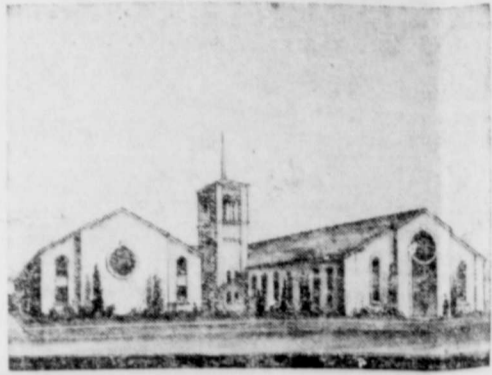

87 Texans Were Poison Victims During 1959

(By Dr. Kenneth Gregory, City Health Officer, Abernathy, Texas)

According to Texas State Health Department statistics, there were 87 deaths from solid and liquid poisons during 1959. Aspirins and salicylates led the causes, followed by noxious foodstuffs (toad stools and poisonous plants). Barbiturates and petroleum products deaths are not as high as some other causes because prompt medical action is usually successful in saving the victim.

A breakdown of ages in poison deaths show 17 deaths for children one-to-four years old, the age of inquisitive toddlers. Thirty-one persons between the age of 45 and 64 died from poisoning, most resulting from an overdose of medicines. Least number of deaths was in the five to 14 age group, with only one death during 1959.

Additional poisonings during 1959 were attributed to deadly gases. Forty-two were reported during the year. Death from carbon monoxide gas was the leading cause, claiming 35 lives.

In nearly all cases of accidental poisoning, negligence or error is the cause. Care should be exercised in the handling of all potential poisons.

Abernathy was rather fortunate this last year and only one known death was caused from poisoning. This was due to an overdose of aspirin in a two and a half year old child. Parents are to be very careful of any kind of medicines left within reach of small children. The newer kinds of medicines are disguised with good tasting additives which are advantageous in getting the children to take them when they are actually needed, however, also entice small children to take potentially poison drugs. Another frequent cause of accidental poisoning is due to mislabeling, or poor identification of drugs by the adult persons, who keep numerous old drugs cluttering up the medicine chests.

I will repeat again: Care should be exercised in the handling of all potential poisons.

On Storage of
Farm Chemicals**

College Station—Safe storage of agricultural chemicals is vital to farm safety, says the Texas Farm

and Ranch Safety Council. One recommendation the Council makes for safe storage of chemicals is to always use properly labeled containers. Chemicals may look like other compounds such as sugar or soft drinks. Without a label it is impossible to distinguish between a danger-

ous substance and one that is safe. Agricultural chemical labels not only explain how the material is to be used but also the safety precautions that should be observed.

The Council lists these Commandments of Chemical Storage:
Have an organized place for storage.

It is best to use or dispose of small amounts of left-over chemicals.

When chemicals of any kind are stored, be sure the label is kept intact.

Keep chemicals stored in a dry place away from fire or other sources of ignition.

Keep the chemical storage place locked to keep out children and others who are not responsible.

Store highly toxic chemicals, those having skull and cross-bones on label, high enough to be out of reach of children should they get into storage area.

Never stack one chemical on top of another.

Check label for instructions so that chemicals that should not be stored together are separated.

Increased mechanization marked the Texas cotton harvest in 1959-60. Machine stripping and picking accounted for 44 percent of the State's upland harvest last year . . . up from the 35 percent for a year earlier.

ashamed of the gospel of Christ for it is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth; to the Jew first, and also to the Greek." (Rom. 1:16).

9. **PREACHING**—"It pleased God by the foolishness of preaching to save them that believe." (I Cor. 1:21).

10. **FAITH**—"Without faith it is impossible to please Him, for he that cometh to God must believe that He is, and that He is a rewarder of them that diligently seek Him." (Heb. 11:6).

11. **REPENTANCE**—"Except ye repent, ye shall all likewise perish." (Luke 13:3).

12. **CONFESSION**—"If thou shalt confess with thy mouth the Lord Jesus, and shalt believe in thine heart that God hath raised Him from the dead, thou shalt be saved." (Rom. 10:9).

13. **BAPTISM**—"Baptism doth also now save us." (I Pet. 3:21). "He that believeth and is baptised shall be saved." (Mark 16:16).

14. **LOVE**—"Every one that loveth is born of God." (I John 4:7). "If ye love ye will keep my commandments." (John 14:23).

15. **WORKS**—"Ye see then, how that by works a man is justified, and not by faith only." (Jas. 2:24).

16. **OURSELVES**—"Save yourselves from this untoward generation." (Acts 2:40).

Some sixteen things have been noted to which man's salvation is ascribed, and this is only a partial list. Surely this should convince the honest reader that man is not saved by faith alone. Some may try in vain to mark down the price of salvation, but the true friends of God will hold forth all the conditions as they are found in the Scriptures.
